

**45-DAY INITIAL STATEMENT OF REASONS  
FOR  
PROPOSED BUILDING STANDARDS  
OF THE  
CALIFORNIA BUILDING STANDARDS COMMISSION  
REGARDING THE 2019 CALIFORNIA BUILDING CODE,  
CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS, TITLE 24, PART 2  
  
(BSC 02/18)**

The Administrative Procedure Act (APA) requires that an Initial Statement of Reasons be available to the public upon request when rulemaking action is being undertaken. The following information required by the APA pertains to this particular rulemaking action:

**STATEMENT OF SPECIFIC PURPOSE, PROBLEM, RATIONALE and BENEFITS:** (Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(1)) requires a statement of specific purpose of each adoption, amendment, or repeal and the problem the agency intends to address and the rationale for the determination by the agency that each adoption, amendment, or repeal is reasonably necessary to carry out the purpose and address the problem the agency intends to address for which it is proposed. The statement shall enumerate the benefits anticipated from the regulatory action, including the benefits or goals provided in the authorizing statute.)

**General purpose, problem, rationale and benefits:** The California Building Standards Commission (BSC) proposes to repeal the adoption of the 2016 California Building Code (CBC), which is based on the 2015 International Building Code (IBC). BSC proposes to adopt the 2018 IBC, most recent edition of the model code, for codification and effectiveness into the 2019 edition of the CBC. This action is to meet the requirements of Health and Safety Code (H&SC) §18928 assuring adoption of the most recent edition of model code within one year of its publication. In addition, H&SC § 18934.5 assures that the commission shall adopt, approve, codify and publish building standards for those occupancies under BSC's authority. These actions meet criteria (3), in the public interest, and (7), incorporation of model codes, of H&SC §18930(a).

BSC proposes to carry forward existing amendments from the 2016 California Building Code for inclusion in the 2019 California Building Code, unless specifically modified below.

**A statement of specific purpose, problem, rationale and benefit for each item is as follows:**

**ITEM 1. CHAPTER 1 – DIVISION I, SECTION 1.1 GENERAL**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC proposes to amend *Chapter 1, Division I, Section 1.1.1 Title* of the code to update the year edition of the model code edition.

BSC proposes to update the year of the model code being adopted in this cycle to meet statutory obligation to adopt latest edition of model code within one year of publication, and to correctly identify the year of the model code incorporated into the 2019 California Building Code. This proposed action will clarify the model code edition of the building standards code intended for publication as the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24. Additionally, an editorial change is being proposed for Section 1.1.3.2 to add an “s” to the singular word “Section” to create the word “Sections”. Lastly, another editorial change within Section 1.1.8.2 is being proposing to change the singular word for “city” to “cities” to be grammatically correct.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended Approve as Submitted (AS) to the proposed amendment to *Chapter 1, Division I, Section 1.1.1*

**CBSC Response:** The CBSC agreed with the CAC recommendation.

## **ITEM 2. CHAPTER 1 – DIVISION I, SECTION 1.2, BUILDING STANDARDS COMMISSION**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC proposes to amend *Chapter 1, Division I, Section 1.2, sub-section 1.2.2, item #1 Title, and to add a new item #2 to identify BSC authority for Graywater systems for nonresidential occupancies*. These code changes were originally added to Part 5 of Title 24, California Plumbing Code, and Part 11 of Title 24, California Green Building Standards Code during the 2016 Intervening Code Cycle, and are intended to update the applicability of BSC authority to align with the other parts of Title 24 that already contain this language. BSC graywater systems that were not included within the administrative portion of BSC’s authority and reference portion of the 2016 California Building Code and are to be included within the 2019 edition of the California Building Code. This proposed action will clarify the application of the building standards that BSC administers related to graywater systems within Title 24 and to align with the other parts of Title 24 that already contain this information.

(The remaining sections within *Chapter 1, Division I*, and are to remain the same and are being moved forward without modification)

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended Approve as Submitted (AS) to the proposed amendment to *Chapter 1, Division I, Section 1.2 and 1.2.2*.

**CBSC Response:** The CBSC agreed with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 3. CHAPTER 1 – DIVISION II, SCOPE AND ADMINISTRATION**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC proposes to amend Chapter 1, *Division II, Scope and Administration* as a result of workshops held following the emergency and certifying rulemaking processes for the Exterior Elevated Elements (EEE) that occurred in 2017 and early 2018. The emergency regulations that were originally proposed and approved were a result of a tragic event that occurred in the summer of 2015 in Berkeley, California at an apartment complex with exterior balconies. During a gathering, a balcony collapsed and 6 young adults were killed.

The published model language varies slightly from the initial emergency and subsequent certifying rulemaking, adopted in 2017 and early 2018. Model adoption is needed to clarify the requirements throughout the state of California.

These model sections are being proposed for adoption: **107.2.5 and 110.3.6**. Additionally, **~~107.2.7 and 110.3.8.1~~** are being proposed for repeal because the 2018 IBC picked up the intent using similar language, making the state amendments no longer necessary. Similar change is also being made to Part 10, 2019 California Existing Building Code and will create a consistency between the two codes. This proposed action will benefit the code user in understanding in clear and accurate terms the conditions under which these provisions are applied, particularly regarding buildings with exterior elevated elements included in their design.

#### ***SECTION 107.2.5 ~~107.2.7~~, 110.3.6 and ~~110.3.8.1~~ [BSC]***

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended Short Term – Further Study (ST/FS) to the proposed amendment to *Chapter 1, Division II, Sections 107.2.5, ~~107.2.7~~, 110.3.6 and ~~110.3.8.1~~*

**CBSC Response:** The CBSC agreed with the CAC recommendation to ST/FS for **Section 107.2.5 and 110.3.6**. After further study, CBSC is proposing to withdraw all previous amendments to these sections. The model code section will be adopted as it appears in the 2018 IBC. Sub-items 3-2 and 3-4 deal only with repeal of emergency amendment language, now being replaced by this proposal. The CAC appears to have inadvertently assigned further study to these sub-items also, without specific reason; BSC presumes this was in error, and thus has responded “disagree”. No matter what the outcome of sub-items 3-1 and 3-3, the previous amendment text will still need to be repealed.

The subsequent SDLF CAC also recommended further study for similar items within Part 10, aligning with this BFO recommendation, at BSC’s request, to address whether the use of only the term “water” is appropriate. BFO CAC suggestions included looking at the inclusion of “vapor” and “moisture”.

The three co-adopting agencies met, regarding the term “water”. The agencies concluded that the use of “water” is fundamental to all other further-compartmenting terms. “Water,”

whether in a solid or gaseous state, will be at some point a liquid, which is the culprit in penetration of assemblies, and the target of these provisions. Additionally, since this is model language, the thinking is that concept of using only the term “water” has been thoroughly vetted. The conclusion of the agencies is to leave the proposed language regarding “water” as it currently appears in the ET, reflecting model text. This item is also affected by Item 4 and related to Item 17.

## **ITEM 4. CHAPTER 2 – DEFINITIONS**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** As in other parts of the California Building Standards Codes, terms used in Part 2 (having specific meaning to the content within the Part) necessitate adoption, for reasons of clarity and correct interpretation. The terms “balcony” and “walking surface”, used in the emergency named in Item 3, have caused unintended application, in some instances. Thus, the term “exterior elevated element” (EEE) was contemplated to be defined, and would have presumably targeted the correct applications. This proposal was originally a result of topics discussed at a February 16 workshop, dealing with the subject of EEE, and there has been subsequent consideration given to the issue, initiated by CAC comments. This action coordinates with changes being proposed for Part 10, 2019 California Existing Building Code.

**CAC Recommendation:** Short-term further study. The SDLF CAC mirrored, at BSC’s request, the status of further study. The question raised at BFO CAC concerns addressing “height above grade”. This phrase is a reference to SB721, currently being considered by the Legislature. It seeks to define “exterior elevated elements,” in establishing an inspection program for the existing built environment, and in doing so names a variety of assemblies to be assigned the moniker. That definition establishes a height above grade at which program requirements become effective. The CAC inquired why BSC’s proposed definition of EEE did not include such a height trigger.

**CBSC Response:** BSC agreed to review the proposed definition. The co-adopting agencies were intending to borrow the term “exterior elevated elements” to define new (including when such elements are added or renovated) construction, but did not have the necessity for a height trigger (inspection program driven), nor the use of all the assembly descriptors used in SB 721. The model, in its 2018 published language, chose to include two terms for pertinent Sections 107.2.5, 110.3.6 and 2304.12.2.6: “balcony” and “elevated walking surfaces,” which differed from earlier versions that were not fully satisfactory to the agencies; but with the published phrasing as, “balconies or other elevated walking surfaces”, the agencies feel that the model carries enough text to adequately define the variety of assemblies being scoped for the provisions. Additionally, the avoidance of defining “EEE” eliminates potential confusion in terminology between SB721’s definition and what the agencies were seeking to produce. Thus, the proposal to define ‘exterior elevated elements’ has been withdrawn. The withdrawal affects also Items 3 and 17.

### **ITEM 5. CHAPTER 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt these chapters as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code without amendment. This action will ensure the adoption of the most recent edition of these chapters making them available for Californian's use throughout the state.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 6. CHAPTER 8 - INTERIOR FINISHES of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt Chapter 8 as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code and to carry forward an existing amendment to Section 801.1. This action ensures that the most recent edition of Chapter 8, as part of the model code adoption, is included to improve the health and safety for Californian's use throughout the state.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 7. CHAPTER 9 and 10 of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt these chapters as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code without amendment. By adopting these model code chapters BSC is providing the most recent edition of these model code chapters for publication into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24. This action will ensure the adoption of the most recent edition of these chapters making them available for Californian's use throughout the state.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

## **ITEM 8. CHAPTER 11 – ACCESSIBILITY of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to NOT adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption. Accessibility provisions are already promulgated by the agencies that have statutory authority to write the accessibility regulations within Title 24. The Department of Housing and Community Development promulgates the access provisions for housing and places them into Chapter 11A within the CBC, and The Division of the State Architect – Access Compliance promulgates the Chapter 11B access provisions within the CBC. By NOT adopting this model code chapter, BSC is avoiding a conflict that would be created between the model code Chapter 11 and state generated Chapters 11A and 11B.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

## **ITEM 9. CHAPTER 12 – INTERIOR ENVIRONMENT of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code and to carry forward existing amendments without change. This proposed action will clarify the model code chapter of the building standards code intended for publication as the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24 and to renumber the existing amendments to align with the new model code format. By adopting the most recent edition of this model code chapter BSC is making available the latest update for the interior environment to improve the health and safety for Californian's use throughout the state.

### **1204.6 [BSC-CG] and 1204.7 [BSC]**

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

## **ITEM 10. CHAPTER 13 – ENERGY EFFICIENCY of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to NOT adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption. Energy efficiency provisions are already promulgated by the agency that has statutory authority to write the energy efficiency regulations within Title 24. The California Energy Commission promulgates the energy provisions for all occupancies and places them into Part 6 of Title 24, California Energy Code. By NOT adopting this model code chapter BSC will avoid a conflict between the model code chapter for energy efficiency provisions, and those proposed, and adopted by the California Energy Commission which has statutory authority to promulgate the energy efficiency provisions in the State of California within Part 6 of Title 24.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Short Term / Further Study (ST/FS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation to short term / further study. After further study BSC is proposing to continue to not adopt Chapter 13, Energy Efficiency due to the adoption of the state mandated energy standards promulgated by the California Energy Commission. By not adopting this chapter BSC is avoiding a conflict between two different parts of Title 24.

#### **ITEM 11. CHAPTER 14 – EXTERIOR WALLS of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code and carry forward existing amendment without change. This proposed action will clarify the model code chapter of the building standards code intended for publication as the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24 and move forward without change the CALGreen reference to Division 5.4 for additional compliance requirements for exterior wall construction. This action will ensure the adoption of the most recent edition of these chapters making them available for Californian's use throughout the state and maintaining accurate references to other pertinent standards within the CALGreen code.

##### ***1403.2.1 [BSC-CG]***

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

#### **ITEM 12. CHAPTER 15 – ROOF ASSEMBLIES of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code. Also, due to model code renumbering of Section **1510.7.1** to **1510.7.2** the exception has been relocated to the new model code Section **1510.7.2**. By adopting this model code chapter BSC is providing the most recent edition of this model code chapter for publication into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 13. CHAPTER 16 – STRUCTURAL DESIGN of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code and carry forward existing amendment with a minor change to the title and first sentence. BSC identified a conflict between the title of Section **1613.1.1** and what is identified in law regarding the occupancy types that BSC regulates. BSC is proposing to remove the term “-owned” within the title ***State-owned structures***. Additionally, the same term is located in the first sentence of the section and also needs to be removed to prevent conflict with BSC law. By adopting this model code chapter BSC is including this chapter as part of the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24 and by proposing this amendment it will remove a conflict in terms between BSC law and the building code regulations.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Short Term / Further Study (ST/FS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation to short term / further study. After further study BSC is proposing to **withdraw** the proposed amendment to delete a portion of the title and the body of the paragraph that continued the same phrase regarding “State-owned”. This may have a larger impact than was first perceived so further investigation is needed prior to reintroducing this as a change in a future cycle.

### **ITEM 14. CHAPTER 17 – SPECIAL INSPECTIONS AND TESTS of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building

Code, Part 2, Title 24, carry forward existing amendments with editorial change to correct the reference section within Section 1707.1 identifying BSC's authority in law.

### **SECTION 1704.2.3 and 1707.1 [BSC]**

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 15. CHAPTER 18 – SOILS AND FOUNDATIONS of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24 without new amendment, carry forward existing amendment related to Seismic reinforcement without change.

#### **1810.10.3.4 Seismic reinforcement.**

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 16. CHAPTER 19 – CONCRETE of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24. BSC proposes to adopt this chapter without new amendment, carry forward existing amendments to Sections **1905.1.2, 1905.1.3, and 1905.1.9~~8~~**. Renumber **1905.1.9** to **1905.1.8** as the model code deleted **1905.1.9** and included that text within **1905.1.8**.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

## **ITEM 17. CHAPTERS 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, and 26 of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt these chapters as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24, carrying forward existing amendments. Similar to the reasons for the Item 4 and Item 18, Chapter 23 only, is also a result of post emergency/certifying rulemaking workshop activity that resulted from a tragic balcony failure incident in Berkeley. This action repeals the existing amendment added by BSC in a prior rulemaking cycle.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO CAC recommended Approve as Submitted for all the items except for Chapter 23 which received a further study, to address whether the use of only the term “water” is appropriate. CAC suggestions included looking at the inclusion of “vapor” and “moisture”.

**CBSC Response:** BSC agreed to further study Item 17-4, and has removed the term “water” from the proposal. The term “water” was a proposed amendment to model text for coordination reasons, given that both Sections 106.2.5 and 109.3.6 were proposed to employ the term. But the published model language for Section 2304.12.2.6 uses the terms “exterior” and “exposed”, which mitigates the need for inclusion of the term “water”. Related Items 3 and 4, have also been further studied, and the net result has changed the original proposed text of this item, such that the co-adopting agencies have concluded that model code language is sufficient. The text of this item is now coordinated with the text of Items 3 and 4. In summary, the agencies accept model language as written in the 2018 IBC, for application to exterior elevated elements.

## **ITEM 18. CHAPTERS 27, 28, and 29 of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to NOT adopt these chapters as part of the model code adoption. The state of California adopts the electrical, mechanical and plumbing provisions from other model codes published. The electrical provisions are published by the National Fire Protection Association, which publishes the National Electrical Code, and the International Plumbing and Mechanical Association (IAPMO), which publishes the Uniform Mechanical and Plumbing codes, which are adopted as Part 3, Part 4 and Part 5 respectively as parts of Title 24. By NOT adopting this model code chapter, BSC is avoiding potential conflicts with other model codes that contain these required provisions.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 19. CHAPTER 30 - ELEVATORS AND CONVEYING SYSTEMS of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24 without amendment. BSC is providing the most recent edition of this model code chapter for publication into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 20. CHAPTER 31 – SPECIAL CONSTRUCTION of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to only adopt specific sections of this chapter as part of the model code adoption. BSC is proposing to amend the existing law provisions for existing Swimming Pool Safety Act. Prior legislation directed the California Building Standards Commission to reprint the law provisions of The Swimming Pool Safety Act into Part 2, Chapter 31 regarding safety features and entrapment devices for privately owned swimming pools, typically found in a residential setting. Recent legislation, SB 442 (Chapter 670, Statutes of 2017) updated the swimming pools safety act. Therefore, BSC is proposed to delete the current swimming pool safety act requirements within Section 3109.4.4 through 3109.6, and adopt the new swimming pool safety act provisions, as adopted into law by SB 442 and updated by BSC by way of a Change Without Regulatory Effect (CWoRE). This action makes the provisions within Chapter 31 for swimming pool safety current for the maximum safety standards required in law today. This is also reflected within an appendix chapter of the 2019 California Residential Code.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 21. CHAPTER 32 - ENCROACHMENT INTO THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code without amendment. BSC is providing the most recent edition of this model code chapter for publication into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 22. CHAPTER 33 – SAFEGUARDS DURING CONSTRUCTION of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24 without new amendment, carry forward existing amendments. BSC is providing the most recent edition of this model code chapter for publication into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 23. CHAPTER 35 – REFERENCED STANDARDS of the 2018 International Building Code without amendment.**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to adopt this chapter as part of the model code adoption for inclusion into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24 without amendment. BSC is providing the most recent edition of this model code chapter for publication into the 2019 California Building Code, Part 2, Title 24.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **ITEM 24. APPENDIX CHAPTERS A, B, C, D, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, M, and N of the 2018 International Building Code**

**Specific Purpose, problem, rationale and benefit:** BSC is proposing to NOT adopt these appendix chapters as part of the model code adoption. However, these appendices will be published into the 2019 CBC. Additionally, BSC will not reprint Appendix Chapter E from the 2018 IBC as that would cause a conflict with the accessibility provisions already included in Chapters 11A and 11B. By NOT adopting these appendix model code chapters, and NOT printing Appendix Chapter E, BSC is avoiding potential conflicts with other model code chapters adopted for use in Title 24 that contain similar provisions. Additionally, by printing these appendix chapters, the local jurisdictions throughout the state can incorporate these appendices by ordinance as needed.

**CAC Recommendation:** The BFO Code Advisory Committee recommended, Approved as Submitted (AS).

**CBSC Response:** BSC concurred with the CAC recommendation.

### **TECHNICAL, THEORETICAL, AND EMPIRICAL STUDY, REPORT, OR SIMILAR DOCUMENTS:**

(Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(3))

There was no technical, theoretical or empirical study, report, or similar documents used as the basis for the proposed amendments to the 2019 California Building Code.

### **STATEMENT OF JUSTIFICATION FOR PRESCRIPTIVE STANDARDS:**

(Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(1))

BSC is statutorily required to adopt by reference model building codes, which contain prescriptive standards. Prescriptive standards provide the following: explicit guidance for certain mandated requirements; consistent application and enforcement of building standards while also establishing clear design parameters; and ensure compliance with minimum health, safety and welfare standards for owners, occupants and guests.

Performance standards are permitted by state law; however, they must be demonstrated to the satisfaction of the proper enforcing agency.

### **CONSIDERATION OF REASONABLE ALTERNATIVES**

(Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(4)(A))

There were no reasonable alternatives available to BSC. BSC is required by statute to adopt model codes as reference in the California Building Standards Law (Health and Safety Code, § 18901 et seq.).

### **REASONABLE ALTERNATIVES THE AGENCY HAS IDENTIFIED THAT WOULD LESSEN ANY ADVERSE IMPACT ON SMALL BUSINESS.**

(Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(4)(B))

No alternatives were identified that would lessen any adverse impact on small business. Adoption of the latest edition of the model code is mandated by H&SC §18928.

**FACTS, EVIDENCE, DOCUMENTS, TESTIMONY, OR OTHER EVIDENCE OF NO SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE IMPACT ON BUSINESS.**

(Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(5)(A))

The California Building Standards Commission (BSC) did not identify any facts, evidence, documents, testimony, or other substantiation to make an initial determination of significant adverse economic impact on businesses. BSC has determined that this regulatory action would not have a significant adverse economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states.

**ASSESSMENT OF EFFECT OF REGULATIONS UPON JOBS AND BUSINESS EXPANSION, ELIMINATION OR CREATION**

The California Building Standards Commission has assessed whether or not and to what extent this proposal will affect the following:

These regulations will update and clarify minimum building standards, which will provide increased protection of public health and safety, worker safety and the environment.

**ESTIMATED COST OF COMPLIANCE, ESTIMATED POTENTIAL BENEFITS, AND RELATED ASSUMPTIONS USED FOR BUILDING STANDARDS**

(Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(5)(B)(i))

BSC did not identify any costs to comply with the proposed amendments. The amendments provide clarity and regulatory consistency for the code user.

**DUPLICATION OR CONFLICTS WITH FEDERAL REGULATIONS**

(Government Code Section 11346.2(b)(6))

There are no federal regulations concerning state agency adoption and amendment of model codes. Those provisions are found in H& SC §§18928 and 18929.1.
