Over 90 Years developing "schoolhouse" standards

hereby repeated

CHAPTER 406

An act to add a new section to article two of chapter three of title one of part three of the Political Code to be numbered three hundred sixty-two g, relating to the establishment of a division of school planning in the state department of education and making an appropriation therefor.

[Approved by the Governor May 10, 1927. In effect July 29, 1927.]

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. A new section, to be numbered 362g, is hereby New section. added to article II of chapter III of title I of part III of the Political Code, to read as follows:

362g. First—The department of education shall have Planning of school power and it shall be its duty:

(a) To establish standards for schools buildings.

(b) To review plans and specifications for all school buildings to be erected outside of incorporated cities which have building codes.

(c) To approve plans and specifications submitted by governing boards of school districts, and to return without approval and with recommendation for changes any plans not conforming to established standards.


(d) To make all necessary provisions whereby governing boards of school districts or architects engaged by them may procure by purchase or otherwise copies of standard specifications, plans, and building codes prepared by the department.

(e) To make upon request of the governing board of any school district, except a city board of education, a survey of the buildings of the district, to advise such governing board

- Division of School House
 Planning created in 1927
- Established in Political Code Section 362g
 - (a) Establish standards for school buildings
 - (b) Review plans and specifications for all school buildings outside Cities which have building codes

Current Statutory Authority

Education Code Section 17251

- (b)"...develop standards for use by school districts in the selection of school sites in accordance with the objectives set forth in subdivision (a)."
- (c) "Establish standards for use by school districts to ensure that the design and construction of school facilities are educationally appropriate and promote school safety."



Current Statutory Authority

(Continued from Slide 4)

Education Code Section 17251

(a)"...advise the governing board (of a school district) on the acquisition of new school sites...(and) give the governing board in writing a list of the recommended locations in the order of their merit, considering especially the matters of educational merit, safety, reduction in traffic hazards, and conformity to the land use element of the general plan..."



CDE involvement in state funded projects

If funds are to be requested from the State Allocation Board (SAB), a district must receive:

- CDE approval of the plans based on Title 5 standards (Education Code Section 17070.50)
- CDE approval of sites based on Title 5 standards (Education Code Section 17070.50)



Non state funded projects

Regardless of funding source, all school districts must:

- Select sites and design plans consistent with the standards in Title 5 regulations (except charter schools)
- Meet California Environmental Quality Act requirements
- Meet all other applicable laws

Title 5 Standards

Held numerous venues statewide focused on district, cities and environmental justice groups.

- Changes are needed to:
 - Reflect current educational planning practices and standards
 - Consider recent educational program changes- Transitional Kindergarten, Common Core Standards, Next Generation Science Standards, etc.
 - Clarify existing standards
 - Update to current codes and other citations
- Internal review identified need to re-evaluate our role
- Review on pause to address organizational structure improvements



Small School District Assistance Initiative

Announced by Superintendent Torlakson in January 2017:

- Phase 1 focused on 44 districts that had a successful bonds in November 2016
- Phase 2 ongoing state agency workshops on planning and funding
- Phase 3 will be collaboration with DSA and OPSC to develop strategies for technical assistance in planning, specifications, construction, and funding






