Background

Senate Bill 1186 (Steinberg, Chapter 383, Statutes of 2012) created Government Code Section 4467, which requires any applicant for a local business license or equivalent instrument to pay an additional fee to the local government that issued the business license or building permit. Local governments must submit a percentage of the fee revenue to the Division of the State Architect (State Architect) for deposit into the Disability Access and Education Revolving Fund (DAER Fund).

Effective January 1, 2018, under Assembly Bill 1379 (Thurmond, Chapter 667, Statutes of 2017), the fee amount increased from \$1 to \$4. The distribution of fee revenue also changed, with 90% allocated to local governments for deposit into their local Accessibility Compliance Fund (AC Fund) and 10% to the State Architect for deposit into the DAER Fund, replacing the previous split of 70% for local governments and 30% for the State Architect. Both the \$4 fee and the 90% local government retention included sunset provisions, which would have reverted the fee back to \$1 and the revenue distribution to 70% for local governments on January 1, 2024. Additionally, the revised statute required local governments that do not issue business licenses to collect the fee when issuing building permits.

Effective January 1, 2023, Assembly Bill 2164 (Lee, Chapter 895, Statutes of 2022) repealed the sunset provisions of AB 1379, extending the \$4 fee and 90% retention by local governments indefinitely. The bill also expanded the permissible uses of the local AC Fund to include providing financial assistance to small businesses.

Pursuant to Government Code Section 4465, the purpose of the DAER Fund is to provide increased compliance with state and federal accessibility requirements by:

- Increasing the number of Certified Access Specialists (CASps).
- Maintaining State Architect oversight of the CASp program.
- Expanding education and outreach efforts for compliance with accessibility requirements.

Government Code Section 4470(c) requires the State Architect to submit an annual report on funds received during the previous calendar year. The State Architect must report the total fees collected by each local government, the total fees transmitted to the DAER Fund by local governments during the previous calendar year, and DAER Fund distribution, including resources spent on:

- Administrative services.
- Moderating certification and examination fees for the CASp program.
- Establishing and maintaining oversight of the CASp program.

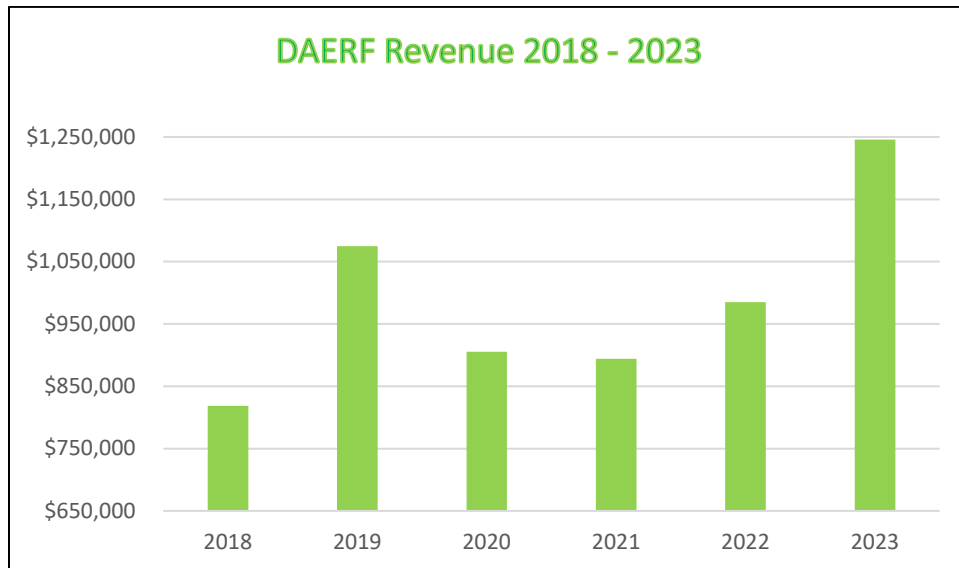
- Developing and disseminating educational materials to facilitate compliance with state and federal access requirements.

Information provided in this report is based on accounting data that represents amounts collected by the state from local governments in calendar year 2023, and state billing information indicating amounts spent in each specific reporting category.

Total Fees Transmitted to the DAER Fund

The State Architect received \$1,248,983 in calendar year 2023, a 27% increase from 2022's \$984,938 and the highest revenue ever, surpassing the previous record of \$1,074,607 in 2019.

In 2023, DSA anticipated a marginal increase in funds. The COVID-19 pandemic led to the permanent closure of 60% of businesses shut down in 2020, causing an 18% cumulative revenue decline in 2020 and 2021. However, as pandemic restrictions eased, DSA saw a 10% revenue increase in 2022. With all restrictions lifted in 2023, revenues surged by 27%.

Use of DAER Fund Resources

In 2023, the State Architect expended \$262,087 on the activities prescribed under Government Code Section 4465. Details are outlined below:

Administrative Services by the State Architect

The State Architect spent \$113,624 of DAER Fund resources for administrative services. The primary administrative services included the operation of the fee collection system and related instruction, correspondence with local governments, review of information reported by local governments, form development, and technical guidance.

The State Architect made further revisions to the online annual reporting form to reflect new reporting requirements under Assembly Bill 2164 (Lee, Chapter 895, Statutes of 2022). As previously mentioned, AB 2164 expanded the purpose for which the DAER Fund may be used to include providing financial assistance to small business owners for accessibility-related construction. Accordingly, the online form was revised to gather relevant information regarding financial assistance to small businesses which included: 1) the dollar amount of financial assistance provided to small businesses, and 2) the number of small businesses that obtained financial assistance. Additionally, the State Architect undertook efforts to clarify the \$4 fee amount per AB 2164 which became effective January 1, 2023. These efforts included tailored communications to specific jurisdictions and updates to the State Architect's 1186 Report Fees webpage.

Explored Ways to Streamline the CASp Certification and Examination Fees

The State Architect spent \$4,481 of DAER Fund resources to explore streamlining of the CASp certification process. The State Architect explored new methods for administering the CASp examination to make scheduling more convenient, reduce examination costs, increase the frequency of exams, and expand the number of testing locations for future 2024 examinations. The State Architect also continuously reviews examination content and the CASp 101 training program for relevancy to current state and federal laws, regulations, and standards. CASp Certification and Examination fees were reduced in 2021 which made the program more affordable and convenient, leading to time savings and a reduction in travel costs. Ongoing monitoring ensures that the program continues to serve the business community in certifying qualified individuals to perform inspection services and to provide disabled individuals with accessible and compliant environments.

Oversight of the CASp Program

The State Architect spent \$143,983 of DAER Fund resources on oversight of the CASp program, including education and outreach efforts. Major items included:

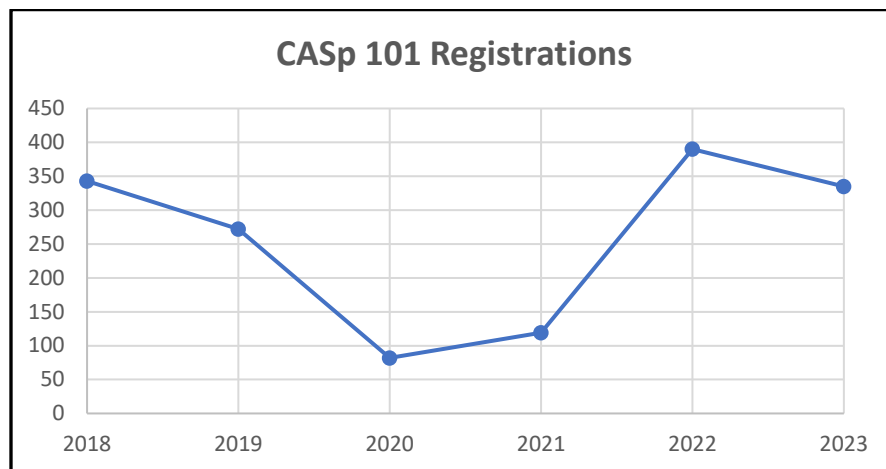
- Providing technical guidance to CASps and the public: The State Architect's office provided technical guidance to CASps and the public on a variety of topics, including accessibility standards and reporting requirements. This guidance was provided through partnerships with the California Commission on Disability Access in public workshops.
- Continuous updates of the online List of Certified Access Specialists database: The State Architect provides continuous updates to the online database of CASps. This database includes information on each CASp's qualifications, experience, and area of the state where they provide services. The database is used by businesses and individuals to find qualified CASps to inspect their properties.
- Responding to occasional complaints filed against CASps: The State Architect's office investigated and responded to occasional complaints filed against CASps.
- Administering accessibility courses on the State Architect's Learning Management System (LMS) along with scheduling and delivery of the CASp 101 live webinar course.

Education and Outreach

In 2023, the State Architect continued its outreach and education initiatives, leveraging DAER Fund resources to enhance accessibility compliance and awareness across California. Key efforts included:

- **Hiring a New Senior Architect:** The fill of a vacancy with a new Senior Architect significantly bolstered the State Architect's capacity for outreach and compliance efforts, ensuring more robust support for accessibility initiatives. This new team member played a critical role in enhancing the state's ability to effectively engage CASps in the delivery of services and in working with the CCDA.
- **CASp 101 Training:** The State Architect offered 3 live 6-hour webinar courses to foster foundational knowledge in accessibility standards and

compliance. Additionally, to assist in their understanding of state and federal accessibility laws and standards, DSA offers the CASp 101 course free to CCDA Commissioners. In 2023, the CASp 101 class received 335 registrations.

- **Presentations to CCDA:**
 - **Disability Access and Education Revolving Fund (DAERF):**
Provided a detailed presentation on DAER Fund utilization and impact at the CCDA Full Commission Meeting, including an overview of local AC Fund activities.
- **CASp Outreach at CALBO and CBOAC Annual Business Meetings:**
Engaged in active outreach at the California Building Officials (CALBO) and County Building Officials Association of California (CBOAC) annual business meetings to promote the importance of Certified Access Specialists in building safety and compliance. The CALBO and CBOAC annual business meetings are important events for the building industry, as they provide opportunities for building officials from across the state to come together, share information, and learn about emerging trends and policies. DSA's involvement in this meeting helped to raise awareness

about the benefits of CASp certification, provided information on the CASp examination, and offered a Question-and-Answer session with DSA-certified CASp staff.

- **Presentation to CMRTA:** Delivered an in-depth presentation to the California Municipal Revenue & Tax Association (CMRTA) focusing on the SB 1186 AC Fund. This presentation included detailed discussions with representatives from various municipalities in Southern California, highlighting the AC Fund's objectives, implementation strategies, and its impact on enhancing accessibility. The State Architect shared best practices and provided updates on ongoing accessibility initiatives, fostering a collaborative environment aimed at improving regional mobility and ensuring compliance with accessibility standards across different jurisdictions. Additionally, the State Architect engaged with stakeholders to address specific concerns, gather feedback, and explore potential partnerships for future projects.
- **Digital Outreach:** Conducted outreach through targeted emails and strategic use of social media channels ensuring widespread dissemination of accessibility information and resources. In total, the State Architect sent 87,738 email messages covering 21 accessibility related topics and issued 12 social media campaigns to develop and disseminate educational accessibility resources.
- **Collaborative Outreach:**
 - **Collaboration with CCDA:** Partnered with the California Commission on Disability Access (CCDA) to provide guidance on AC Fund expenditures permitted by GOV 4467(b)(1). As part of this collaboration, CCDA developed a Quick Reference Guide designed to provide a concise overview of AC Fund resource utilization. The document includes important contacts and links to additional resources. This collaborative effort aims to streamline information dissemination, making it easier for municipalities, businesses, and individuals to understand and implement local fund resources effectively.  - **Breaking Barriers Listening Forum:** On August 31, 2023, the State Architect collaborated with the City of San Jose to participate in the Breaking Barriers Listening Forum, which brought together local businesses, government officials, and individuals with

disabilities. The forum facilitated open dialogue to address challenges and share experiences related to accessibility in the community. Key topics included identifying barriers to accessibility, discussing potential solutions, and exploring ways to implement effective accessibility practices. This event fostered a collaborative environment where stakeholders could exchange ideas and work towards creating a more inclusive community. - **October 2023 Outreach with CCDA and the City of San Jose:** In partnership with the California Commission on Disability Access (CCDA), the State Architect conducted a targeted outreach event in the City of San Jose. This event focused on raising awareness about disability access and providing information on grants available for small businesses to enhance their accessibility. The collaboration aimed to support local businesses in understanding and complying with accessibility standards, thereby improving the overall inclusiveness of the community.

Total Fees Collected by Each Local Government

The State Architect received 307 annual reports from the local governments which documented the collection of \$6,245,341.90 in fees for the 2023 calendar year. Of the 453 jurisdictions that submitted fees to the State Architect, 64% submitted an annual report. Not all of California's 540 local governments (city, county, or city and county) submit annual reports or collect fees; local government participation is at 87%. The following is an explanation of the breakdown demonstrated in the appendices:

- Appendix A lists the 2023 annual collection amounts, as reported by each local government that submitted fees by the deadline to the State Architect in the 2023 calendar year.
- Appendix B lists the local governments that reported their 2023 annual collection amounts but did not submit fees to the State Architect.
- Appendix C lists the local governments that submitted fees in the 2023 calendar year but did not report their annual collection amount.
- Appendix D lists the local governments that neither transmitted 2023 funds nor submitted an annual report before the March deadline.

The State Architect does not have any enforcement authority over local governments. Fee submittal and annual collection reporting are dependent on the local governments' execution of the law. Efforts are made to maintain contact with all 539 local governments in California, regardless of past participation in fee submittal, to remind them of the current requirements and inform them of statutory changes.

Three notifications were sent to local governments reminding them of the annual report submittal deadline of March 1, 2024, with the option of submitting their annual report electronically. The first notification was a letter sent on January 4, 2024. The second notification was February 6, 2024, and the third notification was sent one week before the deadline on February 21, 2024. Annual report submittal information was also made available on-demand at the State Architect's website.

In 2023, the State Architect received 307 annual reports from local jurisdictions. Participation by local jurisdictions in 2023 increased by 2% when compared to the prior reporting period of 2022 (301 reports).
