III. Amendments to Bylaws

- a) Part 1: A discussion regarding Article IV, Item 5 of the Bylaws. It was discussed that there was no verbiage in the current with expanded duties of the executive director including the ability for the Executive Director to deny an appeal based on administrative failures of the appeal which meant that if the appeal that was introduced at the last CDAAC meeting was not withdrawn, it would have to be heard at the June 2025 meeting. Discussion of the express terms of draft amendments to the bylaws provided to the Board including a new section at Article IV, item 5 Duties of the Executive Director. Additional comments regarding the board's desire to require the Executive Director to report to the Board on any ministerial activities and actions at each board meeting were made leading to an amended motion.
 - Part 1: an amended Motion by Eric Nelson (LOC), seconded by Alan Dreyfuss (CPF) to accept the express terms and further amend the express terms at Article IV, item 5, (new item)VII to state: "The Executive Director shall report to the Board at each board meeting any ministerial review or actions taken by the Executive Director."

- b) Part 2: Discussion to determine past membership and the appropriate motion to add an alternate which would ultimately allow Steven Winkle to be appointed to the Board. The April 2025 minutes indicated that 8 individuals were originally appointed to the CDAAC. Those 8 included one board member (Mike Malinowski) who is no longer a board member and one inactive Board Member Roy Hawthorne. The Bylaws state that the CDAAC will have 7 members.
 - Part 2: Motion: Amend the bylaws in Article 8, Item 6.a) to read the CDAAC shall have seven (7) board members and one (1) alternate maximum, and by majority vote by the Board, Motioned by Joe Hall (CCAPA) and seconded by Mitchel Baker (HCD)
 - Part 2 Vote PASSED UNANIMOUSLY Aye (13) Nay (0) Abstain (0)

Following the motion, it was clarified by legal that appointing a board member to the board should occur in the next board meeting. Steven Winkle self-nominated himself to serve on the CDAAC. The Board will consider appointing Steven Winkle to the Board during the September meeting.

IV. Executive Update

The Executive Director took no ministerial action on appeals between 6/12/2025 and 9/3/2025.

Mr. Hawthorne's withdrawal leaves both the contractor and the contractor alternate position vacant.
 - a. The Executive Director suggests that the Bylaws Advisory Committee (BAC) consider amended language in the Bylaws regarding the desired qualifications for this Board appointed position. There is no clarifying language in Health and Safety Code 18960.
 - i. Per Health and Safety Code 18960 (d): "The 21 members listed above shall select a building contractor as a member of the board, who shall serve without pay, but shall receive actual and necessary expenses incurred while serving on the board. Each of the appointing authorities shall appoint, in the same manner as for members, an alternate in addition to a member. The alternate member shall serve in place of the member at the meetings of the board that the member is unable to attend..."

- 5. During the June meeting there was extended conversation regarding the number of positions on the Code Development and Appeals Advisory Committee (CDAAC). Staff have researched the timeline. The sequence of action and occurrences is as follows:
 - 4/3/2024 The Board took action to appoint 8 members including Mike Malinowski and Roy Hawthorne. Note: There were no Bylaws adopted at that time.
 - 4/17/2024 Mike Malinowski resigned from the Board, placing the number of Board members on the CDAAC at 7 total.
 - 2/5/2025 The Board adopted Bylaws limiting the number of members on the CDAAC to 7.
 - 6/12/2025 Roy Hawthorne was errantly omitted from the member list in the staff presentation. It was noted that staff had not been able to reach Mr. Hawthorne
 - 6/12/2025 The Board voted to amend bylaws to include 7 members and 1 alternate.
 - 6/12/2025 Steven Winkle nominated himself for recommended Board appointment during the next meeting.
 - 6/12/2025 Katelyn Baeta-Orick (Board Legal Counsel) recommended to consider appointments during the next Board meeting.
 - 7/21/2025 Roy Hawthorne resigned from the Board.
 - Current CDAAC membership is as follows:

The project team was requesting guidance on the potential for the building, to not be considered a high-rise building as defined in the CBC. The City of Sacramento had made the determination based on the definition of HIGH-RISE BUILDING and EXISTING HIGH-RISE STRUCTURE the building must meet all applicable requirements for a high-rise building. The CDAAC discussed the request and recommended that the project team consider each code requirement that would be required when considering the building a high-rise and address each issue independent of one another. In general, the California Historic Building code is intended to provide more specific alternatives to the regular code as opposed to a broad exception, such as the one being requested.

1103.5.4. [For SF] Automatic Sprinkler System for Existing High-Rise Buildings.

All existing residential high-rise buildings shall be equipped with an automatic

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sprinkler system in accordance with Section 903.3.1.1 where any of the following conditions apply:

- 1. The high-rise building has an occupied floor located more than 120 feet (36 576 mm) above the lowest level of fire department vehicle access.
- 2. The high-rise building has occupied floors located more than 75 feet (22 860 mm) and not more than 120 feet (36 576 mm) above the lowest level of fire department vehicle access, and the building does not have at least two interior exit stairways complying with Section 1104.10 that are separated from the building interior by fire assemblies having a fire resistance rating of not less than 2 hours with opening protection in accordance with Table 716.1(2) of the California Building Code.
- 3. The high-rise building has occupied floors located more than 75 feet (22 860 mm) and not more than 120 feet (36 576 mm) above the lowest level of fire department vehicle access, and the building does not have a fire alarm system that includes smoke detection in mechanical equipment, electrical, transformer, telephone equipment and similar rooms; corridors; elevator lobbies; and at doors penetrating interior exit stairway enclosures.

Existing high-rise buildings that are also qualified historical buildings as defined in California Health and Safety Code Section 18950 shall be provided with an approved automatic fire sprinkler system when and as required by the State Historical Building Code.

- 1. Apartment houses, condominiums, or other Residential Group R-2 Occupancies (classified as R-1 prior to 2008), until January 1, 2033, when this exception expires.
- 2. A mixed-use occupancy building containing a Residential Group R-2 Occupancy (classified as R-1 prior to 2008), until January 1, 2033, when this exception expires.

Any existing high-rise not exempted from this section that does not provide an automatic sprinkler system throughout the residential occupancy is out of compliance and subject to immediate code enforcement action. The owner shall maintain the sprinkler system in accordance with Title 19 of the California Code of Regulations.

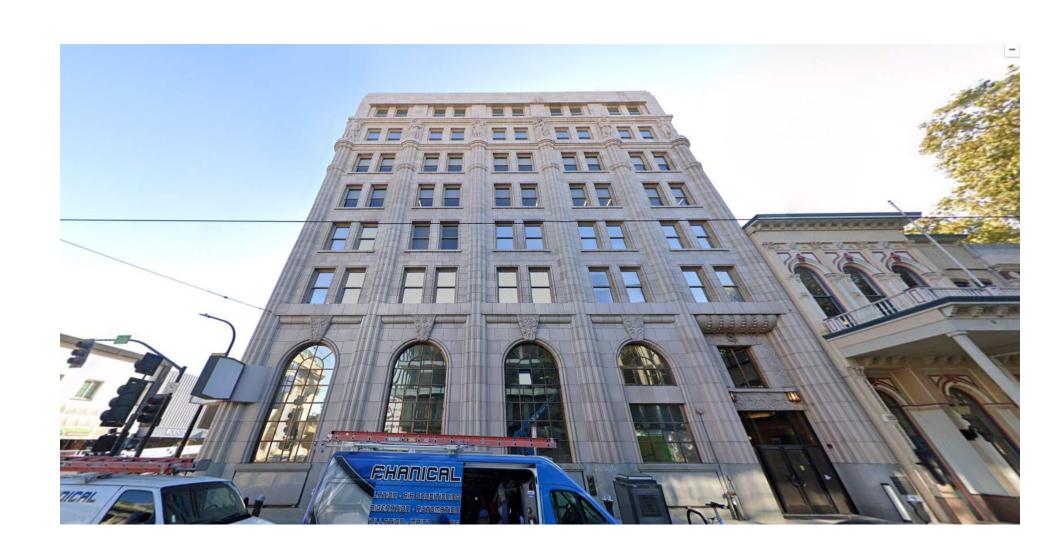
1- SOUTHWEST VIEW FROM J STREET

3- NORTHWEST VIEW CORNER OF J STREET AND 7TH STREET

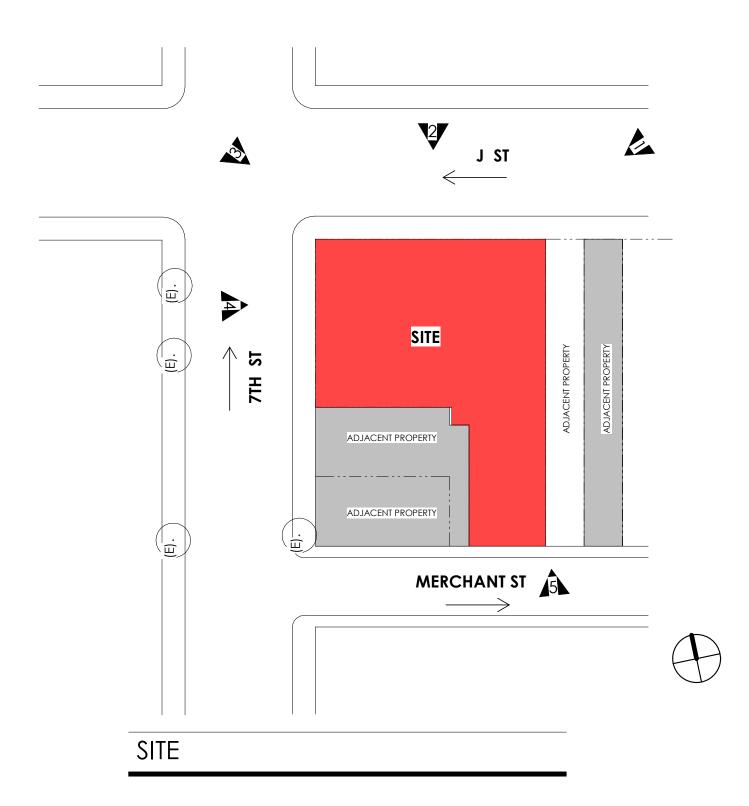

A proposed revision to California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 8, 2022 California Historical Building Code, Chapter 8-7.

Reasoning for the proposed amendment

- There is a benefit of using ASCE 41 for seismic evaluation of the historical building/components as it is a recognized standard that is specifically developed for existing building evaluation and retrofit. Ductility factors are component based for existing buildings.
- 2. The currently referenced ASCE 7 standard is less specifically suited for existing building evaluation and retrofit. The ductility factors are system based and correspond to modern detailing of seismic systems, which generally are inappropriate for historical buildings.

Add a new section 8-706. 1.4:

8-706.1.4 Alternative Seismic Evaluation Methodologies

Alternatively, seismic evaluation of qualified historical buildings or components of qualified historical buildings may be based on the expected seismic demand and capacity as prescribed by the currently adopted version of the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) Standard 41, Seismic Evaluation and Retrofit of Existing Buildings by the current California Existing Building Code. Broad judgment may be utilized in determining the controlling behavior (force vs deformation) with consideration of the overall seismic performance and risk of collapse or life-threatening injury. Where such structural system or component ductility capacity, *m*-factors, do not exist, an appropriate system or *m*-factors shall be rationally assigned considering the detailing of structural system and members.

The target structural performance level and seismic risk are as follows:

- 1. Risk Category I or II structures, one level of performance objective and seismic hazard
 - a. Target Structural Performance level need not exceed: Collapse Prevention
 - b. Target Seismic Hazards need not exceed: 20% in 50 years
 - c. Base Shear need not exceed: 30% of the building weight multiplied by the maximum m-factor of the vertical lateral force resisting system calculated using the Target Seismic Hazard.
- 2. Risk Category III or IV structures, two levels of performance objectives and seismic hazard
 - a. Target Structural Performance level I need not exceed: Life-Safety
 - b. Target Seismic Hazards I need not exceed: 20% in 50 years

- c. target Structural Performance level 11-need not exceed: Collapse Prevention
- d. Target Seismic Hazards II need not exceed: 5% in 50 years
 - e. Base Shear need not exceed: 40% of the building weight multiplied by the maximum m-factor of the vertical lateral force resisting system calculated using the Target Seismic Hazard.
- 3. For Risk Category I, II, and III structures, the maximum considered earthquake ground motion of 0.2 second spectral response, Ss need not exceed 150 percent at 5 percent damping when the fundamental period of the building is 0.5 seconds or less in the direction under consideration.
- 8-706.1.4.1 Tier 1 and/or Tier 2 Deficiency-based evaluation and retrofit shall be permitted for qualified historical buildings or components of historical buildings. Tier 3 may be used if the detailed evaluation will benefit strategies for strengthening.

8-706.1.4.2 Material and Condition Assessment requirements.

Default Material Properties according to ASCE Standard 41 may be used in lieu of material testing with a Knowledge Factor (k) equal to 1.0. Alternatively, Usual Testing and Visual Condition Assessment may be performed according to ASCE Standard 41 using the mean tested value for material properties and a Knowledge Factor (k) equal to 1.0 may be used. Broad judgment may be exercised in determining the material strengths based on the limited sampling and testing. Sampling locations and/or areas of Condition Assessment shall be determined with greater consideration for the preservation of historical fabric and significance.

Modify sections Section 8-805

8-805.1 Existing Solid Masonry

Existing solid masonry walls of any type, except adobe, may be allowed, without testing, a maximum ultimate strength of nine pounds per square inch (62.1 kPa) in shear where there is a qualifying statement by the architect or engineer that an inspection has been made, that mortar joints are filled and that both brick and mortar are reasonably good. The shear stress above applies to unreinforced masonry, except adobe, where the maximum ratio of unsupported height or length to thickness does not exceed 13, and where minimum quality mortar is used or exists. Wall height or length is measured to supporting or resisting elements that are at least twice as stiff as the tributary wall. Stiffness is based on the gross section. Shear stress may be increased by the <u>addition</u> of 10 percent of the axial direct stress due to the weight of the wall directly above. Higher-quality mortar may provide a greater shear value and shall be tested in accordance with Appendix A, Chapter A1 of the *California Existing Building Code* (CEBC) 2010 latest edition, and as modified by the CHBC.





STATE HISTORICAL BUILDING SAFETY BOARD BYLAWS 6/12/2025

Article I - Name, Principal Office and Executive Officer

- 1. The name of the organization is the State Historical Building Safety Board (SHBSB, or the Board)
- 2. The SHBSB is a unit within the Division of the State Architect (DSA)
- 3. The State Architect shall appoint the Executive Director to the Board.

Article II - Purpose, Powers and Duties of the Board

- 1. The Board shall fulfill the purposes, establish policies, procedures and perform duties consistent with the Health and Safety Code (HSC) Part 2.7 State Historical Building Code (Sections 18950-18962).
- 2. Each Board member shall adhere to these bylaws and any amendments to them thereafter ("Bylaws").

Article III - Members and Officers

- 1. The SHBSB is comprised of twenty-two (22) members, and twenty-two (22) alternates, inclusive of the California Licensed Building Contractor appointed by the Board. The appointed alternates shall serve in place of the members at the meetings of the board that the members are unable to attend.
- 2. Members shall be appointed by the appointing organization identified at HSC Section 18960(d). Appointing organizations are to select both a member and an alternate member.
 - a. The alternate shall serve in the capacity of the member if the member is unable to fulfill their duties.
 - b. The member and alternates appointed shall be qualified experts in their respective fields as determined by the appointing organizations.
- 3. The Board shall appoint a member and an alternate California Licensed Building Contractor to serve on the Board.
 - a. The term of each member of the SHBSB is four years.
 - i. Vacancies shall be filled by appointing agencies in the same manner as the original appointments.
 - ii. Appointing organizations may reappoint original members for successive terms or may appoint the alternate as the member, and vice versa.
 - iii. Appointed members and alternates shall coordinate with their appointing organization for reappointment.
 - iv. The State Architect shall serve continuously until replaced.
- 4. No member may delegate their attendance, participation, or vote to any other person other than their appointed alternate.





- 5. Board members must notify DSA and their appointing organization if they can no longer serve in the capacity of a Board member. Their position will be deemed vacant 30 days after notification.
- 6. The Board shall appoint the Chairperson and a Vice Chairperson annually as provided in this section:
 - a. Prior to the February meeting each year, the Executive Director will solicit interest in officer positions.
 - b. At the February meeting, the Executive Director shall ask members to nominate individuals for the position of Chairperson and Vice Chairperson. Any nomination for office must be seconded. No member may nominate or second the nomination for himself or herself for either office.
 - c. A majority vote is necessary to elect an officer, and each officer elected shall serve for one year or until his or her successor is elected.
 - d. If, in the Board's judgment, no nominee for the position of Chairperson or Vice Chairperson can garner sufficient votes for election to that position at the February meeting, a motion to put the election over to a subsequent meeting is in order.
 - e. Newly elected officers shall assume office immediately following the February meeting.
 - f. In the event a vacancy occurs in the office of Chairperson or Vice Chairperson during a calendar year, an election shall be held at the next meeting. Any member interested in completing the one-year term of an office that has become vacant may nominate himself or herself, but each nomination requires a second.
 - g. The position of Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson may be nominated for and serve more than one successive term.
- If, in the event the Chairperson and Vice Chair are not available, the board may, by majority vote, elect the temporary Chairperson to fill the role of Chairperson for that meeting.
 - a. The alternate member serving on behalf of the organization of either the Chairperson or the Vice Chairperson shall not act as the Chairperson or Vice Chairperson respectively in the event of an absence of either officer without the majority vote of the Board.
- 8. No member may be elected as Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson simultaneously.





Article IV – Duties

- 1. The duties of the Board are as follows:
 - a. Adopt rules and regulations pursuant to the State Historical Building Code.
 - b. Adopt and submit alternative building standards for approval by the Building Standards Commission.
 - c. Coordinate and consult with the following state agencies when adopting rules and regulations pursuant to the Historical Building Code which affect qualified historic buildings or structures within their jurisdiction:
 - The Division of the State Architect
 - ii. The State Fire Marshal
 - iii. The State Building Standards Commission, but only with respect to approval of building standards.
 - iv. The Department of Housing and Community Development
 - v. The Department of Transportation
 - vi. Other state agencies that may be affected by the Historic Building Code.
 - d. Act as consultant to the State Architect.
 - e. Act as a review body to California State and local agencies with respect to interpretations, administration and enforcement, publish and report to the Building Standards Commission such interpretations.
 - f. Accept appeals from any party if the issue is of statewide importance and report such interpretations to the Building Standards Commission.
 - g. Accept requests from State agencies on regarding variances or appeals affecting qualified historical buildings or structures.
 - h. Receive filings from local jurisdictions, of changes or modifications to the Historic Building Code pursuant to Health and Safety Code 18959(f)
 - i. The Board may, from time to time, appoint consultants who shall serve without pay but may be reimbursed for actual expenses as approved by the Board.
- 2. The duties of the Board members and alternates are as follows:
 - a. Abide by these bylaws.
 - b. Abide with the Conflict of Interest Code





- c. Abide by Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act including but not limited to communication requirements included therein.
- d. Attend meetings regularly and communicate availability to staff in a timely manner. If unavailable, assist staff in the coordination with the appointed alternate to attend meetings.
- e. In accordance with Bagley-Keene open meeting rules, confer with appointed alternate regarding meeting topics when not able to attend meetings.
- f. Actively participate in meetings.
- 3. The duties of the Chairperson is are as follows:
 - a. serve as spokesperson for the Board;
 - b. represent the position of the Board to the Executive Director
 - c. preside at all meetings of the Board and follow-up with the assistance of the executive director to see that agreed upon action is implemented;
 - d. serve, as necessary, as the Board's liaison to local jurisdictions and local historic building committees/commissions, or designate a member to serve in their place;
 - e. provide direction for the executive director;
 - f. and, along with the executive director, direct staff in preparing agendas for Board meetings, in consultation with other members as permitted by law, and determine priorities for the expenditure of board travel funds.
- 4. The Duties of the Vice Chairperson is are as follows:
 - a. preside at Board meetings in the absence of the Chairperson;
 - b. represent the Board at functions as designated by the Chairperson; and
 - c. fulfill all duties of the Chairperson when he or she is unable to serve.
- 5. Duties of the Executive Director are as follows:
 - a. In the event neither the Chairperson or Vice-chairperson is available the Executive Director may perform the duties of the Chair for administrative duties only. The Executive Director may not vote, nor be counted for the purposes of quorum.
 - Perform administrative duties on behalf of the board including but not limited to the following:
 - Coordinating Board and advisory committee activities including organization of meetings, agendas and minutes.

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- II. Communicating with State and local jurisdictions on board activities.
- III. Conduct presentations regarding Board activities to local jurisdictions or organizations.
- IV. Maintenance of the Board's website and other informational documents.
- V. Perform ministerial reviews of appeals made to the Board, including the ministerial determination of whether an appeal may proceed to the Board or advisory committees for further review. In making this determination, the Executive Director's ministerial review may include, but is not limited to, investigating claims made, making a preliminary evaluation of evidence, preparing reports and recommendations preliminary to Board action, and ensuring that the parties submitting the appeal have included sufficient information necessary for Board review and have taken all necessary administrative steps prior to bringing an appeal to the Board. The Executive Director may consult with the Chairperson, or Vice-Chairperson, in ministerial reviews and determinations.
- VI. Administration of rulemaking documents and coordination with the Building Standards Commission and other State agencies in accordance with Article IV section 1.C. of these bylaws.
- VII. The Executive Director shall report to the Board at each board meeting any ministerial review or actions taken by the Executive Director.

Article V – Meetings

- 1. Board meetings will be held in accordance with the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act and be noticed a minimum of 10 business days in advance of the meeting.
- 2. Board meetings will allow members of the public to attend either in-person or virtually.
- 3. The SHBSB will meet three (3) times per year. Meetings will be held in the months of February, May and September.
 - a. Meeting regularity and schedule may be adjusted at the Executive Director's discretion.
 - b. Additional Board meetings may be held at the discretion of the Executive Director.
- 4. A quorum for Board meetings is twelve (12) Board members in attendance in person.
 - a. Board members must confirm attendance no later than three (3) days prior to the scheduled meeting.





- b. To avoid unplanned absences causing a lack of quorum, if fewer than 13 members have confirmed attendance, the Chairperson may cancel the meeting.
 - i. If the Chairperson <u>n</u>or Vice Chairperson is unavailable, the Executive Director may act in this capacity.
- Meetings will be recorded and SHBSB staff shall keep minutes, which shall, prior to the next scheduled meeting, be provided to all members for review. Minutes shall be approved or disapproved by majority vote of the SHBSB at the next scheduled meeting.

Article VI – Compensation

- 1. Board members serve as without pay but shall receive actual and necessary expenses incurred while serving on the Board.
- 2. Reimbursement of expenses incurred are in accordance with the Department of General Services/Human Resources Polices.

Article VII - Conflict of Interest

1. Board members shall file statements of economic interests as required by the Fair Political Practices Commission. The terms in the Conflict-of-Interest Code, adopted by the Board constitute the Conflict-of-Interest Code of the Board.

Article VIII – Advisory Committees

- An Advisory Committee is more than two (2) members meeting to deliberate or discuss Board duties or activities in accordance with the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act.
- 2. The Board may create by majority vote, advisory committees which serve to advise the Board, on Board related duties. The Advisory Committees may not act on behalf of the Board and must act in accordance with Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act.
- 3. The Board may appoint, by majority vote, members of the board to advisory committees for a limited term not to exceed the term of the appointed member.
- 4. Advisory Committees may not exceed ten (10) Board members but may be created with fewer than ten (10) members.
- 5. Advisory Committees may meet in accordance with the teleconference rules for advisory, non-decision-making bodies in the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act.
- 6. The Board has established the Code Development and Appeals Advisory Committee (CDAAC) as follows:
 - a. The CDAAC shall have seven (7) Board members and one (1) alternate maximum as nominated and confirmed through majority vote by the Board. Board members may self-nominate to serve on the CDAAC.
 - b. Board members not appointed to the advisory committee may attend to hear the meeting but may not participate in the discussion or deliberation.

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- c. The CDAAC shall conduct public workshops or hearings for California Building Code updates, meet to hear and make recommendations to the full Board regarding appeals, meet to provide informal, non-binding, interpretations to State and local jurisdictions on matters relating to the California Historical Building Code.
 - i. Formal, binding interpretations require full Board approval prior to issuance. A copy of the formal interpretation must be sent to the California Building Standards Commission and published.
 - ii. Informal meetings by a state agency, local jurisdiction or private party may be requested.
- d. The CDAAC shall consult with the following state agencies when considering proposed rules and regulations to the Historical Building Code which affect qualified historic buildings or structures within their jurisdiction:
 - The Division of the State Architect
 - ii. The State Fire Marshal
 - iii. The State Building Standards Commission, but only with respect to approval of building standards.
 - iv. The Department of Housing and Community Development
 - v. The Department of Transportation
 - vi. Other state agencies that may be affected by the Historic Building Code.
- 7. The Board has established the Bylaws Advisory Committee (BAC) as follows:
 - a. The BAC shall have five (5) Board members maximum as nominated and confirmed through majority vote by the Board. Board members may self-nominate to serve on the BAC.
 - b. The BAC shall meet to confer on the creation of, and amendments to the Bylaws and to confer on administrative procedures related to the business activities of the Board.

Article IX – Amendment of Bylaw

1. The Bylaws may be amended by a majority vote of the SHBSB. Amendments to the Bylaws are not final until approved by the full Board.

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CONFLICT-OF-INTEREST CODE FOR STATE HISTORICAL BUILDING SAFETY BOARD

The Political Reform Act (Government Code section 81000, et seq.) requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate conflict-of-interest codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation (2 Cal. Code of Regs. Sec. 18730) that contains the terms of a standard conflict-of-interest code, which can be incorporated by reference in an agency's code. After public notice and hearing, the standard code may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act. Therefore. the terms of 2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730 and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission are hereby incorporated by reference. This regulation and the attached Appendices designating positions and establishing disclosure categories. shall constitute the conflict-of-interest code of the **State Historical Building Safety Board (Board)**.

The Chair of the Board, Board Members, and Executive Director must file their statement of economic interests electronically with the **Fair Political Practices Commission**. All other individuals holding designated positions must file their statements with the **Board**. All statements must be made available for public inspection and reproduction under Government Code Section 81008.

The Executive Director may determine in writing that a particular consultant/new position, although a "designated position," is hired to perform a range of duties that is limited in scope and thus is not required to comply fully with the disclosure requirements described in this section. Such written determination shall include a description of the consultant's or new position's duties and, based upon that description, a statement of the extent of disclosure requirements. The Executive Director's determination is a public record and shall be retained for public inspection in the same manner and location as this conflict-of-interest code (Gov. Code Sec. 81008).

APPENDIX B DISCLOSURE CATEGORIES

DISCLOSURE CATEGORY 1

Individuals holding positions assigned to Disclosure Category 1 must report all investments and business positions in business entities, sources of income (including receipt of gifts, loans and travel payments) and real property located in the state of California.
