Upon notice duly given, the meeting of the State Allocation Board (SAB) was held at the East End Complex, located at 1500 Capitol Avenue, in the Auditorium, in Sacramento, on May 28, 2025 at 4:00 p.m.

Ms. Michele Perrault, the SAB Chair, announced that this meeting was being held in person for anyone who would like to provide public comment in person. This meeting was also conducted by way of Zoom meeting for members of the public participating remotely. The meeting was physically webcast from the East End Complex, located at 1500 Capitol Avenue, in the Auditorium, in Sacramento.

The Executive Officer informed the SAB of the following:

2025-26 State Budget – May Revision

On May 14, 2025, Governor Newsom introduced the May Revision to his January 2025 Governor's Budget proposal. The following May Revision proposals are of interest to the SAB and OPSC:

- The May Revision proposes to redirect \$177.5 million in remaining General Fund money previously appropriated for School Facility Program (SFP) projects back to the General Fund due to a projected state budget shortfall in fiscal year 2025-26.

At the February 26, 2025 meeting, the SAB reserved these funds to support the ability to consider providing direct apportionments to school districts directly impacted by the January 2025 wildfires that submit requests for disaster assistance funding by August 31, 2025, and specified that any amount remaining after that time would be available to other SFP projects. To date, OPSC has not received applications for disaster assistance funding from the school districts directly impacted by the January 2025 wildfires.

If the May Revision proposal is ultimately included in the enacted state Budget, these funds will not be available for SFP projects. However, Proposition 2 bond authority is available to support requests for disaster assistance funding and other SFP projects.

- The May Revision includes proposed trailer bill language that restores the SAB's authority to provide the existing excessive cost hardship grants in SFP regulations, for applications submitted on or after October 31, 2024.
- The May Revision includes \$50,000 one-time General Fund for administrative costs for OPSC to implement the California State Auditor's recommendations to engage in the stakeholder process to update the Facility Inspection Tool.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S STATEMENT (cont.)

2025-26 State Budget – May Revision (cont.)

The May Revision does not modify the January Governor's Budget proposal for funding and position authority for DGS to implement and administer Proposition 2. The May Revision also maintains the existing OPSC application processing rate of approximately \$1.5 billion annually.

These proposals are subject to change during the remainder of the budget development process.

Stakeholder Meetings

Since the April 23, 2025 SAB meeting, OPSC has held one stakeholder meeting focused on gathering input toward implementation of various provisions of Proposition 2.

On May 8, 2025, OPSC held its tenth stakeholder meeting to discuss proposed regulatory amendments and considerations to implement the following topics from Proposition 2:

- 75-Year Old Buildings Supplemental Grant
- Career Technical Education Supplemental Grant

At the same meeting, OPSC discussed the following subjects unrelated to Proposition 2:

- Global Regulations Cleanup
- Second Round Modernization

At this meeting, 56 unique stakeholders joined on Zoom, and one stakeholder attended in-person at OPSC's office in West Sacramento.

Details of upcoming stakeholder meetings will continue to be announced in email blasts to school districts and stakeholders.

Career Technical Education Facilities Program (CTEFP) Joint Workshop

On May 22, 2025, OPSC held a joint workshop on the upcoming CTEFP filing round that the SAB authorized at the April 2025 SAB meeting. This workshop was jointly hosted by OPSC, CDE, and the Division of the State Architect. At this workshop, more than 160 external stakeholders joined in via Zoom.

Priority Funding Filing Round 29

The 29th Priority Funding filing period began on May 14, 2025 and closes at the end of the day on June 12, 2025. This filing period marks the first opportunity for applicants who have received an unfunded approval under Proposition 2 bond authority to request apportionments from an upcoming statewide general obligation bond sale. School districts who wish to participate in the priority funding process may submit a request during this time to convert an unfunded approval to an apportionment. If a project receives an apportionment, school districts have 90 days from the date of the apportionment to submit a signed Grant Agreement and a complete and valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05).

Applicants are encouraged to submit Priority Funding requests electronically through OPSC Online. All requests must be received by OPSC before the end of the day on June 12, 2025. These requests will be valid from July 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

Executive Officer Statement

EXECUTIVE OFFICER STATEMENT
State Allocation Board Meeting, June 25, 2025

STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS

Since the May 28, 2025 State Allocation Board (Board) meeting, the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) has held one stakeholder meeting focused on gathering input toward implementation of various provisions of Proposition 2.

On June 12, 2025, OPSC held its eleventh stakeholder meeting to discuss proposed regulatory amendments and considerations to implement the Interim Housing and Disaster Assistance provisions from Proposition 2.

At this meeting, 46 unique stakeholders joined on Zoom, and 2 stakeholders attended in-person at OPSC's office in West Sacramento.

Stakeholders may submit feedback on this topic to OPSCCommunications@dgs.ca.gov until the close of business on June 27, 2025 to have their input considered for subsequent stakeholder meetings on this topic.

Details of upcoming stakeholder meetings will continue to be announced in email blasts to school districts and stakeholders.

CONSIDERATION OF ADDITIONAL TIME FOR FUND RELEASE FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS LOCATED ON MILITARY INSTALLATIONS

The Office of Administrative Law (OAL) approved permanent regulatory amendments to the fund release timeline for public schools located on military installations, specifically School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.90, effective June 3, 2025. As previously announced, these regulatory amendments were previously approved on an emergency basis, effective November 1, 2024. The amendments to School Facility Program Regulation Section 1859.90 authorize the Board to provide an extended fund release deadline of up to 18 months for projects pertaining to a school facility on a military installation that is the recipient of a federal grant that requires a local matching share.

EMERGENCY REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM/PROPOSITION 2 IMPLEMENTATION

The emergency regulations approved by the State Allocation Board in March 2025 were approved by OAL on June 20, 2025 and became effective on that date. These regulations incorporate some of the provisions contained in Proposition 2 into the SFP, as follows, for applications received on or after October 31, 2024:

- The maximum level of total bonding capacity a school district can have to automatically qualify for financial hardship assistance increased from \$5 million to \$15 million.

- The timeframe for requiring revalidation of small school districts' new construction enrollment projections was extended from three years to five years;
- Amendments were added to determine modernization eligibility specifically for school facilities located on a military installation that are the recipient of a federal grant for facilities modernization that requires a local matching share; and
- A second *Grant Agreement [Proposition 2]* was incorporated by reference to reflect additional eligible expenditures added by Proposition 2.

Additionally, the proposed regulations include the addition of the Board's longstanding policy and process authorizing bridge financing as a tool for interfund borrowing for school districts applying for Financial Hardship assistance.

PRIORITY FUNDING FILING ROUND 29 CLOSED

The most recent Priority Funding filing period began on May 14, 2025, and closed on June 12, 2025. This filing period marked the first opportunity for applicants who received an unfunded approval under Proposition 2 bond authority to request apportionments from an upcoming statewide general obligation bond sale.

During this filing period, OPSC received valid requests for 143 unique projects, totaling \$651.7 million in State funding. These requests are valid from July 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025

Requests were not submitted for four projects; however, all four are unfunded approvals for design funding for the Charter School Facilities Program that are not subject to rescission after two occurrences of non-participation in the priority funding process.

CHARTER SCHOOL FACILITIES PROGRAM

As previously announced, the Proposition 2 filing round for the Charter School Facilities Program will open on July 3, with applications accepted via OPSC Online between July 3 and October 30, 2025. OPSC held a technical webinar for prospective applicants on June 25, 2025. That webinar, as well as the previous webinar with an overview of the Charter School Facilities Program, are available as recordings on OPSC's [website](#).

2025-26 BUDGET UPDATES

The State Budget Act for the 2025-26 fiscal year has not yet been enacted, but OPSC notes that the following proposals of interest to the Board that were highlighted in previous meetings have not been changed in the most recently introduced Budget Bills:

- Redirection of \$177.5 million in remaining General Fund money previously appropriated for School Facility Program projects back to the state's General Fund due to the state budget shortfall.
- Proposed trailer bill language that restores the Board's authority to provide excessive cost hardship grants in SFP regulations, for applications submitted on or after October 31, 2024.

- Proposed funding and position authority for the Department of General Services to implement and administer Proposition 2, as well as to implement the State Auditor's recommendations to engage the stakeholder process to update the Facility Inspection Tool.

OPSC will include an update in the next Executive Officer's statement regarding the final outcome of these proposals.

NEXT MEETING

The meeting originally planned for July 23, 2025 will be cancelled. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, August 19, 2025. The time and location of the meeting will be determined and announced at a later date.

SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM

This Resolution of the State Allocation Board (hereafter referred to as the “Board”) is applicable to the appropriate sections of the Education Code and is described and filed in the office of the Executive Officer and will be made available to all interested parties as the Resolution pertains to the documents attached hereto. Said documents were acted upon by the Board at its meeting on June 25, 2025.

WHEREAS, the Board has previously approved or determined to be approvable a number of projects for construction or modernization eligibility of facilities for school districts and is making apportionments and/or unfunded approvals for the grant amounts for projects that meet the Board’s criteria for the apportionment of grants pursuant to Education Code Sections 17072.10, 17078.52, 17078.70, 17079 or 17074.10 or Board Regulations 1859.81.1 or 1859.83;

WHEREAS, Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2 require the State (on whose behalf the Board is acting) to declare its reasonable intent to provide grant funding to school districts, in accordance with Board policy and law, for costs of the projects with proceeds of State bonds.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. This Resolution is adopted by the Board for the purposes of establishing compliance with Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2 and this Resolution does not bind the Board to make any additional apportionment or bind the State to incur any indebtedness.
2. The Board anticipates that some or all of the school districts listed on the list of “Projects” referred to in this Resolution will pay certain capital expenditures in connection with some or all of the project’s cost prior to the issuance of bonds by the State to pay for the grants for the projects. The reimbursement of such costs is consistent with the State’s budgetary and financial circumstances, and in accordance with Board policy, as no other funds or accounts of the State have been budgeted or are available to pay the costs of the projects on either a short-term or a long-term basis.
3. The Board, acting on behalf of the State, hereby declares that it is the State’s official intent to use proceeds of general obligation bonds and/or General Fund proceeds that may become available for such purpose, consistent with the requirements of law that are in effect at the time the funds are available, to provide grants, in accordance with applicable, laws and regulations.
4. This Resolution shall be continuously available for inspection by the general public during normal business hours at the offices of the Board at 707 3rd Street, West Sacramento, California, commencing within one week after the date of enactment of this Resolution.
5. Any eligibility determination does not constitute a commitment of future funding by the Board.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present to the State Allocation Board (Board) a list of School Facility Program (SFP) applications for unfunded approval.

DESCRIPTION

The projects listed on the Attachment represent SFP New Construction, Modernization, Charter School and/or Overcrowding Relief Grant projects in date order of a complete application being received by the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC).

AUTHORITY

SFP Regulation Section 1859.2 defines an Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) as an information list of unfunded projects that was created due to the State's inability to provide interim financing from the Pooled Money Investment Account (AB 55 loans) to fund school construction projects as declared in the Department of Finance Budget Letter #33 issued on December 18, 2008.

"When the Board has no funds to apportion ..., the Board will also accept and process applications for apportionment for purposes of developing an Unfunded List based on the date the application is Ready for Apportionment, with the exception of New Construction funding applications that utilize eligibility generated by the Alternative Enrollment Projection.

...

An application for funding included on an Unfunded List is eligible for reimbursement subject to adjustments in the New Construction Grants amount pursuant to Section 1859.77."

BACKGROUND

At the March 11, 2009 SAB meeting, the Board requested that Staff continue to process applications to the Board for unfunded approval, up to the bonding authority. The Attachment reflects applications being presented for unfunded approval, including SFP modernization and new construction projects in date order of a complete application being received by the OPSC. The list also includes health and safety facility hardship applications for funding that have been processed and are ready for approval regardless of received date. The unfunded approval of the applications as reflected on the Attachment does not constitute a guarantee of future funding.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approve the SFP application(s) as presented on the Attachment.
2. Provide that these unfunded approvals do not constitute a guarantee of future funding.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present school districts' requests for an extension to the deadline to submit a Fund Release Authorization (Form SAB 70-02) for previously approved California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) funding applications.

DESCRIPTION

Program regulations require that school districts participating in the Program must submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months of receiving an apportionment. In addition to the complete Form, applicants must also enter into a binding contract for at least 90 percent of the building construction activities of the project. If the school district is unable to meet this requirement, the school district may submit in writing other evidence satisfactory to the State Allocation Board (Board) of circumstances beyond the control of the school district that precludes the school district from submitting a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months. A complete form is inclusive of a California Department of Education (CDE) plan approval, Division of the State Architect (DSA)-approved plans and specifications for the project. The school districts listed on Attachment A have submitted written requests for an extension to the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC). Therefore, OPSC is presenting these requests to the Board for consideration.

AUTHORITY

Regulation Section 1860.16(f) states, in part:

For an Apportionment received pursuant to Section 1860.7(b) and 1860.7(d), where submittal of the necessary CDE plan approval and/or DSA-approved plans and specifications were not required at the time the Board granted an Apportionment, the school district has up to 18 months to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Request* (Form SAB 70-02) from the date of the first Apportionment. The school district may submit in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the school district that precludes the school district from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment. If the required submittals or other evidence in writing are not received within 18 months of the first Apportionment, the Apportionment shall be rescinded, and the Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant will return to the Program for reallocation without further Board action.

- (1) School districts submitting other evidence shall have up to three years from the date of the first Apportionment to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02). This shall not extend the deadline in Section 1860.18.

STAFF COMMENTS

OPSC received letters from two school districts requesting an extension to the 18-month Program deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 (Attachment B). OPSC reviewed each school district's letter and determined that they appear to demonstrate other evidence of circumstances beyond their control that preclude them from submitting a complete Form SAB 70-02 within the required time period. Attachment A includes the application numbers, school district names, a summary of the circumstances, the current due date, and the proposed new due date for each application. Staff recommends approval of the school districts' requests as shown on Attachment A.

The school districts are advised that approval of the extension does not extend the three-year deadline to complete the project and submit a complete Expenditure Report (Form SAB 70-03) with final expenditures.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve each school district's request for a time extension to the fund release deadline as indicated for each application listed on Attachment A under the column heading "Staff Recommendations."

The Jurupa Unified School District respectfully requests an extension to the deadline to submit the Fund Release for the District's California, Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program project at Pedley Elementary School (Application Number 70/67090-00-005) to August 31, 2025. Despite the District's best efforts, it will not be possible to meet the requirement to be under contract for 90% of the work by the current June 4, 2025, deadline.

The District received an Apportionment for this project in December 2023 and promptly moved forward with the design of the project, engaging the architect by May 2024. During the design process, the District continually monitored expected construction costs and anticipated enrollment at the site. Unfortunately, project cost estimates show that costs will exceed the grant plus the District's required matching share. The District explored options to reduce costs, including reducing the scope of the project. However, to best meet the enrollment needs at this campus, it is necessary to keep the project at the original scope of seven classrooms. To maintain the original project scope, the District will need to provide a local match beyond what the program funding formulas calculate. For the District to be able to responsibly make the final decision on providing additional local funds for this project, it was critical to learn the outcome of both the statewide and local school bond measures that went before voters in November 2024. Availability of local and state bond funds was a key factor in determining the best way for this project to proceed considering all priority projects the District needs to address. Once it became clear that the bonds had passed, the District confirmed the project scope of seven classrooms and the architects submitted the plans to the Division of the State Architect (DSA) in December 2024. The plans are in back check, and the District anticipates DSA approval by the end of May. Approval by the California Department of Education is also expected in the month of May, if not earlier.

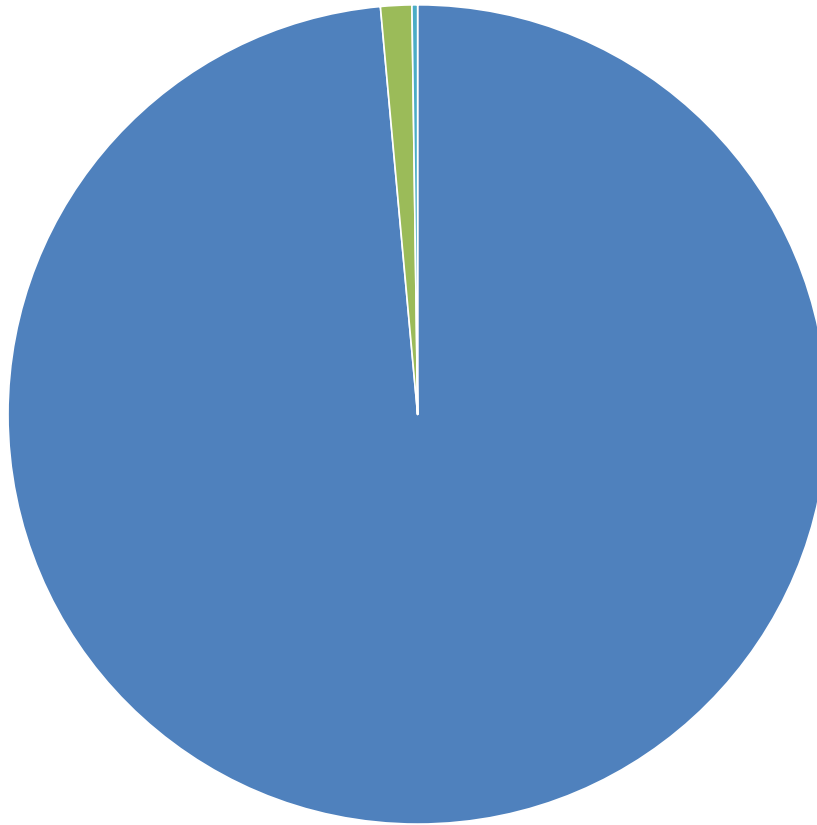
**Proposition 2

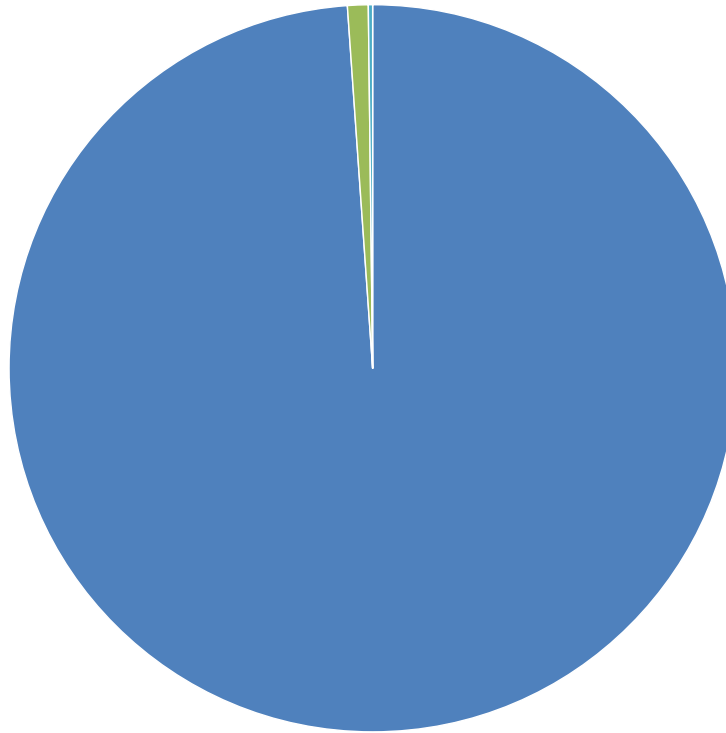

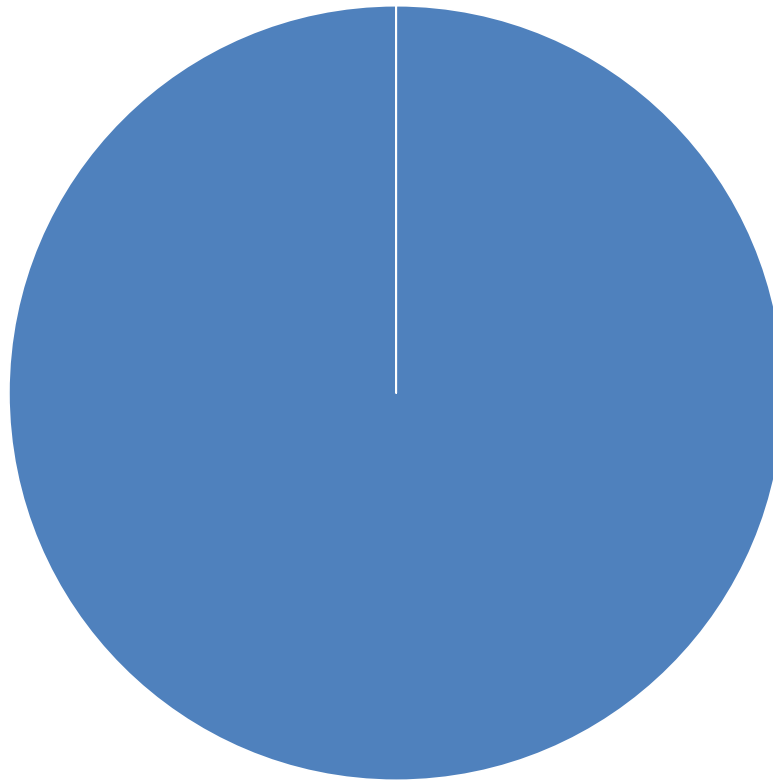

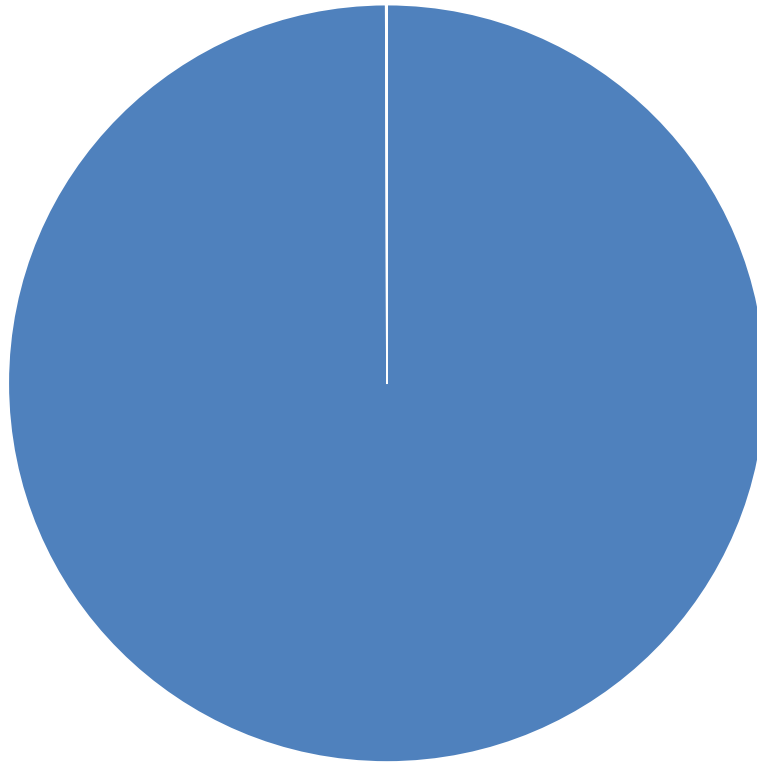

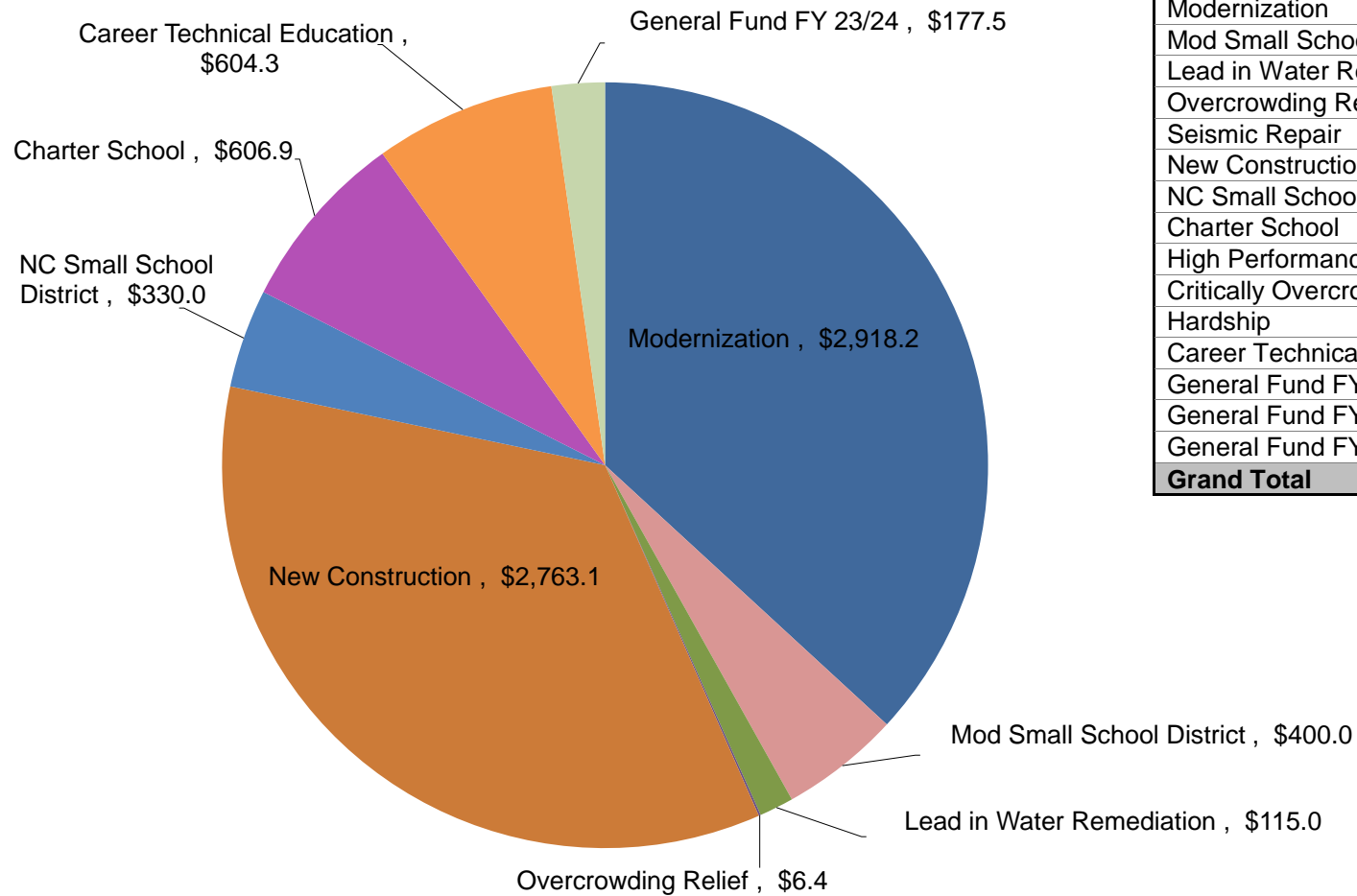

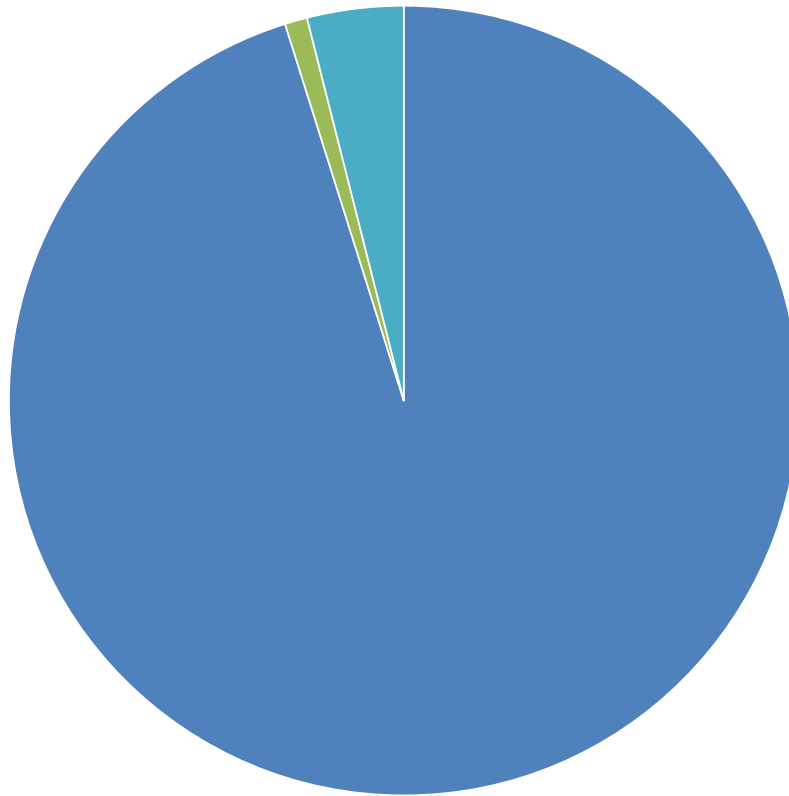

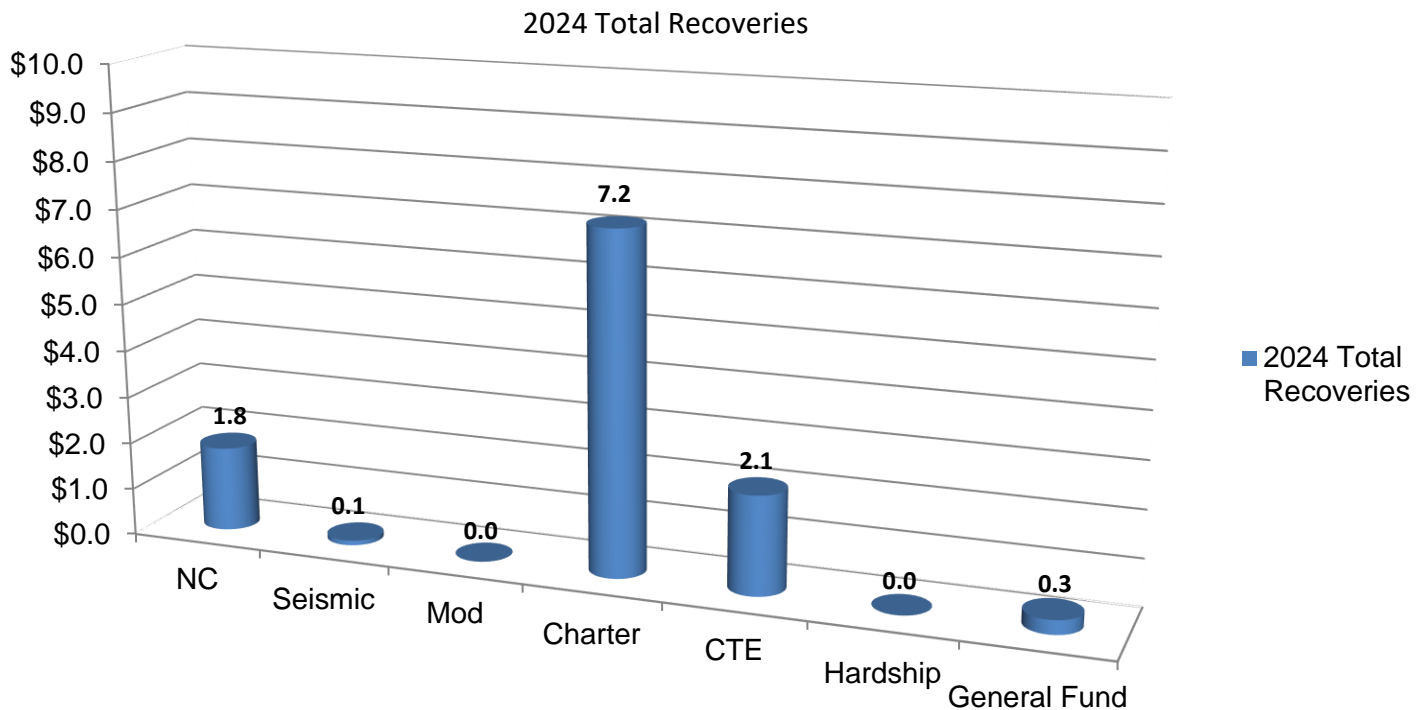

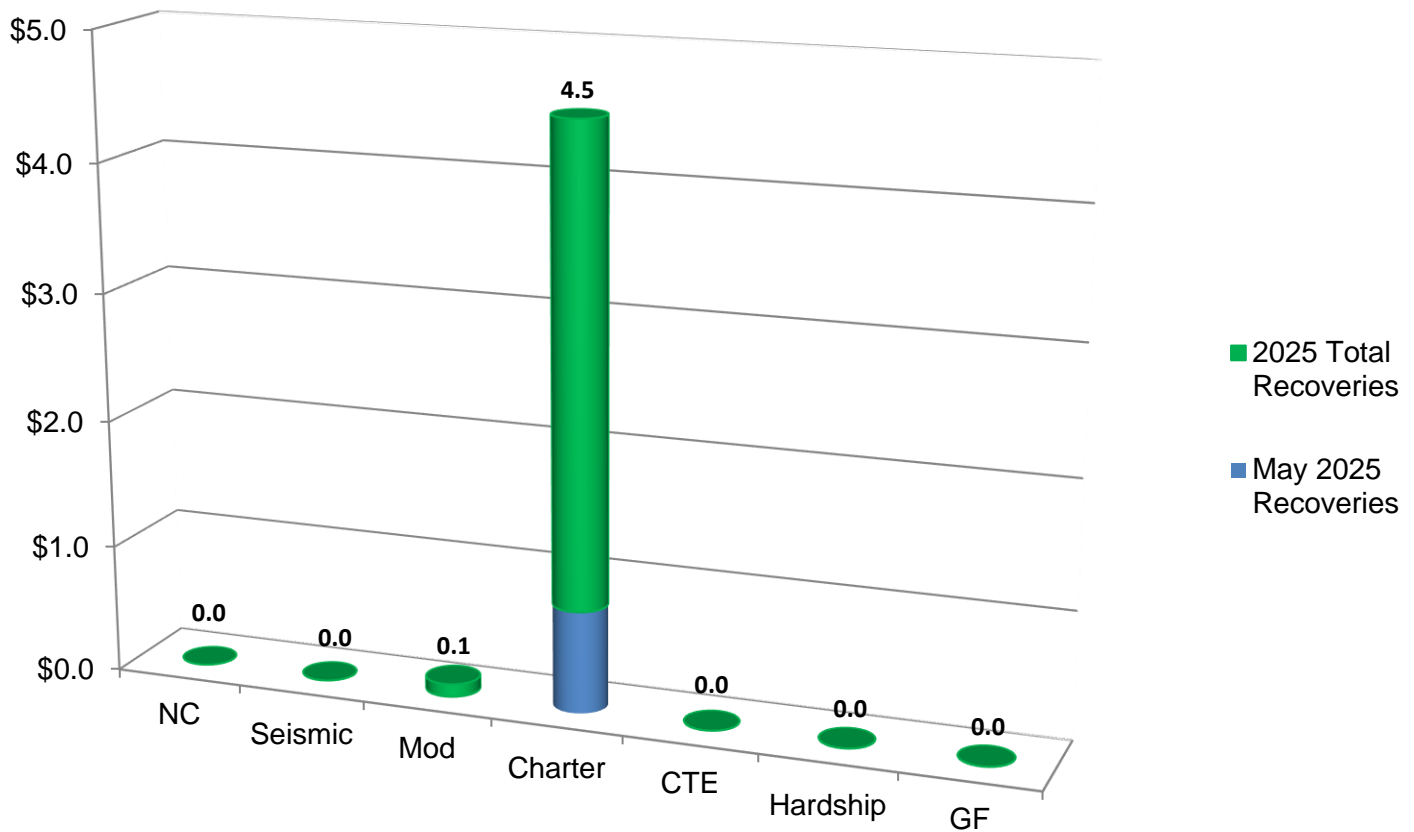

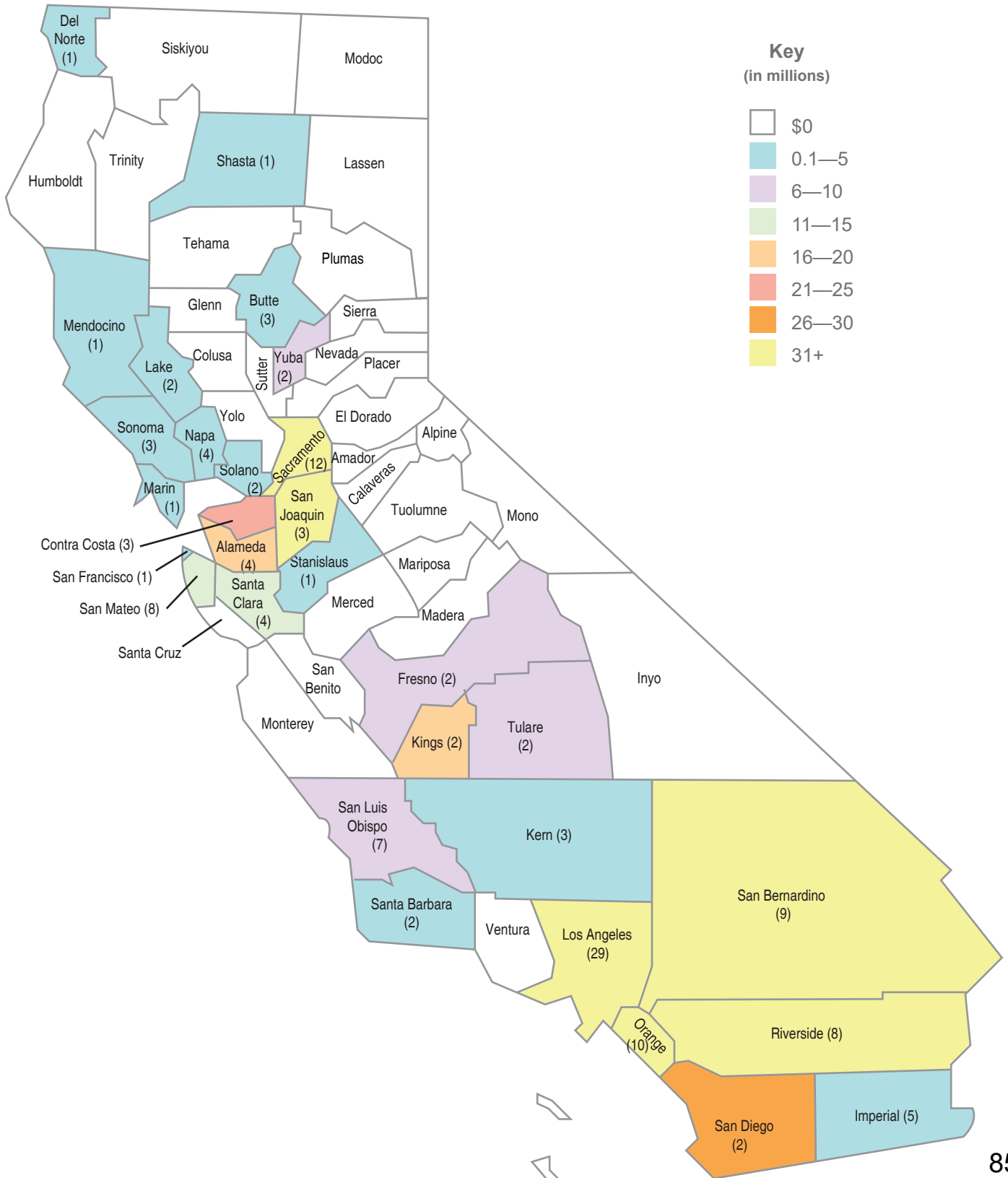

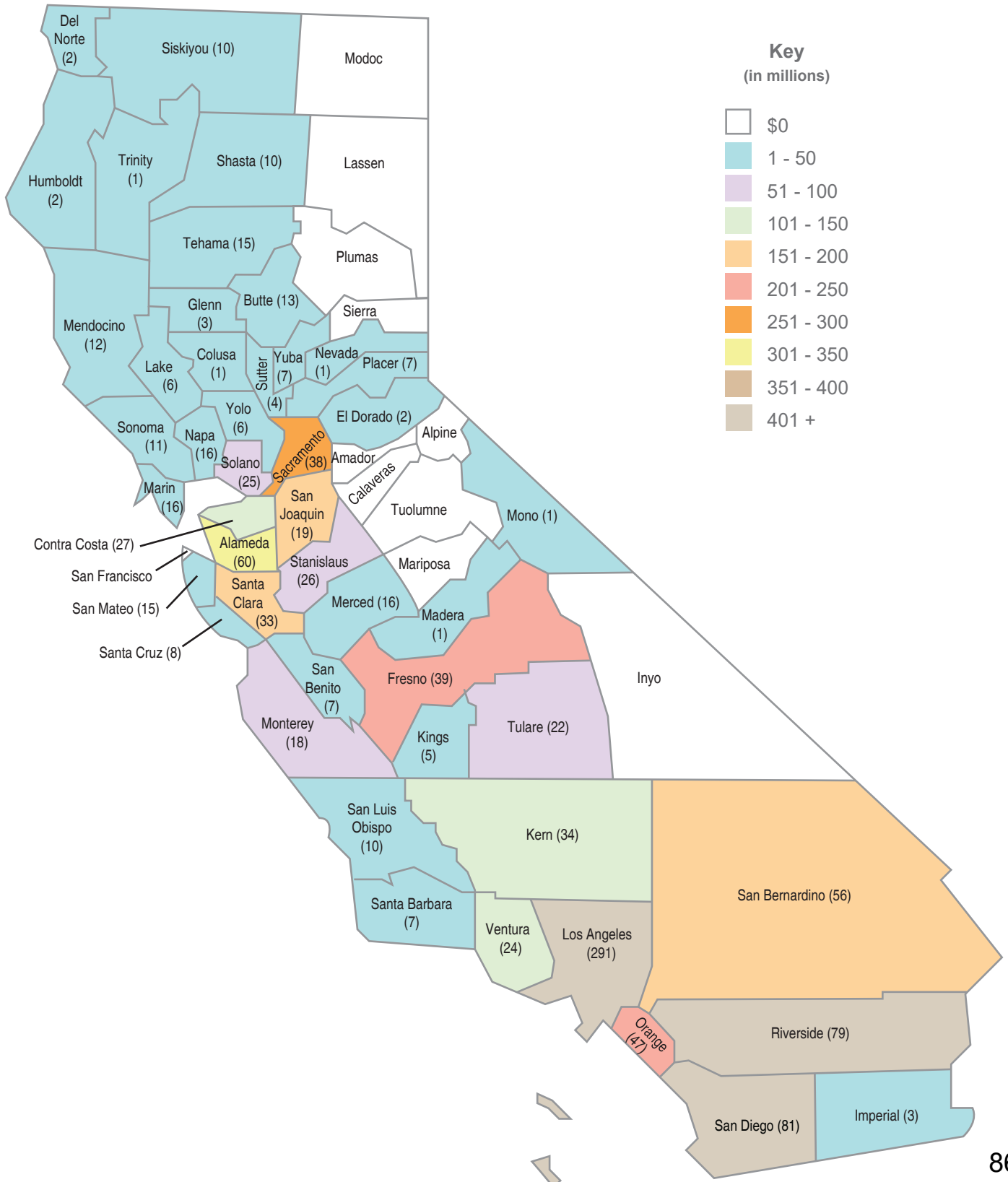
School Facility Program Proposition 2 Unfunded Approvals by County

PROPOSED EMERGENCY REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR THE SCHOOL
FACILITY PROGRAM

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present the State Allocation Board (Board) with recommendations for the adoption of School Facility Program (SFP) regulatory amendments, on an emergency basis, for the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), which was approved by a majority of California's voters on November 5, 2024. These proposed amendments are related to the implementation of a total of four Proposition 2 topics.

DESCRIPTION

To implement Proposition 2 provisions, staff is conducting stakeholder meetings to discuss and receive feedback on proposed regulatory amendments resulting from statutory additions and amendments to Education Code (EC). The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) has conducted multiple stakeholder meetings to discuss Proposition 2 implementation and propose regulatory amendments to the SFP. In part, these stakeholder meetings introduced proposed concepts and regulations for the following four topics:

- Matching Shares
- 75 Years or Older Supplemental Grant
- Supplemental Grant for Minimum Essential Facilities (MEF)
- Transitional Kindergarten (TK) Supplemental Grant

Based upon feedback received, OPSC determined that the proposed regulatory amendments related to these topics are able to move forward for Board consideration after some adjustments to the versions presented in the most recent stakeholder meetings, which are respectively outlined in the Staff Analysis component of this item.

This item seeks Board approval of staff's recommendation to adopt the proposed regulatory amendments to the SFP regulations to implement and align with new statutory requirements pursuant to the provisions of Proposition 2. This item also seeks Board approval of staff's recommendation to adopt the proposed amendments to the *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 50-04) to align with the proposed amendments.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A.

BACKGROUND

The passage of Proposition 2 makes numerous changes to the SFP that are applicable to applications received on or after October 31, 2024. Staff has held five stakeholder meetings for the proposed regulatory amendments presented in this item, on January 30, February 13, March 13, April 3, and May 8, 2025. This item represents the second set of proposed regulatory amendments for the Board's consideration to implement Proposition 2 provisions for applicable SFP applications received on or after October 31, 2024. Additional proposed amendments will be presented at future Board meetings on a flow basis.

Below is an overview of the relevant Proposition 2 statutes as they apply to each topic.

Matching Shares

Historically, SFP New Construction and Modernization projects have been eligible for a fixed state share percentage of the total approved project cost, except for school districts that qualify for financial hardship funding.¹ School districts applying for New Construction funding must provide an equal matching share (50/50). For school districts applying for Modernization funding, the state provides 60 percent of the total approved project cost, and the school district provides 40 percent of the total approved project cost.

Proposition 2 establishes a points-based determination and sliding scale for the required state and local matching shares for all SFP projects, regardless of whether they qualify for financial hardship assistance. Proposition 2 specifies the number of points awarded based on the school district's gross bonding capacity per enrollment, the school district's unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the Local Control Funding Formula, whether the school district has an enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer, and whether the project includes the use of a project labor agreement. Based on the total number of points for a project, the required local matching share will be adjusted as follows, with no change to the total approved project cost. The range of total possible points is between 3 points and 16 points, inclusive. The relevant statutory changes are as follows:

- EC Section 17070.59 was added to establish a points-based determination and sliding scale for the required state and local match for SFP projects that do not qualify for financial hardship assistance.
- EC Section 17070.87 was added to require New Construction and Modernization applications submitted before October 31, 2024, to be processed and apportioned in accordance with the SFP statutes, as they read on January 1, 2024.

¹ School districts eligible for financial hardship assistance may qualify for additional state funding beyond the Proposition 2 points-based determination and sliding scale amounts and may receive up to 100 percent state funding for the total approved project cost.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

- EC Section 17072.30 was amended to outline the sliding scale and point allocation for New Construction projects and to delete a reference to the fixed 50-percent state share.
- EC 17074.16 was amended to outline the sliding scale and point allocation for Modernization projects and to delete references to the fixed 60-percent state share and 40-percent local match.

75 Years or Older Buildings Supplemental Grant

Proposition 2 added EC Section 17074.265, which provides a Modernization supplemental grant for projects with a scope of work that includes the demolition and replacement of building(s) at least 75 years of age or older.

MEF Supplemental Grant and TK Supplemental Grant

Another addition to EC is Section 17073.16, which authorizes several new Modernization supplemental grants. Subdivisions (a) and (b) of this EC Section provide an MEF supplemental grant for projects that are either:

- Expanding an existing gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen if the facility is 60 percent or less than the department's recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the school, or
- Constructing a new gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen if the site is lacking one or more of the specified facilities.

Additionally, EC Section 17073.16(c) provides a TK supplemental grant for projects that are either:

- Retrofitting an existing school facility to adequately house TK pupils, or
- Constructing new TK classrooms if the site is lacking sufficient school facilities to house TK pupils.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

Stakeholder Meetings

At the January 30, 2025 stakeholder meeting, staff introduced the points-based determination and sliding scale for the required local match for SFP projects (Matching Shares) in addition to the 75 Years or Older Building Supplemental grant.

On February 13, 2025, staff presented proposed implementation of supplemental grants for MEF and TK.

Subsequently, Matching Shares was presented a second time at the March 13, 2025 stakeholder meeting to address feedback received from the first meeting. The remaining topics were discussed for a second time at the April 3, 2025 stakeholder meeting.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Finally, the 75 Years or Older Buildings supplemental grant was presented for the third time at the May 8, 2025 stakeholder meeting.

Stakeholder Feedback

Staff appreciates those who attended and those who raised questions or provided feedback.

Feedback that was received for each respective stakeholder meeting may be found on Attachment E, alongside the items as previously presented. A summary of stakeholder feedback received since the last stakeholder meeting for each topic and staff's response is provided on Attachment F.

Collectively, staff's recommendations presented in this item were informed by stakeholder feedback and represent staff's final recommendations for implementation of these topics.

Proposed SFP Regulations

Below is a summary of the proposed SFP Regulations for each respective topic within this item, as seen on Attachment B:

Matching Shares

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.2 includes a new definition for "Local Funding Adjustment Grant," which means the additional funding provided to reduce a school district's required matching share, pursuant to Education Code Sections 17072.30, 17074.16, and 17070.59 for applications received on or after October 31, 2024.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 delineates the methodology as prescribed in statute (EC Section 17070.59) for purposes of determining the points used to compute the required matching funds from local sources pursuant to EC Sections 17072.30 and 17074.16.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.1 specifies matching share determination requirements for New Construction applications received on or before October 30, 2024 as well as for applications received on or after October 31, 2024 (pursuant to EC Section 17072.30) and adjusted for the Local Funding Adjustment grant as determined in Section 1859.70.5.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.79 specifies matching share determination requirements for Modernization applications received on or before October 30, 2024 as well as for applications received on or after October 31, 2024 (pursuant to EC Section 17074.16) and adjusted for the Local Funding Adjustment grant as determined in Section 1859.70.5.

75 Years or Older Buildings Supplemental Grant

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.2 includes a new definition for the proposed *75 Years or Older Building Cost Estimate and Cost/Benefit Analysis* (Form SAB 57-75).

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.7.1 is a new section for the Modernization Additional Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings that outlines the eligibility criteria and grant calculations for this grant. With these regulations, a new modernization supplemental grant has been created to replace a 75 Years or Older Building using a grant that is aligned with the new construction per pupil grant amount. These grants will be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, along with the other SFP grants. A qualifying portable building must be replaced with a permanent building.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2 has a proposed amendment to include the replacement of existing buildings that are at least 75 years old, pursuant to Section 1859.78.85, with increased area needed to meet the minimum California Code of Regulations, Title 5 requirements as one of the exclusions for new building area within a modernization project. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will result in an adjustment to the new construction baseline eligibility pursuant to Section 1859.51.

Minimum Essential Facilities Supplemental Grant

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.2 includes a new definition for the term “Minimum Essential Facility.”
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.5 outlines the eligibility criteria and grant calculation. These grants will be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, along with the other SFP grants.

TK Supplemental Grant

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.51 is amended to require an adjustment to New Construction eligibility as a result of new TK classrooms constructed. While the Full Day Kindergarten (FDK) Program provides an exclusion for new classrooms constructed with program funds so that the new capacity was not included in the New Construction baseline in EC Section 17375, the same exclusion was not provided in EC Section 17073.16(c). Therefore, the proposed SFP regulation amendments include an adjustment to the district's new construction baseline if new TK classrooms are constructed with funding from the new supplemental grant. Additionally, SFP Regulation Section 1859.32 is amended to exclude classrooms funded through the FDK Program from the gross classroom inventory, pursuant to EC Section 17375(a)(5).
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.9.2 outlines the eligibility criteria and calculation for this supplemental grant to construct new or retrofit existing space into TK classrooms. This section limits the supplemental funding to a maximum of four classrooms per school site. These grants will be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, along with the other SFP grants.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2 has a proposed amendment to include TK classrooms as one of the exclusions for new building area within a modernization project.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2 – Use of Modernization Grant Funds

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2 include the addition of subdivisions (a)(3) and (a)(4) that modernization grant funds may be used on additional square footage constructed with funding pursuant to Sections 1859.78.7.1, 1859.78.9.1, and 1859.78.9.2, as well as any additional square footage constructed to meet the minimum requirements of California Code of Regulations, Title 5.
- SFP Regulation subdivision (b)(3) has been added to account for an exception for site development work for facilities indicated within subdivision (a)(2), (a)(3), and (a)(4).

Proposed Form SAB 50-04

Below is a summary of the proposed amendments to the Form SAB 50-04, as seen on Attachment C:

Matching Shares

- The form has a proposed Section 22: Local Funding Adjustment Grant. Both the instructions and body of the form have been amended for this addition and subsequent renumbering of sections.
- The instructions of the form have been amended to include requested information and documentation to determine the Local Funding Adjustment Grant, i.e., the district's total assessed valuation, gross bonding capacity, unduplicated pupil percentage, pupil enrollment, and whether the project includes the use of a Project Labor Agreement.

75 Years or Older Buildings Supplemental Grant

- Under the General Information component of the form, number 7 has been amended to include information related to 75 Years or Older Building Apportionments and required documentation.
- The proposed Section 2(d.) of the Specific Instructions and body of the form provides instructions and a fillable component of the form for requesting funding for 75 Years or Older Buildings. With this proposed change, the existing subsections under this Section are renumbered to become Section 2(e.) through (i.)
- The proposed Section 6(d.) of the Specific Instructions provides instructions and a fillable component of the form for requesting the site development grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings. The current subsections are renumbered to become Section 6(e.) through (f.)

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

MEF Supplemental Grant

- Section 6 of the Specific Instructions and body of the form includes a proposed additional subsection (g) that provides instructions and a fillable component to request an additional grant for an MEF.
- A Certification has been added to the Form SAB 50-04 for instances in which a classroom(s) is demolished and reconfigured into an MEF.

TK Supplemental Grant

- Section 6 of the Specific Instructions and body of the form includes a proposed additional subsection (h) that provides instructions and a fillable component to request an additional grant for a Transitional Kindergarten Classroom(s).
- A Certification has been added to the Form SAB 50-04 regarding funding requests for TK Classrooms.

Substantive Changes to the Proposed SFP Regulations Since the Last Stakeholder Meetings

After the most recent presentations of these topics, staff made some substantive amendments to the proposed SFP Regulations. Each topic is broken out respectively below.

Matching Shares

- A new definition was added to SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 for “Local Funding Adjustment Grant.”
- The introductory paragraph of proposed SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 was revised to specify when required documentation, pursuant to subdivision (a), must be submitted to OPSC for determination of the Local Funding Adjustment Grant. For Approved Applications on the workload list or the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority list, the school district must submit documentation for total assessed valuation within 90 days of the OPSC notification of application processing, and that document submittal date serves at the point in time for the reporting year required for the total assessed valuation documentation. The documentation for purposes of the total assessed valuation is based in statute and referenced within the proposed regulation. For Approved Applications pursuant to SFP Regulation Sections 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2, the received date of the Form SAB 50-04 serves as the point in time for the reporting year required for the total assessed valuation documentation.
- Subdivision (a) was added to proposed SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 to specify the information school districts must submit to OPSC for determination of the Local Funding Adjustment Grant.
- Subdivision (c) was added to specify that school districts that do not provide supporting documentation will receive the lowest points allowable under each category used to determine the Local Funding Adjustment.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

75 Years or Older Building Supplemental Grant

- A new definition for “Current Replacement Cost” has been added to SFP Regulation Section 1859.2.
- A second introductory paragraph was added to SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.7.1 to indicate that a school district may replace a 75 Years or Older Building in the same location or an alternate location on the same site, and that site development funding for the minimum work required to replace the qualifying building may be provided.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.7.1(e) was amended to indicate that the Board shall provide 60 percent of approved site development and applicable design costs. Previously, OPSC proposed providing site development and design funding equal to the lesser of 60 percent of approved site development and applicable design costs or 35 percent of the funding in either 1859.78.7.1(b) or (c). Upon further consideration, OPSC determined a 35-percent cap could disadvantage some districts and the 60-percent approach better aligns site development grants with the work in the DSA-approved plans and specifications.

MEF Supplemental Grant

- Several subsections of SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.5 were revised to specify that OPSC will use the enrollment in the current CBEDS Report at the time of receipt of an Approved Application at the site. Initially, OPSC proposed using the current CBEDS at the time of processing of the application to determine the recommended MEF size. However, based on stakeholder feedback and consideration that this grant is a modernization supplemental grant, OPSC made this change to facilitate districts’ ability to better plan their projects and to more closely align with the Modernization program. This change does not have any effect on the New Construction Program or the enrollment reporting requirements for new construction funding applications. Districts will still be required to update their new construction eligibility at the time of processing of their new construction funding applications.
- An additional grant for Site Development was added to SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.5 to assist with the costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping and other costs incurred when adding an MEF to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the MEF. With the addition of subsections (b)(6) and (b)(7) for new projects, and the addition of subsections (c)(6) and (c)(7) for expansion projects, districts have the option of requesting a flat 35-percent increase to the amount determined from the square footage calculation or districts may choose to submit a detailed cost estimate for the site development work required for the eligible portion of the MEF and receive 60 percent of OPSC’s verified eligible costs contained in the cost estimate.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1 was amended to add two new rows to the chart in this section to account for multipurpose only (excludes food service) and school kitchen facilities. In the current chart, the recommended school

- kitchen square footage amount is included in the multipurpose room square footage amount. Education Code 17073.16 specifies that funding can be provided for a gymnasium, multipurpose room, library or school kitchen. To account for multipurpose room-only or school kitchen-only projects, OPSC developed square footage amounts for multipurpose room-only (excludes food service) and school kitchen facilities and included them in the existing chart.
- A certification has been added to Section 24 of the Form SAB 50-04 for instances when a classroom(s) is demolished and reconfigured into an MEF. The certification requires districts to certify that the classroom(s) is being rebuilt in the same plan set as the application requesting the MEF, or the district certifies that the classroom(s) is not being rebuilt due to lack of need and the district acknowledges that no adjustment to the school district's new construction eligibility will be made for the removal of classrooms when they are lost as part of a reconfiguration project.
 - The Form SAB 50-04 Instructions and Section 6g were amended to account for the addition of the site development grant as it relates to this supplemental grant.

TK Supplemental Grant

- Several subsections of SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.9.2 were revised to specify that OPSC will use the enrollment at the time of receipt of an Approved Application. Initially, OPSC proposed using enrollment at the time of processing of the application. However, based on stakeholder feedback and consideration that this grant is a modernization supplemental grant, OPSC made this change to facilitate districts' ability to better plan their projects and to more closely align with the Modernization program. This change does not have any effect on the New Construction Program or the enrollment reporting requirements for new construction funding applications. Districts will still be required to update their new construction eligibility at the time of processing of their new construction funding applications.
- An additional option for Site Development funding was added to SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.9.2 to assist with the costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for adding or retrofitting a TK classroom(s) on a site. With the addition of subsection (c)(5) for new projects, and the addition of subsection (d)(5) for retrofit projects, districts have the option of requesting a flat 35-percent increase to the TK per pupil grant amount or districts may choose to submit a detailed cost estimate for the site development work required for the eligible TK classrooms and receive 60 percent of OPSC's verified eligible costs contained in the cost estimate.

Non-Substantive Technical and Language Adjustments Since the Last Stakeholder Meetings

After the most recent presentations of these topics, staff made technical and language adjustments to the proposed SFP Regulations and Form SAB 50-04, which are outlined by topic below.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Matching Shares

SFP Regulations

- The title of the proposed SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 was updated to “Points for Determining the Local Funding Adjustment Grant,” rather than “Points for Local Matching Share Determination.”
- Language in the introductory paragraphs and in subsection (b) of proposed SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 was condensed and reorganized for clarity.
- Additionally, staff referenced adjustments for the Local Funding Adjustment Grant using the points determined in SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 within the existing New Construction and Modernization Matching Share SFP Regulations (Sections 1859.77.1 and 1859.79).

Form SAB 50-04

- Staff included language in the instructions for proposed Section 22, requiring the district to provide a letter from the county auditor-controller, that certifies the school district’s current year total assessed valuation. In accordance with the statute (EC Section 17070.59) for determining the points associated with the local matching shares, a school district must indicate its gross bonding capacity, which is based upon a calculation associated with the school district’s current year assessed valuation. EC Section 17070.54, specific to the new requirement related to the five-year school facilities master plan, requires the verification of the applicable school district’s current assessed value from the appropriate local government entity that collects and maintains this information.
- Staff amended the instructions
A correction was made to accurately reference the “California Basic Educational Data System” (CBEDS) in the proposed instructions for the new Section 22 (Local Funding Adjustment Grant).
- The proposed Section 22 instructions were amended for purposes of the following:
 - Total Assessed Valuation shall be reported pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5(a)(1).
 - Districtwide enrollment shall be reported pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5(a)(3).

Form SAB 57-75 and Instructions

- The Form title was updated for consistency with the proposed regulations.
The unit cost per unit amount from the Sierra West Current Construction Remodeling Costs publication was confirmed at F2. A separate page for the Instructions was created and expanded to ensure all portions of the Form have clear directions for required information. In particular, the Cost Benefit Allowance instructions portion of the Form was updated. The prior version of the Form presented to stakeholders had the Current Replacement Cost amounts entered as approved by the Board in January 2025 for demonstration purposes. Those were removed, as the user will enter the

amounts for the year during which they are completing the Form. Finally, instructions were added for the amounts to enter and how to calculate the 50-percent threshold to determine eligibility of the building.

75 Years or Older Building Supplemental Grant

SFP Regulations

- Within Section 1859.2, a new Definition for “Department” is proposed to align with the definition in Education Code Section 17070.15.
- Allowable costs to be included in the Cost Estimate for the required Cost Benefit Analysis were updated to exclude replacement of portable classrooms, furniture and equipment, and costs for routine maintenance and repair.
- The grant determination for the replacement of non-classroom square footage was clarified.

MEF Supplemental Grant

SFP Regulations

- Within SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.5, the word “eligible” and a sentence clarifying that the district must meet all requirements to qualify for Modernization funding, prior to receiving the additional grant, were added to the introduction paragraph.
- In SFP Regulation Sections 1859.77.5(a) and 1859.77.5(a)(3)(B), School District was capitalized.
- In subdivision (a)(1), (A) was removed as it was not necessary and Square Footage was capitalized.
- In SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2, subdivision (a)(4) was added to include the clause, “including the School District’s required matching share.”

TK Supplemental Grant

SFP Regulations

- Within SFP Regulation Section 1859.2, new definitions for “Retrofit” and “Transitional Kindergarten” were added.
- Language in SFP Regulation Section 1859.32(n) was abbreviated.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.6 was renumbered to Section 1859.78.9.2 and the section was reorganized for clarity.

Additional Non-Substantive Amendments to the Form SAB 50-04

Separately from the stakeholder items, staff proposes an amendment to the Form SAB 50-04, which removes the term “handicapped” and replaces it with the term “access” as it relates to access compliance, which is the current California Code of Regulations, Title 24 terminology. This change may be seen within the instructions of the form under General Information, numbers 7 and 8, as well as under the body of the Form within the proposed Section 23, Architect of Record or Licensed Architect Certification.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Adopt the proposed amendments to the SFP Regulations as shown on Attachment B.
2. Adopt the proposed amendments to the Form SAB 50-04 as shown on Attachment C.
3. Adopt the proposed *75 Years or Older Building Cost/Benefit Analysis* (Form SAB 57-75) as shown on Attachment D.
4. Authorize the Executive Officer to file the proposed regulatory amendments with the Office of Administrative Law on an emergency basis and make the regulations permanent.

This Item was approved by the State Allocation Board on June 25, 2025.

ATTACHMENT A

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17070.35 – General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare. Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

EC Section 17070.59 – General Provisions

For purposes of determining the points used to compute the required matching funds from local sources applied pursuant to Sections 17072.30 and 17074.16, the department shall compute the sum of the following point computations applicable to each school district:

(a) For each school district, the department shall divide the district's gross bonding capacity by the district's total enrollment, as determined for purposes of this chapter.

(1) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of zero dollars (\$0) to nine thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$9,999), inclusive, shall receive four points.

(2) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment

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of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to nineteen thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$19,999), inclusive, shall receive three points.

(3) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to fifty-four thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$54,999), inclusive, shall receive two points.

(4) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) or more shall receive one point.

(b) (1) For each school district, the department shall identify each district's unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the local control funding formula pursuant to Section 42238.02.

(2) (A) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 75 percent and 100 percent shall receive eight points.

(B) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 50 percent and 74.99 percent shall receive six points.

(C) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 25 percent and 49.99 percent shall receive four points.

(D) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage that is 24.99 percent or less shall receive two points.

(c) A school district that has a pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer shall receive two points.

(d) (1) A school district project that includes the use of a project labor agreement shall receive two points.

(2) For purposes of this subdivision, "project labor agreement" has the same meaning as defined in paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 2500 of the Public Contract Code.

(e) The department shall draft regulations for consideration by the board to further clarify the requirements of this section.

EC Section 17070.87 – General Provisions

New construction and modernization applications submitted before October 31, 2024, shall be processed and apportioned in accordance with this chapter, as it read on January 1, 2024.

EC Section 17072.30 – New Construction Funding Process

(a) Subject to the availability of funds, the board shall apportion funds to an eligible school district only upon the approval of the project by the Department of General Services pursuant to the Field Act, as defined in Section 17281, and certification by the school district that the required matching funds from local sources have been expended by the district for the project, or have been deposited in the county fund, or will be expended by the district by the time the project is completed, in an amount at least equal to the proposed apportionment pursuant to this chapter, before release of the state funds.

(b) The board shall adjust a school district's required local contribution pursuant to this section and the school district's associated state contribution required pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10), as follows:

(1) For a school district determined to have a score of more than 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 45 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 55 percent.

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(2) For a school district determined to have a score of 9 or 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 47 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 53 percent.

(3) For a school district determined to have a score of eight points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 48 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 52 percent.

(4) For a school district determined to have a score of six or seven points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 49 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 51 percent.

(5) For a school district determined to have a score of less than six points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 50 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 50 percent.

EC Section 17073.16 – Modernization Eligibility Determination

(a) A school district eligible for funding pursuant to this article may receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(1) Expanding an existing gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen, if the facility is 60 percent or less than the department's recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the school.

(2) Constructing a new gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen if the site is lacking one or more of the specified facilities.

(b) A site may receive a supplemental grant for only one project described in subdivision (a).

(c) (1) A school district eligible for a modernization apportionment may also receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(A) Retrofitting an existing school facility to adequately house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(B) Constructing new transitional kindergarten classrooms if the site is lacking sufficient school facilities to house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(2) A school district that receives a supplemental grant to house transitional kindergarten pupils pursuant to paragraph (1) shall meet the requirements of subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (5) of subdivision (b) of, paragraphs (2) and (3) of subdivision (f) of, and subdivision (g) of, Section 17375.

(d) The funding provided under this section shall be in addition to any other funding provided pursuant to this article.

(e) The board, in consultation with the Superintendent, shall develop regulations implementing this section.

EC Section 17074.16 – Modernization Apportionment

(a) The board shall release disbursements to school districts with approved applications for modernization, to the extent state funds are available for the state's share, and the school district has provided its required local match.

Subject to the availability of funds, the board shall apportion funds to an eligible school district only upon the approval of the project by the Department of General Services pursuant to the Field Act, as defined in Section 17281, including, but not

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limited to, a project that complies with the Field Act by complying with Section 17280.5, and evidence that the certification by the school district that the required matching funds from local sources have been expended by the district for the project, or have been deposited in the county fund or will be expended by the district by the time of completion of the project, and evidence that the district has entered into a binding contract for the completion of that project. If state funds are insufficient to fund all qualifying school districts, the board shall fund all qualifying school districts in the order in which the application for funding was approved by the board.

(b) The board shall adjust a school district's required local contribution pursuant to this section and the school district's associated state contribution required pursuant to this article as follows:

(1) For a school district determined to have a score of more than 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 35 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 65 percent.

(2) For a school district determined to have a score of 9 or 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 37 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 63 percent.

(3) For a school district determined to have a score of eight points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 38 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 62 percent.

(4) For a school district determined to have a score of six or seven points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 39 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 61 percent.

(5) For a school district determined to have a score of less than six points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 40 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 60 percent.

EC Section 17074.265 – Modernization Apportionment

(a) Notwithstanding Article 6 (commencing with Section 17073.10), a school district shall be eligible to receive a modernization apportionment to demolish and construct a building or buildings on an existing schoolsite if both of the following conditions are met:

(1) The building or buildings to be replaced are at least 75 years old.

(2) The school district provides a cost-benefit analysis that indicates the total cost to modernize the building or buildings is at least 50 percent of the current replacement cost, as defined by the board, of the building or buildings. The cost-benefit analysis may include applicable site development costs.

(b) A project that meets the requirements of subdivision (a) shall be eligible for a grant equal to the grant provided under Section 17072.10 multiplied by the capacity of the building or buildings calculated pursuant to Section 17071.25.

(c) The board may adopt regulations to implement this section.

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Revenue and Taxation Code Section 2052 – The Equalized County Assessment Roll

The local roll as delivered to the auditor pursuant to Section 617, including any changes made by the county board during the month of July, together with the board roll as transmitted to the auditor pursuant to Section 756 and the estimate with any changes transmitted pursuant to Section 755, shall become the last equalized roll on August 20, and such rolls together shall continue to be the last equalized roll, except as otherwise provided in this chapter, (a) for the purpose of computing any debt limit for the issuance of bonds of any public entity that is based on a percentage of assessed valuation as shown on the last equalized assessment roll and (b) for all other purposes, until the assessment roll for the following year becomes the last equalized roll in accordance with the provisions of this section.

“Retrofit” means a construction project to retrofit an existing school facility to adequately house Transitional Kindergarten or kindergarten pupils, which shall only include the costs of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other related fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, furniture and equipment, including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, playground safety improvements, the identification, assessment, or abatement of hazardous asbestos, seismic safety improvements, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

“Transitional Kindergarten” means the first year of a two-year kindergarten program that uses a modified kindergarten curriculum that is age and developmentally appropriate, pursuant to EC Section 48000.

(t) Reduced by the number of pupils housed in additional Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms constructed, pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16(c) in an SFP modernization project.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 Points for Determining the Local Funding Adjustment Grant.

This Section shall apply to Approved Applications received on or after October 31, 2024 for funding of a New Construction Adjusted Grant, Modernization Adjusted Grant, and funding pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2. For Approved Applications on the OPSC workload list or the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority list, OPSC will notify the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04. The School District must submit documentation to substantiate the information in (a) within 90 days of the OPSC notification. For Approved Applications submitted pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2, the School District must report the information in (a) on the Form SAB 50-04 and shall be based on the OPSC received date of the Approved Application.

(a) To determine the Local Funding Adjustment Grant, the School District must submit the following information:

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(1) The School District's total assessed valuation in the form of a letter or report from the appropriate county auditor-controller(s) that certifies to the School District's total assessed valuation. The total assessed valuation means the amount provided in the last equalized county assessment roll reported pursuant to Revenue and Taxation Code Section 2052. The reporting year of the total assessed valuation shall be based upon the OPSC received date as determined in the chart below.

(2) The School District's gross bonding capacity which shall be the product of (A) or (B) as applicable:

(A) Multiply the total assessed valuation in (a) by 1.25 percent for non-unified School Districts, or

(B) Multiply the total assessed valuation in (a) by 2.5 percent for unified School Districts.

(3) The School District's total enrollment meaning the districtwide enrollment reported on a Form SAB 50-01 in Part A, the continuation high pupils reported in Part C, and the Special Day Class pupils reported in Part D. The enrollment year data is determined as follows:

July 1 through October 31	Submit Prior Fiscal Year
November 1 through June 30	Submit Current Fiscal Year

(4) Unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the local control funding formula pursuant to EC Section 42238.02. The enrollment year data is determined as in (2) above.

(b) The points used to compute the Local Funding Adjustment Grant are the sum of (1), (2), (3) and (4) below:

(1) Points for the School District's gross bonding capacity divided by the School District's total enrollment shall be one of the following:

(A) Four points for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of zero dollars (\$0) to nine thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$9,999), inclusive.

(B) Three points for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to nineteen thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$19,999), inclusive.

(C) Two points for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to fifty-four thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$54,999), inclusive.

(D) One point for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) or more.

(2) Points for the School District's unduplicated pupil percentage shall be one of the following:

(A) Eight points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 75 percent and 100 percent, inclusive.

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(B) Six points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 50 percent and 74.99 percent, inclusive.

(C) Four points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 25 percent and 49.99 percent, inclusive.

(D) Two points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage that is 24.99 percent or less.

(3) Two points for a School District with a pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer.

(4) Two points for a project that includes the use of a project labor agreement in the application being processed. Projects that indicate use of a project labor agreement will be verified as part of the audit process required in EC Section 41024. If it is determined that a project labor agreement was not used, the funding associated with the points assigned in (d) to determine the matching share percentage will be required to be returned, with interest (based on the interest rate earned in the Pooled Money Investment Account at the time of fund release) from the time of fund release until funds are returned.

(c) If the School District does not submit any of the necessary information in subsection (a), the funding application receives the lowest points possible in the corresponding subsections (b)(1), (2), (3) and/or (4)

Section 1859.77.5. Modernization Additional Grant for Minimum Essential Facilities.

In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide grant amounts identified in Subsections (b) or (c) for an application for modernization if the eligible project includes a Minimum Essential Facility pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16. The School District must meet all requirements to qualify for Modernization funding, prior to the additional grant pursuant to this section.

(a) A School District may request a modernization supplemental grant to construct a new or expand an existing multipurpose, gymnasium, library, school kitchen, or a hybrid combination of any of these four facility types, including, but not limited to, multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid, multipurpose/school kitchen hybrid, or multipurpose/gymnasium/school kitchen, when all of the following are met:

(1) The site does not have an existing Minimum Essential Facility, or the existing Minimum Essential Facility is not adequate to serve the enrollment of the school. For the purposes of this Section, an existing Minimum Essential Facility is considered inadequate to serve the enrollment of the school if the existing Square Footage is 60 percent or less than the square footage necessary for the enrollment in the current CBEDS Report at the time of receipt of an Approved Application at the site, as calculated pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)(2.).

(2) The site has not previously received funding pursuant to this article to construct or expand a Minimum Essential Facility.

(3) An Approved Application for Modernization funding has been received by OPSC for a project wherein the DSA-approved plans contain the construction or expansion of a Minimum Essential Facility eligible for this grant.

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(A) An Approved Application received by the OPSC, on or after October 31, 2024, may be amended to request this supplemental grant provided the plans and specifications that contain the expansion or construction of a Minimum Essential Facility eligible for this supplemental grant were approved by the DSA prior to the receipt of the Approved Application.

(B) If the School District wishes to amend its Approved Application to include a request for this supplemental grant and the plans and specifications were approved by DSA after the receipt of the Approved Application, the School District must request in writing that the Approved Application be withdrawn and removed from OPSC's workload list. The resubmitted Approved Application will receive a new received date by OPSC.

(4) The construction contract(s) for the construction or expansion of the Minimum Essential Facility was executed on or after July 3, 2024.

(5) The Minimum Essential Facility must meet the requirements pursuant to the California Code of Regulations, Title 5.

(6) For purposes of this Section, a multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid is considered to be both a multipurpose room and a gymnasium. A school site with a middle school and/or high school pupils is eligible for one multipurpose room and one gymnasium; therefore, if a school site has an adequate multipurpose room and an adequate gymnasium, it is not eligible for a multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid under this Section.

(b) If all conditions in Subsection (a) are met, and the site is lacking one or more of the Minimum Essential Facilities, the application is eligible to receive a supplemental grant based on the Square Footage of the new Minimum Essential Facility justified by enrollment at the project site as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment at the site using the CBEDS Report at the time of receipt of an Approved Application.

(2) The eligible Square Footage for the Minimum Essential Facility shall be the lesser of the actual Square Footage constructed or the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)(2.).

(3) If a School District submits documentation that demonstrates additional toilet space must be constructed to obtain plan approval from DSA, the eligible toilet Square Footage may be increased by the amount of Square Footage required to obtain plan approval.

(4) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the permanent Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$312 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$559 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(5) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the portable Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$69 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$181 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(6) In addition to the funding provided in Subsections (4) and (5), the application is eligible to receive an amount equal to 35 percent of the sum of Subsections (4) and (5) for costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping and other costs

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incurred when adding a Minimum Essential Facility to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the Minimum Essential Facility.

(7) In lieu of 35 percent funding provided in (6) above, the School District has the option of requesting 60 percent of eligible costs pursuant to Section 1859.76 (a), (b), and (c) by submitting a detailed cost estimate for site development work for the eligible Square Footage in the qualifying Minimum Essential Facility and submitting any justification documents that will support the work with the Form SAB 50-04. The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development work that meets common engineering practices and industry standards that are consistent with the specific site conditions if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Current Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify to the district that the site development work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards. This amount will be prorated for any excess Square Footage constructed beyond the eligible Square Footage determined in (b)(2) and (b)(3).

(c) If all conditions in Subsection (a) are met, and the site's existing Minimum Essential Facility is not adequate to serve the enrollment of the school, the application is eligible to receive a supplemental grant based on the square footage of the expanded Minimum Essential Facility justified by enrollment at the project site as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment at the site using the CBEDS Report at the time of receipt of an Approved Application.

(2) The eligible Square Footage for the Minimum Essential Facility shall be the lesser of the delta between the Square Footage of the existing Minimum Essential Facility and actual Square Footage constructed or the delta between the Square Footage of the existing Minimum Essential Facility and the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)(2).

(3) If a School District submits documentation that demonstrates that additional toilet space must be constructed to obtain plan approval from DSA, the eligible toilet Square Footage may be increased by the amount of Square Footage required to obtain plan approval.

(4) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the permanent Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$312 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$559 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(5) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the portable Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$69 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$181 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(6) In addition to the funding provided in Subsections (4) and (5), an amount equal to 35 percent of the sum of Subsections (4) and (5) for costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping and other costs incurred when adding a Minimum Essential Facility to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the Minimum Essential Facility.

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(7) In lieu of 35 percent funding provided in (6) above, the School District has the option of requesting 60 percent of eligible site development costs pursuant to Section 1859.76 (a), (b) and (c) by submitting a detailed cost estimate for site development work for the eligible Square Footage in the qualifying Minimum Essential Facility and submitting any justification documents that will support the work with the Form SAB 50-04. The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development work that meets common engineering practices and industry standards that are consistent with the specific site conditions if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Current Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify to the School District that the site development work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards. This amount will be prorated for any excess Square Footage constructed beyond the eligible Square Footage determined in (c)(2) and (c)(3).

SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.1. New Construction District Matching Share Requirement.

For applications received before October 31, 2024, Any funding provided by these Regulations shall require a School dDistrict matching share contribution on a dollar-for-dollar basis with the exception of financial hardship provided by Section 1859.81 or any additional grant provided for a district-owned site acquisition cost pursuant to Sections 1859.74.5 or 1859.81.2.

For applications received on or after October 31, 2024, any funding provided by these Regulations shall require a School District matching share contribution pursuant to Education Code Sections 17070.59 and 17072.30 and adjusted for the Local Funding Adjustment Grant using the points determined in Section 1859.70.5, with the exception of Financial Hardship provided by Section 1859.81 or any additional grant provided for a district-owned site acquisition cost pursuant to Sections 1859.74.5 or 1859.81.2.

The School dDistrict may include as its School dDistrict matching share any amounts expended on the project for an energy audit made pursuant to Education Code Section 17077.10 and any amounts applied to the project for incentive grants or rebates received by the School dDistrict from a program funded pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 381.

Section 1859.78.7.1 Modernization Additional Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings

In lieu of the funding provided by subdivision (a) of Education Code Section 17074.10 and Section 1859.78.3, the Board shall provide funding to Approved Applications received on or after October 31, 2024 for projects that include the demolition and

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replacement of 75 years or older permanent or portable school building(s) if a contract for the work was awarded on or after July 3, 2024.

A School District may replace the 75 Years or Older Building in the same location or an alternate location on the same site. Site development funding for the minimum work required to replace the qualifying building may be provided pursuant to subdivision (e).

(a) To receive 75 Years or Older funding pursuant to Education Code Section 17074.265, all of the following must be met:

(1) The existing permanent or portable building must be at least 75 years or older. For purposes of determining the age of the building, the 75 years or older period shall begin 12 months after the original plans for the construction of the building were approved by the Department or DSA as applicable.

(2) Each building on the site that is 75 years or older must qualify on an individual basis.

(3) If the school building was demolished prior to OPSC's receipt of an Approved Application, the school building must have been 75 years old prior to the demolition.

(4) The existing permanent or portable building must be replaced on the same site.

(5) The School District must complete and submit to OPSC a 75 Years or Older Building Cost/Benefit Analysis (Form SAB 57-75) that demonstrates the total cost to modernize a 75 years or older school building and comply with current Title 24 Building Code is at least 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost for the applicable building type; permanent or portable. The cost/benefit analysis for each building proposed for replacement under this section must meet the following criteria:

(A) The Form SAB 57-75 must demonstrate the minimum work required to modernize and continue to occupy the 75 years or older school building is at least 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost of the existing Square Footage of the school building.

(B) The work in the Form SAB 57-75 may only include work directly related to the modernization of the qualifying 75-year old school building, which may include improvements to extend the useful life of, or to enhance the physical environment of the qualifying 75-year old building. The Form SAB 57-75 may only include:

1. The cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, costs to limit pupil exposure to harmful air pollutants by updating air filtration systems, telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, and the upgrading of electrical systems or wiring or cabling of Classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

2. The cost of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high-performance schools.

(C) The Form SAB 57-75 may not include costs associated with the acquisition of real property.

(D) The Form SAB 57-75 must be completed using the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication by Sierra West Publishing. For all materials or items listed, the amounts entered on the Form SAB 57-75 must use the unit costs. For individual materials or items that are not contained in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair

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publication, the School District must provide supporting documentation to demonstrate that the costs for the unique work are reasonable and appropriate.

(E) All requested line items shall include Construction Specifications Institute reference number (CSI #), description, F2 total unit cost amount, and quantity. Any line items that include amounts in lump-sum formats will not be reviewed or approved. For individual materials or items that are not contained in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair publication, the School District must provide supporting documentation to demonstrate that the costs for the unique work are reasonable and appropriate.

(b) For each qualifying Classroom replaced, funding shall be provided on a per pupil grant basis for the number of pupils to be housed as follows: 25 for each K-6 Classroom, 27 for each 7-12 Classroom, 13 for each Special Day Class Non-Severe Classroom, and 9 for each Special Day Class Severe Classroom. Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the Board shall provide the following grant amounts:

(1) \$19,016 for each elementary pupil.

(2) \$20,113 for each middle school pupil.

(3) \$25,592 for each high school pupil.

(4) \$53,437 for each Special Day Class Severe pupil.

(5) \$35,738 for each Special Day Class Non-Severe pupil.

The amounts in (1), (2), (3), (4) and (5) above shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17072.10.

(c) For qualifying non-classroom space, funding provided shall be based on the eligible Square Footage. The eligible Square Footage shall be the lesser of the following:

(1) Non-classroom Square Footage that was on the site at the time modernization eligibility was established pursuant to Section 1859.60

(2) Non-classroom Square Footage constructed to replace the qualifying Square Footage, justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2. Excess Square Footage required as part of California Code of Regulations, Title 5 requirements needed to obtain plan approvals are permissible per Regulation Section 1859.79.2 and considered an eligible expenditure, not to exceed Square Footage allowances provided in the chart in Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)(2.). Any excess Square Footage not due to California Code of Regulations, Title 5 requirements will not be eligible and must be locally funded by the School District.

(d) The funding for the replacement Square Footage is calculated as follows:

(1) Multiply the Square Footage determined in (c) by \$312. This amount shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17072.10.

(2) Divide the product by the per pupil allowance in (b) to determine the total allowable pupil grants for the Square Footage being constructed. For school sites serving multiple grade levels, select the amount for the highest grade level served by the building.

(e) An additional grant for site development may be provided for the minimum work required to replace the qualifying building. Any site development provided will be reduced, on a prorated basis, by the percentage of excess building Square Footage constructed. The Board shall provide 60 percent of the following approved site development and applicable design costs:

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(1) Service site development cost, within school property lines, attributable only to the replacement of the qualifying building(s) for:

(A) Site clearance including the removal of trees, brush, and debris within footprint of the replacement building(s).

(B) Demolition and removal of the qualifying building(s) and existing buildings and site improvements which lie in the footprint of a proposed replacement building(s).

(C) Removal and rerouting of existing utility service which lie in the footprint of a proposed replacement building(s).

(D) Rough grading including cut and fill and leveling and terracing operations required in the design.

(E) Soil compaction adhering to common engineering practices and engineered fill that is required by a soils report that is available for review by OPSC.

(F) On-site drainage facilities including inlets below grade drainage facilities and retention basins.

(G) Erosion control improvements such as plant material, temporary sprinkler systems, jute mesh and straw, due to embankments having a slope of at least two to one and a vertical height greater than six feet.

(H) Outside stairways, handicap ramps and retaining walls due to embankments having a slope of at least two to one and a vertical height greater than six feet.

(I) Fire code requirements on site that are not a part of the replacement building.

(2) Utility service costs that are necessary to serve the replacement building:

(A) Water: Replacement or repair of main water service line(s) between the utility company connection and to five feet of the qualifying building(s) on the site, connection fees if applicable, meter (if not provided by the serving utility), and replacement or repair of a domestic water appurtenances (i.e., well, pump, tank) as needed for the proper operation of the system.

(B) Sewage: Replacement or repair of main sewer line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the qualifying building(s) on the site and connection fees, if applicable. Replacement or repair of sewage appurtenances (i.e., treatment/disposal system) as needed for the proper operation of the system and a main disposal line from the treatment system to five feet of the qualifying building(s) on the site.

(C) Gas: Replacement or repair of main gas service line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the qualifying building(s) on the site, connection fee (if applicable), meter (if not provided by serving utility) or replacement or repair of gas service appurtenances (i.e., liquefied petroleum system and tank) as needed for proper operation of the system and a new main supply line from the tank to five feet of the qualifying building(s) on the site.

(D) Electric: Replacement or repair of electrical service between the utility company connection and the qualifying building's main switchboard. Primary electric service runs between the utility company's point of connection and the transformer. Secondary electric service runs between the transformer and the main switchboard. Connection fee, transformer pads and protective devices (i.e., bollards) as required by the utility company.

(E) Communication systems: Replacement or repair of service between the utility company connection and the nearest distribution center.

(3) The School District must submit a detailed cost estimate for eligible site development work in (A) and (B) and any justification documents that will support the work with the Form SAB 50-04 using the most current edition of the Current Construction Cost publication by Sierra West Publishing. The Board will approve

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reasonable and appropriate site development work which meets common engineering practices and industry standards that are consistent with the specific site conditions if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Current Construction Cost publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify to the School District that the site development work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards.

(f) Portable buildings replaced pursuant to this section shall be replaced with permanent Square Footage.

(g) The qualifying 75 Years or Older Building(s) must be demolished before the Notice of Completion of the project.

Section 1859.78.9.1. Modernization Additional Grant for Minimum Essential Facilities.

In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide grant amounts identified in Subsections (b) or (c) for an application for modernization if the eligible project includes a Minimum Essential Facility pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16. The School District must meet all requirements to qualify for Modernization funding, prior to the additional grant pursuant to this section.

(a) A School District may request a modernization supplemental grant to construct a new or expand an existing multipurpose, gymnasium, library, school kitchen, or a hybrid combination of any of these four facility types, including, but not limited to, multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid, multipurpose/school kitchen hybrid, or multipurpose/gymnasium/school kitchen, when all of the following are met:

(1) The site does not have an existing Minimum Essential Facility, or the existing Minimum Essential Facility is not adequate to serve the enrollment of the school. For the purposes of this Section, to determine if an existing Minimum Essential Facility is inadequate, the existing Square Footage is 60 percent or less than the square footage necessary for the enrollment in the current CBEDS Report at the time of receipt of an Approved Application at the site as calculated pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2.

(2) The site has not previously received funding pursuant to this article to construct or expand a Minimum Essential Facility.

(3) An Approved Application for Modernization funding has been received by OPSC for a project wherein the DSA-approved plans contain the construction or expansion of a Minimum Essential Facility eligible for this grant.

(A) An Approved Application received by the OPSC, on or after October 31, 2024, may be amended to request this supplemental grant provided the plans and specifications that contain the expansion or construction of a Minimum Essential Facility eligible for this supplemental grant were approved by the DSA prior to the receipt of the Approved Application.

(B) If the School District wishes to amend its Approved Application to include a request for this supplemental grant and the plans and specifications were approved by DSA

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after the receipt of the Approved Application, the School District must request in writing that the Approved Application be withdrawn and removed from OPSC's workload list.

The resubmitted Approved Application will receive a new received date by OPSC.

(4) The construction contract(s) for the construction or expansion of the Minimum Essential Facility was executed on or after July 3, 2024.

(5) The Minimum Essential Facility must meet the requirements pursuant to the California Code of Regulations, Title 5.

(6) For purposes of this Section, a multipurpose/gymnasium Hybrid is considered to be both a multipurpose and a gymnasium. A school site with a middle school and/or high school pupils is eligible for one multipurpose and one gymnasium; therefore, if a school site has an adequate multipurpose and an adequate gymnasium, it is not eligible for a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid under this Section.

(b) If all conditions in Subsection (a) are met, and the site is lacking one or more of the Minimum Essential Facilities, the application is eligible to receive a supplemental grant based on the Square Footage of the new Minimum Essential Facility constructed justified by enrollment at the project site as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment at the site using the CBEDS Report at the time of receipt of an Approved Application.

(2) The eligible Square Footage for the Minimum Essential Facility shall be the lesser of the actual Square Footage constructed or the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2.

(3) If a School District submits documentation that demonstrates additional toilet space must be constructed to obtain plan approval from DSA, the eligible toilet Square Footage may be increased by the amount of Square Footage required to obtain plan approval.

(4) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the permanent Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$312 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$559 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(5) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the portable Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$69 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$181 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(6) In addition to the funding provided in Subsections (4) and (5), an amount equal to 35 percent of the sum of Subsections (4) and (5) for costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping and other costs incurred when adding a Minimum Essential Facility to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the Minimum Essential Facility.

(7) In lieu of 35 percent funding provided in (6) above, the School District has the option of requesting 60 percent of eligible costs pursuant to Section 1859.76 (a), (b), and (c) by submitting a detailed cost estimate for requests related to site development work for the eligible Square Footage in the qualifying Minimum Essential Facility and any justification documents that will support the work must be submitted with the Form SAB 50-04. The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development work

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that meets common engineering practices and industry standards that are consistent with the specific site conditions if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Current Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify to the district that the site development work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards. This amount will be prorated for any excess Square Footage constructed beyond the eligible Square Footage determined in (b)(2) and (b)(3).

(c) If all conditions in Subsection (a) are met, and the site's existing Minimum Essential Facility is not adequate to serve the enrollment of the school, the application is eligible to receive a supplemental grant based on the square footage of the expanded Minimum Essential Facility constructed justified by enrollment at the project site as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment at the site using the CBEDS Report at the time of receipt of an Approved Application.

(2) The eligible Square Footage for the Minimum Essential Facility shall be the lesser of the delta between the Square Footage of the existing Minimum Essential Facility and actual Square Footage constructed or the delta between the Square Footage of the existing Minimum Essential Facility and the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)(2).

(3) If a School District submits documentation that demonstrates that additional toilet space must be constructed to obtain plan approval from DSA, the eligible toilet Square Footage may be increased by the amount of Square Footage required to obtain plan approval.

(4) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the permanent Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$312 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$559 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(5) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the portable Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$69 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$181 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(6) In addition to the funding provided in Subsections (4) and (5), an amount equal to 35 percent of the sum of Subsections (4) and (5) for costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping and other costs incurred when adding a Minimum Essential Facility to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the Minimum Essential Facility.

(7) In lieu of 35 percent funding provided in (6) above, the School District has the option of requesting 60 percent of eligible site development costs pursuant to Section 1859.76 (a), (b) and (c) by submitting a detailed cost estimate for requests related to site development work for the eligible Square Footage in the qualifying Minimum Essential Facility and any justification documents that will support the work must be submitted with the Form SAB 50-04. The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development work that meets common engineering practices and

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industry standards that are consistent with the specific site conditions if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Current Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify to the School District that the site development work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards. This amount will be prorated for any excess Square Footage constructed beyond the eligible Square Footage determined in (c)(2) and (c)(3).

Section 1859.78.9.2 Modernization Additional Grant for Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms

(a) In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide the funding determined in (c) for each eligible Transitional Kindergarten Classroom, up to a maximum of four Classrooms, in an Approved Application for Modernization funding if the School District demonstrates a need to adequately house Transitional Kindergarten pupils as described in Education Code Section 17073.16, and the following conditions are met:

(1) The Approved Application was received on or after October 31, 2024.

(2) Construction contracts for the construction or Retrofit of Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms were signed on or after July 3, 2024.

(3) Final DSA and CDE plan approvals for the eligible Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms were obtained prior to the receipt date of the Approved Application.

(4) The funding must construct or Retrofit facilities that result in Classroom(s) that meets the design requirements required for new kindergarten Classrooms as specified in paragraph (2) of subdivision (h) of Section 14030 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations.

(5) For new construction projects, Classrooms must be not less than 1,350 square feet, including restrooms, storage, teacher preparation, wet and dry areas.

(6) For Retrofit projects, Classrooms shall not be less than 1,350 square feet, including restrooms, storage, teacher preparation, wet and dry areas unless both of the following conditions are met:

(A) The project qualifies for an exemption through CDE pursuant to Title 5, Section 14030(r) of the California Code of Regulations to Retrofit a Classroom that will be less than 1,350 square feet.

(B) The Classroom shall not be less than 1,250 square feet.

(7) The School District shall not use funds to purchase, or install, a Portable Classroom(s).

(8) The School District lacks the facilities to provide Transitional Kindergarten instruction at the project school site. A project school site is considered lacking Transitional Kindergarten facilities if the calculated enrollment exceeds the current kindergarten Classroom capacity at the site. Classrooms constructed as kindergarten or Transitional Kindergarten classrooms or altered to house kindergarten or Transitional Kindergarten students, regardless of current use, will be included when determining the existing kindergarten and Transitional Kindergarten classroom capacity, as determined by CDE. For purposes of determining Classroom capacity, a loading standard of 25 kindergarten

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pupils per Classroom will be used and all Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms will be loaded for full-day instruction unless the School District indicates that an existing Classroom(s) will continue to be used for non-full-day instruction at the completion of the project. The maximum calculated Transitional Kindergarten Classroom need shall be determined by one of the following:

(A) Calculate the mean of first grade, second grade, and third grade enrollment at the time of receipt of an Approved Application. The mean shall be rounded up to the nearest whole number.

(B) Calculate the mean of the Transitional Kindergarten enrollment at the time of receipt of an Approved Application, plus two prior enrollment years. The mean shall be rounded up to the nearest whole number.

(b) Applicants requesting the additional grant for Transitional Kindergarten shall include the following documentation:

(1) A description of the proposed project, including, but not limited to, the following information:

(A) The total number of Transitional Kindergarten and kindergarten Classrooms on the site prior to the construction of the proposed Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms in the project.

(B) The current CBEDS Report, at the time of receipt of an Approved Application, including Transitional Kindergarten students pursuant to EC Section 48000. To determine the appropriate enrollment reporting year, refer to the following:

(C) The enrollment at the site for the three years immediately preceding the enrollment reporting year determined in (7)(B) above.

(D) The total number of Transitional Kindergarten and kindergarten Classrooms on the site after the completion of the project.

(E) Site map that includes labelling of all facilities and their current use, identifies all Classrooms constructed or previously retrofitted to house preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and kindergarten students, and identifies any facilities that will be retrofitted in the project.

(c) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the additional grant for the construction of a new Transitional Kindergarten Classroom(s) shall be equal to the sum of (1) through (6):

(1) \$19,016 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 for each Transitional Kindergarten Classroom in the DSA-approved plans.

(2) \$23 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 if the Classroom(s) in the DSA-approved plans if the project includes an automatic fire detection and alarm system.

(3) \$318 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 if the DSA-approved plans if the project includes an automatic sprinkler system.

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(4) An amount equal to 35 percent of the amount determined in (1) for costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary to add a Transitional Kindergarten Classroom(s) to the site.

(5) In lieu of 35 percent funding provided in (4) above, the School District has the option of requesting 60 percent of eligible site development costs pursuant to Section 1859.76 (a), (b) and (c) by submitting a detailed cost estimate for requests related to site development work for the qualifying Classrooms, and any justification documents that will support the work with the Form SAB 50-04. The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development work that meets common engineering practices and industry standards that are consistent with the specific site conditions, if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Current Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify to the School District that the site development work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards.

(6) An amount equal to 12 percent of the amount determined in (a) for each pupil housed in a multilevel building that will house pupils in all levels of the building if the usable site acreage is less than 75 percent of the site size recommended by CDE, pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title 5, Section 14010(a), for the master-planned project capacity.

(7) The grant amounts in (1), (2), and (3) above shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17072.10(b).

(d) Beginning [insert the OAL effective date of this Section], the additional grant for the Retrofit of an existing school facility to be a Transitional Kindergarten Classroom(s) shall be equal to the sum of (1) through (5) below:

(1) \$6,034 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 for each Transitional Kindergarten Classroom in the DSA-approved plans.

(2) \$196 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 for each Classroom(s) in the DSA-approved plans if the project includes an automatic fire detection and alarm system.

(3) An amount equal to 35 percent of the amount determined in (a) for costs associated with demolition, landscaping, playground safety improvements and other costs incurred when adding a preschool, transitional kindergarten or kindergarten Classroom(s) to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the project.

(4) An amount equal to 15 percent of the amount determined in (a) for upgrading existing site development (utilities) work as necessary if the project includes the Retrofit of a 50-year-old or older permanent building.

(5) In lieu of funding provided in (3) and (4) above, the School District has the option of requesting 60 percent of eligible site development costs pursuant to Section 1859.76 (a), (b) and (c) by submitting a detailed cost estimate for requests related to site development work for the qualifying Classrooms, and any justification documents that will support the work with the Form SAB 50-04. The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development work that meets common engineering practices and industry standards that are consistent with the specific site conditions, if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Current Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify to the School District that the site development work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards.

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(6) The grant amounts in (1) and (2) above shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17074.10(b).

Section 1859.79. Modernization District Matching Share Requirement.

Except in the case of financial hardship as provided in Section 1859.81 a School dDistrict matching share for a modernization project shall be required as follows:

(a) If the Approved Application is received on or before April 29, 2002, any Modernization Grant plus any other funding provided by these Regulations shall require a School dDistrict matching share equal to at least 20 percent of those amounts which, combined with the State's Modernization Adjusted Grant, shall represent 100 percent of the total project cost.

(b) If the Approved Application is received after April 29, 2002 and before October 31, 2024, any Modernization Grant, plus any other funding authorized by these Regulations shall require a School dDistrict matching share equal to at least 40 percent of those amounts which, combined with the State's Modernization Adjusted Grant, shall represent 100 percent of the total project cost.

(c) If the Approved Application is received on or after October 31, 2024, any Modernization Grant, plus any other funding authorized by these Regulations shall require a School District matching share contribution pursuant to Education Code Sections 17070.59 and 17074.16 and adjusted for the Local Funding Adjustment Grant using the points determined in Section 1859.70.5.

The School dDistrict may include as its School dDistrict matching share any amounts expended on the project for an energy audit made pursuant to Education Code Section 17077.10 and any amounts applied to the project for incentive grants or rebates received by the School dDistrict from a program funded pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 381.

Section 1859.79.2. Use of Modernization Grant Funds.

The Modernization Grant plus any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Sections 17073.16, 17074.25, 17074.10(f) and 17070.15(i) and may also be utilized for other purposes as set forth in Education Code Section 100420(c), and Labor Code Section 1771.3(a) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014. Modernization funding may also be used for the costs incurred by the district directly or through a contract with a third party provider for the initiation and enforcement of a LCP. Modernization funding, with the exception of savings, is limited to expenditure on the specific site where the modernization grant eligibility was generated. The grant may not be used for the following:

(a) New building area with the exception of the following:

(1) Replacement building area of like kind. Additional Classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the School District.

(2) Building area required by the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or by the Division of the State Architect's (DSA) handicapped access requirements.

(3) Additional Square Footage constructed with funding provided by Sections 1859.78.7.1, 1859.78.9.1 or 1859.78.9.2.

(4) Additional Square Footage constructed to meet the minimum requirements of California Code of Regulations, Title 5.

(b) New site development items with the exception of:

(1) Replacement, repair or additions to existing site development.

(2) Site development items required by the federal ADA Act or by the DSA's handicapped access requirements.

(3) Site development work for facilities in (a)(3) or (a)(4) above.

(c) The evaluation and removal of hazardous or solid waste and/or hazardous substances when the Department of Toxic Substance Control has determined that the site contains dangerous levels of a hazardous substance, hazardous waste, or both that exceed ten percent of the combined adjusted grant and the district matching share for the project.

(d) Leased facilities not owned by another School District or a county superintendent. Modernization Grant funds may be used on any school facilities on the site, with the exception of portable classroom facilities eligible for an additional apportionment pursuant to Education Code Sections 17073.15 and 17074.10(f) and as defined in Section 1859.78.8. If the classroom facilities on the site include areas that are currently ineligible for modernization, it will not disqualify those facilities from future modernization funding.

IMPLEMENTATION OF PROPOSITION 2 FOR THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM

PURPOSE

The purpose of this meeting is to engage with stakeholders regarding the implementation of the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), and to discuss and collect feedback on proposed amendments to the School Facility Program (SFP) Regulations for the following topics:

- Topic 1 – Financial Hardship (Attachment A1)
- Topic 2 – Modernization Eligibility for Schools Located on Military Installations and New Construction Eligibility for Small School Districts (Attachment A2)
- Topic 3 – Eligible Expenditures (Attachment A3)
- Topic 4 – School Facility Program (SFP) Matching Share (Attachment A4)
- Topic 5 – 75-Year Old Building Supplemental Grant (Attachment A5)

BACKGROUND

Proposition 2, or Assembly Bill (AB) 247 (Muratsuchi, Chapter 81, Statutes of 2024), the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024, was approved by a majority of California's voters on November 5, 2024.

The passage of Proposition 2 necessitates modifications to the SFP Regulations to allow school districts to continue submitting eligibility and funding applications to OPSC that are adherent to the amended or additional components of Education Code. Related to these statutory changes, OPSC must implement the provisions of AB 247 by amending existing SFP Regulations to adhere to the new statutory requirements.

As a result of this, OPSC is requesting stakeholder feedback regarding these changes. Each of the topics listed within the Purpose section of this report is broken out into its own attachments for stakeholder reference.

PROPOSED REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM MATCHING SHARES

PURPOSE

To discuss and receive stakeholder input regarding proposed regulatory amendments resulting from the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), which was approved by a majority of California's voters on November 5, 2024, related to School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Sections 1859.77.1 and 1859.79. Additionally, the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) proposes the addition of SFP Regulation Section 1859.92.1. These amendments would implement Proposition 2's points-based determination and sliding scale for the required local match for SFP projects.

AUTHORITY

BACKGROUND

Fixed State Share Percentage

Historically, SFP New Construction and Modernization projects have been eligible for a fixed state share percentage of the total approved project cost, except for school districts that qualify for financial hardship funding. School districts applying for New Construction funding must provide an equal matching share (50/50). School districts applying for Modernization funding, the state provides 60 percent of the total approved project cost, and the school district provides 40 percent of the total approved project cost.

Proposition 2 – Points-Based Determination and Sliding Scale for Required Matching Share

Proposition 2 establishes a points-based determination and sliding scale for the required state and local matching shares for SFP projects that do not qualify for financial hardship assistance¹. Proposition 2 specifies the number of points awarded based on the school district's gross bonding capacity per enrollment, the school district's unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the Local Control Funding Formula, whether the school district has an enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer, and whether the project includes the use of a project labor agreement. Based on the total number of points for a project, the required local matching share will be adjusted as follows, with no change to the total approved project cost. The range of total possible points is between 3 points and 16 points,

¹ School districts eligible for financial hardship assistance may qualify for additional state funding beyond the Proposition 2 points-based determination and sliding scale amounts and may receive up to 100 percent state funding.

inclusive. These changes are applicable to all SFP applications received on or after October 31, 2024. Proposition 2 specifies that SFP applications received before October 31, 2024 will be processed to the Board in accordance with SFP statutes as they read on January 1, 2024. The relevant statutory changes are as follows:

- Education Code (EC) Section 17070.59 has been added to establish a points-based determination and sliding scale for the required state and local match for SFP projects that do not qualify for financial hardship projects.
- EC Section 17070.87 has been added to require new construction and modernization applications submitted before October 31, 2024, to be processed and apportioned in accordance with the SFP statutes, as they read on January 1, 2024.
- EC Section 17072.30 has been amended to outline the sliding scale and point allocation as it relates to New Construction projects and delete a reference to the fixed 50 percent state share.
- EC 17074.16 has been amended to outline the sliding scale and point allocation as it relates to Modernization projects and delete references to the fixed 60 percent state share and 40 percent local match.

Points-Based Determination and Sliding Scale

EC 17070.59 creates a points-based determination based on four criteria and a sliding scale related to the state share and local share of projects, assigned as the following:

\$0 - \$9,999	4 points
\$10,000 - \$19,999	3 points
\$20,000 - \$54,999	2 points
\$55,000+	1 point

* School district projects with a total of fewer than 6 points receive the same state and local matching share percentages as SFP projects prior to Proposition 2.

As a result of these changes, OPSC staff is presenting proposed amendments to SFP Regulation Sections, as seen on Attachment A4b.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

Proposition 2 necessitates modifications to the SFP Regulations to allow school districts to continue submitting eligibility and funding applications to OPSC that conform to the amended EC. OPSC is asking for stakeholder feedback on proposed amendments pursuant to EC Section 17070.59(e), as reflected in Attachment A4b.

EC Section 17070.59(a) - Gross Bonding Capacity

Gross bonding capacity refers to a school district's capacity to issue debt. The new EC Section 17070.59 specifies how to determine the points used to compute the required local matching funds from local sources (pursuant to EC Sections 17072.30 and 17074.16, for New Construction and Modernization purposes respectively).

Specific to the District's gross bonding capacity and pursuant to EC Section 17070.59(a), for each school district, the department shall divide the district's gross bonding capacity by the district's total enrollment, as determined for purposes of this chapter.

$$\begin{array}{c} \text{District's Gross Bonding Capacity} \\ \textbf{Divided By} \\ \text{District's Total Enrollment} \\ \textbf{Equals} \\ \text{Gross Bonding Capacity per District's Total Enrollment} \end{array}$$

ATTACHMENT E

Enrollment in this case shall be determined by a review of the district's annual enrollment data within the California Department of Education (CDE)'s DataQuest, which provides data and statistics about California's TK/K-12 public educational system. This data is provided through the California Basic Educational Data System (CBEDS), which is an annual data collection administered in October by CDE.

The enrollment year used shall be reflected as November 1 through October 31. For instance, November 1, 2024, through October 31, 2025, would be reflective of the 2024-2025 enrollment year. Regarding the specific enrollment year used, OPSC proposes to use the same enrollment year in which the application is being processed to align with current practices.

Example of Gross Bonding Capacity per Total Enrollment Calculation

If a district has a gross bonding capacity of \$163,000,000, and a total enrollment of 2,282 pupils, their gross bonding capacity per the district's total enrollment will be calculated as the following:

$$\begin{array}{r} \underline{\$263,000,000} \\ \text{Divided By} \\ \underline{2,282 \text{ (pupils)}} \\ \text{Equals} \\ \underline{\$115,249.78 \text{ (rounded to the nearest dollar as \$115,250)}} \end{array}$$

In accordance with the new points-based system and this example, this district has a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of \$115,250. Therefore, this amount exceeds \$55,000, and as a result, the district receives 1 point in the calculation to determine its matching share.

EC Section 17070.59(b) - Unduplicated Pupil Percentage

EC Section 17070.59(b)(1) specifies that for each school district, the department shall identify each district's unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the local control funding formula (pursuant to Section 42238.02). EC Sections 17070.59(b)(2)(A), (b)(2)(B), (b)(2)(C), and (b)(2)(D) delineate the points received based upon determination of unduplicated pupil percentages between specified percentages.

The Unduplicated Pupil Percentage (UPP) is a percentage based off of three years of data (the current, prior, and second year) of targeted disadvantaged students. According to CDE's website, "the UPP is not an average of each year's percentage; rather, the sum of the unduplicated pupil count (UPC) for the three years is divided by the sum of enrollment for the three years to produce the current year's UPP. In subsequent years, the newest year will be added, and the oldest will be dropped off."

This data may be found through Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) Summary Data spreadsheets, available by fiscal year, which are available here: [Statewide LCFF Summary Data - Principal Apportionment \(CA Dept of Education\)](#).

Examples of Unduplicated Pupil Percentage Determination

Scenario #1: A district has a UPP of 0.0907, which translates to 9.07 percent. Based upon EC Section 17070.59(b)(2)(D), the district would receive two points.

Scenario #2: A district has a UPP of 0.3727, which translates to 37.27 percent. Based upon EC Section 17070.59(b)(C), the district would receive four points.

EC Section 17070.59(c) - Pupil Enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer

EC Section 17070.59(c) indicates that if a school district has a pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer, it will receive two points.

The district's pupil enrollment is based on the latest California Basic Education Data Systems (CBEDS) that is available approximately the 15th of October each year, Applications filed on or after the 1st of November must include the current school year enrollment. This enrollment will be pursuant to the Form SAB 50-01 instructions for reporting enrollment data.

County superintendents report the enrollment for community school students as reported in April prior to the latest CBEDS report.

The enrollment data must include all of the following, if applicable:

- Off-track and on-track students attending multi-track year round schools
- Students living outside the district's boundaries but attending schools in the district
- Students receiving Classroom-Based Instruction in Charter Schools located within the district boundaries and are enrolled in the same grade levels of type served by the district regardless if the district chartered the school
- Students attending magnet schools
- Community school students

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- Students attending independent study

Do not include any of the following:

- Students living in the district's boundaries but attending other districts
- Students attending regional occupational programs
- Students attending preschool programs
- Other students not generally considered K-12 students including adult education students
- Students receiving Classroom-Based Instruction in Charter Schools located within the district boundaries but are enrolled in grade levels or type not served by the district
- Students living inside district boundaries but are receiving Classroom-Based Instruction in Charter Schools located outside the district boundaries
- Students receiving Nonclassroom-Based Instruction
- Juvenile court/court school students
- Special Day Class pupils or
- Continuation high school pupils

EC Section 17070.59(d) - Project Labor Agreement

EC Section 17070.59(d)(1) specifies that a school district project that includes the use of a project labor agreement shall receive two points. EC Section 17070.59(d)(2) specifies that for purposes of this subdivision, the definition of "project labor agreement" is pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 2500 of the Public Contract Code (PCC). This definition therefore means "...a prehire collective bargaining agreement that establishes terms and conditions of employment for a specific construction project or projects and is in an agreement described in Section 158(f) of Title 29 of the United States Code."

As such, this added section to EC issues points attributed to districts that do or do not include the use of a project labor agreement, pursuant to PCC Section 2500(b)(1). If the district includes the use of a project labor agreement, it receives two points. If they do not, no points are issued.

Matching Share Scale Examples

Example #1

A district submits a SFP Modernization funding application on December 12, 2024 that has:

- A gross bonding capacity per total enrollment of \$50,000 (2 points)
- An unduplicated pupil percentage of 55% (6 points)
- Its School District Enrollment is greater than 200 pupils (0 points)
- Its project doesn't include the use of a Project Labor Agreement (0 points)

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In total, the district would have 8 points. As a result, the State Share of its Modernization project would be 62%, and the Local Share of the project would be 37%.

Example #2

A district submits a SFP New Construction application to OPSC on December 12, 2024 that has:

- A gross bonding capacity per total enrollment of \$56,000 (1 point)
- An unduplicated pupil percentage of 24.50% (2 points)
- Greater than 200 pupils for its school district enrollment (0 points)
- Its project doesn't include the use of a Project Labor Agreement (0 points)

In total, the district would have 3 points. As a result, the State Share of its New Construction project would be 50%, and the Local Share would be 50%. This is due to the district having less than 6 points, which does not meet the new criteria of the sliding match scale.

Summary of Proposed Amendments to SFP Regulations

SFP Regulations Section 1859.77.1 and 1859.79

To implement the sliding scale matching share system pursuant to the new EC Section 17070.59, OPSC proposes the following amendments:

In Section 1859.77.1 (New Construction District Matching Share Requirement), specify that the existing dollar-for-dollar matching share requirement applies to applications received before October 31, 2024. For applications received on or after October 31, 2024, add a requirement that any funding provided by these Regulations shall require a district matching share contribution pursuant to Education Code Sections 17070.59 and 17072.30.

In Section 1859.79 (Modernization Matching Share Requirement):

- In subsection (b), specify that the existing dollar-for-dollar matching share requirement applies to applications received before October 31, 2024.
- Add a subsection (c) specifying that for applications received on or after October 31, 2024, any Modernization Grant, plus any other funding authorized by these Regulations shall require a district matching share contribution pursuant to Education Code Sections 17070.59 and 170704.16.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5

To outline the points process of the new points-based system for determining the district's the local matching share for projects, OPSC proposes adding Section 1859.70.5.

ATTACHMENT E

- Subsection (a) outlines the process for determining points allocated as a result of the district's gross bonding capacity divided by the district's enrollment.
- Subsection (b) outlines the process for determining points allocated as a result of the district's unduplicated pupil percentage.
- Subsection (c) outlines the points allocated to school districts with a pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer.
- Finally, subsection (d) indicates the point amount to be allocated to school districts that include the use of a project labor agreement in the current application.

Application for Funding (Form SAB 50-04) to Include Additional Instructions and Editable Sections for Districts to Include Information Specific to Determination of Matching Shares

Overall, the form amendments make the form consistent with the additions to EC for determination of the percentage for local matching shares for school districts. To streamline the verification process of applications, OPSC proposes adding a Local Matching Share Determination section under Section 22 of the Form SAB 50-04 where school districts will indicate the following:

- District's total assessed valuation
- District's gross bonding capacity as a dollar amount
- District's unduplicated pupil percentage
- District's current school enrollment as a numerical entry
- Whether the district has entered a Project Labor Agreement as a Yes/No field

This would replace the prior Form SAB 50-04's Section 22, Architect of Record or Licensed Architect Certification. Below, please see the outlined changes:

Current Form SAB 50-04

Section 22 (Architect of Record or Licensed Architect Certification)
Section 23 (Architect of Record or Design Professional Certification)
Section 24 (Certification)

Proposed Form SAB 50-04

Section 22 (Local Matching Share Determination)
Section 23 (Architect of Record or Licensed Architect Certification)
Section 24 (Architect of Record or Design Professional Certification)
Section 25 (Certification)

Additionally, under the new proposed Section 22, OPSC requests that the district indicates its total assessed valuation. The intention with the addition of an entry for the total assessed valuation is to assist with the verification process of the district's total gross bonding capacity.

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As such, OPSC proposes renumbering the existing Sections 22 (Architect of Record or Licensed Architect Certification), 23 (Architect of Record or Design Professional Certification), and 24 (Certification), their associated instructions, and references to these sections in the Section 1 instructions and the Certification section.

Attachment A4b includes the proposed amendments to the SFP Regulations and Attachment A4c includes the proposed updates to the Form SAB 50-04 for stakeholder consideration.

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AUTHORITY All Applications

Education Code (EC) 17070.35 – General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare.

Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

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AUTHORITY

Applications Received on or before October 30, 2024

EC Section 17072.30 – New Construction Funding Process

(a) Subject to the availability of funds, and to the determination of priority pursuant to Section 17072.25, if applicable, the board shall apportion funds to an eligible school district only upon the approval of the project by the Department of General Services pursuant to the Field Act, as defined in Section 17281, and certification by the school district that the required 50 percent matching funds from local sources have been expended by the district for the project, or have been deposited in the county fund, or will be expended by the district by the time the project is completed, in an amount at least equal to the proposed apportionment pursuant to this chapter, prior to release of the state funds.

(b) This section is operative January 1, 2008.

Education Code Section 17074.16 – Release of funds; applications filed after April 29, 2002

(a) The board shall release disbursements to school districts with approved applications for modernization, to the extent state funds are available for the state's 60-percent share, and the school district has provided its 40-percent local match. Subject to the availability of funds, the board shall apportion funds to an eligible school district only upon the approval of the project by the Department of General Services pursuant to the Field Act, as defined in Section 17281, including, but not limited to, a project that complies with the Field Act by complying with Section 17280.5, and evidence that the certification by the school district that the required 40-percent matching funds from local sources have been expended by the district for the project, or have been deposited in the county fund or will be expended by the district by the time of completion of the project, and evidence that the district has entered into a binding contract for the completion of that project. If state funds are insufficient to fund all qualifying school districts, the board shall fund all qualifying school districts in the order in which the application for funding was approved by the board.

(b) This section shall apply only to an application that was filed after April 29, 2002.

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AUTHORITY

Applications Received on or after October 31, 2024

EC Section 17070.59 – General Provisions

For purposes of determining the points used to compute the required matching funds from local sources applied pursuant to Sections 17072.30 and 17074.16, the department shall compute the sum of the following point computations applicable to each school district:

(a) For each school district, the department shall divide the district's gross bonding capacity by the district's total enrollment, as determined for purposes of this chapter.

(1) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of zero dollars (\$0) to nine thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$9,999), inclusive, shall receive four points.

(2) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to nineteen thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$19,999), inclusive, shall receive three points.

(3) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to fifty-four thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$54,999), inclusive, shall receive two points.

(4) A school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) or more shall receive one point.

(b) (1) For each school district, the department shall identify each district's unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the local control funding formula pursuant to Section 42238.02.

(2) (A) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 75 percent and 100 percent shall receive eight points.

(B) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 50 percent and 74.99 percent shall receive six points.

(C) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 25 percent and 49.99 percent shall receive four points.

(D) A school district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage that is 24.99 percent or less shall receive two points.

(c) A school district that has a pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer shall receive two points.

(d) (1) A school district project that includes the use of a project labor agreement shall receive two points.

(2) For purposes of this subdivision, "project labor agreement" has the same meaning as defined in paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 2500 of the Public Contract Code.

(e) The department shall draft regulations for consideration by the board to further clarify the requirements of this section.

(Added by Stats. 2024, Ch. 81, Sec. 6. (AB 247) Effective July 3, 2024. Operative November 6, 2024, pursuant to Sec. 30 of Ch. 81.)

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EC Section 17070.87 – General Provisions

New construction and modernization applications submitted before October 31, 2024, shall be processed and apportioned in accordance with this chapter, as it read on January 1, 2024.

(Added by Stats. 2024, Ch. 81, Sec. 7. (AB 247) Effective July 3, 2024. Operative November 6, 2024, pursuant to Sec. 30 of Ch. 81.)

EC Section 17072.30 – New Construction Funding Process

(a) Subject to the availability of funds, the board shall apportion funds to an eligible school district only upon the approval of the project by the Department of General Services pursuant to the Field Act, as defined in Section 17281, and certification by the school district that the required matching funds from local sources have been expended by the district for the project, or have been deposited in the county fund, or will be expended by the district by the time the project is completed, in an amount at least equal to the proposed apportionment pursuant to this chapter, before release of the state funds.

(b) The board shall adjust a school district's required local contribution pursuant to this section and the school district's associated state contribution required pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10), as follows:

(1) For a school district determined to have a score of more than 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 45 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 55 percent.

(2) For a school district determined to have a score of 9 or 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 47 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 53 percent.

(3) For a school district determined to have a score of eight points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 48 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 52 percent.

(4) For a school district determined to have a score of six or seven points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 49 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 51 percent.

(5) For a school district determined to have a score of less than six points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 50 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with Section 17072.10) shall be 50 percent.

(Amended by Stats. 2024, Ch. 81, Sec. 10. (AB 247) Effective July 3, 2024. Operative November 6, 2024, pursuant to Sec. 30 of Ch. 81.)

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EC Section 17074.16 – Modernization Apportionment

(a) The board shall release disbursements to school districts with approved applications for modernization, to the extent state funds are available for the state's share, and the school district has provided its required local match. Subject to the availability of funds, the board shall apportion funds to an eligible school district only upon the approval of the project by the Department of General Services pursuant to the Field Act, as defined in Section 17281, including, but not limited to, a project that complies with the Field Act by complying with Section 17280.5, and evidence that the certification by the school district that the required matching funds from local sources have been expended by the district for the project, or have been deposited in the county fund or will be expended by the district by the time of completion of the project, and evidence that the district has entered into a binding contract for the completion of that project. If state funds are insufficient to fund all qualifying school districts, the board shall fund all qualifying school districts in the order in which the application for funding was approved by the board.

(b) The board shall adjust a school district's required local contribution pursuant to this section and the school district's associated state contribution required pursuant to this article as follows:

(1) For a school district determined to have a score of more than 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 35 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 65 percent.

(2) For a school district determined to have a score of 9 or 10 points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 37 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 63 percent.

(3) For a school district determined to have a score of eight points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 38 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 62 percent.

(4) For a school district determined to have a score of six or seven points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the school district's required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 39 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 61 percent.

(5) For a school district determined to have a score of less than six points pursuant to Section 17070.59, the required local matching funds pursuant to subdivision (a) shall be 40 percent and the associated state contribution pursuant to this article shall be 60 percent.

(Amended by Stats. 2024, Ch. 81, Sec. 14. (AB 247) Effective July 3, 2024. Operative November 6, 2024, pursuant to Sec. 30 of Ch. 81.)

School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.77.1. New Construction District Matching Share Requirement.

Any funding provided by these Regulations shall require a district matching share contribution on a dollar-for-dollar basis with the exception of financial hardship provided by Section 1859.81 or any additional grant provided for a district-owned site acquisition cost pursuant to Sections 1859.74.5 or 1859.81.2.

The district may include as its district matching share any amounts expended on the project for an energy audit made pursuant to Education Code Section 17077.10 and any amounts applied to the project for incentive grants or rebates received by the district from a program funded pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 381.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79. Modernization Matching Share Requirement.

Except in the case of financial hardship as provided in Section 1859.81 a district matching share for a modernization project shall be required as follows:

- (a) If the Approved Application is received on or before April 29, 2002, any Modernization Grant plus any other funding provided by these Regulations shall require a district matching share equal to at least 20 percent of those amounts which, combined with the State's Modernization Adjusted Grant, shall represent 100 percent of the total project cost.
- (b) If the Approved Application is received after April 29, 2002, any Modernization Grant, plus any other funding authorized by these Regulations shall require a district matching share equal to at least 40 percent of those amounts which, combined with the State's Modernization Adjusted Grant, shall represent 100 percent of the total project cost.

The district may include as its district matching share any amounts expended on the project for an energy audit made pursuant to Education Code Section 17077.10 and any amounts applied to the project for incentive grants or rebates received by the district from a program funded pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 381.

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PROPOSED REGULATIONS

Section 1859.77.1. New Construction District Matching Share Requirement.

For applications received before October 31, 2024, Any funding provided by these Regulations shall require a district matching share contribution on a dollar-for-dollar basis with the exception of financial hardship provided by Section 1859.81 or any additional grant provided for a district-owned site acquisition cost pursuant to Sections 1859.74.5 or 1859.81.2.

For applications received on or after October 31, 2024, any funding provided by these Regulations shall require a district matching share contribution pursuant to Education Code Sections 17070.59 and 17072.30, with the exception of financial hardship provided by Section 1859.81 or any additional grant provided for a district-owned site acquisition cost pursuant to Sections 1859.74.5 or 1859.81.2.

The district may include as its district matching share any amounts expended on the project for an energy audit made pursuant to Education Code Section 17077.10 and any amounts applied to the project for incentive grants or rebates received by the district from a program funded pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 381.

Note: Authority cited: Section 17070.35, Education Code.

Section 1859.79. Modernization Matching Share Requirement.

Except in the case of financial hardship as provided in Section 1859.81 a district matching share for a modernization project shall be required as follows:

- (a) If the Approved Application is received on or before April 29, 2002, any Modernization Grant plus any other funding provided by these Regulations shall require a district matching share equal to at least 20 percent of those amounts which, combined with the State's Modernization Adjusted Grant, shall represent 100 percent of the total project cost.
- (b) If the Approved Application is received after April 29, 2002 and before October 31, 2024, any Modernization Grant, plus any other funding authorized by these Regulations shall require a district matching share equal to at least 40 percent of those amounts which, combined with the State's Modernization Adjusted Grant, shall represent 100 percent of the total project cost.
- (c) If the Approved Application is received on or after October 31, 2024, any Modernization Grant, plus any other funding authorized by these Regulations shall require a district matching share contribution pursuant to Education Code Sections 17070.59 and 17074.16.

The district may include as its district matching share any amounts expended on the project for an energy audit made pursuant to Education Code Section 17077.10 and any amounts applied to the project for incentive grants or rebates received by the district from a program funded pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 381.

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Section 1859.70.5 Points For Local Matching Share Determination

This Regulation shall only apply to Approved Applications received on or after October 31, 2024 for New Construction and Modernization Grants.

The points used to compute the required matching funds for a New Construction and Modernization Grants request shall be based on the following computations. A project shall receive points for a local matching share based on the total of (a), (b), (c) and (d):

- (a) Points for the district's gross bonding capacity divided by the district's total enrollment at the time OPSC notifies the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04:
 - (1) Four points for a district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of zero dollars (\$0) to nine thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$9,999), inclusive.
 - (2) Three points for a district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to nineteen thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$19,999), inclusive.
 - (3) Two points for a district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to fifty-four thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$54,999), inclusive.
 - (4) One point for a school district determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) or more.
- (b) Points for the district's unduplicated pupil percentage at the time OPSC notifies the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04, based upon:
 - (1) An unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the local control funding formula pursuant to EC Section 42238.02
 - (A) Eight points for a district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 75 percent and 100 percent, inclusive.
 - (B) Six points for a district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 50 percent and 74.99 percent, inclusive.
 - (C) Four points for a district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 25 percent and 49.99 percent, inclusive.
 - (D) Two points for a district determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage that is 24.99 percent or less.
 - (c) Two points for a district with a pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer at the time OPSC notifies the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04.
 - (d) Two points for a school project that includes the use of a project labor agreement in the application being processed.

PROPOSED REGULATIONS TO IMPLEMENT A MODERNIZATION GRANT FOR 75-YEAR-OLD BUILDINGS

PURPOSE

To discuss and receive stakeholder feedback regarding proposed regulatory amendments resulting from Assembly Bill (AB) 247, the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), which was approved by a majority of California's voters on November 5, 2024, related to the implementation of an additional grant for 75-year-old buildings.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A5a.

BACKGROUND

Proposition 2 adds Education Code (EC) Section 17074.265 to provide a modernization grant for projects in which the scope of the work includes the demolition and construction of building(s) at least 75 years old.

EC 17074.265 adds to the existing SFP Modernization Program as follows:

(a) Notwithstanding Article 6 (commencing with Section 17073.10), a school district shall be eligible to receive a modernization apportionment to demolish and construct a building or buildings on an existing schoolsite if both of the following conditions are met:

(1) The building or buildings to be replaced are at least 75 years old.

(2) The school district provides a cost-benefit analysis that indicates the total cost to modernize the building or buildings is at least 50 percent of the current replacement cost, as defined by the board, of the building or buildings. The cost-benefit analysis may include applicable site development costs.

(b) A project that meets the requirements of subdivision (a) shall be eligible for a grant equal to the grant provided under Section 17072.10 multiplied by the capacity of the building or buildings calculated pursuant to Section 17071.25.

(c) The board may adopt regulations to implement this section.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

The intention of staff is to provide initial thoughts and interpretation of the amended statute, raise questions on potential processing details to prompt and receive feedback from stakeholders, address any questions and present proposed regulations in a future stakeholder meeting.

Augmentation to the Modernization Grant

Similar to the grants provided for buildings 50 years or older, the grants for 75-year-old buildings would be provided in lieu of the typical per-pupil base grant. For these 75-year-old buildings, the grants can only be used for demolition and replacement. EC stipulates that the district will receive an increased grant amount based on the pupil grant amount designated for new construction projects under EC 17072.10. Additionally, when determining the age of these 75-year-old buildings, staff proposes using the same methodology as the standard SFP modernization eligibility.

EC Section 17074.265 appears to place emphasis on providing more state funds in order to replace buildings that have become 75 years of age and that it is more cost efficient to replace the building than it is to modernize it. EC Section 17074.265 differs from current statute and SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.8. Under current regulation, funding is provided to districts for buildings that are at least 20 or 25 years old, with facilities becoming eligible for modernization grants again every 20 or 25 years thereafter. However, to qualify for the 75-year-old grant, buildings that have reached 75 years of age must be demolished and replaced rather than modernized.

In addition, this grant would not replace the modernization base grant and/or 50-year-old grants, but instead would provide a grant alternative for districts to now replace buildings that have reached 75 years of age. Staff suggests that because there is the potential that a school site will have some buildings that are 50 years of age while other buildings have reached 75 years of age at the same time, the district may utilize both grants on a hybrid modernization project. The modernization base grant and the 50-year-old grant regulations provide the flexibility for the grants to be used towards any eligible modernization work throughout the site. However, the 75-year-old grant could only be used on the building that has generated the eligibility. For the scope of work pertaining to replacing buildings that are at least 75 years old, the regular modernization eligibility and 50-year-old grants could not be used in addition to the 75-year-old grant.

For reimbursement projects, the following would not qualify for the 75-year-old grant:

- The building was replaced using local funds and was not at least 75 years old at the time it was replaced.

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- The building was replaced in any State funded project, irrespective of whether it was a New Construction or Modernization type of project. This exclusion is to prevent double funding from the State.

Building Specific – Eligible Project Scope

As the building being replaced must be at least 75 years old to generate eligibility to receive this grant, the apportionment can only be used for replacing a building that meets this condition. The district must submit plans showing the demolition of the building(s) that were at least 75 years at the time of demolishment and Division of State Architect (DSA) approved plans must show the construction of the new building space. Staff will review the plans to confirm the demolished building age requirements of being at least 75 years old have been met.

In addition, staff considers the language in EC Section 17074.265 indicating “buildings”, to be specific to permanent buildings and not portable buildings. EC Sections 17073.15 and 17074.10(f) already provide a second round of funding for buildings reaching another 20 or 25 years of age past initial apportionment, with the emphasis on replacing portable classroom buildings. As portables are to be replaced through the second round of modernization funding, OPSC interprets that the 75-year-old funding will only apply to the replacement of permanent buildings and not portable classroom buildings.

For a district that qualifies for 50-year-old pupil grants, the grants could be utilized to fund any work throughout the campus, regardless of whether the plans include the building(s) that generated the eligibility. In the instance of 75-year-old grants, they are designated only for building specific funding. Therefore, staff suggests that OPSC processing for this grant should be building focused, in contrast to the site-specific approach used for funding 50-year-old buildings. If the submitted plans include only the modernization of a building that is 75 years old, and it is not being replaced, the project does not meet EC requirements and is therefore ineligible for the 75-year-old grant.

Required Cost-Benefit Analysis to Determine Funding Eligibility

One of the conditions for receiving funding requires the use of a Cost Benefit Analysis (CBA) to determine whether the costs associated with the modernization of a 75-year-old building will be at least 50 percent of what the costs would be to demolish and build it back.

To verify the CBA, the district will need to provide a unit-cost amount that conforms to the Sierra West Red Book for Modernization at F1 Level of difficulty. However, if there is other modernization work in the approved plans, this grant will only be applicable to the 75-year-old building. This cost estimate will then be divided by the Total Replacement Cost as determined in SFP regulations.

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Staff proposes to use the following table that displays the cost-benefit calculation method used in the Facility Hardship Program, pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1.

As the district will need to provide a cost estimate showing the total costs to modernize the building, those costs will then be divided by the total Current Replacement Costs to determine the resulting percentage. If the percentage for the cost to modernize is at least 50 percent of the replacement cost, the project will be eligible for 75-year-old funding, as show in the table below.

Total Cost to Modernize / Total Current Replacement Costs \geq 50%	Project is eligible
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Build Back of Demolished Classrooms and/or Ancillary Space

While new construction and modernization eligibility processing through SFP is separated by guidelines tailored to each individual program, the new EC Section appears to combine certain aspects to ensure that a district is able to replace buildings that are 75 years old. EC Section 17074.265 specifies that the calculation for grants that will fund these projects is to take the grant provided in EC Section 17072.10 (per-unhoused pupil grant amount provided for new construction projects) and multiply it by the capacity of the building(s) pursuant EC Section 17071.25 (eligibility determination guidelines for modernization projects).

However, staff proposes that EC Section 17071.25 will need to be addressed only through determining what the building looked like during eligibility establishment by referencing the original snapshot. Because applications requesting the 75-year-old

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grant will need to be building specific, only the building being worked on will be considered with regards to capacity, and not the entire campus to determine the pupil grant amount a district is eligible for. Staff suggests that “capacity” as indicated in the new EC will, for processing purposes, reference the new construction per-pupil grant amount be multiplied by the loading standards per grade level of the classroom(s) in the 75-year-old building(s). The usage of the building space should also be considered in instances where there are both classrooms and ancillary space within the same building.

Classroom Spaces

SFP Regulation 1859.79.2 indicates that for modernization funding, the construction of new facilities is only allowable in very limited cases. However, the new EC Section 17074.265 allows for 75-year-old buildings to be both demolished completely and built back. Staff proposes that while a new facility will be built using 75-year-old grant funding, SFP Regulations regarding how space may be constructed back under the modernization program will still need to be followed.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2 indicates that a modernization project that includes the replacement of buildings in like kind, will not be allowed to build more classrooms or square footage within the replacement area than were there originally. When replacing buildings that have reached 75 years of age, a district may build back the same number of classrooms in that building in like kind or build back fewer and have a net loss of classrooms. If any classroom space is being built back as non-classroom space, then the grant amount should be calculated as ancillary space. However, any increase in classrooms will result in a reduction of the new construction eligibility baseline dependent on the classroom capacity for the additional room(s). In addition, if the build back results in an increase in square footage from the original building area, that additional square footage must be funded exclusively from district funds outside of the SFP project, beyond the district’s required matching share.

As the calculation for 75-year-old classroom buildings will use the per-pupil grant amount provided for new construction projects with the loading capacity of each classroom within the building, staff proposes the following calculation for how a 75-year-old building that has only classrooms will be determined:

Number of Classrooms** X Classroom Loading Capacity*** =	# of 75-Year-Old Pupil Grants
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** In the 75-year-old building.

*** 25 pupils per classroom in grades K-6, 27 pupils per classroom in grades 7-12, 13 pupils in Non-Severe classrooms, and 9 pupils in Severe classrooms.

Ancillary Spaces

When considering the replacement of a 75-year-old building that is used for ancillary space instead of classroom space, staff proposes that SFP Regulation 1859.77.3(a) for Minimum Essential Facilities (MEF) be utilized to determine the

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appropriate pupil grants. SFP Regulation allows a district to request grants “that exceed the capacity of the project based on loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2) and any loading standards adopted by the SAB by these regulations if the project is to construct a multipurpose, gymnasium, Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid, and/or library, or for an Alternative Education school to construct a multipurpose/gymnasium, library, counseling offices, and/or conference rooms.” By applying the guidelines of a MEF for 75-year-old buildings, staff will be able to calculate the capacity of the building in alignment with EC guidelines that require the use of the new construction pupil grant amount against the capacity of the building to fund the replacement.

The following example shows the potential calculation for a building that includes ancillary space:

Both Ancillary and Classroom Space

Staff proposes that in the instance a building includes both classroom space and ancillary space, the MEF calculations be adjusted to account for both spaces. By doing so, staff would be able to accurately determine the capacity for a building that is reliant on both square footages and classroom space. The following example shows the potential calculation:

Requesting 50-year-old Utilities Within the Project

When a district is demolishing and building back a building that has reached 75 years of age, EC Section 17074.265 indicates that the grant be equivalent to the new construction grant amount. Therefore, the eligible costs included in the project should take into consideration the conditions for new construction funding. Staff proposes that EC Section 17072.35 for new construction funding already takes into account the costs associated with site development by indicating: "a grant for new construction may be used for any and all costs necessary to adequately house new pupils in any approved project, and those costs may only include the cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, **site acquisition and development** . . ." Therefore, the 50-year-old utility grant should not be provided for a 75-year-old building that is being replaced as the new construction grant being provided already accounts for those costs.

Adjustment to Modernization Eligibility as a Result of Replaced Facility Spaces

As 75-year-old buildings are being demolished and replaced, similar to other programs such as the Overcrowded Relief Grant, Facility Hardship program, and locally funded projects, staff proposes that the SFP Regulation Section 1859.61 be amended to account for these facilities being replaced as well.

Therefore, the modernization eligibility would be impacted by the amended language by the following thoughts:

- The modernization eligibility's snapshot will not be altered, and the total classroom inventory and square footages will remain the same.
- The age of the 75-year-old buildings that were demolished will be reset to the Apportionment date of the modernization project as the new starting point for

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those buildings. This will be accomplished through a one-time adjustment to the modernization eligibility that will ensure the site continues to generate modernization eligibility in a consistent practice.

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AUTHORITY All Applications

Education Code (EC) 17070.35 – General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare. Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

EC Section 17072.10 – New Construction Grant Eligibility Determination

(a) The board shall determine the maximum total new construction grant eligibility of an applicant by multiplying the number of unhoused pupils calculated pursuant to Article 3 (commencing with Section 17071.75) in each

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school district with an approved application for new construction, by the per-unhoused-pupil grant as follows:

(1) Five thousand two hundred dollars (\$5,200) for elementary school pupils.

(2) Five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500) for middle school pupils.

(3) Seven thousand two hundred dollars (\$7,200) for high school pupils.

(b) The board annually shall adjust the per-unhoused-pupil apportionment to reflect construction cost changes, as set forth in the statewide cost index for class B construction as determined by the board.

(c) Regulations adopted by the board prior to July 1, 2000, that adjust the amounts identified in this section for qualifying individuals with exceptional needs, as defined in Section 56026, as amended after July 1, 2000, in consideration of the recommendations provided pursuant to Section 17072.15, shall continue in effect. An increase made to the per-unhoused-pupil grant amounts set forth in subdivision (a), on or after January 1, 2010, including, but not limited to, those made pursuant to Section 17072.11 on or after January 1, 2010, also shall be made to the per-unhoused-pupil who is a qualifying individual with exceptional needs grant amounts established pursuant to this subdivision. If an increase to the per-unhoused-pupil grant amounts differentiates among the pupil groups based on whether the pupils are elementary, middle, or high school pupils, the Office of Public School Construction shall recommend to the board, within 60 days of that increase, a methodology to adjust the per-unhoused-pupil grant amount for pupils who are qualifying individuals with exceptional needs so that those adjustments appropriately reflect the increases.

(d) The board may establish a single supplemental per-unhoused-pupil grant in addition to the amounts specified in subdivision (a) based on the statewide average marginal difference in costs in instances where a project requires multilevel school facilities due to limited acreage. The application of a school district shall demonstrate that a practical alternative site is not available.

(e) For a school district having an enrollment of 2,500 or less for the prior fiscal year, the board may approve a supplemental apportionment of up to seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) for any new construction project assistance. The amount of the supplemental apportionment authorized pursuant to this subdivision shall be adjusted in 2008 and every year thereafter by an amount equal to the percentage adjustment for class B construction.

EC Section 17071.25 – Existing School Building Capacity

(a) The existing school building capacity in the applicant school district or, where appropriate, in the attendance area, at the time of initial application shall be calculated pursuant to the following formula:

(1) Identify by grade level all permanent teaching stations existing in the school district or, where appropriate, the attendance area. For the purposes of this section, “teaching station” means any space that was constructed or

reconstructed to serve as an area in which to provide pupil instruction, but shall not include portable buildings, except as provided in Section 17071.30.

(2)(A) The assumed capacity of each calculated teaching station pursuant to paragraph (1) shall be 25 pupils for each teaching station used for kindergarten or for grades 1 to 6, inclusive, and 27 pupils for each teaching station used for grades 7 to 12, inclusive.

(B) On or after January 1, 2000, the board may adopt or amend regulations adjusting the assumed capacity set forth in this subparagraph as appropriate for each teaching station used for nonsevere or severe special day class purposes after considering the recommendations of the Legislative Analyst pursuant to Section 17072.15. These special day class capacity adjustments and any adjustment of existing school capacity related to changes in the assumed capacity of special day class teaching stations shall be approved by the Director of Finance prior to implementation.

EC Section 17072.35 – New Construction Funding Process

A grant for new construction may be used for any and all costs necessary to adequately house new pupils in any approved project, and those costs may only include the cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, site acquisition and development, evaluation and response action costs relating to hazardous substances at a new or existing schoolsite, demolition, construction, acquisition and installation of portable classrooms, landscaping, necessary utility costs, utility connections and other fees, equipment including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, furnishings, and the upgrading of electrical systems or the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology. A grant for new construction may also be used to acquire an existing government or privately owned building, or a privately financed school building, and for the necessary costs of converting the government or privately owned building for public school use. A grant for new construction may also be used for the costs of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high performance schools.

EC Section 17073.15 – Modernization Eligibility Determination

A school district is eligible to receive an apportionment for the modernization of a permanent school building that is more than 25 years old or a portable classroom that is at least 20 years old. A school district is eligible to receive an additional apportionment for the modernization of a permanent school building every 25 years after the date of the previous apportionment or a portable classroom every 20 years after the previous apportionment.

EC Section 17074.10(f) – Modernization Apportionment

(a) The board shall determine the total funding eligibility of a school district for modernization funding by multiplying the following amounts by each pupil of that grade level housed in school buildings that satisfy the requirements of Section 17073.15:

(1) Two thousand two hundred forty-six dollars (\$2,246) for each elementary pupil.

(2) Two thousand three hundred seventy-six dollars (\$2,376) for each middle school pupil.

(3) Three thousand one hundred ten dollars (\$3,110) for each high school pupil.

(b) The board shall annually adjust the factors set forth in subdivision (a) according to the adjustment for inflation set forth in the statewide cost index for class B construction, as determined by the board.

(c) The board may adopt regulations to be effective until July 1, 2000, that adjust the amounts identified in this section for qualifying individuals with exceptional needs, as defined in Section 56026. The regulations shall be amended after July 1, 2000, in consideration of the recommendations provided pursuant to Section 17072.15.

(d) It is the intent of the Legislature that the amounts provided pursuant to this article for school modernization do not include funding for administrative and overhead costs.

(e) For a school district having an enrollment of 2,500 or less for the prior fiscal year, the board may approve a supplemental apportionment of up to two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for any modernization project assistance. The amount of the supplemental apportionment shall be adjusted in 2001 and every year thereafter by an amount equal to the percentage adjustment for class B construction.

(f) For a portable classroom that is eligible for a second modernization, the board shall require the school district to use the modernization funds to replace the portable classroom and to certify that the existing eligible portable classroom will be removed from any classroom use, unless the school district is able to document that modernizing the portable classroom is a better use of public resources. The capacity and eligibility of the school district shall not be adjusted for replacing a portable classroom pursuant to this subdivision and Section 17073.15.

School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.61. Adjustments to the Modernization Baseline Eligibility

The baseline eligibility for modernization as provided in Section 1859.60 for a specific site will be adjusted as follows:

(a) Reduced by the number of pupils provided grants in a modernization SFP project or a CSFP Rehabilitation project at the specific site.

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- (b) Reduced by the number of pupils housed, based on the loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2), in a modernization LPP project funded under the LPP pursuant to Sections 1859.14 and 1859.15.
 - (c) Increased by changes in projected enrollment in subsequent enrollment reporting years.
 - (d) Increased for additional facilities not previously modernized with State funds, that become 25 years old, if permanent, or 20 years old, if portable or as a result of audit findings made pursuant to Sections 1859.90, 1859.90.3 and 1859.105.
 - (e) Adjusted as a result of errors or omissions by the district or by the OPSC.
 - (f) Adjusted as a result of amendments to these Subgroup 5.5 Regulations that affect the eligibility.
 - (g) For classroom loading standards adopted by the Board for non-severely disabled individuals with exceptional needs and severely disabled individuals with exceptional needs.
 - (h) As directed by the Board due to a finding of a Material Inaccuracy pursuant to Regulation Section 1859.104.1.
 - (i) Increased for facilities previously modernized with State funds, which qualify for an additional modernization apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.78.8.
 - (j) Decreased for facilities that were deemed eligible for modernization pursuant to Sections 1859.60 and 1859.61(d) and subsequently replaced, or will be replaced under a signed contract for construction or acquisition of facilities, in a project funded by the district without participation from the State.
 - (k) Adjusted as a result of replaced eligible portables funded with the Overcrowding Relief Grant, pursuant to Education Code Section 17079, et seq.
 - (l) Adjusted upon Board receipt of the local school board resolution acknowledging that the buildings have been removed from K-12 use, as follows:
 - (1) School Buildings and/or classrooms that receive replacement funding via the New Construction Grant or the Facility Hardship Square Footage Grant pursuant to Section 1859.82.1 or Section 1859.82.2
 - (2) School Buildings and/or classrooms that were originally included in the district's baseline eligibility and were later demolished or removed from classroom use due to health and/or safety concerns that meet the requirements of Regulation Section 1859.82.1 or 1859.82.2 as verified by OPSC, except the district did not have the current enrollment to support the replacement and funding of those School Buildings and/or classrooms. Buildings and/or classrooms removed from K-12 classroom use that remain on the school site will be identified on a list published on OPSC's website.
- For (l)(1) the building age shall be reset to the date of the Apportionment for the corresponding project. For (l)(2) the building shall be removed from the classroom inventory used to establish modernization eligibility at the site.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a) Use of New Construction Grant Funds for Projects Accepted by the DSA after January 22, 2003

New Construction Grant funds and any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Section 17072.35; and may also be utilized for the cost incurred by the district for the development and implementation of remedial action plan approved by the DTSC pursuant to Education Code Section 17213.

Authorization for use of New Construction Grants for which the final plans and specifications for the project were accepted by the DSA after January 22, 2003 may be requested as follows:

- (a) A district may request new construction grants that exceed the capacity of the project based on loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2) and any loading standards adopted by the SAB by these regulations if the project is to construct a multipurpose, gymnasium, Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid, and/or library, or for an Alternative Education school to construct a multipurpose/gymnasium, library, counseling offices, and/or conference rooms, at an existing site that does not have an existing or adequate facility of the type being requested when all of the following is met:
- (1) The district must adopt a school board resolution that has been discussed at a public hearing at a regularly scheduled meeting of the district's governing board on a date preceding the application filing that includes the following:
 - (A) An acknowledgement that funds for the purposes of housing the excess pupils are being diverted to another project.
 - (B) An acknowledgement that the State has satisfied its obligation, pursuant to Section 1859.50, to house the pupils receiving grants in the project.
 - (C) A plan outlined in the resolution that identifies how the district has housed or will house the pupils receiving grants in the project in school buildings as defined in Education Code Section 17368. The plan must certify one of the following methods:
 1. The district will construct or acquire facilities for housing the pupils with funding not otherwise available to the SFP as a district match within five years of project approval by the SAB, and the district must identify the source of the funds; or
 2. The district will utilize higher district loading standards providing the loading standards are within the approved district's teacher contract and do not exceed 33:1 per classroom.
 - (2) The existing school site was not constructed under the SFP.
 - (3) The proposed project includes no more than eight classrooms.
 - (4) Grants requests, above 100 percent of the number of pupils to be housed, based on Special Day Class pupil eligibility are only permitted under this subsection (a) when building a Special Day Class facility.
 - (5) For purposes of this Section, a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid is considered to be both a multipurpose and a gymnasium. A school site with a

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middle school and/or high school pupils is eligible for one multipurpose and one gymnasium; therefore, if a school site has an adequate multipurpose and an adequate gymnasium, it is not eligible for a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid under this Section.

(6) For purposes of this section to determine if an existing facility is inadequate, the existing square footage is less than 60 percent of the square footage necessary for the current CBEDS for the site plus the Net School Building Capacity of the proposed project as calculated pursuant to Section 1859.82(b), except for Alternative Education Schools. For Alternative Education Schools, refer to the following:

*The proposed project cannot include more than eight classrooms.

(7) The maximum excess pupil amount being requested for this type of use of grants request, is calculated by the following:

(A) Multiply the current CBEDS for the site plus the Net School Building Capacity for the proposed project by the square footage for the type of facility being requested, as follows:

1. For Alternative Education Schools, refer to the chart above.
2. For a multipurpose room, gymnasium, and/or library, refer to the chart in Section 1859.82(b).
3. For a Multipurpose/Gym Hybrid:
 - a. For school sites with middle school pupils, use 15.2 square feet per pupil, with a minimum of 8,056 square feet and a maximum of 18,848 square feet.
 - b. For school sites with high school pupils, use 18.6 square feet per pupil, with a minimum of 10,193 square feet and a maximum of 21,874 square feet.

(B) Multiply the product in (a)(7)(A) above by the per square foot grant amount of \$154. This per square foot grant amount will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(C) Divide the product in (a)(7)(B) above by the New Construction Grant amount for the project grade level, rounded up to the nearest whole number.

...

SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.8. Modernization Grant for Facilities Previously Modernized with State Funds.

The Board shall provide an additional apportionment provided by Education Code 17074.10(a) and Section 1859.78.3, for facilities previously modernized with State funds as follows:

An additional apportionment will be provided for the modernization of a permanent school building every 25 years following the date of its previous State modernization apportionment.

(b) In the case of portable classrooms, an additional apportionment will be permitted every 20 years after the date of its previous State modernization apportionment provided the modernization funds will be used to replace the portable classroom(s) and the school district must certify that the portable classrooms will be removed from any classroom use unless acceptable documentation is provided by the district indicating that the modernization of the portable classrooms is a better use of public resources.

If the previous SFP modernization apportionment includes both permanent and portable facilities, the number of pupil grants that will be added to the site's baseline eligibility shall be determined by the percentage of permanent or portable facilities identified on the Form SAB 50-03 that generated the initial eligibility.

The capacity and eligibility of the school district will not be adjusted for the replacement of the portable classroom pursuant to Education Code Sections 17074.10(f) and 17073.15.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2. Use of Modernization Grant Funds.

The Modernization Grant plus any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Sections 17074.25, 17074.10(f) and 17070.15(i) and may also be utilized for other purposes as set forth in Education Code Section 100420(c), and Labor Code Section 1771.3(a) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014. Modernization funding may also be used for the costs incurred by the district directly or through a contract with a third party provider for the initiation and enforcement of a LCP.

Modernization funding, with the exception of savings, is limited to expenditure on the specific site where the modernization grant eligibility was generated. The grant may not be used for the following:

New building area with the exception of the following:

- (1) Replacement building area of like kind. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the district.
- (2) Building area required by the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or by the Division of the State Architect's (DSA) handicapped access requirements.

(b) New site development items with the exception of:

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- (1) Replacement, repair or additions to existing site development.
- (2) Site development items required by the federal ADA Act or by the DSA's handicapped access requirements.
- (c) the evaluation and removal of hazardous or solid waste and/or hazardous substances when the Department of Toxic Substance Control has determined that the site contains dangerous levels of a hazardous substance, hazardous waste, or both that exceed ten percent of the combined adjusted grant and the district matching share for the project.
- (d) Leased facilities not owned by another district or a county superintendent. Modernization Grant funds may be used on any school facilities on the site, with the exception of portable classroom facilities eligible for an additional apportionment pursuant to Education Code Sections 17073.15 and 17074.10(f) and as defined in Section 1859.78.8. If the classroom facilities on the site include areas that are currently ineligible for modernization, it will not disqualify those facilities from future modernization funding.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1 (2)(D) Facility Hardship Program.

"School Building" for the purposes of this Section shall have the same definition as Education Code Section 17283 and shall also exclude any districtwide administrative facilities.

A district is eligible for Facility Hardship funding to repair, replace, or construct School Buildings or related required components that are currently causing a health and safety threat to the students and/or staff. Projects solely to replace components that have reached the end of their useful life, perform routine maintenance or repair, issues resulting from the deferment of routine maintenance or repair, lack of current code compliance, or the addition of components that were not previously existing, do not meet the qualifying criteria of the program. However, this work may be incorporated into a qualifying Facility Hardship application if it is required to be completed to gain DSA approval.

Beginning 90 days after the effective date of this Section [November 29, 2020], Approved Applications requesting Facility Hardship Program funding shall be submitted to OPSC within 12 months of DSA approval for the scope of work mitigating the identified health and safety threat. If the project does not require DSA approval, then the Approved Application for funding must be received within the 6 months following project completion, as demonstrated by the earliest of the following: the date that the notice of completion of the project has been filed; occupancy of any portion of the project Facility; or when the School Buildings or components of the School Buildings in the project are currently in use by the district. If a district demonstrates that extreme or unusual circumstances prevented the submission of an eligible application within the applicable timeline outlined above, OPSC may allow up to an additional 6 months for submittal.

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(a) Districts may qualify for funding to replace or construct new School Buildings. Factors to be considered by the Board to determine eligibility for Facility Hardship program replacement funding may include, but are not limited to:

(1) Damage or loss as a result of a natural disaster such as a fire, flood, or earthquake.

(2) Proximity to a major freeway, airport, electrical facility, high power transmission lines, dam, pipeline, or industrial facility.

(3) Adverse air quality.

(4) Structural deficiency to the School Building, and

(5) Site conditions such as faulting, toxic soil, or liquefaction.

(b) To qualify for replacement funding for School Buildings, the district must submit an Approved Application for funding and either (1) or (2) below:

(1) For School Buildings that are lost, destroyed, or unable to be repaired, the district must submit:

(A) A report from an industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) that states that the only way to mitigate the health and safety threat is to replace the School Building(s).

(B) Documentation which demonstrates that the facilities in the project must be reconstructed in order to house the current enrollment of the district.

(2) For permanent School Buildings where the cost to rehabilitate the School Building(s) exceeds 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost, or for Portable Classrooms where the cost to rehabilitate exceeds the Portable Classroom Replacement Grant or Portable Toilet Replacement Grant, the district must submit:

(A) A report by an industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) that outlines the minimum work to mitigate the health and safety threat and remain in the existing School Building. If the threat is due to the presence of mold, OPSC must conduct a site visit to discuss the scope of the project prior to remediation. If the remediation is done prior to a site visit, the application will be ineligible for funding. Requests for asbestos mitigation must include lab test results indicating the asbestos is currently friable, and provides the location, material, and testing methods used.

(B) A letter of concurrence from a governmental agency that has jurisdiction or expertise over the field in which the health and safety threat originates. The letter must concur with the industry specialist report on both 1. and 2. below:

1. An imminent health and safety threat to student and/or staff exists.

2. The mitigation measures outlined in the industry specialist's report are the minimum measures required to mitigate the threat and allow the continued use of the School Building(s).

(C) Applications must include a detailed Form SAB 58-01 that meets the following requirements:

1. The Form SAB 58-01 must use the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication by Sierra West

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Publishing. For all materials or items listed in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication, amounts entered on the Form SAB 58-01 must use the provided unit costs. For individual materials or items that are not contained in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair publication, the district must provide supporting documentation for OPSC to review the requested unit cost.

2. All requested line items shall include Construction Specifications Institute reference number (CSI #), description, F3 total unit cost amount, and quantity. Any line items that include amounts in lump-sum formats will not be reviewed or approved.

3. The work in the Form SAB 58-01 shall match the work outlined in the report provided by the industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) for the minimum work required to mitigate the health and safety threat.

4. The estimate submitted to OPSC shall be for the same scope of work reviewed and concurred to by DSA, and that is referenced in the governmental concurrence letter for the project.

5. The Form SAB 58-01 may also include any work required by DSA to obtain plan approval.

(D) A cost/benefit analysis that demonstrates the minimum work required to mitigate the health and safety threat and remain in the School Building exceeds 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost of the existing Square Footage of the School Building. The minimum work required may include work required by DSA to gain approval for the mitigation project.

RE: FEEDBACK ON TOPICS PRESENTED DURING JANUARY 30, 2025 STAKEHOLDER MEETING FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF PROPOSITION 2 FOR THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM

To Whom it May Concern:

Hancock Park & DeLong, Inc. appreciates the opportunity to provide feedback regarding the topics presented during the first Proposition 2 Implementation meeting held on January 30, 2025. Below is a summary of our comments and concerns:

- **Topic 1 – Financial Hardship**
 - For the proposed regulation section 1859.81.(i)(6)c., we request the ability for school districts to include an estimated or “up to” maximum amount of anticipated funding that will be borrowed or transferred, rather than an exact amount of funding. It is often difficult to determine the exact amount of funding that will be required for inter-fund borrowing, so a maximum anticipated amount would provide much-needed flexibility.
- **Topic 2 – Modernization Eligibility for Schools Located on Military Installations and New Construction Eligibility for Small School Districts**
 - For the adjustments to New Construction eligibility, we request the flexibility for school districts to submit current fiscal year enrollment information beginning in September of each year, rather than being required to utilize the prior year’s enrollment data. Those districts who have begun school and are aware of increased enrollment should have the ability to capture and use the increased enrollment data to support their projections and applications.
- **Topic 3 – Eligible Expenditures – n/a**
- **Topic 4 – School Facility Program (SFP) Matching Share**
 - We request clarification on the calculation of the SFP grant amounts when the matching share changes. It is unclear based on a reading of the proposed regulations whether the total project (State + district share) is staying the same or going down, if for example, the matching share goes down to 35 percent for a modernization project. Please see the below examples of a ‘standard’ 60%/40% project and the

two options for a project with an adjusted matching share. Under Option 1, the total project amount stays the same, with the state share going up and the matching share going down- it seems that this would necessitate a change in the actual pupil grants. Under Option 2, the state share would stay the same but the matching share goes down further than Option 1. This option would result in less funding for financial hardship districts.

As a 60%/40% project, with ~100 K-6 pupil grants (calculations are simplified/ rounded down):

State=	\$600,000
District=	\$400,000
Total project=	\$1,000,000

Option 1: As a 65%/35% project:

State=	\$650,000
District=	\$350,000
Total project=	\$1,000,000

Option 2: As a 65%/35% project:

State=	\$600,000
District=	\$323,077
Total project=	\$923,077

- **Topic 5 – 75-Year Old Building Supplemental Grant**

- For replaced square footage, we request the ability for school districts to increase the square footage of any replaced classroom spaces to meet minimum space requirements under Title 5 for current classrooms. Districts should have the ability meet current Title 5 requirements and not be held to standards from over 75 years ago.

Re: Proposition 2 Implementation Stakeholder Meeting #1

Dear Ms. Kirk,

On behalf of the Los Angeles Unified School District (Los Angeles Unified), we appreciate OPSC's Proposition 2 stakeholder engagement and welcome the opportunity to provide input on the proposed amendments to the School Facility Program in response to Proposition 2.

The comments and recommendations provided below correspond to the topics raised and materials provided for the January 30, 2025, Implementation Stakeholder Meeting #1.

Topic #2 - Modernization eligibility for Schools Located on Military Installations and New Construction Eligibility for Small School Districts (Attachment A2)

- *Eligibility Determination (Form 50-03)*: Clarify that the "year" being requested for the CBEDS enrollment data, refers to a "school year" rather than a "calendar year."
- *Eligibility Determination (Form 50-03)*: The language on lines 2 and 3 in the Option B section regarding military schools should also be included on lines 2 and 3 in the Option A section.

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Topic #3 – Eligible Expenditures (Attachment A3)

- *Grant Agreement Form, Items 5.q and 5.r:* The proposed grant agreement does not explicitly state whether lead testing following a remediation project is an eligible expenditure or whether lead testing prior to any remediation efforts is eligible. We believe language is necessary to clarify that these are both eligible expenditures.
- *Grant Agreement Form Items 5.q. and 5.r.:* Both items directly reference EC 17074.25(a)(2)(C) and should be combined for clarity.
- *Grant Agreement Form Items 5.u.:* As the supplemental grant for expansion or construction of a gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen will be discussed in greater detail at a future stakeholder meeting, we propose that discussion and implementation of any related grant-agreement language be deferred until that meeting.
- *Grant Agreement Form Item 5.w.:* As EC 17077.35 and 17073.16 will be discussed in greater detail at a future stakeholder meeting, we propose that implementation of any grant-agreement language related to Energy Efficiency changes be deferred until that meeting.
- *Grant Agreement Form Items 3.p, 3.s, 5.n, 5.t, and 5.v.:* Clarify whether design costs are considered eligible expenses for broadband infrastructure, healthcare and mental health facilities, kitchens, transitional kindergarten classrooms, and preschool program facilities.

Topic #4 – School Facility Program (SFP) Matching Share (Attachment A4)

- *New Construction Funding Process & New Construction District Matching Share Requirement:* EC Section 17072.30(a) which is cited as an authority for 2 CCR 1859.77.1, conflicts with the new Proposition 2 matching share guidance for new construction grants. The EC states that before state funds will be released, a school district must meet certain provisions, including making a certification that the required matching funds “in an amount at least equal to the proposed apportionment” be expended or deposited in the county fund, or will be expended by project completion. Due to the Proposition 2 updates to this EC section, it is no longer possible to have a matching share that is equal to an apportionment unless a school district is determined to have a score of less than six points pursuant to Section 17070.59. Clarification is needed on how to address this conflict.
- *Points for Local Matching Share Determination:* The proposed regulations for 2 CCR 1859.70.5(a) suggest the points for a district’s bonding capacity, unduplicated pupil counts, and pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer, be calculated when OPSC provides notification of application processing. Los Angeles Unified recommends that the points for the local matching share be calculated at the time of processing for the New Construction program and be calculated at the time of application submission for the Modernization program. Per 2 CCR 1859.51(e), for new construction funding requests, a district must submit an eligibility update at the time of processing. This eligibility update directly impacts the funding request by potentially reducing or changing the number of pupil grants available for use in the funding request.

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Accordingly, other calculations that directly impact the funding request—such as the matching share—should also be determined at that time to provide a consistent approach to determining the apportionment. Conversely, for modernization funding requests, eligibility is determined at the time of application submission. The matching share should also be determined at that time, to provide a consistent approach to determining the apportionment.

- *Local Matching Share Determination* (Form SAB 50-04,): Section 22 discusses how to calculate the matching share, and includes steps to calculate a district's enrollment as "pursuant to the Form SAB 50-01 instructions for reporting enrollment data." However, the suggested SAB 50-04 language fails to include all the 50-01's instructions and specifically excludes enrollment accounted for in Part C (Continuation High School Pupils) and Part D (Special Day Class Pupils). We recommend that Part C and Part D be added to the SAB 50-04 language.
- *Gross Bonding Capacity*: The calculation of a district's gross bonding capacity relies on the district's assessed value, which, per EC 17070.54(c)(6), must be verified by the 'appropriate local government entity that collects and maintains this information.' However, this data is not publicly available and is often sourced from non-governmental entities. Los Angeles Unified requests consideration of alternative sources for verification.

Topic #5 – 75-Year-Old Building Supplemental Grant (Attachment A5)

- *Building Specific – Eligible Project Scope*: Los Angeles Unified does not agree with OPSC's interpretation of EC 17073.15 and 17074.10(f). According to EC 17074.10(f), portables eligible for a second modernization funding must be replaced unless the district can "document that modernizing the portable classroom is a better use of public resources". This wording indicates that portables are not necessarily "replaced through the second round of modernization funding," therefore the grant to replace 75-year-old buildings should not be limited to the replacement of permanent buildings and instead also include portable buildings.
- Los Angeles Unified requests that districts not be limited to like-kind square footage restrictions in certain situations when a replacement building requires additional square footage due to code requirements or functional mandates. Some examples of when additional square footage should be allowed are:
 - If classrooms in a 75-year-old building are too small and need to be brought up to 960sf to be compliant with Title 5 general classroom size guidelines, there will be a size increase when comparing the demolished square footage to the replacement square footage. This additional square footage should be eligible and allowable to receive funding.
 - If a district demolishes buildings (permanent or portables) with the intent to replace and consolidate those spaces under one roof, the replacement building will necessarily include hallways, restrooms, or outdoor corridors that were not included in the demolished buildings. This would create additional square footage that would be necessary to receive design approval, and to functionally use the building. This additional square footage should be eligible and allowable to receive funding.


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- *Requesting 50-year-old Utilities Within the Project:* OPSC states that “...the 50-year-old utility grant should not be provided for a 75-year-old building that is being replaced as the new construction grant being provided already accounts for these costs”. Los Angeles Unified believes this is a misreading of EC 17072.35, which says that the new construction grant (not specifically the new construction *pupil* grant) provides for these costs. The new construction grant accomplishes this through the site-development/utilities additional grant permitted in section 5.f of Form SAB 50-04 and 2 CCR 1859.76. A similar utility grant should therefore also be available as part of the grant to replace a 75-year-old building.
- *Required Cost-Benefit Analysis to Determine Funding Eligibility:* OPSC suggests that a district will need to provide a unit cost amount that conforms to the Sierra West Current Construction Costs Remodeling Repair (Modernization) book at F1 level of difficulty. However, 2 CCR section 1859.82.1 (Facility Hardship Program) prescribes the use of that same book at an F3 level, and although not memorialized in section 1859.82.2 (Seismic Mitigation Program), OPSC allows the usage of the same book at an F3 level for that program. Los Angeles Unified recommends consistent usage of the Sierra West publication across all SFP programs and recommends that F3 level be used for the purpose of preparing the cost benefit analysis for this supplemental grant.
- *Cost Benefit Analysis (Table 1):* In preparing the modernization estimate, Table 1 indicates that the existing square footage must be determined using DSA plans (“Verify from DSA plans”). However, the original DSA plans may no longer be available and/or the building may have been constructed before DSA was established. In such cases, Los Angeles Unified recommends SP1A diagrams, or other similar type of documentation, be acceptable for determining square footage (as has been permitted for other funding requests in the Modernization and Seismic Mitigation programs).
- *Cost Benefit Analysis:* Los Angeles Unified proposes that OPSC allow districts to base their cost-benefit-analysis-modernization-estimate on conceptual drawings, or schematic drawings as is similarly permitted in the Seismic Modernization Program. A modernization estimate based on DSA-approved modernization plans would be unduly expensive and time-consuming.
- *Build Back of Demolished Classrooms and/or Ancillary Space:* OPSC proposes calculating this supplemental grant based on the original snapshot of a building rather than its current configuration. However, Los Angeles Unified recommends that funding be based on the building’s current usage, consistent with the approach used in the Seismic Mitigation Program and aligned with EC 17071.25(a). This section specifies that a district’s existing school building capacity is determined at the time of initial application, reflecting current usage rather than a past snapshot that may no longer be relevant. If EC 17071.25 is to guide the funding calculation, its full context should be considered. Basing the grant on the conditions at the time of application provides a more accurate and equitable representation of current classroom utilization. Therefore, Los Angeles Unified urges OPSC to adopt a funding methodology that reflects current building usage, aligns with the functional requirements of the replacement building’s design, and remains consistent with the Seismic Mitigation Program approach and the language of EC 17071.25(a).

IMPLEMENTATION OF PROPOSITION 2 FOR THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM

PURPOSE

The purpose of this meeting is to engage with stakeholders regarding the implementation of the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), and to discuss and collect feedback on proposed amendments to the School Facility Program (SFP) Regulations for the following topics:

- Topic 6 – Interim Housing and Natural Disaster Assistance (Attachment A6)
- Topic 7 – Five-Year Master Plan (Attachment A7)
- Topic 8 – Small Size School District Program (Attachment A8)
- Topic 9 – Energy Efficiency Supplemental Grant (Attachment A9)
- Topic 10 – Supplemental Grants for Minimum Essential Facilities (Attachment A10)
- Topic 11 – Transitional Kindergarten Supplemental Grant (Attachment A11)

BACKGROUND

Proposition 2, or Assembly Bill (AB) 247 (Muratsuchi, Chapter 81, Statutes of 2024), the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024, was approved by a majority of California’s voters on November 5, 2024.

The passage of Proposition 2 necessitates modifications to the SFP Regulations to allow school districts to continue submitting eligibility and funding applications to the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) that are adherent to the amended or additional components of Education Code. Related to these statutory changes, OPSC must implement the provisions of AB 247 by amending existing SFP Regulations to adhere to the new statutory requirements.

As a result, OPSC is requesting stakeholder feedback regarding these changes. Each of the topics listed within the Purpose section of this report is broken out into its own attachments for stakeholder reference.

PROPOSED REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR MINIMUM ESSENTIAL FACILITIES MODERNIZATION SUPPLEMENTAL GRANT

PURPOSE

To discuss and receive stakeholder feedback regarding proposed regulatory amendments resulting from Assembly Bill (AB) 247, the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), which was approved by a majority of California's voters on November 5, 2024, related to the School Facility Program (SFP) Modernization Supplemental Grant for Minimum Essential Facilities (MEF).

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A10a.

BACKGROUND

The SFP currently provides funding for MEF through the New Construction program by means of SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a). It is a Use of Grants (UOG) request (not a supplemental grant) that diverts existing New Construction pupil grants from funding the construction of classrooms to instead build MEFs.

Applicants may request to use New Construction grants that exceed the capacity of a project if the project is to construct a multipurpose room (MPR), gymnasium, multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid, and/or library at an existing site that does not have an existing or adequate facility of the type being requested.

The funding for the grant is calculated on a pupil grant basis by multiplying the current California Basic Educational Data System (CBEDS) enrollment for the site, plus the Net School Building Capacity for the proposed project, by the square footage for the type of facility being requested (refer to the square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b)(3)(b) 2. to determine the maximum pupil grant request for the application).

As the UOG request diverts New Construction pupil grants to fund the MEF, the district's New Construction eligibility baseline is adjusted by the pupil grants requested for the added classroom capacity in the project, plus the grants being diverted for the MEF portion of the project.

ATTACHMENT E

With the passage of Proposition 2 on November 25, 2024, a new way to provide MEF funding was added by means of a Modernization supplemental grant.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

Staff has prepared potential options to implement the statutory changes to program eligibility and funding criteria for the Modernization supplemental grant for MEF.

Eligibility Criteria

This grant is a Modernization *only* supplemental grant that may be provided *in addition to* any other funding provided for the application. In order to request the grant, the district must have Modernization eligibility, a valid project, and submit an Approved Application for Modernization funding. This is not a stand-alone grant and can only be requested in addition to a complete application for funding.

Application Submittal Timing

If an application has already been received by OPSC, on or after October 31, 2024, and is on the Workload List or the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority (ARBBA) List but did not request the grant and would like to, districts may do so, provided the existing scope of work in the DSA-approved plans submitted with the original application contains the expansion or construction of an MEF eligible for this supplemental grant. If the scope of work requested in the application does not contain the expansion or construction of an MEF eligible for this supplemental grant, districts may add eligible scope of work to the application and request this supplemental grant, provided that the additional scope of work was approved by the Division of the State Architect (DSA) *prior* to the received date of the funding application. Districts that wish to add eligible scope of work that was approved by DSA *after* the received date of the funding application must withdraw their existing application and resubmit the funding application to OPSC in order to request this supplemental grant.

Reimbursement

Districts may be eligible for reimbursement of projects that include an eligible scope of work specific to this supplemental grant, provided the district executed construction contracts on or after July 3, 2024, in accordance with the effective date of AB 247.

Determining a Minimum Essential Facility

There are four types of eligible facilities for this grant, as identified in statute: MPR, gymnasium, library or school kitchen. In order to be eligible for this supplemental grant, the MEF must meet the requirements of the *California Code of Regulations, Title 5* (Title 5). Permanent or portable construction is allowed.

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STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Districts can utilize this supplemental grant to expand an existing facility or construct a new one. In order to be eligible to expand an existing facility, the facility must be 60 percent or less than the recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the school. Districts may be eligible to construct a new facility if the project's site is lacking one of the eligible facilities.

Hybrid facilities such as a multipurpose/gymnasium or multipurpose/gymnasium/kitchen are eligible to receive this grant. However, sites with an existing multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid are considered to have both an MPR and a gymnasium and therefore are not eligible for a new facility of this type (either MPR or gymnasium). Note that while the site may not be eligible for a new MPR or gymnasium, the district may be able to expand the existing facility if it is determined to be 60 percent or less of the recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the site.

To maintain consistency with existing SFP Regulations, OPSC proposes that elementary schools (K-6) would not be eligible for a gymnasium and would only be eligible for an MPR. Further, an elementary school would not be eligible for a multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid, only an MPR.

Determining the Recommended Facility Size

In order to determine the recommended size of the facility, OPSC proposes to utilize relevant portions of the current square footage chart (excerpts below) from the Facility Hardship Program in SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B) 2.

Facility	Elementary School Pupils	Middle School Pupils	High School Pupils
Multi-Purpose (includes food service)	5.3 sq. ft. per pupil minimum 4,000 sq. ft.	5.3 sq. ft. per pupil minimum 5,000 sq. ft.	6.3 sq. ft. per pupil minimum 8,200 sq. ft.
Gymnasium (includes shower/locker area)	N/A	12.9 sq. ft. per pupil minimum 6,828 sq. ft. maximum 16,000 sq. ft.	15.3 sq. ft. per pupil minimum 8,380 sq. ft. maximum 18,000 sq. ft.
Library/Media Center	2.3 sq. ft. per pupil plus 600 sq. ft., minimum 960 sq. ft.	3.3 sq. ft. per pupil plus 600 sq. ft. minimum 960 sq. ft.	4.3 sq. ft. per pupil plus 600 sq. ft. minimum 960 sq. ft.

For multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid facilities, OPSC proposes to use the square footage recommendations from SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a)(7)(A)(3), which are:

- Middle Schools: 15.2 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 8,056 square feet and a maximum of 18,848 square feet.
- High Schools: 18.6 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 10,193 square feet and a maximum of 21,874 square feet.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

This is the same method currently used to determine the recommended size of a facility for a UOG request to construct an MEF pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a). The chart currently defines the per pupil and minimum square footage amounts for an MPR (including food service), gymnasium and library. The square footage recommendations in this chart utilize space allowances from the Lease Purchase Program (LPP) as a guide.

As the existing chart has the square footage amount for a school kitchen included in the square footage total for an MPR, OPSC proposes utilizing the food service square footage amounts from the LPP Handbook to determine the square footage recommendations for a school kitchen. They are as follows:

- Elementary Schools: 2 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 400 square feet and a maximum of 1,480 square feet.
- Middle Schools: 2 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 400 square feet and a maximum of 1,880 square feet.
- High Schools: 3 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 600 square feet and a maximum of 3,975 square feet.

Conversely, since the chart does not provide the square footage for an MPR-only facility, MPR-only square footage recommendations can be determined by calculating the difference between the recommended square footage for a combined MPR and food service facility and the recommended square footage for only a school kitchen facility. As such, MPR-only recommended square footage is proposed to be as follows:

- Elementary Schools: 3.3 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 3,600 square feet.
- Middle Schools: 3.3 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 4,600 square feet.
- High Schools: 3.3 square feet per pupil with a minimum of 7,600 square feet.

OPSC reviewed Title 5 and found that while Title 5 provides concrete square footage recommendations for instructional spaces, per pupil square footage recommendations for MPR, gymnasium, library and school kitchen facilities were not included.

Determining Enrollment

OPSC will utilize the site's CBEDS enrollment at the time of application processing to determine the recommended size of the facility. The CBEDS year will be determined based on the date of the initial 90-Day Notification of Upcoming Processing. Should the 90-Day window begin before and end after October 31, Districts will have the option of utilizing either CBEDS year.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Supplemental Grant for Only One Project

A site can only request and receive this supplemental grant once per site, pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16(b) (i.e., if a district submitted an application and received the supplemental grant for the construction of a new gymnasium at a site, the district could not request the supplemental grant again on the same or any future application, regardless of whether the site's existing MEF is undersized or nonexistent).

Schools that Span Grade Levels

As mentioned above, elementary schools are not eligible for a gymnasium or a multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid, consistent with current SFP Regulations. However, if the site serves mixed grade levels such as a K-8, it would be eligible for a gymnasium or a multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid. In order to determine the square footage amount in the case of a mixed grade level site, OPSC proposes to use the highest grade level served to determine the square footage amounts, consistent with existing OPSC practices.

Minimum Square Footage Built

OPSC proposes that in order to be eligible for this supplemental grant, the project must build more than 60 percent of the recommended facility size needed to serve the school's enrollment, in order to address the need for an inadequately sized or lacking MEF.

Demolition and Replacement Requirements for New Projects

OPSC proposes that in applications where a site lacks an MEF, the conversion or replacement of space that is not that MEF type would be allowed only if the displaced facilities are rebuilt in the same project. For example, if a site lacks a library, the application may convert existing classrooms into a library provided those displaced classrooms are rebuilt in the same project.

Demolition and Replacement Requirements for Expansion Projects

OPSC proposes that the demolition of an undersized MEF and the replacement of that MEF with an MEF that is more than 60 percent of the recommended size needed to serve the school's enrollment would be considered an expansion of that MEF and considered an allowable use of this supplemental grant.

Existing Sites Constructed Under the SFP

If the enrollment of an existing facility that was previously constructed via a UOG request for an MEF has increased to the point that the facility is deemed to be less than 60 percent of the recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the site, the site could receive the grant to expand the existing facility.

ATTACHMENT E

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Affected Supplemental Grants

The funding for this Modernization supplemental grant would not be increased by any other supplemental grants (i.e. the three percent grant for Access and Fire Life Safety would not be applied to this grant). The only supplemental grant that OPSC proposes to be increased by this supplemental grant is the Geographic Percent Factor supplemental grant (SFP Regulation Section 1859.83(a)).

Funding Methods

The language in Education Code (EC) Section 17073.16 is broad regarding the calculation of the grant. As such, OPSC has developed two options to present to stakeholders for consideration. Both options would be limited to funding the *lesser* of the new space being constructed or the recommended size of the space based on the site's enrollment.

Overview of Funding Options

Option 1

In this scenario, the supplemental grant amount would be calculated using the Permanent/Portable Other and Toilet square foot grant amounts. New projects would be funded based on the lesser of the total size of the new MEF or the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment. Expansion projects would be funded based on the lesser of the delta between the existing MEF space and the total size of the expanded MEF or the delta between the existing MEF space and the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.

ATTACHMENT E

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Option 2

In this scenario, a calculation to determine the maximum pupil grant amount for the facility, similar to the existing UOG for MEF calculation in SFP Regulation 1859.77.3(a)(7), will determine the supplemental grant amount. The Modernization base grant amount will be used in this calculation to determine funding for the new MEF using per-pupil grants. The site's modernization baseline eligibility will not be adjusted because of this grant (beyond the pupil grants requested in Section 2). New projects would be funded based on the lesser of the total size of the new MEF or the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment. Expansion projects would be funded based on the lesser of the delta between the existing MEF space and the total size of the expanded MEF or the delta between the existing MEF space and the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.

Full Description of Funding Options

Option 1

In this scenario, the supplemental grant amount would be calculated using the Permanent/Portable Other and Toilet square foot grant amounts. New projects would be funded based on the lesser of the total size of the new MEF or the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment. Expansion projects would be funded based on the lesser of the delta between the existing MEF space and the total size of the expanded MEF or the delta between the existing MEF space and the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.

- Recommended MEF Size (New Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the recommended MEF size, is summarized as:

Determine the recommended MEF size utilizing the square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b), multiply that recommended MEF size by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot and Permanent/Portable Toilet square foot grant amounts (Toilet space will be funded first), add the Permanent/Portable Other square footage total and the Permanent/Portable Toilet square footage total for the total supplemental grant amount.

- Actual Size of the Facility (New Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the new or expanded facility, is summarized as:

Determine the total square footage of the new or expanded facility, multiply that amount by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot and Permanent/Portable Toilet square foot grant amounts (Toilet space will be funded first), add the Permanent/Portable Other square footage total and the Permanent/Portable Toilet square footage total for the total supplemental grant amount.

- Delta of the Existing MEF Size and the Recommended MEF Size (Expansion Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the delta between the existing MEF size and the recommended MEF size, is summarized as:

Determine the recommended MEF size utilizing the square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b) and verify that the existing MEF square footage is 60 percent or less than the recommended MEF size. Multiply the delta by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot and Permanent/Portable Toilet square foot grant amounts (Toilet space will be funded first), add the Permanent/Portable Other square footage total and the Permanent/Portable Toilet square footage total for the total supplemental grant amount.

- Delta of the Existing MEF Size and the Total Size of the Expanded Facility (Expansion Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the delta between the existing MEF size and the total size of the expanded facility, is summarized as:

Determine the recommended MEF size utilizing the square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b) and verify that the existing MEF square footage is 60 percent or less than the recommended MEF size. Subtract the existing MEF square footage from the total square footage of the expanded facility to determine the delta, which is the amount eligible to be funded. Multiply the delta by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot and Permanent/Portable Toilet square foot grant amounts (Toilet space will be funded first), add the Permanent/Portable Other square footage total and the Permanent/Portable Toilet square footage total for the total supplemental grant amount.

Option 1 Considerations

- By basing the funding on the Permanent/Portable Other and Toilet square footage that is being built, it considers the actual type of space built when determining the supplemental grant amount.
- When a new project is funded based on the lesser of the size of the new facility and the recommended square footage, the grant only funds *up to* what is recommended.

- By considering the existing MEF space in an expansion project, the supplemental grant would not fund any work done to the existing space. Only the lesser of the new square footage being built or the delta between the existing and the recommended square footage would be funded.
- Funding within the program is made more consistent by partially aligning how MEF spaces are funded with how the Facility Hardship Replacement and Charter Rehabilitation programs are funded.
- This option differs from how existing MEF (New Construction) UOG applications are currently funded. Existing UOG MEF applications are funded by using a calculation to determine the appropriate number of pupil grants to fund the MEF space and funding is determined by using per pupil grant amounts. Instead, this method would fund using square footage grant amounts based on Permanent/Portable Toilet and Other square footage.

Option 2

In this scenario, a calculation to determine the maximum pupil grant amount for the facility, similar to the existing UOG for MEF calculation in SFP Regulation 1859.77.3(a)(7), will determine the supplemental grant amount. The Modernization base grant amount will be used in this calculation to determine funding for the new MEF using per-pupil grants. The site's modernization baseline eligibility will not be adjusted because of this grant (beyond the pupil grants requested in Section 2). New projects would be funded based on the lesser of the total size of the new MEF or the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment. Expansion projects would be funded based on the lesser of the delta between the existing MEF space and the total size of the expanded MEF or the delta between the existing MEF space and the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.

- Recommended Size (New Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the recommended MEF size, is summarized as:

Determine the recommended MEF size utilizing the square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b). Multiply that recommended MEF size by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot grant amount. Divide that product by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type. Round up. That number is the maximum pupil amount for the facility. The supplemental grant

amount is the maximum pupil amount for the facility multiplied by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project.

- Actual Size of the Facility (New Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the square footage of the new facility, is summarized as:

Determine the square footage of the new facility. Multiply that amount by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot grant amount. Divide that product by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type. Round up. That number is the maximum pupil amount for the facility. The supplemental grant amount is the maximum pupil amount for the facility multiplied by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project.

- Delta of the Existing MEF Size and the Recommended MEF Size (Expansion Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the delta between the existing MEF size and the recommended MEF size, is summarized as:

Determine the recommended MEF size utilizing the square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b) and verify that the existing MEF square footage is 60 percent or less than the recommended MEF size. Subtract the existing MEF square footage from the recommended MEF square footage to determine the delta, which is the square footage eligible to be funded. Multiply the delta by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot grant amount. Divide that product by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type. Round up. That number is the maximum pupil amount for the facility. The supplemental grant amount is the maximum pupil amount for the facility multiplied by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project.

- Delta of the Existing MEF Size and the Total Size of the Expanded Facility (Expansion Projects)
 - The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount, when the lesser of the two is the delta between the existing MEF size and the expanded facility, is summarized as:

Determine the recommended MEF size utilizing the square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b) and verify that the existing MEF square footage is 60 percent or less than the recommended MEF size. Subtract the existing MEF square footage from the square footage of the expanded facility to determine the delta, which is the square footage eligible to be funded. Multiply the delta by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot grant amount. Divide that product by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type. Round up. That number is the maximum pupil amount for the facility. The supplemental grant amount is the maximum pupil amount for the facility multiplied by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project.

Option 2 Considerations

- This option is most similar to how the existing UOG MEF (New Construction) grant is currently funded, with the main difference being that this option utilizes Modernization base grant amounts to determine funding instead of New Construction base grant amounts.
- This option does not differentiate between Other and Toilet square footage being built but instead focuses on total square footage. All Permanent space is funded at the same amount and all Portable space is funded at the same amount.
- By considering the existing MEF space in an expansion project, only the new square footage being built (not to exceed the recommended) is funded. Only the lesser of the new square footage being built or the delta between the existing and the recommended square footage would be funded.

Education Code (EC) Section 17070.35 – General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare.

Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.2. Definitions.

“Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid” means a single facility that is comprised of both a multipurpose room and a gymnasium that share common space for purposes of Section 1859.77.3. The facility must be identified as a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid by the California Department of Education.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3. Use of New Construction Grant Funds for Projects Accepted by the DSA after January 22, 2003.

New Construction Grant funds and any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Section 17072.35; and may also be utilized for the cost incurred by the district for the development and implementation of remedial action plan approved by the DTSC pursuant to Education Code Section 17213.

Authorization for use of New Construction Grants for which the final plans and specifications for the project were accepted by the DSA after January 22, 2003 may be requested as follows:

- (a) A district may request new construction grants that exceed the capacity of the project based on loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2) and any loading standards adopted by the SAB by these regulations if the project is to construct a multipurpose, gymnasium, Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid, and/or library, or for an Alternative Education school to construct a multipurpose/gymnasium, library, counseling offices, and/or conference rooms, at an existing site that does not have an existing or adequate facility of the type being requested when all of the following is met:
- (1) The district must adopt a school board resolution that has been discussed at a public hearing at a regularly scheduled meeting of the district's governing board on a date preceding the application filing that includes the following:
 - (A) An acknowledgement that funds for the purposes of housing the excess pupils are being diverted to another project.
 - (B) An acknowledgement that the State has satisfied its obligation, pursuant to Section 1859.50, to house the pupils receiving grants in the project.
 - (C) A plan outlined in the resolution that identifies how the district has housed or will house the pupils receiving grants in the project in school buildings as defined in Education Code Section 17368. The plan must certify one of the following methods:
 1. The district will construct or acquire facilities for housing the pupils with funding not otherwise available to the SFP as a district match within five years of project approval by the SAB, and the district must identify the source of the funds; or
 2. The district will utilize higher district loading standards providing the loading standards are within the approved district's teacher contract and do not exceed 33:1 per classroom.
 - (2) The existing school site was not constructed under the SFP.
 - (3) The proposed project includes no more than eight classrooms.
 - (4) Grants requests, above 100 percent of the number of pupils to be housed, based on Special Day Class pupil eligibility are only permitted under this subsection (a) when building a Special Day Class facility.

(5) For purposes of this Section, a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid is considered to be both a multipurpose and a gymnasium. A school site with a middle school and/or high school pupils is eligible for one multipurpose and one gymnasium; therefore, if a school site has an adequate multipurpose and an adequate gymnasium, it is not eligible for a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid under this Section.

(6) For purposes of this section to determine if an existing facility is inadequate, the existing square footage is less than 60 percent of the square footage necessary for the current CBEDS for the site plus the Net School Building Capacity of the proposed project as calculated pursuant to Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2., except for Alternative Education Schools. For Alternative Education Schools, refer to the following:

Additionally, these spaces will not count as available capacity for purposes of providing funding in this section when calculating space available to house displaced pupils.

d. Any space not in the chart below will be provided based on the Square Footage replaced. This may include, but is not limited to, janitor's closets, hallways, and vestibules.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.83. Excessive Cost Hardship Grant.

In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, a district is eligible for funding as a result of unusual circumstances that created excessive project costs beyond the control of the district. The Excessive Cost Hardship Grant shall be based on any of the following:

(a) Excessive Cost due to Geographic Location.

A district with a project that is located in a geographic area designated in the Geographic Percentage Chart below is eligible for the sum of the Excessive Cost Hardship Grant(s) determined by multiplying the indicated percentage factor shown in the Geographic Percentage Chart below by each of the following amounts:

(1) The New Construction Grant and the Modernization Grant.

(2) The funding provided by Sections 1859.71.2, 1859.71.3, 1859.72, 1859.73, 1859.73.2, 1859.76(d)(1) and (2), 1859.78.4, 1859.78.5, 1859.82.1, 1859.82.2, 1859.83(b), (c), (d) and (e) and 1859.125(a)(1) through (a)(2).

Applications Received on or after October 31, 2024

EC Section 17073.16 – Modernization Eligibility Determination

(a) A school district eligible for funding pursuant to this article may receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(1) Expanding an existing gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen, if the facility is 60 percent or less than the department's recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the school.

(2) Constructing a new gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen if the site is lacking one or more of the specified facilities.

(b) A site may receive a supplemental grant for only one project described in subdivision (a).

...

(d) The funding provided under this section shall be in addition to any other funding provided pursuant to this article.

(e) The board, in consultation with the Superintendent, shall develop regulations implementing this section.

PROPOSED REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM SUPPLEMENTAL GRANT FOR TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN CLASSROOMS

PURPOSE

To discuss and receive stakeholder input regarding proposed regulatory amendments resulting from provisions of Proposition 2, related to the establishment of a new supplemental grant for the retrofit or new construction of transitional kindergarten classrooms for school districts receiving an apportionment for modernization funding.

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17073.16 states in part:

(c) (1) A school district eligible for a modernization apportionment may also receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(A) Retrofitting an existing school facility to adequately house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(B) Constructing new transitional kindergarten classrooms if the site is lacking sufficient school facilities to house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(2) A school district that receives a supplemental grant to house transitional kindergarten pupils pursuant to paragraph (1) shall meet the requirements of subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (5) of subdivision (b) of, paragraphs (2) and (3) of subdivision (f) of, and subdivision (g) of, Section 17375.

See Attachment A11a for the remainder of the Authority.

BACKGROUND

In July 2021, Assembly Bill 130 expanded the existing Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (FDK Program) to include preschool and transitional kindergarten. The last apportionments for those funds were approved in June 2024. A new opportunity for districts seeking funding for transitional kindergarten facilities was approved through AB 247 (Muratsuchi, Chapter 81, Statutes of 2024).

On November 5, a majority of California's voters approved Proposition 2, which implements the provisions of AB 247 (Muratsuchi, Chapter 81, Statutes of 2024). Among the provisions of Proposition 2, EC Section 17073.16 has been added and establishes three new supplemental grants for School Facility Program (SFP) Modernization funding applications. One of these provides funding for the retrofit of existing school facilities or new construction of a transitional kindergarten classroom(s) for school districts receiving an apportionment for modernization funding.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

The passage of Proposition 2 necessitates modifications to the SFP Regulations to allow school districts to submit funding applications that allow for the inclusion of transitional kindergarten supplemental grants, as referenced in the amended EC. The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) is asking for stakeholder feedback on proposed implementation, pursuant to the new EC Section 17073.16.

Supplemental Grant for Retrofit and New Construction of Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms – EC Section 17073.16(c) through (e)

With the passage of Proposition 2, Section 17073.16(c) through (e) was added to the EC to provide a supplemental grant to build new or retrofit existing school facilities to house transitional kindergarten pupils. This grant is a modernization *only* supplemental grant that will be provided *in addition to* any other funding provided for the application. In order to request the grant, the district must first have modernization eligibility, a valid project that has modernization scope of work that is in addition to the transitional kindergarten portion of the project and must submit an application for modernization funding. This is not a stand-alone grant and can only be requested in addition to an otherwise complete application for funding.

OPSC notes that although the referenced subdivisions in EC Section 17375 refer to preschool classrooms, the supplemental grant provided in EC Section 17073.16(c) is limited to providing funding for transitional kindergarten classrooms. The references to EC Section 17375 strictly pertain to eligibility requirements to receive the supplemental grant. However, pursuant to amendments in EC Sections 17072.35(b) and 17074.25(b), a district is not precluded from using a new construction or modernization base grant to support the construction of preschool classrooms. This new eligible use of new construction and modernization base grant funding was addressed as part of the January 30, 2025, stakeholder meeting discussing all new eligible uses of SFP funding.

Qualifying Criteria for Funding

Based on OPSC staff's initial review of the new statute, the qualifying criteria described below would apply to projects requesting the additional grant to construct new transitional kindergarten classrooms or retrofit existing classrooms to house transitional kindergarten pupils.

Application Submittal Timing

Applications on the Workload List or Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority (ARBBA) List, received by OPSC on or after October 31, 2024, may request the supplemental grant, provided the existing scope of work in the approved plan set includes the retrofit or construction of a transitional kindergarten classroom(s) that is eligible for this supplemental grant. Districts may add eligible scope of work to the application and request this supplemental grant, provided that the additional scope of work was approved by the Division of the State Architect (DSA) *prior* to the received date of the funding application. Districts that wish to add eligible scope of

work that was approved by DSA *after* the received date of the funding application must withdraw their existing application and resubmit the funding application to OPSC in order to request this supplemental grant. Additionally, the California Department of Education (CDE) approval letter submitted with any *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 50-04) on or after October 31, 2024, must include the work eligible for the transitional kindergarten supplemental grants requested.

Reimbursement

Districts may be eligible for reimbursement of the new supplemental grant for projects that include an eligible scope of work, provided the district executed construction contracts on or after July 3, 2024, in accordance with the effective date of AB 247.

Portable Classrooms

EC Section 17073.16(c)(2) cites EC Section 17375(f)(3), which specifies that a school district shall not use funds to purchase or install portable classrooms. Therefore, portable classrooms are not eligible to be purchased when constructing new transitional kindergarten classrooms nor when replacing existing classrooms as part of a retrofit project.

Adjustments for New Capacity

The FDK Program provided an exclusion for new classrooms constructed with program funds in that the new capacity was not included in the New Construction baseline. However, SFP regulations require an adjustment to the district's new construction baseline if new transitional kindergarten classrooms are constructed with funding from the new supplemental grant, as they are not specifically exempted in the way new transitional kindergarten classrooms were in the FDK Program. The new classrooms would also be included in the gross classroom inventory for purposes of establishing New Construction eligibility.

Title 5 Requirements

EC Section 17073.16 (c)(2) states that districts receiving a supplemental grant to house transitional kindergarten shall meet several requirements outlined in EC Section 17375(g). Chief among them is the provision that districts receiving a supplemental transitional kindergarten grant must construct or retrofit facilities that result in Title 5-compliant classrooms. Key requirements for Title 5 include, but are not limited to:

- Kindergarten classroom size for permanent structures is not less than 1,350 square feet, including restrooms, storage, teacher preparation, wet and dry areas.
- Kindergarten classrooms are designed to allow supervision of play yards (unless prevented by site shape or size) and all areas of the classroom.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

- Play yard design provides a variety of activities for development of large motor skills.
- Classrooms are located close to parent drop-off and bus loading areas.
- Storage, casework, and learning stations are functionally designed for use in free play and structured activities, e.g., shelves are deep and open for frequent use of manipulative materials.
- Windows, marking boards, sinks, drinking fountains, and furniture are appropriate heights for kindergarten-age students.
- Restrooms are self-contained within the classroom or within the kindergarten complex.

Eligibility Determination for the Transitional Kindergarten Supplemental Grant

Lacking Sufficient School Facilities to House Transitional Kindergarten Pupils

EC Section 17073.16(c)(2) requires school district to meet the requirements of EC Section 17375(b)(5)(A) to determine program eligibility. This section directs districts to provide the enrollment data for the year in which its application is processed and the three immediately preceding years. This data, in addition to a review conducted by CDE, will be used to determine the school site's need for transitional kindergarten classrooms and their eligibility for the supplemental grant. Districts would be instructed to provide the appropriate enrollment documents as part of the 90-Day Notification of Upcoming Application Processing. The eligibility review process for the supplemental grant would mirror that of Program applications submitted during the Third and Fourth filing rounds of the FDK program.

Pursuant to EC Section 17375(b)(5)(A), part of the verification process will also include consulting with CDE to determine if an application should be limited to a retrofit project. Additionally, OPSC in partnership with CDE, will conduct site reviews for any classrooms onsite originally designed to house kindergarten pupils. Kindergarten classrooms determined to have met Title 5 requirements at the time of construction will be counted towards the total usable kindergarten classrooms onsite.

A project site will be considered lacking transitional kindergarten facilities if the projected transitional kindergarten enrollment at the site exceeds the kindergarten classroom capacity at the site using the SFP loading standard of 25 (K-6) pupils per classroom. For purposes of determining existing classroom capacity, districts will specify if they intend to operate full or part-day transitional kindergarten/kindergarten programming.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Options for Calculating the Grant

Statute does not stipulate how funding shall be calculated for the transitional kindergarten supplemental grant. Therefore, OPSC is currently contemplating various options for calculating funding for this supplemental grant.

Option 1: Square Footage-Funding

Funding could be calculated based on a square footage grant. The total allowable square footage would meet the minimum Title 5 requirements for transitional kindergarten classrooms following the current funding model for the replacement of facilities under the Facility Hardship/Seismic Mitigation Programs. There are established grant amounts for Other and Toilet square footage.

Considerations:

- This method would limit funding to the confines of the enclosed classroom space.
- Does not account for playground, path of travel, or pick-up drop-off work that is typically required for Title 5 compliance.

Option 2: FDK Funding Model

Funding could be calculated following the funding model for classrooms funded through the FDK Program. The equivalent of 25 New Construction pupil grants is provided for new transitional kindergarten classrooms. The equivalent of 25 Modernization pupil grants is provided to retrofit existing classrooms. In addition, this supplemental grant could potentially include other FDK Program and SFP supplemental grants as applicable to the project scope.

Considerations:

- Maintains consistent methodology used by the FDK Program to construct or retrofit new, Title 5-compliant classrooms.
- This supplemental grant could exceed the Modernization base grant that it is supplementing.
- District providing new or retrofitted transitional kindergarten classrooms could add additional supplemental grants to the transitional kindergarten portion of the Modernization project. See the chart below for additional grants.
- Determining how to apply a new construction grant into the 60/40 State/District funding share concept for Modernization applications would be necessary.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)*Option 3: Percentage-Based Funding*

Funding could be based on the percentage of the value of the Modernization per-pupil grants requested. This method is similar to other Modernization supplemental grants.

Consideration:

- Depending on the number of Modernization pupil grants, this method may not provide adequate grants or may provide excessive grants, to retrofit or construct the facilities in the project.

Supplementing the Transitional Kindergarten Supplemental Grant

For each of the options presented above, OPSC is also continuing to evaluate the applicability of the other Modernization program supplemental grants to determine which grants can be considered on top of the transitional kindergarten supplemental grant. OPSC will bring those findings back to the next stakeholder meeting. Below are some initial concepts regarding which projects may be eligible for existing supplemental grants to augment the transitional kindergarten supplemental grant.

Education Code (EC) 17070.35 – General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare.

Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

EC Section 17375 – Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program

(a)(1) The California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program is hereby established, under the administration of the State Allocation Board pursuant to the requirements of this section, to provide one-time grants to school districts to construct new school facilities or retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of providing transitional kindergarten classrooms and full-day kindergarten classrooms

pursuant to Section 8973, and for the construction of new preschool classrooms, the modernization of existing preschool classrooms, or the modernization of existing kindergarten and grade 1 to 12, inclusive, classrooms that would be converted to provide California state preschool programs operated by school districts on a public schoolsite, pursuant to this section.

(2) Moneys appropriated pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, hereby created in the State Treasury, administered by the State Allocation Board.

(3) For the 2018–19 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section, as it read on December 31, 2020.

(4) (A) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of four hundred ninety million dollars (\$490,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section. The funds appropriated in this subparagraph shall be available for encumbrance or expenditure by the State Allocation Board until June 30, 2027.

(B) For the 2022–23 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the 2021–22 fiscal year to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section. The funds appropriated in this subparagraph shall be available for encumbrance or expenditure by the State Allocation Board until June 30, 2028.

(C) (i) Of the moneys allocated to a school district from the appropriation made pursuant to this paragraph, savings and interest achieved upon full completion of an approved project, and as a result of a school district's efficient and prudent expenditure of the moneys allocated, may be used for professional development or instructional materials to build capacity for the implementation of a California state preschool program, a transitional kindergarten program, a full-day kindergarten program, or high priority capital outlay purposes identified by the school district and in accordance with subdivision (f), associated regulations, and any accompanying grant agreement.

(ii) Notwithstanding any other law, for purposes of the funds appropriated in support of this paragraph only, a school district may retain and use savings and interest pursuant to clause (i) even if it receives financial hardship assistance pursuant to Section 17075.10.

(iii) Savings and interest retained by a school district shall be expended within one year of project completion or returned to the state as required by associated regulations and any accompanying grant agreement.

(5) New school facilities built pursuant to this section shall not be included in the eligibility determination used for purposes of the Leroy F. Greene School

Facilities Act of 1998 (Chapter 12.5 (commencing with Section 17070.10) of Part 10).

(b) (1) The State Allocation Board shall award grants to school districts that lack the facilities to provide transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten as required for eligibility pursuant to Sections 17071.25 and 17072.10, that lack facilities that satisfy the design requirements required for new kindergarten classrooms as specified in paragraph (2) of subdivision (h) of Section 14030 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations, or that lack the facility capacity to increase California state preschool program services.

(2) Priority for grants shall be given to school districts that meet either of the following criteria:

(A) The school district is financially unable to contribute a portion of, or all of, the local matching share required pursuant to paragraph (3) for a project, and meets the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Sections 17075.10 and 17075.15. For purposes of this section, paragraph (5) of subdivision (d) of Section 17075.15 shall not apply.

(B) (i) For school districts seeking a transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten facilities grant, the school district is located in an underserved community with a high population of pupils who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 42238.01.

(ii) For school districts seeking a preschool facilities grant, the school district is located in an underserved area, as defined in Section 8205, that is prioritized to receive funds for the California state preschool program according to the prioritization process described in Section 8210.

(3) Except for school districts that meet the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10 and as specified in paragraph (4), a school district that applies for a grant pursuant to this section for new construction shall provide 50 percent of the cost of the project, and a school district that applies for a grant pursuant to this section for a retrofit project shall provide 40 percent of the cost of the project.

(4) Except for school districts that meet the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10, a school district shall provide 25 percent of the cost of the project, whether the project is for new construction or retrofit, if the school district does either of the following:

(A) Converts a part-day kindergarten program to a full-day kindergarten program. A school district that was awarded a grant from funds appropriated pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (a) and met the requirements of this paragraph shall have its grant amount adjusted from funds appropriated pursuant to paragraph (4) of subdivision (a) to reflect the requirements of this paragraph.

(B) Commencing with the 2021–22 fiscal year, offers, or expands enrollment in, a California state preschool program or transitional kindergarten program.

ATTACHMENT E

AUTHORITY All Applications (cont.)

(5) (A) A school district seeking a transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten facilities grant from moneys in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account shall provide the Office of Public School Construction with schoolsite enrollment data for the year in which its application is processed and the three immediately preceding years. The Office of Public School Construction shall use this data to verify the schoolsite's overall need for funding pursuant to this section based on the schoolsite's enrollment patterns. As part of this verification, the Office of Public School Construction, in consultation with the State Department of Education, shall determine if the schoolsite's need for funding shall be limited to retrofit projects.

(B) For a school district seeking a new construction grant for preschool classrooms from moneys in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, the school district shall demonstrate that its existing classrooms, including outdoor play areas and equipment, are insufficient to meet the needs of providing preschool, and that the school district's projected enrollment in the preschool program exceeds the current preschool program classroom capacity at the applicable schoolsite. A school district shall use both of the following to demonstrate enrollment for purposes of determining eligibility:

(i) The most recent childcare needs assessment conducted by its regional local planning council for preschool age children.

(ii) A current or future contract with the State Department of Education to operate a preschool program.

(6) A school district, county office of education, or community college district seeking a preschool facilities grant shall hold title to the real property where the facilities will be located.

(c) The State Allocation Board shall disburse grant funds to school districts with approved applications for new construction or retrofit projects, to the extent funds are available for the state's applicable matching share, if the school district has provided its applicable local matching share, unless the school district meets the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10, and upon certification by the school district that the school district has entered into a binding contract for completion of the approved project.

(d) The State Allocation Board shall allocate funds to school districts using the same maximum grant eligibility amounts that are used for purposes of the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (Chapter 12.5 (commencing with Section 17070.10) of Part 10), as set forth in Sections 17072.10 and 17072.11 for new construction, and as set forth in Section 17074.10 for retrofit projects.

(e) As a condition of receiving grant funds pursuant to this section, and before the release of those funds, the school district shall do all of the following:

(1) Execute and submit a grant agreement consistent with the applicable sections of the grant agreement specified in Section 1859.90.4 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations.

(2) For a school district applying for grant funds for a transitional kindergarten facilities project, pass a resolution at a public meeting of the governing board of the school district stating the school district's intent to offer, or expand enrollment in, a transitional kindergarten program.

(3) For a school district applying for grant funds for a California state preschool program facilities project, pass a resolution at a public meeting of the governing board of the school district stating the school district's intent to expand enrollment in a preschool program and apply for expanded program service funding, and certify that the school district has or will apply for a contract to operate a preschool program before occupying the to-be-constructed or retrofitted facility.

(f) (1) A school district may use grant funds awarded for new construction on costs necessary to adequately house preschool, transitional kindergarten, and kindergarten pupils in an approved project, which shall include only the following:

(A) The costs of design, engineering, testing, inspections, plan checking, construction management, site acquisition and development, evaluation and response action costs relating to hazardous substances at a new or existing schoolsite, demolition, construction, landscaping, necessary utility costs, utility connections and other related fees, equipment including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, furnishings, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

(B) The costs of acquiring an existing government-owned or privately owned building, or a privately financed school building, and the necessary costs of converting the government-owned or privately owned building for public school use.

(2) (A) A school district may use grant funds awarded for a retrofit project to retrofit an existing school facility to adequately house preschool, transitional kindergarten, and kindergarten pupils, which shall only include the costs of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other related fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, furniture and equipment, including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, playground safety improvements, the identification, assessment, or abatement of hazardous asbestos, seismic safety improvements, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

(B) Grant funds awarded for a retrofit project shall not be used for costs associated with acquisition and development of real property or for routine maintenance and repair.

(3) A school district shall not use funds to purchase or install portable classrooms. For purposes of this article, "portable classroom" means a classroom building of one or more stories that is designed and constructed to be relocatable and transportable over public streets, and for a single-story portable classroom, is designed and constructed for relocation without the separation of the roof or floor from the building and when measured at the most exterior walls, has a floor area that does not exceed 2,000 square feet.

(g) For a modernization grant pursuant to this article to retrofit an existing preschool classroom, including outdoor play areas and installed equipment, the applicable classroom shall comply with all of the following:

(1) The Field Act, as set forth in Article 3 (commencing with Section 17280) and Article 6 (commencing with Section 17365).

(2) The California Building Standards Code, as set forth in Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations.

(3) The regulations for early learning and care programs as set forth in Chapter 19 (commencing with Section 18000) of Division 1 of Title 5 of, and Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 101151) of Division 12 of Title 22 of, the California Code of Regulations, as applicable.

(4) Written approval from the State Department of Education that the building plans comply with the standards set forth in Subchapter 1 (commencing with Section 14001) of Chapter 13 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations.

(h) The State Allocation Board may adopt regulations to implement this section. Any regulations adopted pursuant to this section may be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of the Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of these regulations shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare.

(i) Notwithstanding any other law, a school district shall be subject, with regard to this section, to an audit conducted pursuant to Section 41024.

(j) The Office of Public School Construction shall report to the Director of Finance, and shall post on its internet website, information regarding the use of grant funds that have been made available to school districts during each fiscal year grant funds are disbursed pursuant to this section. A final report shall also be issued after projects have been audited pursuant to Section 41024 and any savings have been spent or returned to the state.

(k) The Department of General Services may charge its administrative costs against the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day

Kindergarten Facilities Account, which shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Finance and which shall not exceed 2.5 percent of the account. These administrative funds shall be subject to the encumbrance or expenditure availability for the appropriations described in paragraph (4) of subdivision (a).

(l) Funds made available to school districts pursuant to this article shall supplement, not supplant, existing funds available for school facilities construction.

(m) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:

(1) "Kindergarten" includes transitional kindergarten, as defined in Section 48000.

(2) "Preschool classroom" means a preschool classroom used or proposed to be used for instructional purposes in a California state preschool program.

(3) "Preschool program" means a full-day California state preschool program pursuant to Article 2 (commencing with Section 8207) of Chapter 2 of Part 6.

(4) "Schoolsite" or "site" means the project site for which the school district is applying for grants under this article.

(5) "School district" means as follows:

(A) For transitional kindergarten and full-day kindergarten facilities grants, "school district" means a school district.

(B) For preschool facilities grants, "school district" means a school district, county office of education, or a community college district that operates a preschool program on behalf of, or in lieu of, a school district or county office of education.

(Amended by Stats. 2024, Ch. 38, Sec. 8. (SB 153) Effective June 29, 2024.)

School Facility Program Regulation Section 1859.51. Adjustments to the New Construction Baseline Eligibility.

The baseline eligibility for new construction determined on the Form SAB 50-03 will be adjusted as follows:

(a) Reduced by the number of pupils provided grants in a new construction SFP project and by the number of pupils that received a Preliminary Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.140 or a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.162.2.

(b) Reduced by the number of pupils housed, based on the loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2)(A), in a new construction LPP project funded under the provisions of the LPP pursuant to Sections 1859.12 or 1859.13.

(c) Reduced by the number of pupils housed in additional classrooms constructed or purchased based on the loading standards, pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2)(A), in a modernization SFP project.

EC Section 17072.35 – New Construction Funding Process

(a) A grant for new construction may be used for any and all costs necessary to adequately house new pupils in any approved project, and those costs may only include the cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, site acquisition and development, evaluation and response action costs relating to hazardous substances at a new or existing schoolsite, demolition, construction, acquisition and installation of portable classrooms, landscaping, necessary utility costs, utility connections and other fees, equipment including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, furnishings, and the upgrading of electrical systems or the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology, including schoolsite-based infrastructure necessary to provide access to broadband internet within the schoolsite. A grant for new construction may also be used to acquire an existing government or privately owned building, or a privately financed school building, and for the necessary costs of converting the government or privately owned building for public school use. A grant for new construction may also be used for the costs of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high performance schools. A grant for new construction may be used for the costs of design, materials, and construction to advance state energy goals pursuant to state law, support outdoor learning environments, or to directly shade and protect pupils from higher average temperatures, which may include incorporating nature and natural materials. A grant for new construction may be used for seismic mitigation purposes and for related design, study, and testing costs.

(b) This section does not preclude a school district from using a grant for new construction to support the construction of a school kitchen, a transitional kindergarten classroom, a facility to support a local educational agency-administered preschool program, including, but not limited to, a California state preschool program set forth in Article 2 (commencing with Section 8207) of Chapter 2 of Part 6, that is operated by a school district and located on a schoolsite operated by the district, or a facility to support school nurses and counselors to increase access to health care and mental health services.

(c) In developing guidelines and regulations for consideration by the board, the State Department of Education shall provide a school district with maximum flexibility in the design and new construction of school facilities.

EC Section 17073.16 – Modernization Eligibility Determination

(a) A school district eligible for funding pursuant to this article may receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(1) Expanding an existing gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen, if the facility is 60 percent or less than the department's recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the school.

(2) Constructing a new gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen if the site is lacking one or more of the specified facilities.

(b) A site may receive a supplemental grant for only one project described in subdivision (a).

(c) (1) A school district eligible for a modernization apportionment may also receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(A) Retrofitting an existing school facility to adequately house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(B) Constructing new transitional kindergarten classrooms if the site is lacking sufficient school facilities to house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(2) A school district that receives a supplemental grant to house transitional kindergarten pupils pursuant to paragraph (1) shall meet the requirements of subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (5) of subdivision (b) of, paragraphs (2) and (3) of subdivision (f) of, and subdivision (g) of, Section 17375.

(d) The funding provided under this section shall be in addition to any other funding provided pursuant to this article.

(e) The board, in consultation with the Superintendent, shall develop regulations implementing this section.

(Added by Stats. 2024, Ch. 81, Sec. 13. (AB 247) Effective July 3, 2024. Operative November 6, 2024, pursuant to Sec. 30 of Ch. 81.)

EC Section 17074.25 – Modernization Apportionment

(a) (1) A modernization apportionment may be used for an improvement to extend the useful life of, or to enhance the physical environment of, the school. The improvement may only include the cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, the replacement of portable classrooms, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, furniture and equipment, including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, playground safety improvements, the identification, assessment, or abatement of hazardous asbestos, seismic safety improvements, and the upgrading of electrical systems or the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology, including schoolsite-based infrastructure necessary to provide access to broadband internet within the schoolsite. modernization apportionment may be used for the costs of design, materials, demolition, and construction to advance state energy goals pursuant to state law, support outdoor learning environments, or to directly shade and protect pupils from higher average temperatures, which may include incorporating nature and natural materials. A modernization grant may not be used for costs associated with acquisition and development of real property or for routine maintenance and repair.

(2) A modernization apportionment may also be used for any of the following:

(A) The cost of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high-performance schools.

(B) Seismic mitigation purposes and related design, study, and testing costs.

(C) To remediate any water outlet used for drinking or preparing food with lead levels in excess of 15 parts per billion.

(D) The control, management, or abatement of lead.

(b) This section shall not preclude a school district from using a grant for modernization to support the modernization of a school kitchen, a transitional kindergarten classroom, a facility to support a local educational agency-administered preschool program, including, but not limited to, a California state preschool program set forth in Article 2 (commencing with Section 8207) of Chapter 2 of Part 6, that is operated by a school district and located on a schoolsite operated by the district, or a facility to support school nurses and counselors to increase access to health care and mental health services.

(c) (1) A modernization apportionment may be used to limit pupil exposure to harmful air pollutants by updating air filtration systems.

(2) (A) This subdivision is declaratory of existing law.

(B) It is the intent of the Legislature in enacting Chapter 714 of the Statutes of 2018 (Assembly Bill 2453 of the 2017–18 Regular Session) to encourage school districts to add air filtration systems to applications for modernization apportionments when air pollution occasionally or regularly exceeds levels known to be harmful to public health.

(d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this article, a school district that is apportioned funds pursuant to Section 17073.16 shall use the supplemental grant for expanding an existing, or constructing a new, gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen.

(e) In developing guidelines and regulations for consideration by the board, the department, in consultation with the State Department of Education, shall provide a school district with maximum flexibility in the design and modernization of school facilities.

To Whom it May Concern:

Hancock Park & DeLong, Inc. appreciates the opportunity to continue providing feedback regarding the topics presented during the second Proposition 2 Implementation meeting held on February 13, 2025. Below is a summary of our comments and concerns:

- **Topic 6 – Interim Housing and Natural Disaster Assistance**

- We appreciate OPSC recognizing that the costs for interim housing assistance reimbursement may create barriers for some school districts. Is it possible to create a standard classroom-based emergency interim housing grant, similar to a design grant or a preliminary grant, that could be adjusted for a construction or “final” apportionment after additional information is provided and other government or insurance assistance is considered?

- **Topic 7 – Five-Year Master Plan**

- We encourage OPSC to reconsider the costs of developing a facility master plan (FMP) as an eligible project expenditure. The costs to prepare a master plan range from tens of thousands of dollars to several hundreds of thousands of dollars. There does not appear to be a mechanism to provide funding for the preparation of an FMP, so to also disallow the expense as an allowable project expenditure creates an even larger hurdle for school districts and could be characterized as an unfunded mandate for participation in the School Facility Program (SFP).
- We encourage OPSC to consider allowing an FMP to be valid for a full five years after school district board approval and then allowing 5-year updates to the FMP thereafter. A well-developed FMP can take anywhere from a few months up to a year (or beyond) for a district to prepare, and often includes significant community and stakeholder input, so requiring a school district to update the FMP annually is overly burdensome and unnecessary. Furthermore, small school districts are less likely to have the funding, staff or resources necessary to prepare annual updates, which will likely limit their ability to participate in the SFP if this becomes a requirement.

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- **Topic 8 – Small Size School District Program**

- We request that OPSC provide clarification on how pupils are to be counted for the Small Size School District program, within the *Enrollment Certification/ Projection* (SAB Form 50-01) instructions. The instructions seem to have conflicting direction on when to include enrollment if students are both “receiving non-classroom-based instruction” and “attending independent study”. Many (or most) independent study programs do not have students attending physical classrooms 100 percent of the school day, and are considered “non-classroom-based”, however they do still have the need for a certain number of classrooms.
- For certain small-to-medium sized districts, including the below charter school students may mean the difference between being above or below the 2,500 pupil cut-off to be a small school district:
SAB Form 50-01 instructions – Include: “Students receiving Classroom-Based Instruction in Charter Schools located within the district boundaries and are enrolled in the same grade levels or type served by the district regardless if the district chartered the school.” This may be a rare occurrence, but it would be unfortunate if a district was not able to participate in the program due to a factor that is largely out of their control.

- **Topic 9 – Energy Efficiency Supplemental Grant**

- **Topic 10 – Supplemental Grants for Minimum Essential Facilities**

- **Topic 11 – Transitional Kindergarten (TK) Supplemental Grant**

- We request that districts be able to utilize contracts signed *prior to* July 3, 2024 to justify projects under this program. This program is essentially taking the place of the CA Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, Full Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (CAPSTKFDKFGP), with the same intent, and we believe that districts who anticipated being able to participate in the CAPSTKFDKFGP should not be excluded from requesting the TK supplemental grant.

We request the following bridging technologies be included in the “Energy Efficiency Components” as listed in the amended EC 17077.35 (b).

- HVAC - Thermal Energy Storage.
- Electric Hybrid Heat Pumps with Natural Gas Auxiliary Heating.

Item 2:

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM FOR THE CREATION OF A SMALL SIZE SCHOOL DISTRICT PROGRAM

As per EC 17078.47 (a-d) & 10078.48 (a-d)

We believe that all the requirements as stated in the above listed EC Sections can be addressed with an AI tool. Due to the technical nature and importance of this section we recommend the creation of a stakeholder’s task force for further input and parameter development.

Please clarify the certification process for *private construction consultants* and maintaining an up-to-date list of certified consultants for use by priority school districts, as per EC 17078.47 (d).

Item 3:

PROPOSED REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR MINIMUM ESSENTIAL FACILITIES MODERNIZATION SUPPLEMENTAL GRANT

Include indoor school gardens that supply fruits and or vegetables to the districts’ kitchens in the proposed minimum Essential Facilities Supplemental Grant.

On behalf of the Los Angeles Unified School District (Los Angeles Unified), we appreciate OPSC's Proposition 2 stakeholder engagement and welcome the opportunity to provide input on the proposed amendments to the School Facility Program in response to Proposition 2.

The comments and recommendations provided below correspond to the topics raised and materials provided for the February 13, 2025, Implementation Stakeholder Meeting #2.

Topic #6 – Interim Housing and Natural Disaster Assistance (Attachment A6)

The issue of interim housing assistance following a natural disaster raises several important considerations regarding eligibility, funding mechanisms, and regulatory clarifications.

Classroom Inventory Adjustments for Disaster-Related Replacements

In reference to Education Code section 17075.20(d)(2), OPSC states that any classroom portable purchased under section 17075.20(a) must be included in a district's classroom inventory, either when establishing new construction eligibility or through an adjustment if eligibility has already been established. However, clarification is needed to specify that when a portable is acquired

solely to replace a classroom destroyed in a natural disaster, it should not be added to the inventory, as it does not constitute an increase in capacity.

Charter School Eligibility for Interim Housing Assistance

There is ambiguity in the eligibility criteria for charter schools seeking interim housing assistance. While OPSC's analysis on page 6 concludes that charter schools cannot apply directly, a school district may apply on behalf of a charter school occupying district-owned facilities. However, Education Code section 17075.20(a) does not explicitly exclude charter schools on non-district-owned sites. Clarification is needed to determine whether a school district can apply on behalf of a charter school located on a non-district-owned site or if such schools are entirely ineligible for assistance.

Funding Challenges and Timing of Assistance

Timely access to interim housing assistance funding is critical, as schools need to accommodate displaced students immediately following a disaster. Waiting for reimbursement may present financial hardships. One proposed solution is for districts to submit a verified quote for the minimum amount needed and later reconcile any excess once insurance or other public assistance funds are received.

Los Angeles Unified recommends an upfront apportionment based on verified quotes, allowing districts to receive full funding at the outset. Since disasters are unplanned events, many districts lack the immediate resources to cover a matching share. Providing 100% of the verified quote upfront ensures districts can address their needs without delay. Once insurance and public assistance funding is secured, a true-up process would reconcile actual expenses, with any excess funds returned to the State.

Additionally, clarification is needed regarding the timing of state and local funds. If immediate access is not available, a clear timeline should be established to ensure school districts can plan accordingly.

In summary, regulatory clarification, eligibility adjustments, and a shift toward upfront funding mechanisms would improve the effectiveness of interim housing assistance, ensuring that schools can respond swiftly to natural disasters while maintaining financial accountability.

Topic #7 – Five-Year Master Plan (Attachment A7)

Master Plan Updates and Timing:

In response to OPSC's request for stakeholder feedback, Los Angeles Unified recommends the following:

- Updates or addendums to a district's master plan should be required no more than once every five years, with the five-year period beginning on the date of the district governing board's approval. The plan's duration should be determined solely based on this approval date.
- Any updates or addendums must receive formal approval from the district's governing board.

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Eligibility Determination and Funding Considerations:

Education Code (EC) 17070.54(b) requires that a facilities master plan include information on a district's eligibility for state bond funding. However, clarification is needed regarding the time period this eligibility should represent and whether second-round funding must be included.

To address these concerns, Los Angeles Unified recommends the following:

- Eligibility should be determined within one calendar year of the governing board's approval of the master plan. Second-round funding should be excluded unless its methodology and application are fully finalized.
- Regulations should explicitly state that a master plan's eligibility calculations are based on the original site snapshots used to establish baseline eligibility, rather than the building inventory submitted as part of the master plan.
- Regulations should clarify that if a district uses SAB forms to estimate eligibility, these forms serve solely as a calculation tool and will not be processed as official submissions.

Master Plan and Closeout Audits:

Los Angeles Unified requests clarification on which version of the master plan is required at the time of the closeout audit—whether it should be the version submitted as part of the application or an updated version. Clear guidance on this requirement will help ensure consistency and compliance across districts.

Additionally, we recommend the development of a standardized master plan certification checklist to help districts document key information and certify the plan's completeness. This checklist would provide a clear framework for compliance, streamline the review process, and reduce administrative uncertainties.

Stakeholder Engagement and Master Plan Cost Reimbursement:

Los Angeles Unified recommends that stakeholders be given the opportunity to provide input on the guidelines and standards for school site inventories, which will be discussed between OPSC and CDE. Ensuring stakeholder involvement will help create clear, practical, and equitable standards that reflect the needs of all districts.

Additionally, the cost of developing a facilities master plan has been discussed, with OPSC indicating it may be classified as an operational expense. Los Angeles Unified recommends revisiting this classification to determine whether master plan development qualifies as an eligible expenditure, allowing districts to receive appropriate funding support for this mandated documentation.

"Current" Assessed Value (EC 17070.54(c)(6))

Los Angeles Unified seeks clarification on what qualifies as "current" assessed value and whether entities other than governmental agencies may be considered appropriate for verification purposes.

"Modernization" (EC 17070.54(d))

Los Angeles Unified requests a clear and comprehensive definition of "modernization" beyond what is outlined in EC 17070.15 to ensure consistency in its application.

Year of Construction and Modernization (EC 17070.54(d))

Los Angeles Unified seeks clarification on how the year of construction and modernization should be determined—whether based on the year construction commenced, the year it was completed, or the year DSA plans were approved. Additionally, we request guidance on the appropriate date to use for non-DSA projects if a DSA approval date is recommended for determining the "last modernized" date. Lastly, we recommend that regulations explicitly state that this data will not be used to determine modernization eligibility.

Topic #9 – Energy Efficiency Supplemental Grant (Attachment A9)

Requesting the Supplemental Grant: Options 1 and 2

Under both options presented, OPSC has stated that the DSA Tracker "Type of Program" must match the SFP funding category being requested. However, it remains unclear how DSA and SFP will interpret a district's application for like-kind replacement when filed under SFP Modernization funding, despite the actual work involving new building construction. Los Angeles Unified requests further clarification on how DSA will evaluate and assign the Title 24 Energy Requirement program in such cases. If DSA's classification does not align with SFP's funding definitions, we recommend that this mandate be reconsidered or removed to prevent unnecessary funding complications for districts.

If a tiered approach is selected, the thresholds outlined in OPSC's Option 1 would need to be revised. The recent revision to EC 17077.35 does not establish a minimum threshold for grant eligibility—it simply requires that the proposed building exceed nonresidential building energy-efficiency standards without specifying by how much. Given this, any tiered approach should align with the intent of the statute and avoid imposing arbitrary thresholds that are not legally required. Additionally, if a tiered approach is implemented, Los Angeles Unified requests calculation examples to clarify how the grant amount would be determined under each tier.

Los Angeles Unified recommends adopting Option 2, as it provides a simplified and streamlined approach. However, there are inconsistencies regarding how DSA would confirm a project exceeds Title 24 energy requirements. OPSC has indicated that the appropriate DSA Project Tracker checkbox would be selected to confirm compliance, but it would not display a percentage. This, in turn, would trigger the need for additional documentation, such as the "DSA Energy Compliance Review Verification Form", to prove that Title 24 standards were exceeded. If no minimum percentage exceedance is required, then the DSA Project Tracker should not need to display a percentage, nor should additional documentation be necessary. Additionally, if the DSA Energy Compliance Review Verification Form is to be required, it should be made available for review before it is incorporated into the process. Los Angeles Unified recommends addressing and clarifying these points before finalizing the selection and implementation of either option.

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Topic #10 – Supplemental Grants for Minimum Essential Facilities (MEF) (Attachment A10)

Los Angeles Unified appreciates the ability to consider multiple funding options for the calculation of the supplemental grant for MEFs. Los Angeles Unified staff has performed an initial analysis based on the proposed options but is not prepared to make a recommendation without additional information from OPSC demonstrating how the calculation examples would compare. Therefore, we request that the next stakeholder materials include examples to facilitate comparison of the different funding options, including Use of Grants, Option 1, and Option 2.

Additionally, while the Use of Grants provision (2 CCR 1859.77.3) specifies that current CBEDS data be used to calculate the pupil amount requested, Los Angeles Unified recommends allowing the option to use a three-year average of CBEDS, similar to the flexibility provided under 2 CCR 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2.

Lastly, we request clarification on the calculation of fundable toilet square footage, specifically whether a site-wide analysis will be conducted to determine if an existing site already meets the required toilet square footage for current enrollment.

Topic #11 – Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms Supplemental Grant (Attachment A11)

Los Angeles Unified appreciates the ability to consider multiple funding options for the calculation of the supplemental grant for Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms. Los Angeles Unified staff has performed an initial analysis based on the proposed options but is not prepared to make a recommendation without additional information from OPSC demonstrating how the calculation examples would compare to one another. Therefore, we request that the next stakeholder materials include examples to facilitate comparison of the different funding options.

BACKGROUND

Proposition 2

Proposition 2 was approved by a majority of California’s voters on November 5, 2024. To implement its provisions, existing SFP Regulations must be updated to align with the new statutory provisions.

Global SFP Regulation Cleanup

Separate from Proposition 2 implementation, OPSC is taking the opportunity while other regulatory changes are taking place to amend SFP regulations and forms that would be beneficial to provide additional clarity and/or corrections.

OPSC is requesting stakeholder feedback regarding these changes. Each of the topics listed within the Purpose section of this report is broken out into its own attachments for stakeholder reference.

PROPOSED REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM MATCHING SHARES

PURPOSE

To continue to discuss and receive stakeholder input regarding proposed regulatory amendments resulting from the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), which was approved by a majority of California's voters on November 5, 2024, to implement a points-based determination and sliding scale for the required local match for School Facility Program (SFP) projects.

DESCRIPTION

This report continues discussion of the proposed regulatory amendments presented to stakeholders on January 30, 2025. This report addresses the written comments Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) staff received from four school districts and agencies and proposes additional clarifying amendments.

There are two attachments to this report:

1. Attachment A4b is the proposed SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5.
2. Attachment A4c is the proposed amendments to the Form SAB 50-04

BACKGROUND

Stakeholder Feedback

On January 30, 2025, OPSC presented proposed regulatory amendments to SFP Regulation Sections 1859.77.1 and 1859.79, the proposed addition of SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5, as well as changes to the Form SAB 50-04 resulting from the following additions and amendments to Education Code (EC):

- EC Section 17070.59
- EC Section 17070.87
- EC Section 17072.30
- EC Section 17074.16

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BACKGROUND (cont.)

The amendments presented at the first stakeholder meeting included:

1. Clarifying language that the current existing dollar-for-dollar matching share requirement applies to New Construction applications (SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.1) and Modernization applications (SFP Regulation Section 1859.79[b]) received before October 31, 2024.
2. Addition of language for SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.1 specifying that applications received on or after October 31, 2024 shall require a district matching share contribution pursuant to EC Sections 17070.59 and 17072.30.
3. Addition of language for SFP Regulation Section 1859.79 specifying that applications received on or after October 31, 2024 shall require a district matching share pursuant to EC Sections 17070.59 and 17074.16.
4. Addition of SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 to outline the points process of the new points-based system for determining the district's local matching share for projects.

Summary of Stakeholder Feedback

Staff would like to thank stakeholders that participated in this meeting and provided valuable feedback.

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STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Below is a summary of the stakeholder feedback and OPSC's responses as a result of the meeting held on January 30, 2025:

Additional Clarification: Total Project Cost and Project Labor Agreement

Based on stakeholder questions and feedback, OPSC is providing further clarification on the following two subjects:

1. The determination of matching shares and its impact on the total project cost and associated pupil grant requests, and
2. Certifying to the use of a project labor agreement and the associated points contributing to the matching shares determination.

1. Matching Shares Determination – Total Project Cost

As indicated in the response to stakeholder feedback #6, the total project cost will not be affected by the new sliding percentage scale for matching shares. The total approved project cost will comprise of four components:

1. State Share
2. Financial Hardship (as applicable)
3. District Contribution
4. **Local Funding Adjustment Grant (new, as applicable)**

For purposes of calculating the matching shares for a Modernization grant, the State share will remain unchanged. Financial Hardship, dependent on a district's financial hardship status, would cover some or all of the District Contribution. The District Contribution will vary, dependent on the points allocated to the district for their project. Finally, the Local Funding Adjustment Grant will offset a portion of the

local matching share according to the school district's point allocation. To see this in practice, an example is presented below:

Example of 65/35 Matching Shares

With 2025 Construction Cost Index costs, a school district is requesting 100 K-6 pupils as a base grant for a Modernization project. This results in a total project cost of \$1,159,013.33 with Small Size project and Fire Code supplemental grants added.

The applicant received 11 points for purposes of determining the matching share of this application, which means the matching shares determination is 65 percent, comprised of 60 percent State Share, 5 percent Local Funding Adjustment Grant, and 35 percent District Contribution.

The State Share will remain as 60 percent of the total project cost. The District Contribution is 35 percent of the total project cost, and the Local Funding Adjustment Grant accounts for the remaining five percent. The "total approved project cost" is \$1,159,013.33.

For a standard 60/40 project, the overall "total approved project cost" is the same, but the District Contribution is greater and the Local Funding Adjustment Grant is zero:

The stakeholder noted that it appears an adjustment to the actual pupil grants being requested would be needed as a result of the calculation of the matching share determination. OPSC emphasizes that there would be **no adjustment to pupil grants being requested**. This is because the total project cost does not change, and the only adjustment is to the percentages of the State and District shares. The

matching shares determination only impacts the funding sources (State and District), not the total funding provided per pupil.

2. Clarification on the Process of Certifying to the use of a Project Labor Agreement

OPSC understands that it may not be known with certainty at the time of application processing whether or not a school district will be using a project labor agreement.

As a result, OPSC proposes amending SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 and the Form SAB 50-04, as presented in the January 30, 2025 stakeholder meeting, to clarify the process of certifying to the use of a project labor agreement at the time of application processing as it relates to the audit process as required in EC Section 41024.

The amendment would include language outlining that if it is determined a project labor agreement was not used, the funding associated with the two points assigned will be required to be returned to OPSC with interest. In parallel, OPSC proposes adding this clarification to the Form SAB 50-04 for purposes of transparency as to the certifications the District Representative signs to upon submission of an application and fund release, respectively.

The proposed additions to SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5 and the Form SAB 50-04 are summarized below.

Summary of Proposed Amendments to SFP Regulation Section 1859.70.5.

To add subsection (d)(1), indicating the following:

- Applicants that indicate the use of a project labor agreement are subject to verification at the time of the audit as required in EC Section 41024.
- If it is determined that a project labor agreement was not used, the funding associated with the two points (as provided in [d]) will be required to be returned with interest (based on the interest rate earned in the Pooled Money Investment Account at the time of fund release) from the time of fund release until funds are returned.

Attachment A4b includes the proposed amendments to the Form SAB 50-04.

Summary of Proposed Amendments to the Form SAB 50-04

During the January 30, 2025, stakeholder meeting, OPSC presented changes to the Form SAB 50-04, which included adding an editable entry section for Local Matching Share Determination, noted as a new Section 22, which shifted the subsequent sections on the form to be renumbered as 23, 24, and 25.

OPSC proposes additional certification language within Section 25 of the Form SAB 50-04 to clarify that the use of a project labor agreement will be verified as part of the audit as required in EC Section 41024. This certification further specifies that if it is determined a project labor agreement was not used, the district acknowledges that the funding associated with the corresponding points assigned to the project to determine the matching share percentage will be required to be returned, with interest (based on the interest rate earned in the PMIA at the time of fund release) from the time of fund release until funds are returned.

Attachment A4c includes the proposed updates to the Form SAB 50-04 for stakeholder consideration.

Seismic Mitigation Program Matching Shares – EC Section 17075.10

Separately from the EC Section amendments mentioned above, EC Section 17075.10 was repealed and reenacted as a result of Proposition 2. Amendments resulting from this change altered the funding source for some applications under the Seismic Mitigation Program, and therefore the matching shares. These changes will be discussed during the March 20, 2025 stakeholder meeting, and may be referenced within the stakeholder item.

ATTACHMENT E

PROPOSED REGULATIONS

Section 1859.70.5 Points For Local Matching Share Determination

This Regulation shall apply to Approved Applications received on or after October 31, 2024 for New Construction and Modernization Grants, including Approved Applications for funding pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2.

The points used to compute the required matching funds for a New Construction Adjusted Grant and a Modernization Adjusted Grant request shall be based on the following computations. An Approved Application shall receive points for a local matching share based on the total of (a), (b), (c) and (d):

- (a) Points for the School District's gross bonding capacity divided by the School District's total enrollment at the time OPSC notifies the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04:
 - (1) Four points for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of zero dollars (\$0) to nine thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$9,999), inclusive.
 - (2) Three points for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to nineteen thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$19,999), inclusive.
 - (3) Two points for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to fifty-four thousand nine hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$54,999), inclusive.
 - (4) One point for a School District determined to have a gross bonding capacity per enrollment of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) or more.
- (b) Points for the School District's unduplicated pupil percentage at the time OPSC notifies the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04, based upon:
 - (1) An unduplicated pupil percentage as determined for purposes of the local control funding formula pursuant to EC Section 42238.02
 - (A) Eight points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 75 percent and 100 percent, inclusive.
 - (B) Six points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 50 percent and 74.99 percent, inclusive.
 - (C) Four points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage of between 25 percent and 49.99 percent, inclusive.
 - (D) Two points for a School District determined to have an unduplicated pupil percentage that is 24.99 percent or less.
- (c) Two points for a School District with a pupil enrollment of 200 pupils or fewer at the time OPSC notifies the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04.
- (d) Two points for a project that includes the use of a project labor agreement in the application being processed.
 - (1) Projects that indicate use of a project labor agreement will be verified as part of the audit process required in EC Section 41024. If it is determined that a project labor agreement was not used, the funding associated with the points assigned in (d) to determine the matching share percentage will be required to be returned, with interest (based on the interest rate earned in the Pooled Money Investment Account at the time of fund release) from the time of fund release until funds are returned.

ATTACHMENT E

GENERAL INFORMATION

If this application is submitted when there is Insufficient Bond Authority, as defined in Regulation Section 1859.2, the School District must adopt and submit a school board resolution, pursuant to Regulation Section 1859.95.1. For information regarding remaining bond authority, contact the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) prior to submittal of this application.

If not previously submitted, a district may file an application for modernization funding by use of this form concurrently with a determination of or an adjustment to the district's modernization eligibility. The district must submit a determination of or an adjustment to the district's new construction baseline eligibility upon request, as described in Regulation Sections 1859.51 or 1859.70, as applicable. The Board will only provide new construction funding if this form is submitted prior to the date of occupancy of any classrooms included in the construction contract. If the district has a pending reorganization election that will result in the loss of eligibility for the proposed project, the district must submit an adjustment to the district's new construction baseline eligibility as required in Section 1859.51 upon request. This may be accomplished by completion and submittal of Form SAB 50-01, Form SAB 50-02 and Form SAB 50-03 for the current enrollment year. Failure to submit the requested Forms may result in OPSC returning the funding application to the district unprocessed.

For purposes of Education Code Section 17073.25, the California Department of Education (CDE) is permitted to file modernization applications on behalf of the California Schools for the Deaf and Blind.

Requests for funding may be made as follows:

1. A separate apportionment for site acquisition for a new construction project for environmental hardship pursuant to Section 1859.75.1. For purposes of this apportionment, the following documents must be submitted with this form (as appropriate):
 - Form SAB 50-01, Form SAB 50-02 and Form SAB 50-03 (if not previously submitted).
 - Contingent site approval letter from the CDE.
 - Preliminary appraisal of property.
 - Approval letter from the Department of Toxic Substances Control.
 2. A separate apportionment for site acquisition and/or design costs for a new construction project pursuant to Section 1859.81.1. This apportionment is available only to districts that meet the financial hardship criteria in Section 1859.81. Districts may apply for a separate apportionment for the design and for site acquisition on the same project. For purposes of this apportionment, the following documents must be submitted with this form (as appropriate):
 - Form SAB 50-01, Form SAB 50-02 and Form SAB 50-03 (if not previously submitted).
 - Contingent site approval letter from the CDE (site apportionment only).
 - Preliminary appraisal of property (site apportionment only).
 3. A separate apportionment for district-owned site acquisition cost pursuant to Section 1859.81.2. For purposes of this apportionment, the following documents must be submitted with this form (as appropriate):
 - Form SAB 50-01, Form SAB 50-02 and Form SAB 50-03 (if not previously submitted).
 - Site approval letter from the CDE.
 - Appraisal of district-owned site.
 - Cost benefit analysis as prescribed in Section 1859.74.6 or a copy of the Board finding that the non-school function on the district-owned site must be relocated.
 4. A separate apportionment for design cost for a modernization project pursuant to Section 1859.81.1. This apportionment is available only to districts that meet the financial hardship criteria in Section 1859.81. For purposes of this apportionment, the Form SAB 50-03 must accompany this form (if not previously submitted).
 5. A New Construction Adjusted Grant pursuant to Section 1859.70 or 1859.180. If the funding request includes site acquisition, the proposed site must either be owned by the district, in escrow, or the district has filed condemnation proceedings and received an order of possession of the site. For purposes of this apportionment, the following documents must be submitted with this form (as appropriate):
 - Form SAB 50-01, Form SAB 50-02 and Form SAB 50-03.
 - Site/plan approval letter from the CDE.
 - Appraisal of property if requesting site acquisition funds.
 - Plans and specifications (P&S) for the project that were approved by the DSA. Submittal of plans may be on CD-ROM or "Zip Drive" readable in AutoCAD 14. The specifications may be provided on a diskette that is IBM compatible.
 - Cost estimate of proposed site development, if requesting site development funding.
 - If this request is pursuant to Section 1859.77.2 and the district's housing plan is other than those listed in the certification section of this form, a copy of the school board resolution and the approved housing plan.
 - If the site apportionment is requested pursuant to Regulation Section 1859.74.5, a cost benefit analysis as prescribed in Regulation Section 1859.74.6 or a copy of the Board finding that the non-school function on the district-owned site must be relocated.
 - If this request is fully or partially based on eligibility derived from an Alternative Enrollment Projection, a justification of how the project relieves overcrowding, including but not limited to, the elimination of the use of Concept 6 calendars, four track year-round calendars, or bussing in excess of 40 minutes.
 - Written confirmation from the district's career technical advisory committee indicating that the need for vocational and career technical facilities is being adequately met within the district consistent with Education Code Sections 51224, 51225.3(b), 51228(b), and 52336.1.
 6. For purposes of the Overcrowding Relief Grant (ORG), districts must submit the Overcrowding Relief Grant District-Wide Eligibility Determination (Form SAB 50-11) prior to the submittal of this funding application. In addition, districts must have had the CDE deem the site eligible for the ORG (pursuant to Section 1859.181) prior to the submittal of this application. For purposes of this apportionment, the following documents must be submitted with this form as well as the documents listed in section 5 above:
 - Overcrowding Relief Grant Eligibility Determination Form approved by the CDE.
 - Copies of the supporting documentation provided to the CDE when determining the density of the site, including the site diagram.
- The district is not required to submit its current CBEDS enrollment data.
7. Modernization Adjusted Grant pursuant to Section 1859.70. For purposes of this apportionment, the following documents must be submitted with this form (as appropriate):
 - Form SAB 50-03 (if not previously submitted).
 - P&S for the project that were approved by the DSA.
 - If the request includes funding for accessibility and fire code requirement pursuant to Section 1859.83(f), the DSA approved list of the minimum accessibility work required and a detailed cost estimate for the work in the plans.

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- DSA approval letter for elevator to meet handicapped compliance, if funding is requested.
- Cost estimate of the proposed site development necessary for the Reconfiguration of an existing high school.
- Plan approval letter from the CDE.
- Districtwide enrollment data on Form SAB 50-01 when requesting project assistance (if not previously submitted).
- If the request includes funding for 50 year old permanent buildings pursuant to Section 1859.78.6, a site diagram identifying all buildings to be modernized in the project. The diagram must specify those buildings that are at least 50 years old.
- Written confirmation from the district's career technical advisory committee indicating that the need for vocational and career technical facilities is being adequately met within the district consistent with Education Code Sections 51224, 51225.3(b), 51228(b), and 52336.1.

8. Final Charter School Apportionment for Charter School Facilities Rehabilitation pursuant to Section 1859.167.1. For purposes of this apportionment, the following documents must be submitted with this form (as appropriate):

- P&S for the project that were approved by DSA.
- If the request includes funding for accessibility and fire code requirement pursuant to Section 1859.167.3(d), the DSA approved list of the minimum accessibility work required and a detailed cost estimate for the work in the plans.
- DSA approval letter for elevator to meet handicapped compliance, if funding is requested.
- High performance incentive (HPI) scorecard from DSA.
- Plan approval letter from the CDE.
- Construction cost estimate signed by the architect of record or design professional.
- Determination of financial soundness from the California School Finance Authority (CSFA).
- Written confirmation from the applicant's career technical advisory committee indicating that the need for vocational and career technical facilities is being adequately met within the district consistent with Education Code Sections 51224, 51225.3(b), 51228(b), and 52336.1.

9. If the application includes a request for Financial Hardship, the district must comply with the requirements of Section 1859.81.

- If the application is submitted when there is Insufficient Bond Authority, as defined in Section 1859.2, the district must adopt a school board resolution pursuant to Section 1859.95.1(b).

If the district is requesting New Construction funding after the initial baseline eligibility was approved by the Board and the district's current CBEDS enrollment reporting year is later than the enrollment reporting year used to determine the district's baseline eligibility or adjusted eligibility, the district must complete a new Form SAB 50-01 based on the current year CBEDS enrollment data, and submit it to the OPSC with this form. In addition, if the district's request is fully or partially based on eligibility derived from an Alternative Enrollment Projection, the district must update the Alternative Enrollment Projection to correspond with the CBEDS enrollment data for the current year. A small district with 2,500 or less enrollment as defined in Section 1859.2 will not have its eligibility reduced for a period of three years from the date the district's baseline eligibility was approved by the Board as a result of reduction in projected enrollment.

For a list of the documents that must be submitted in order for the OPSC to deem a funding request for new construction or modernization complete and ready for OPSC

processing, consult the SFP handbook and other information located on the OPSC Web site at www.dgs.ca.gov/opsc.

For purposes of completing this form for a Final Charter School Apportionment, a charter school shall be treated as a school district.

The district must assign a Project Tracking Number (PTN) to this project. Dear Ms. Kirk,

On behalf of the Los Angeles Unified School District (Los Angeles Unified), we appreciate OPSC's Proposition 2 stakeholder engagement and welcome the opportunity to provide input on the proposed amendments to the Schol Facility Program in response to Proposition 2.

The comments and recommendations provided below correspond to the topics raised and materials provided for the March 13, 2025, Implementation Stakeholder Meeting #5.

SFP Matching Share

In the initial materials provided for the January 30th stakeholder meeting, OPSC appeared to indicate that the additional percentage points provided through the sliding scale were to be directly applied to the State and Local Shares (Jan 30th Stakeholder Materials - Attachment A4 Page 7). It was this example in the materials that led to the recommendations and comments surrounding the timing of the matching share determination and whether pupil changes would be necessary and allowed.

However, in the materials provided for the March 13th stakeholder meeting, OPSC labeled the additional matching share percentages as a "Local Funding Adjustment Grant" which is to be applied and accounted for separately from the 60 percent State Share. Los Angeles Unified would like to

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confirm that the methodology provided in the March 13th materials, treating the additional matching share percentages as a separate line item, is the methodology OPSC will be proceeding with for the matching share changes.

Los Angeles Unified currently receives assessed valuation from a third party—not the Los Angeles County Assessor—which is then used as part of the District’s bond sales and disclosures. Los Angeles Unified is in conversation with the County Assessor to confirm whether it will provide the necessary information required for us to meet Education Code Section 17074.54(c)(6) or certify the accuracy of the information received from the third party. Should the assessor prefer to certify the third party information, Los Angeles Unified requests that this be deemed compliant within the requirements of the Ed Code.

Career Technical Education Facilities Modernization Supplemental Grant

Based on experience with the Career Technical Education Facilities Program (CTEFP), Los Angeles Unified recommends adopting Option 1, because typical cost estimates for Career Technical Education upgrades far exceed five percent of the modernization scope of work they are typically tied to.

Global SFP Regulation Clean-up

Section 1859.60 Calculation to Determine Modernization Baseline Eligibility

Section 1859.78.6 Modernization Grant for 50 year or Older Permanent Buildings

Los Angeles Unified has concerns related to the proposed amendment detailing when the 20/25/50 year period for a building’s aging should begin. While the proposed amendment appears to provide guidance for the aging of stockpile buildings, it prompts the need for additional guidance around the nuances of stockpile building placement, and how this impacts the aging for other types of buildings.

The proposed amendment indicates it is the placement on the current campus that begins the aging of a building. However, the amendment does not consider that a portable’s current campus may not have been the first campus it was placed and occupied on, in effect restarting the clock simply because a portable was relocated to another campus. Los Angeles Unified recommends OSPC consider the DSA approval of a portable building’s first campus placement, rather than the current campus placement, as the start of a building’s aging.

Next, by specifying the DSA approval date will be the start of a building’s aging, the amendment warrants additional guidance for buildings constructed or placed on a site before DSA came into existence. Los Angeles Unified requests OSPC provide guidance on what aging start date should be used, in place of the DSA approval date, to establish a building’s age in cases where a building pre-dates DSA.

Los Angeles Unified recommends that the proposed methodology outlined in Regulation Sections 1859.60 and 1859.76.6 for calculating a building’s age be applied prospectively—used *only* for establishing new modernization baselines moving forward—and not applied retroactively to baselines that have already been established.



Currently, OPSC permits, and SAB has approved, Form SAB 50-03 submissions, using stockpile dates to determine the age of portable classrooms. The proposed methodology directly conflicts with this long-standing practice and the correction of this information would impose an unnecessary administrative burden on staff. Moreover, applying the methodology retroactively would place districts that have relied on previously accepted stockpile dates into inadvertent non-compliance. Therefore, Los Angeles Unified further recommends that OPSC continue to honor and allow the use of previously approved stockpile data for modernization eligibility purposes.

OPSC's statement that the proposed amendment in EC Section 17074.25(a)(1) will align with Regulation Sections 1859.60 and 1859.78.6 by clarifying that a building's age will be reset to the date of its previous apportionment, does not clarify how districts are to reset a building's age when the current modernization program practices do not track apportionments by building. As previously mentioned in its response letter to Stakeholder Meeting #3 dated March 7, 2025, Los Angeles Unified recommends a broader discussion be held to evaluate the current practices and methodology for calculating and using second round eligibility.

BACKGROUND

The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) held a public meeting on January 30, 2025, to discuss proposed criteria for determining the eligibility and funding for a modernization grant for buildings at least 75 years old, and to receive stakeholder input. Temporary Housing is also not possible, but there is a nearby site on which it would be more cost effective to build the new school. SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2 indicates that "modernization funding, with the exception of savings, is limited to expenditure on the specific site where the modernization grant eligibility was generated." EC 17074.25 also specifies that "a modernization apportionment may be used for an improvement to extend the useful life of, or to enhance the physical environment of, the school." Both references indicate that the funding provided through the SFP must be used to replace and construct on the same site the 75-years-or-older building is located.</p> <p>Therefore, the replacement building must be on the same site that has the existing 75-years-or-older building.</p>

A similar utility grant should therefore also be available as part of the grant to replace a 75-year-old building.</p>	<p>7. OPSC is proposing that a district may also request Site Development (utilities only) for the replacement of a 75-years-or-older building, provided that the grant was not included in a prior funding application for a 50 years or older building. This aligns with how site development grants are provided for other modernization projects, and 50-years-or-older building grants per SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.7.</p>
<p>8. OPSC suggests that a district will need to provide a unit cost amount that conforms to the Sierra West Current Construction Costs Remodeling Repair (Modernization) book at F1 level of difficulty. However, 2 CCR section 1859.82.1 (Facility Hardship Program) prescribes the use of that same book at an F3 level, and although not memorialized in Section 1859.82.2 (Seismic Mitigation Program), OPSC allows the usage of the same book at an F3 level for that program. SP1A diagrams are recommended, or other similar type of documentation, to be acceptable for determining square footage (as has been permitted for other funding requests in the Modernization and Seismic Mitigation programs). Can the District base their cost-benefit analysis/modernization estimate on conceptual drawings, or schematic drawings as is similarly permitted in the Seismic Mitigation Program? A modernization estimate based on DSA-approved modernization plans would be unduly expensive and time-consuming.</p>	<p>9. OPSC acknowledges that, in some cases, original DSA plans may be unavailable. <p>10. (cont.) functional requirements of the replacement building's design and remains consistent with the Seismic Mitigation Program approach and the language of EC 17071.25(a).</p>	
<p>11. According to EC 17074.10(f), portables eligible for a second modernization funding must be replaced unless the district can "document that modernizing the portable classroom is a better use of public resources." This wording indicates that portables are not necessarily "replaced through the second round of modernization funding," and therefore the grant to replace 75-year-old buildings should not be limited to the replacement of permanent buildings and instead also include portable buildings.</p>	<p>11. As the statute does not indicate a specific type of building (i.e. portable or permanent), a district may choose to demolish and replace a portable building using 75-years-or-older funding.</p>

Additional Clarification: Pupil Grants Request

Upon further review, staff has determined that the 75-years-or-older pupil grants that are being requested must be commensurate with SFP modernization grants that are available. Similar to the grant for 50-years-or-older buildings, pupil grants provided to districts for the replacement of 75-years-or-older buildings will be considered a "subset" of the site's total eligibility. Therefore, the 75-years-or-older pupil grants requested may not exceed the cumulative grant request in Section 2.a. on the *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 50-04). In summation, the 75-years-or-older pupil grants being requested must also be subject to the modernization eligibility that is available and the requirements of SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.3.

Pupil Grant Funding Model

Staff is presenting the following pupil grant funding model to show how the 75-years-or-older *base grant* is calculated from the annual new construction per pupil grants.

While the base grant under new construction is calculated on a 50/50 state/district share basis, the 75-years-or-older supplemental grant is going

to be processed under the modernization program on a 60/40 basis (see Table 1). The following example (see Table 2) shows how the funding model will be determined for classrooms demolished and replaced that have become 75 years or older.

Proposed New Regulations and Regulatory Amendments

In congruence with the stakeholder meeting presentation on January 30, 2025, and the questions proposed both during and afterwards, staff is proposing a new regulation section for 75-years-or-older funding and has identified proposed regulatory amendments to implement the statutory changes to the program eligibility and funding criteria. The new and updated proposed regulatory amendments are on Attachment A5b.

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STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Staff proposes the following new regulation section for the 75-years-or-older grants:

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.65 Modernization Grant for 75-years-or-older facilities. This regulation section will define the parameters in which a project that demolished and replaced a building that has reached an age of 75-years-or-older will be approved for funding. Specific to the statute, these projects are required to include a cost-benefit analysis showing the cost estimate to rehabilitate the building will be at least 50 percent of the Total Replacement Cost. Any excess square footages will fall under the guidelines of SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2.

Staff updated the following amendments to the SFP Regulations that are impacted by the new statute:

- SFP Regulation Section 1859.61 will be amended to include a new adjustment type (m) for 75-years-or-older spaces that will be funded using the new construction pupil grant amount. This adjustment is intended to account for the facilities being demolished and replaced by the new building.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.7 will be amended to allow for site development (utilities) funding for applications with a scope of the work for demolishing and replacing buildings that are 75 years or older.
- SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2(a)(2) will be revised to incorporate provisions for increased square footage in alignment with Title 5. Because SFP regulations do not permit an increase in square footage for modernization projects, this amendment will include regulation language to address the Title 5 requirements for specific minimum dimensions for classrooms, ancillary spaces, etc.
- The Form SAB 50-04 will be updated to include sections specifically for 75-years-or-older funding. The General Information Section will be revised to incorporate details under #7, addressing 75-years-or-older apportionments and hybrid projects that include 75-years-or-older work within the scope of the project. The instructions for Section 2 "Type of Project," will also be

modified by adding a new “2.d.” to address requests for 75-years-or-older funding. Districts will be required to specify the number of classrooms and/or square footage being demolished and reconstructed, as well as the number of pupil requests per grade level.

- On the Form SAB 50-04, Section 2 will include the new 2.d. for the 75-years-or-older grant request. Section 6 (d) for “Modernization Additional Grant Request” will be amended to allow a district to request an additional grant for site development utility costs necessary for the replacement of a 75-years-or-older building. Subsequent lettering has been amended to account for the inclusion of this new section. See Attachment A5c for the proposed amendments to the Form SAB 50-04.

Updates since the first stakeholder meeting are highlighted in yellow in the proposed regulations attachment (Attachment A5b) and the Form SAB 50-04 (Attachment A5c).

**School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.78.7. Modernization
Additional Grant for Site Development Necessary for 50 Years or Older
Permanent Buildings.**

In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide funding for upgrading existing site development (utilities) work as necessary for the modernization of 50 years or older permanent buildings equal to the lesser of (a) or (b):

(a) 60 percent of the costs necessary to upgrade utility service to 50 year or older permanent building(s) on the site as follows:

(1) Water: Replacement or repair of main water service line(s) between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site, connection fees if applicable, meter (if not provided by the serving utility), and replacement or repair of a domestic water appurtenances (i.e., well, pump, tank) as needed for the proper operation of the system.

(2) Sewage: Replacement or repair of main sewer line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site and connection fees, if applicable. Replacement or repair of sewage appurtenances (i.e., treatment/disposal system) as needed for the proper operation of the system and a main disposal line from the treatment system to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.

(3) Gas: Replacement or repair of main gas service line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site, connection fee (if applicable), meter (if not provided by serving utility) or replacement or repair of gas service appurtenances (i.e., liquefied petroleum system and tank) as needed for proper operation of the system and a new main

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supply line from the tank to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.

(4) Electric: Replacement or repair of electrical service between the utility company connection and the building main switchboard. Primary electric service runs between the utility company's point of connection and the transformer. Secondary electric service runs between the transformer and the main switchboard. Connection fee, transformer pads and protective devices (i.e., bollards) as required by the utility company.

(5) Communication systems (i.e., cable television and telephone): Replacement or repair of service between the utility company connection and the nearest distribution center.

(b) Twenty percent of the funding authorized by Section 1859.78.6.

The district must submit a detailed cost estimate and appropriate DSA approved plans with Form SAB 50-04 for all requests for the site development work. The cost estimate must include appropriate justification documents that indicate the work is necessary to complete the modernization of the 50 years or older building(s) that will be modernized as part of the project.

The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development (utilities) work that meets common engineering practices and industry standards and are consistent with the specific site conditions, if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Remodeling Repair Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify that the site development (utilities) work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards. Utility service(s) cost shall be prorated, if necessary, for any excess capacity not needed to service the 50 year or older permanent building(s).

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.2. Use of Modernization Grant Funds.

The Modernization Grant plus any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Sections 17074.25, 17074.10(f) and 17070.15(i) and may also be utilized for other purposes as set forth in Education Code Section 100420(c), and Labor Code Section 1771.3(a) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014. Modernization funding may also be used for the costs incurred by the district directly or through a contract with a third party provider for the initiation and enforcement of a LCP.

Modernization funding, with the exception of savings, is limited to expenditure on the specific site where the modernization grant eligibility was generated. The grant may not be used for the following:

New building area with the exception of the following:

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(1) Replacement building area of like kind. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the district.

(2) Building area required by the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or by the Division of the State Architect's (DSA) handicapped access requirements.

(b) New site development items with the exception of:

(1) Replacement, repair or additions to existing site development.

(2) Site development items required by the federal ADA Act or by the DSA's handicapped access requirements.

(c) the evaluation and removal of hazardous or solid waste and/or hazardous substances when the Department of Toxic Substance Control has determined that the site contains dangerous levels of a hazardous substance, hazardous waste, or both that exceed ten percent of the combined adjusted grant and the district matching share for the project.

(d) Leased facilities not owned by another district or a county superintendent. Modernization Grant funds may be used on any school facilities on the site, with the exception of portable classroom facilities eligible for an additional apportionment pursuant to Education Code Sections 17073.15 and 17074.10(f) and as defined in Section 1859.78.8. If the classroom facilities on the site include areas that are currently ineligible for modernization, it will not disqualify those facilities from future modernization funding.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.3. Minimal Requests for Modernization Grant Funds.

(a) With the exception of Approved Applications that meet the requirements of Section 1859.107(a), districts seeking a Modernization Grant must submit Form SAB 50-04 for any one of the following:

(1) at least 52 Non-Severe grants, or

(2) at least 36 Severe grants, or

(3) at least 101 grants, or

(4) the remaining modernization eligibility at the school site if less than the grants in (1), (2), or (3).

(b) Form SAB 50-04 requesting Modernization Grant funds that do not meet the above criteria will not be accepted by the SAB.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1 (2)(D) Facility Hardship Program.

"School Building" for the purposes of this Section shall have the same definition as Education Code Section 17283 and shall also exclude any districtwide administrative facilities.

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A district is eligible for Facility Hardship funding to repair, replace, or construct School Buildings or related required components that are currently causing a health and safety threat to the students and/or staff. Projects solely to replace components that have reached the end of their useful life, perform routine maintenance or repair, issues resulting from the deferment of routine maintenance or repair, lack of current code compliance, or the addition of components that were not previously existing, do not meet the qualifying criteria of the program. However, this work may be incorporated into a qualifying Facility Hardship application if it is required to be completed to gain DSA approval.

Beginning 90 days after the effective date of this Section [November 29, 2020], Approved Applications requesting Facility Hardship Program funding shall be submitted to OPSC within 12 months of DSA approval for the scope of work mitigating the identified health and safety threat. If the project does not require DSA approval, then the Approved Application for funding must be received within the 6 months following project completion, as demonstrated by the earliest of the following: the date that the notice of completion of the project has been filed; occupancy of any portion of the project Facility; or when the School Buildings or components of the School Buildings in the project are currently in use by the district. If a district demonstrates that extreme or unusual circumstances prevented the submission of an eligible application within the applicable timeline outlined above, OPSC may allow up to an additional 6 months for submittal.

(a) Districts may qualify for funding to replace or construct new School Buildings. Factors to be considered by the Board to determine eligibility for Facility Hardship program replacement funding may include, but are not limited to:

- (1) Damage or loss as a result of a natural disaster such as a fire, flood, or earthquake.
- (2) Proximity to a major freeway, airport, electrical facility, high power transmission lines, dam, pipeline, or industrial facility.
- (3) Adverse air quality.
- (4) Structural deficiency to the School Building, and
- (5) Site conditions such as faulting, toxic soil, or liquefaction.

(b) To qualify for replacement funding for School Buildings, the district must submit an Approved Application for funding and either (1) or (2) below:

(1) For School Buildings that are lost, destroyed, or unable to be repaired, the district must submit:

(A) A report from an industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) that states that the

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AUTHORITY (cont.)

only way to mitigate the health and safety threat is to replace the School Building(s).

(B) Documentation which demonstrates that the facilities in the project must be reconstructed in order to house the current enrollment of the district.

(2) For permanent School Buildings where the cost to rehabilitate the School Building(s) exceeds 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost, or for Portable Classrooms where the cost to rehabilitate exceeds the Portable Classroom Replacement Grant or Portable Toilet Replacement Grant, the district must submit:

(A) A report by an industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) that outlines the minimum work to mitigate the health and safety threat and remain in the existing School Building. If the threat is due to the presence of mold, OPSC must conduct a site visit to discuss the scope of the project prior to remediation. If the remediation is done prior to a site visit, the application will be ineligible for funding. Requests for asbestos mitigation must include lab test results indicating the asbestos is currently friable, and provides the location, material, and testing methods used.

(B) A letter of concurrence from a governmental agency that has jurisdiction or expertise over the field in which the health and safety threat originates. The letter must concur with the industry specialist report on both 1. and 2. below:

1. An imminent health and safety threat to student and/or staff exists.
2. The mitigation measures outlined in the industry specialist's report are the minimum measures required to mitigate the threat and allow the continued use of the School Building(s).

(C) Applications must include a detailed Form SAB 58-01 that meets the following requirements:

1. The Form SAB 58-01 must use the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication by Sierra West Publishing. For all materials or items listed in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication, amounts entered on the Form SAB 58-01 must use the provided unit costs. For individual materials or items that are not contained in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair publication, the district must provide supporting documentation for OPSC to review the requested unit cost.
2. All requested line items shall include Construction Specifications Institute reference number (CSI #), description, F3 total unit cost amount, and quantity. Any line items that include amounts in lump-sum formats will not be reviewed or approved.
3. The work in the Form SAB 58-01 shall match the work outlined in the report provided by the industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) for the minimum work required to mitigate the health and safety threat.

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AUTHORITY (cont.)

4. The estimate submitted to OPSC shall be for the same scope of work reviewed and concurred to by DSA, and that is referenced in the governmental concurrence letter for the project.

5. The Form SAB 58-01 may also include any work required by DSA to obtain plan approval.

(D) A cost/benefit analysis that demonstrates the minimum work required to mitigate the health and safety threat and remain in the School Building exceeds 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost of the existing Square Footage of the School Building. The minimum work required may include work required by DSA to gain approval for the mitigation project.

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SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2. Seismic Mitigation Program.

“School Building” for the purposes of this Section shall have the same definition as Education Code Section 17283 and shall also exclude any districtwide administrative facilities.

A school district is eligible for funding to repair, reconstruct, or replace the Most Vulnerable Category 2 Buildings which were originally constructed to be used as School Facilities and pose an unacceptable risk of injury to its occupants in the event of seismic activity. Program eligibility is determined by the DSA while determination of grant funding is determined by the Board based on the following criteria.

Notwithstanding Sections 1859.93 and 1859.93.1, all applications for the seismic mitigation of the Most Vulnerable Category 2 Buildings shall be funded in the order of receipt of an Approved Application for funding. Any grants provided for the purpose of this section shall be provided as a new construction project and allocated on a 50 percent state share basis.

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PROPOSED REGULATIONS

Section 1859.61. Adjustments to the Modernization Baseline Eligibility.

The baseline eligibility for modernization as provided in Section 1859.60 for a specific site will be adjusted as follows:

- (a) Reduced by the number of pupils provided grants in a modernization SFP project or a CSFP Rehabilitation project at the specific site.
- (b) Reduced by the number of pupils housed, based on the loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2), in a modernization LPP project funded under the LPP pursuant to Sections 1859.14 and 1859.15.
- (c) Increased by changes in projected enrollment in subsequent enrollment reporting years.
- (d) Increased for additional facilities not previously modernized with State funds, that become 25 years old, if permanent, or 20 years old, if portable or as a result of audit findings made pursuant to Sections 1859.90, 1859.90.3 and 1859.105.
- (e) Adjusted as a result of errors or omissions by the district or by the OPSC.
- (f) Adjusted as a result of amendments to these Subgroup 5.5 Regulations that affect the eligibility.
- (g) For classroom loading standards adopted by the Board for non-severely disabled individuals with exceptional needs and severely disabled individuals with exceptional needs.
- (h) As directed by the Board due to a finding of a Material Inaccuracy pursuant to Regulation Section 1859.104.1.
- (i) Increased for facilities previously modernized with State funds, which qualify for an additional modernization apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.78.8.
- (j) Decreased for facilities that were deemed eligible for modernization pursuant to Sections 1859.60 and 1859.61(d) and subsequently replaced, or will be replaced under a signed contract for construction or acquisition of facilities, in a project funded by the district without participation from the State.
- (k) Adjusted as a result of replaced eligible portables funded with the Overcrowding Relief Grant, pursuant to Education Code Section 17079, et seq.
- (l) Adjusted upon Board receipt of the local school board resolution acknowledging that the buildings have been removed from K-12 use, as follows:
 - (1) School Buildings and/or classrooms that receive replacement funding via the New Construction Grant or the Facility Hardship Square Footage Grant pursuant to Section 1859.82.1 or Section 1859.82.2
 - (2) School Buildings and/or classrooms that were originally included in the district's baseline eligibility and were later demolished or removed from classroom use due to health and/or safety concerns that meet the requirements of Regulation Section 1859.82.1 or 1859.82.2 as verified by OPSC, except the district did not have the current enrollment to support the replacement and funding of those School Buildings and/or classrooms. Buildings and/or classrooms removed from K-12 classroom use that remain on the school site will be identified on a list published on OPSC's website.

Section 1859.78.7. Modernization Additional Grant for Site Development Necessary for 50 Years or Older Permanent Buildings and 75 Years Or Older Buildings.

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In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide, funding for upgrading existing site development (utilities) work as necessary for the modernization of 50 years or older permanent buildings, or buildings replaced pursuant to Section 1859.78.65 for the replacement of a building that has reached 75 years or older, equal to the lesser of (a) or (b):

- (a) 60 percent of the costs necessary to upgrade utility service to 50 year or older permanent building(s), or 75 years or older building(s), on the site as follows:
 - (1) Water: Replacement or repair of main water service line(s) between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s), or 75 years or older building(s), on the site, connection fees if applicable, meter (if not provided by the serving utility), and replacement or repair of a domestic water appurtenances (i.e., well, pump, tank) as needed for the proper operation of the system.
 - (2) Sewage: Replacement or repair of main sewer line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s), or 75 years or older building(s), on the site and connection fees, if applicable. Replacement or repair of sewage appurtenances (i.e., treatment/disposal system) as needed for the proper operation of the system and a main disposal line from the treatment system to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.
 - (3) Gas: Replacement or repair of main gas service line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s), or 75 years or older building(s), on the site, connection fee (if applicable), meter (if not provided by serving utility) or replacement or repair of gas service appurtenances (i.e., liquefied petroleum system and tank) as needed for proper operation of the system and a new main supply line from the tank to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.
 - (4) Electric: Replacement or repair of electrical service between the utility company connection and the building main switchboard. Primary electric service runs between the utility company's point of connection and the transformer. Secondary electric service runs between the transformer and the main switchboard. Connection fee, transformer pads and protective devices (i.e., bollards) as required by the utility company.
 - (5) Communication systems (i.e., cable television and telephone): Replacement or repair of service between the utility company connection and the nearest distribution center.
- (b) Twenty percent of the funding authorized by Section 1859.78.6.

The district must submit a detailed cost estimate and appropriate DSA approved plans with Form SAB 50-04 for all requests for the site development work. The cost estimate must include appropriate justification documents that indicate the work is necessary to complete the modernization of the 50 years or older building(s) that will be modernized as part of the project.

The Board will approve reasonable and appropriate site development (utilities) work that meets common engineering practices and industry standards and are consistent with the specific site conditions, if the site development costs are consistent with the most current edition of the Remodeling Repair Construction Costs publication by the Sierra West Group. The design professional must certify that the site development (utilities) work does not exceed the minimum requirements to develop the site to meet educational needs and/or standards.

Utility service(s) cost shall be prorated, if necessary, for any excess capacity not needed to service the 50 year or older permanent building(s).

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Section 1859.78.65 Modernization Grant for 75 Years or Older Facilities

- (a) In lieu of the funding provided by Subdivision (a) of Education Code Section 17074.10 and Section 1859.78.3, the Board shall provide the amounts as follows:
- (1) Classroom space will be replaced with per-pupil grants using the calculation of existing school capacity in Section 1859.35, based on the New Construction Grant provided under Education Code 17072.10.
 - (2) Ancillary space will be replaced on a per-square-foot basis for the enclosed space at the following amounts, and shall be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71:
 - (A) \$260 for permanent non-toilet area in permanent buildings.
 - (B) \$466 for toilet area in permanent buildings.
 - (C) \$58 for non-toilet area in portable buildings.
 - (D) \$151 for toilet area in portable buildings.

 - (3) The existing permanent or portable building must be replaced at the same site. Excess square footage required as part of Title 5 requirements needed to obtain plan approval are permissible per Regulation Section 1859.79.2
 - (4) A cost benefit analysis shall be submitted showing that the cost to rehabilitate the Permanent or Portable Schools Building(s) exceeds 50 percent of the Total Replacement Cost. The cost estimate showing rehabilitation costs must provide unit-cost amounts that conform to the Sierra West Current Construction Costs.
 - (5) For a project to qualify for reimbursements for 75 years or older funding, in addition to meeting SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.1, the building was replaced using only local funds and was 75 years or older at the time it was replaced.

For purposes of determining the age of the building, the 75 years or older period shall begin 12 months after the original plans for the construction of the building were approved by the DSA.

Section 1859.79.2. Use of Modernization Grant Funds.

The Modernization Grant plus any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Sections 17074.25, 17074.10(f) and 17070.15(i) and may also be utilized for other purposes as set forth in Education Code Section 100420(c), and Labor Code Section 1771.3(a) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014. Modernization funding may also be used for the costs incurred by the district directly or through a contract with a third party provider for the initiation and enforcement of a LCP. Modernization funding, with the exception of savings, is limited to expenditure on the specific site where the modernization grant eligibility was generated. The grant may not be used for the following:

(a) New building area with the exception of the following:

(1) Replacement building area of like kind. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the district.

(2) Replacement of existing buildings that are at least 75 years or older, pursuant to 1859.78.65, with increased area needed to meet the minimum California Department of Education Title 5 requirements. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the district.

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~~(2)~~(3) Building area required by the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or by the Division of the State Architect's (DSA) handicapped access requirements.

(4) A new or expanded Minimum Essential Facility receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.5

(5) New construction or retrofit transitional kindergarten classrooms receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.6

(b) New site development items with the exception of:

(1) Replacement, repair or additions to existing site development.

(2) Site development items required by the federal ADA Act or by the DSA's handicapped access requirements.

(3) A new or expanded Minimum Essential Facility receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.5

(4) New construction or retrofit transitional kindergarten classrooms receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.6

(c) the evaluation and removal of hazardous or solid waste and/or hazardous substances when the Department of Toxic Substance Control has determined that the site contains dangerous levels of a hazardous substance, hazardous waste, or both that exceed ten percent of the combined adjusted grant and the district matching share for the project.

(d) Leased facilities not owned by another district or a county superintendent.

Modernization Grant funds may be used on any school facilities on the site, with the exception of portable classroom facilities eligible for an additional apportionment pursuant to Education Code Sections 17073.15 and 17074.10(f) and as defined in Section 1859.78.8. If the classroom facilities on the site include areas that are currently ineligible

for modernization, it will not disqualify those facilities from future modernization funding.

PROPOSED REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR MINIMUM ESSENTIAL FACILITIES MODERNIZATION SUPPLEMENTAL GRANT

PURPOSE

To continue to discuss and receive stakeholder input regarding the proposed regulatory amendments resulting from the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2), which was approved by a majority of California's voters on November 5, 2024, in order to implement the Minimum Essential Facilities (MEF) Modernization Supplemental Grant.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A10a.

BACKGROUND

On February 13, 2025, the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) held a stakeholder meeting to discuss the implementation of the MEF Modernization Supplemental Grant. This item continues the discussion and addresses the questions, comments and feedback received by OPSC from school districts and other stakeholders since the meeting. Stakeholder feedback may be found on Attachment B of this item.

This item also proposes a method for funding the supplemental grant and provides calculations and examples for each project type.

This item also presents proposed changes to current School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.77.5 and the Form SAB 50-04.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION**Summary of Stakeholder Feedback**

OPSC would like to thank the stakeholders that participated in this meeting and provided valuable feedback. Below is a summary of the stakeholder feedback and OPSC's responses as a result of the meeting held on February 13, 2025:

Proposed Funding Methods

Staff has developed the following two options for consideration. Please note, both of the options were previously presented at the February 13, 2025 stakeholder meeting. They are being presented again with examples of calculations provided, as well as a brief overview of the existing UOG calculation pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a) for comparative purposes.

As mentioned in the item presented on February 13, 2025, both options would be limited to funding the *lesser* of the new space being constructed or the recommended size of the space based on the site's enrollment.

OPSC has provided the following square footage chart from SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b) for convenience when analyzing the calculations:

Overview of Funding Methods

Option 1

Under Option 1, the supplemental grant amount would be calculated using the Permanent/Portable Other and Toilet square foot grant amounts. As this is a modernization supplemental grant, the square foot grant amounts will be utilized at

a 60/40 split. A site-wide analysis of existing toilet square footage will be conducted to determine if an existing site already meets the required toilet square footage for current enrollment to determine the fundable toilet square footage.

Option 2

Under Option 2, a calculation to determine the maximum pupil grant amount for the facility, similar to the existing MEF (UOG) calculation in SFP Regulation 1859.77.3(a)(7), would determine the supplemental grant amount. However, instead of using the New Construction base grant amount, the Modernization base grant amount will be used in this calculation. The site's modernization baseline eligibility would not be adjusted because of this grant (beyond the pupil grants requested in Section 2).

Full Description of Funding Options and Calculations

Option 1

In this option, the supplemental grant amount would be calculated using the Permanent/Portable Other and Toilet square foot grant amounts.

- New projects would be funded based on the *lesser* of:
 - The total size of the new MEF, or
 - The recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.
- Expansion projects would be funded based on the *lesser* of:
 - The delta between the existing MEF space and the total size of the expanded MEF, or
 - The delta between the existing MEF space and the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.

New Projects

The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount for new projects is summarized as:

Determine the *lesser* of the following:

- The recommended MEF size, or
- The total square footage of the new facility.

Determine the amount of fundable toilet square footage by comparing the existing toilet square footage on the site with the recommended toilet square footage based on current CBEDS according to the per pupil square footage allocation in the chart in SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b) (see square footage chart above). Multiply the lesser of the two from above by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot and Permanent/Portable Toilet square foot grant amounts (eligible toilet space will be funded first), add the Permanent/Portable Other square footage total and the Permanent/Portable Toilet square footage total for the total supplemental grant amount.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Option 1 Example (New Projects) – Recommended Size of the Facility

A middle school (7-8) with a CBEDS of 1,250 does not have an MPR and is building a permanent MPR (with food service) that is 7,000 square feet, of which 1,000 square feet is Toilet. It is assumed that all toilet square footage is fundable.

- In order to determine the recommended MEF size, multiply the CBEDS at the site (1,250) by 5.3 square feet (see square footage chart above). The product of this calculation is 6,625 square feet, which exceeds the recommended minimum of 5,000 square feet. Therefore, the recommended size of the MEF (MPR) for this site is 6,625 square feet. The lesser of the recommended size (6,625 square feet) and what is being built (7,000 square feet) is the recommended size.
- To determine the 2025 grant amount, 1,000 Permanent Toilet square feet is multiplied by the Permanent Toilet square foot grant amount of \$559 for a total of \$559,000. The remaining 5,625 of Permanent Other square feet is multiplied by the Permanent Other square foot grant amount of \$312 for a total of \$1,755,000. The total supplemental grant amount is \$2,314,000.

Existing MPR (with Food Service) Square Feet = 0
 New MPR (with Food Service) = 7,000 Square Feet (6,000 Permanent Other, 1,000 Permanent Toilet)

1,250 Students x 5.3 Square Feet per Student = 6,625 Recommended Square Feet

5,625 Permanent Other Square Feet x \$312 = \$1,755,000
 1,000 Permanent Toilet Square Feet x \$559 = \$559,000
Total Supplemental Grant Amount = \$2,314,000

Expansion Projects

The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount for expansion projects is summarized as:

Determine the *lesser* of the following:

- The delta between the existing MEF size and the recommended MEF size, or
- The delta between the existing MEF size and the total size of the expanded facility.

Subtract the existing MEF square footage from the lesser of the two above to determine the delta. The delta is the square footage eligible to be funded.

Determine the amount of fundable toilet square footage by comparing the existing toilet square footage on the site with the recommended toilet square footage based on current CBEDS according to the per pupil square footage allocation in the chart in SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(b) (see square footage chart above). Multiply the delta by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot and Permanent/Portable Toilet square foot grant amounts (eligible toilet space will be funded first), add the Permanent/Portable Other square footage total and the Permanent/Portable Toilet square footage total for the total supplemental grant amount.

Option 1 Example (Expansion Projects) – Delta of Existing MEF and Recommended Size

A middle school (7-8) with a CBEDS of 1,250 has an existing permanent MPR (with food service) that is 3,000 square feet, of which 350 square feet is Toilet, and is expanding it by 4,000 square feet, of which 650 square feet is Toilet. The newly expanded MPR will have a total of 7,000 square feet, of which 1,000 square feet is Toilet.

- In order to determine the recommended MEF size, multiply the CBEDS at the site (1,250) by 5.3 square feet. The product of this calculation is 6,625 square feet, which exceeds the recommended minimum of 5,000 square feet. Therefore, the recommended size is 6,625 square feet.
- The delta between the existing MEF square footage (3,000 square feet) and the total size of the expanded facility (7,000 square feet) is 4,000 square feet, of which 650 square feet is Toilet. The delta between the existing MEF square footage (3,000 square feet) and the recommended size (6,625 square feet) is 3,625 square feet. Therefore, the lesser of the two and what is eligible to be funded is 3,625 square feet.
- To determine the 2025 grant amount, 650 Permanent Toilet square feet is multiplied by the Permanent Toilet square foot grant amount of \$559 for a total of \$363,350. The remaining 2,975 of Permanent Other square feet is multiplied by the Permanent Other square foot grant amount of \$312 for a total of \$928,200. The total supplemental grant amount is \$1,291,550.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Existing MPR (with Food Service) = 3,000 Square Feet (2,650 Permanent Other, 350 Permanent Toilet)

Expanded MPR (with Food Service) = 7,000 Square Feet (6,000 Permanent Other, 1,000 Permanent Toilet)

1,250 Students x 5.3 Square Feet per Student = 6,625 Recommended Square Feet

7,000 Total Expanded Square Feet – 3,000 Existing Square Feet = 4,000 New Square Feet

6,625 Recommended Square Feet – 3,000 Existing Square Feet = 3,625 Square Feet

2,975 Permanent Other Square Feet x \$312 = \$928,200

650 Permanent Toilet Square Feet x \$559 = \$363,350

Total Supplemental Grant Amount = \$1,291,550

Considerations

- By basing the funding on the Permanent/Portable Other and Toilet square footage that is being built, Option 1 considers the actual type of space built when determining the supplemental grant amount.
- When a new project is funded based on the lesser of the size of the new facility and the recommended square footage, the grant only funds *up to* what is recommended.
- By considering the existing MEF space in an expansion project, the supplemental grant would not fund any work done to the existing space. Only the lesser of the new square footage being built or the delta between the existing and the recommended square footage would be funded.
- Funding within the program is made more consistent by aligning how MEF spaces are funded with how the Facility Hardship Replacement and Charter Rehabilitation programs are funded.
- Option 1 differs from how existing MEF (New Construction) UOG applications are currently funded. Existing UOG MEF applications are funded by using a calculation to determine the appropriate number of pupil grants to fund the MEF space and funding is determined by using per pupil grant amounts. Instead, this method would fund using square footage grant amounts based on Permanent/Portable Toilet and Other square footage.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Option 2

In this option, the supplemental grant amount would be determined by using a square footage calculation to determine the maximum pupil grant amount for the facility, similar to the existing MEF (UOG) calculation in SFP Regulation 1859.77.3(a)(7). However, instead of using the New Construction base grant amount, the Modernization base grant amount will be used in this calculation. Note, the site's Modernization baseline eligibility will not be adjusted because of this grant (beyond the pupil grants requested in Section 2).

- New projects would be funded based on the *lesser* of:
 - The total size of the new MEF, or
 - The recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.
- Expansion projects would be funded based on the *lesser* of:
 - The delta between the existing MEF space and the total size of the expanded MEF, or
 - The delta between the existing MEF space and the recommended size of the MEF based on current enrollment.

New Projects

The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount for new projects is summarized as:

Determine the *lesser* of the following:

- The recommended MEF size, or
- The total square footage of the new facility.

Multiply the lesser of the two by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot grant amount. As this is a modernization supplemental grant, the square foot grant amounts will be utilized at a 60/40 split. Divide that product by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type. Round up. That number is the maximum pupil amount for the facility. The supplemental grant amount is the maximum pupil amount for the facility multiplied by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)**Option 2 (New Projects) Example – Recommended Size**

A middle school (7-8) with a CBEDS of 1,250 does not have a MPR and is building a permanent MPR (with food service) that is 7,000 square feet.

- In order to determine the recommended MEF size, multiply the CBEDS at the site (1,250) by 5.3 square feet (see square footage chart above). The product of this calculation is 6,625 square feet, which exceeds the recommended minimum of 5,000 square feet. Therefore, the recommended size of the MEF is 6,625 square feet. The lesser of the recommended size (6,625 square feet) and the new facility (7,000 square feet) is the recommended size.
- To determine the maximum pupil amount for the facility, multiply the recommended MEF size by the Permanent Other square foot grant amount of \$312 for a total of \$2,067,000. Divide that amount by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type (\$6,381) and round up. The result is 324 (rounded up). This is the maximum pupil amount for the facility.
- To determine the 2025 grant amount, multiply the maximum pupil amount for the facility (324) by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project (\$6,381). The supplemental grant amount is \$2,067,444.

Existing MPR (with Food Service) = 0 Square Feet
 New MPR (with Food Service) = 7,000 Square Feet
 1,250 Students x 5.3 Square Feet per Student = 6,625 Recommended Square Feet

6,625 Permanent Other Square feet x \$312 = \$2,067,000
 $\$2,067,000 / \$6,381$ (Modernization Base Grant for 7-8 pupils) = 323.9304
 Round Up to the Nearest Whole Number = 324
 $324 \times \$6,381 = \$2,067,444$
Total Supplemental Grant Amount = \$2,067,444

Expansion Projects

The calculation to determine the supplemental grant amount for expansion projects is summarized as:

Determine the *lesser* of the following:

- The delta between the existing MEF size and the recommended MEF size,
or

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

- The delta between the existing MEF size and the total size of the expanded facility.

Multiply the lesser of the two by the Permanent/Portable Other square foot grant amount. Divide that product by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type. Round up. That number is the maximum pupil amount for the facility. The supplemental grant amount is the maximum pupil amount for the facility multiplied by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project.

Option 2 (Expansion Projects) Example – Delta of Existing MEF and Recommended Size

A middle school (7-8) with a CBEDS of 1,250 has an existing MPR with food service that is 3,000 square feet and is expanding it by 4,000 square feet. The newly expanded MPR will have a total of 7,000 square feet.

- In order to determine the recommended MEF size, multiply the CBEDS at the site (1,250) by 5.3 square feet (see square footage chart above). The product of this calculation is 6,625 square feet, which exceeds the recommended minimum of 5,000 square feet. Therefore, the recommended size is 6,625 square feet.
- The delta between the existing MEF square footage (3,000 square feet) and the total size of the expanded facility (7,000 square feet) is 4,000 square feet. The delta between the existing MEF square footage (3,000 square feet) and the recommended size (6,625 square feet) is 3,625 square feet. Therefore, the lesser of the two and what is eligible to be funded is 3,625 square feet.
- To determine the maximum pupil amount, multiply 3,625 by the Permanent Other square foot grant amount of \$312 for a total of \$1,131,000. Divide that amount by the Modernization base grant amount for the project type (\$6,381) and round up. The result is 178 (rounded up). This is the maximum pupil amount for the facility.
- To determine the 2025 grant amount, multiply the maximum pupil amount for the facility (178) by the Modernization base grant amount for the type of project (\$6,381). The supplemental grant amount is \$1,135,818.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Existing MPR (with Food Service) = 3,000 Square Feet
Expanded MPR (with Food Service) = 7,000 Square Feet
 $1,250 \text{ Students} \times 5.3 \text{ Square Feet per Student} = 6,625 \text{ Recommended Square Feet}$

$7,000 \text{ Total Expanded Square Feet} - 3,000 \text{ Existing Square Feet} = 4,000 \text{ New Square Feet}$
 $6,625 \text{ Recommended Square Feet} - 3,000 \text{ Existing Square Feet} = 3,625 \text{ Square Feet}$

$3,625 \text{ Permanent Other Square feet} \times \$312 = \$1,131,000$
 $\$1,131,000 / \$6,381 \text{ (Modernization Base Grant for 7-8 pupils)} = 177.2449$
Round Up to the Nearest Whole Number = 178
 $178 \times \$6,381 = \$1,135,818$
Total Supplemental Grant Amount = \$1,135,818

Considerations

- Option 2 is most similar to how the existing MEF (New Construction) grant is currently funded. The main difference is that this option utilizes Modernization base grant amounts to determine funding.
- Option 2 does not differentiate between Other and Toilet square footage being built, but instead focuses on total square footage. All Permanent space is funded at the same amount and all Portable space is funded at the same amount.
- By considering the existing MEF space in an expansion project, only the new square footage being built (not to exceed the recommended size) is funded.

Existing Use of Grants (UOG) - MEF Calculation

For comparison purposes, staff has included an overview of the existing MEF calculation pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a), as requested. Please note that the current method for funding an MEF is a New Construction UOG request that diverts pupil grants intended to construct classrooms to house un-housed pupils to construct MEFs instead and directly draws down on a district's new construction eligibility baseline. It is not a supplemental grant. Additionally, the existing calculation does not differentiate between new and expansion projects to determine the grant amount. However, it does require a check to ensure that an existing facility is 60 percent or less than the recommended size in order to be eligible for the grant. This determination has no bearing on the amount of funding received.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

The calculation is summarized as:

Determine the recommended MEF size. Multiply that recommended MEF size by the Permanent Other square foot grant amount. Divide that product by the New Construction base grant amount for the project type. Round up. That number is the total maximum pupil grants that can be requested. As a UOG request to construct an MEF, pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a), is a diversion of new construction pupil grants, the grant amount is the number of pupil grants requested in Section 2a, not to exceed the calculated maximum request and the district's available new construction eligibility, multiplied by the New Construction base grant amount for the type of project.

MEF (UOG) Request Example

A middle school (7-8) with a CBEDS of 1,250 does not have an MPR and is building a permanent MPR (with food service) that is 7,000 square feet.

- In order to determine the recommended MEF size, multiply the CBEDS at the site (1,250) by 5.3 square feet (see square footage chart above). The product of this calculation is 6,625 square feet. Therefore, the site's existing facility is inadequate as the existing square footage (0 square feet) is less than 60 percent of the square footage necessary for the current CBEDS for the site plus the Net School Building Capacity of the proposed project.
- To determine the maximum pupil grants that can be requested for the facility, multiply the recommended MEF size (6,625 square feet) by the Permanent Other square foot grant amount of \$260 for a total of \$1,722,500. Divide that amount by the New Construction base grant amount for the project type (\$16,761) and round up. The result is 103 (rounded up). The application can request up to 103 7-8 new construction pupil grants for this facility.
- To determine the 2025 grant amount, it will be assumed that the district has sufficient new construction eligibility to request the maximum pupil grants for the facility. Multiply the maximum pupil amount for the facility (103) by the New Construction base grant amount for the type of project (\$16,761). The grant amount is \$1,726,383.

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STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Existing MPR (with Food Service) = 0 Square Feet
New MPR (with Food Service) = 7,000 Square Feet
1,250 Students x 5.3 Square Feet per Student = 6,625 Recommended Square Feet

6,625 Permanent Other Square feet x \$260 = \$1,722,500
\$1,722,500 / \$16,761 (New Construction Base Grant for 7-8 pupils) = 102.7683
Round Up to the Nearest Whole Number = 103
103 x \$16,761 = \$1,726,383
Total Grant Amount = \$1,726,383

Summary of Funding Outcomes

Methods	Total Funding (New Project)	Total Funding (Expansion Project)
Option 1	\$2,314,000	\$1,291,550
Option 2	\$2,067,444	\$1,135,818
MEF (UOG)	\$1,726,383	\$1,726,383

Note: The example scenarios for New Projects were the same across all three methods, and the example scenarios for Expansion Projects were the same across all three methods.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends Option 1.

OPSC has identified three factors to be considered when determining funding for the grant: the size of the facility constructed, the type of construction (Permanent or Portable), and the type of square footage within the facility (Toilet and Non-Toilet).

Option 1 considers all three factors above and aligns the grant funding most closely with the project scope by basing the funding on the amount of Permanent/Portable Other and Toilet square footage that is being built.

Option 2 also factors in square footage as it differentiates between Permanent or Portable construction, however, it does not account for the amount of Other or Toilet square footage constructed.

Additionally, Option 1 allows for additional consistency within the program by aligning how MEF spaces are funded with how the Facility Hardship Replacement and Charter Rehabilitation programs are funded.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Proposed Amendments to SFP Regulations

Attachment A10b includes the full proposed amendments to the SFP Regulations.

Below is a summary of the proposed amendments.

Section 1859.2 – Definitions

OPSC proposes an amendment to Section 1859.2 to include a definition for a Minimum Essential Facility.

Article 8 – New Construction and Modernization Grant Determinations

OPSC proposes to add Section 1859.77.5 to detail the eligibility criteria and funding calculation for this grant.

Section 1859.79.2 – Use of Modernization Grant Funds

OPSC proposes an amendment to clarify that the new square footage resulting from this supplemental grant is an allowable use of this supplemental grant.

Proposed Amendments to the Form SAB 50-04

Instructions

OPSC proposes adding additional instructions in the *Modernization Additional Grant Request* section (Section 6).

The instructions will read:

Check the box if the district is requesting an Additional Grant for a Minimum Essential Facility pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.5. Check the box for the type of facility being requested (if the facility is a hybrid facility, select 'Other' and indicate the type of facility on the line provided) and indicate the type and amount of square footage being built in the project. Then check the appropriate box depending on whether the MEF is permanent construction or not.

Section 6 – Modernization Additional Grant Request

OPSC proposes adding a series of check boxes labelled "f. Minimum Essential Facilities" to Section 6 of the Form SAB 50-04 for districts to request the MEF Supplemental Grant.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

- Within the new “f” section of the Form SAB 50-04, there would be a series of sub-check boxes for each of the four MEF types (multipurpose, gymnasium, library kitchen), as well as a fifth sub-check box and subsequent line for districts requesting a hybrid facility to indicate the type of hybrid facility.
- Below the five sub-check boxes for the MEF type would be two lines labelled Toilet (sq. ft.) and Other (sq. ft.) for districts to indicate the amount and type of square footage being built in the project.
- Below the two lines for square footage would be the question “Is the MEF Permanent Construction?” with two check boxes indicating “Yes” or “No.”

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Education Code Section 17073.16 – Modernization Eligibility Determination

(a) A school district eligible for funding pursuant to this article may receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(1) Expanding an existing gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen, if the facility is 60 percent or less than the department's recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the school.

(2) Constructing a new gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen if the site is lacking one or more of the specified facilities.

(b) A site may receive a supplemental grant for only one project described in subdivision (a).

...

(d) The funding provided under this section shall be in addition to any other funding provided pursuant to this article.

(e) The board, in consultation with the Superintendent, shall develop regulations implementing this section.

School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation 1859.50. Calculations to Determine New Construction Baseline Eligibility.

The district shall calculate its eligibility determination by completion of the Form SAB 50-03. Eligibility determination for New Construction Grant(s) may be requested on either a district-wide basis, a HSAA or Super HSAA basis.

If a district requests to have its eligibility determination made on a district-wide basis, eligibility for future grants in the district must be filed on the same basis for a period of five years from the date the district received an apportionment that was justified by eligibility determined on a district-wide basis.

If a district requests to re-file its eligibility determination from district-wide to HSAA or Super HSAA after the five year time period has elapsed, the existing school building capacity in the HSAA or Super HSAA will be determined based on the classrooms available in the HSAA or Super HSAA at the time of the initial district-wide request for eligibility determination. Once the baseline eligibility has been determined for the HSAA or Super HSAA, it will be adjusted for classrooms constructed, funded or acquired in that HSAA or Super HSAA as provided by Section 1859.51.

If the district requests to have its eligibility determination made on a HSAA or Super HSAA, it must meet the criteria of Section 1859.41.

The calculated eligibility on the Form SAB 50-03, is the initial eligibility of the district, the HSAA or Super HSAA and shall be referenced as the baseline

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eligibility for future SFP funding. The baseline eligibility is the basis for filing Form SAB 50-04, for a new construction SFP grant.

If a special education program and the title to the related facilities is transferred between a school district and county office of education after the baseline eligibility was established by the Board, the following shall be required if the title transfer took place after January 1, 2007, or if requested by the school district and county office of education due to a title transfer that took place prior to January 1, 2007:

- (a) The sending School District's existing school building capacity shall be adjusted pursuant to Section 1859.51(r).
- (b) The receiving School District's existing school building capacity shall be adjusted pursuant to Section 1859.51(i).
- (c) The sending School District's enrollment projection shall be adjusted pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.75(f).
- (d) The receiving School District shall remit to the State a proportionate share of any financial hardship assistance provided for the project as described in Section 1859.106.

For purposes of this paragraph, the transfer of title to facilities shall also include:

- (1) A pre-existing lease, for the duration of more than five years whether in a single lease or cumulative total of several leases, of the receiving School District's facilities by the sending School District that is terminated after transfer of the special education program takes place.
- (2) A lease, for the duration of more than five years whether in a single lease or cumulative total of several leases, of the sending School District's facilities by the receiving School District.

There shall not be any further adjustments made as a result of any subsequent transfers of that program for a period of five years from the date of the initial transfer or before all applicable funds have been remitted to the State as a result of the initial transfer. Both School Districts shall submit a Form SAB 50-01 for enrollment changes immediately upon transfer of title.

A district affected by a reorganization election on or after November 4, 1998 may file an application for a determination of new construction baseline eligibility after a successful reorganization election.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.3(a) states, in part:

New Construction Grant funds and any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Section

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17072.35; and may also be utilized for the cost incurred by the district for the development and implementation of remedial action plan approved by the DTSC pursuant to Education Code Section 17213.

Authorization for use of New Construction Grants for which the final plans and specifications for the project were accepted by the DSA after January 22, 2003 may be requested as follows:

(a) A district may request new construction grants that exceed the capacity of the project based on loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2) and any loading standards adopted by the SAB by these regulations if the project is to construct a multipurpose, gymnasium, Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid, and/or library, or for an Alternative Education school to construct a multipurpose/gymnasium, library, counseling offices, and/or conference rooms, at an existing site that does not have an existing or adequate facility of the type being requested when all of the following is met:

(1) The district must adopt a school board resolution that has been discussed at a public hearing at a regularly scheduled meeting of the district's governing board on a date preceding the application filing that includes the following:

(A) An acknowledgement that funds for the purposes of housing the excess pupils are being diverted to another project.

(B) An acknowledgement that the State has satisfied its obligation, pursuant to Section 1859.50, to house the pupils receiving grants in the project.

(C) A plan outlined in the resolution that identifies how the district has housed or will house the pupils receiving grants in the project in school buildings as defined in Education Code Section 17368. The plan must certify one of the following methods:

1. The district will construct or acquire facilities for housing the pupils with funding not otherwise available to the SFP as a district match within five years of project approval by the SAB, and the district must identify the source of the funds; or

2. The district will utilize higher district loading standards providing the loading standards are within the approved district's teacher contract and do not exceed 33:1 per classroom.

(2) The existing school site was not constructed under the SFP.

(3) The proposed project includes no more than eight classrooms.

(4) Grants requests, above 100 percent of the number of pupils to be housed, based on Special Day Class pupil eligibility are only permitted under this subsection (a) when building a Special Day Class facility.

(5) For purposes of this Section, a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid is considered to be both a multipurpose and a gymnasium. A school site with a

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middle school and/or high school pupils is eligible for one multipurpose and one gymnasium; therefore, if a school site has an adequate multipurpose and an adequate gymnasium, it is not eligible for a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid under this Section.

(6) For purposes of this section to determine if an existing facility is inadequate, the existing square footage is less than 60 percent of the square footage necessary for the current CBEDS for the site plus the Net School Building Capacity of the proposed project as calculated pursuant to Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2., except for Alternative Education Schools. For Alternative Education Schools, refer to the following:

(a) With the exception of Approved Applications that meet the requirements of Section 1859.107(a), districts seeking a Modernization Grant must submit Form SAB 50-04 for any one of the following:

- (1) at least 52 Non-Severe grants, or
- (2) at least 36 Severe grants, or
- (3) at least 101 grants, or
- (4) the remaining modernization eligibility at the school site if less than the grants in (1), (2), or (3).

(b) Form SAB 50-04 requesting Modernization Grant funds that do not meet the above criteria will not be accepted by the SAB.

(7) The maximum excess pupil amount being requested for this type of use of grants request, is calculated by the following:

(A) Multiply the current CBEDS for the site plus the Net School Building Capacity for the proposed project by the square footage for the type of facility being requested, as follows:

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1. For Alternative Education Schools, refer to the chart above.
2. For a multipurpose room, gymnasium, and/or library, refer to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2.
3. For a Multipurpose/Gym Hybrid:
 - a. For school sites with middle school pupils, use 15.2 square feet per pupil, with a minimum of 8,056 square feet and a maximum of 18,848 square feet.
 - b. For school sites with high school pupils, use 18.6 square feet per pupil, with a minimum of 10,193 square feet and a maximum of 21,874 square feet.
- (B) Multiply the product in (a)(7)(A) above by the per square foot grant amount of \$154. This per square foot grant amount will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.
- (C) Divide the product in (a)(7)(B) above by the New Construction Grant amount for the project grade level, rounded up to the nearest whole number.
- ...

SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.4. Modernization Additional Grant for Fire Code Requirements.

(a) In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide the following grant amounts for each pupil included in an application for modernization if the project includes an automatic fire detection and alarm system as described in Education Code Section 17074.52 or the fire detection and alarm system is deferred as authorized by Subdivision (b) of Education Code Section 17074.50:

- (1) \$72.12 for each elementary school pupil.
- (2) \$72.12 for each middle school pupil.
- (3) \$72.12 for each high school pupils.
- (4) \$134.14 for each pupil that is a Severely Disabled Individual with Exceptional Needs.
- (5) \$200.49 for each pupil that is a Non-Severely Disabled Individual with Exceptional Needs.

(b) Pursuant to Subdivision (c) of Education Code Section 17074.56, the Board shall provide the grant amounts shown in (a) above, in addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, for each pupil included in an application for modernization if all the following criteria are met:

- (1) The final plans for the modernization project were submitted to the Division of the State Architect for review and approval between September 1, 2001 and June 30, 2002.
- (2) The final plans for the modernization project included an automatic fire detection and alarm system as described in Education Code Section 17074.52 or the project will include the system prior to the completion of the project.

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(3) The modernization project did not receive the entire modernization Adjusted Grant apportionment by June 30, 2002.

The amounts shown in (a) above shall be adjusted annually in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.78.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.3. Minimal Requests for Modernization Grant Funds.

(a) With the exception of Approved Applications that meet the requirements of Section 1859.107(a), districts seeking a Modernization Grant must submit Form SAB 50-04 for any one of the following:

- (1) at least 52 Non-Severe grants, or
- (2) at least 36 Severe grants, or
- (3) at least 101 grants, or
- (4) the remaining modernization eligibility at the school site if less than the grants in (1), (2), or (3).

(b) Form SAB 50-04 requesting Modernization Grant funds that do not meet the above criteria will not be accepted by the SAB.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.83(a) states, in part:

In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, a district is eligible for funding as a result of unusual circumstances that created excessive project costs beyond the control of the district. The Excessive Cost Hardship Grant shall be based on any of the following:

(a) Excessive Cost due to Geographic Location.

A district with a project that is located in a geographic area designated in the Geographic Percentage Chart below is eligible for the sum of the Excessive Cost Hardship Grant(s) determined by multiplying the indicated percentage factor shown in the Geographic Percentage Chart below by each of the following amounts:

- (1) The New Construction Grant and the Modernization Grant.
- (2) The funding provided by Sections 1859.71.2, 1859.71.3, 1859.72, 1859.73, 1859.73.2, 1859.76(d)(1) and (2), 1859.78.4, 1859.78.5, 1859.82.1, 1859.82.2, 1859.83(b), (c), (d) and (e) and 1859.125(a)(1) through (a)(2).

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1. Facility Hardship Program.

“School Building” for the purposes of this Section shall have the same definition as Education Code Section 17283 and shall also exclude any districtwide administrative facilities.

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A district is eligible for Facility Hardship funding to repair, replace, or construct School Buildings or related required components that are currently causing a health and safety threat to the students and/or staff. Projects solely to replace components that have reached the end of their useful life, perform routine maintenance or repair, issues resulting from the deferment of routine maintenance or repair, lack of current code compliance, or the addition of components that were not previously existing, do not meet the qualifying criteria of the program. However, this work may be incorporated into a qualifying Facility Hardship application if it is required to be completed to gain DSA approval.

Beginning 90 days after the effective date of this Section [November 29, 2020], Approved Applications requesting Facility Hardship Program funding shall be submitted to OPSC within 12 months of DSA approval for the scope of work mitigating the identified health and safety threat. If the project does not require DSA approval, then the Approved Application for funding must be received within the 6 months following project completion, as demonstrated by the earliest of the following: the date that the notice of completion of the project has been filed; occupancy of any portion of the project Facility; or when the School Buildings or components of the School Buildings in the project are currently in use by the district. If a district demonstrates that extreme or unusual circumstances prevented the submission of an eligible application within the applicable timeline outlined above, OPSC may allow up to an additional 6 months for submittal.

(a) Districts may qualify for funding to replace or construct new School Buildings. Factors to be considered by the Board to determine eligibility for Facility Hardship program replacement funding may include, but are not limited to:

(1) Damage or loss as a result of a natural disaster such as a fire, flood, or earthquake.

(2) Proximity to a major freeway, airport, electrical facility, high power transmission lines, dam, pipeline, or industrial facility.

(3) Adverse air quality.

(4) Structural deficiency to the School Building, and

(5) Site conditions such as faulting, toxic soil, or liquefaction.

(b) To qualify for replacement funding for School Buildings, the district must submit an Approved Application for funding and either (1) or (2) below:

(1) For School Buildings that are lost, destroyed, or unable to be repaired, the district must submit:

(A) A report from an industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) that states that the

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only way to mitigate the health and safety threat is to replace the School Building(s).

(B) Documentation which demonstrates that the facilities in the project must be reconstructed in order to house the current enrollment of the district.

(2) For permanent School Buildings where the cost to rehabilitate the School Building(s) exceeds 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost, or for Portable Classrooms where the cost to rehabilitate exceeds the Portable Classroom Replacement Grant or Portable Toilet Replacement Grant, the district must submit:

(A) A report by an industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) that outlines the minimum work to mitigate the health and safety threat and remain in the existing School Building. If the threat is due to the presence of mold, OPSC must conduct a site visit to discuss the scope of the project prior to remediation. If the remediation is done prior to a site visit, the application will be ineligible for funding. Requests for asbestos mitigation must include lab test results indicating the asbestos is currently friable, and provides the location, material, and testing methods used.

(B) A letter of concurrence from a governmental agency that has jurisdiction or expertise over the field in which the health and safety threat originates. The letter must concur with the industry specialist report on both 1. and 2. below:

1. An imminent health and safety threat to student and/or staff exists.
2. The mitigation measures outlined in the industry specialist's report are the minimum measures required to mitigate the threat and allow the continued use of the School Building(s).

(C) Applications must include a detailed Form SAB 58-01 that meets the following requirements:

1. The Form SAB 58-01 must use the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication by Sierra West Publishing. For all materials or items listed in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication, amounts entered on the Form SAB 58-01 must use the provided unit costs. For individual materials or items that are not contained in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair publication, the district must provide supporting documentation for OPSC to review the requested unit cost.
2. All requested line items shall include Construction Specifications Institute reference number (CSI #), description, F3 total unit cost amount, and quantity. Any line items that include amounts in lump-sum formats will not be reviewed or approved.
3. The work in the Form SAB 58-01 shall match the work outlined in the report provided by the industry specialist (a person or entity that specializes in the specific area of expertise for that health and safety issue) for the minimum work required to mitigate the health and safety threat.

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4. The estimate submitted to OPSC shall be for the same scope of work reviewed and concurred to by DSA, and that is referenced in the governmental concurrence letter for the project.

5. The Form SAB 58-01 may also include any work required by DSA to obtain plan approval.

(D) A cost/benefit analysis that demonstrates the minimum work required to mitigate the health and safety threat and remain in the School Building exceeds 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost of the existing Square Footage of the School Building. The minimum work required may include work required by DSA to gain approval for the mitigation project.

...

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2. Seismic Mitigation Program.

“School Building” for the purposes of this Section shall have the same definition as Education Code Section 17283 and shall also exclude any districtwide administrative facilities.

A school district is eligible for funding to repair, reconstruct, or replace the Most Vulnerable Category 2 Buildings which were originally constructed to be used as School Facilities and pose an unacceptable risk of injury to its occupants in the event of seismic activity. Program eligibility is determined by the DSA while determination of grant funding is determined by the Board based on the following criteria.

Notwithstanding Sections 1859.93 and 1859.93.1, all applications for the seismic mitigation of the Most Vulnerable Category 2 Buildings shall be funded in the order of receipt of an Approved Application for funding. Any grants provided for the purpose of this section shall be provided as a new construction project and allocated on a 50 percent state share basis.

...

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PROPOSED REGULATIONS

Section 1859.2. Definitions.

For the purpose of these regulations, the terms set forth below shall have the following meanings, subject to the provisions of the Act:

...

"Minimum Essential Facility" is defined as a gymnasium, multipurpose room, library and/or school kitchen pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16, or a hybrid combination of any of the four, including, but not limited to, multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid, multipurpose/school kitchen hybrid, or multipurpose/gymnasium/school kitchen.

...

Note: Authority cited: Sections 17070.35 and 17078.64, Education Code.

Reference: Sections 17009.5, 17017.6, 17017.7, 17021, 17047, 17050, 17051, 17070.15, 17070.51(a), 17070.71, 17070.77, 17071.10, 17071.25, 17071.30, 17071.33, 17071.35, 17071.40, 17071.75, 17071.76, 17072.10, 17072.12, 17072.18, 17072.33, 17073.16, 17073.25, 17074.10, 17074.30, 17075.10, 17075.15, 17077.40, 17077.42, 17077.45, 17078.52, 17078.56, 17078.72(k), 17079, 17079.10, 17280, 56026 and 101012(a)(8), Education Code; Section 53311, Government Code; and Sections 1771.3 in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014 and 1771.5, Labor Code.

Section 1859.77.5. Modernization Additional Grant for Minimum Essential Facilities.

In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide the following grant amounts for an application for modernization if the project includes a Minimum Essential Facility pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16.

(a) A district may request a modernization supplemental grant, in addition to a complete application for funding, pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16 to construct a new or expand an existing multipurpose, gymnasium, library, school kitchen, or a hybrid combination of any of the four, including, but not limited to, multipurpose/gymnasium hybrid, multipurpose/school kitchen hybrid, or multipurpose/gymnasium/school kitchen, when all of the following is met:

(1) The site does not have an existing Minimum Essential Facility, or the existing Minimum Essential Facility is not adequate to serve the enrollment of the school.

(A) For the purposes of this Section, to determine if an existing Minimum Essential Facility is inadequate, the existing square footage is 60 percent or less than the square footage necessary for the current CBEDS at the site as calculated pursuant to Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2.

(2) The site has not previously received funding pursuant to this article to construct or expand a Minimum Essential Facility.

(3) An Approved Application for Modernization funding has been received by the OPSC for a project wherein the DSA-approved plans contain in the scope of work the construction or expansion of a Minimum Essential Facility eligible for this grant pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16.

(A) An Approved Application received by the OPSC, on or after October 31, 2024, may be amended to request this supplemental grant provided the plans and specifications that contain the expansion or construction of a Minimum Essential Facility eligible for this supplemental grant were approved by the DSA prior to the receipt of the Approved Application.

(B) If a district wishes to amend its Approved Application to include a request for this supplemental grant and the plans and specifications were approved by DSA after the receipt of the Approved Application, the district must request in writing that the Approved application be withdrawn and removed from the OPSC workload list. The resubmitted application will receive a new received date by the OPSC.

(4) The construction contract(s) for the construction or expansion of the Minimum Essential Facility was executed on or after July 3, 2024.

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(5) The Minimum Essential Facility must meet the requirements pursuant to the *California Code of Regulations, Title 5.*

(6) For purposes of this Section, a multipurpose/gymnasium Hybrid is considered to be both a multipurpose and a gymnasium. A school site with a middle school and/or high school pupils is eligible for one multipurpose and one gymnasium; therefore, if a school site has an adequate multipurpose and an adequate gymnasium, it is not eligible for a Multipurpose/Gymnasium Hybrid under this Section.

(b) If all conditions in Subsection (a) are met, and the site is lacking one or more of the Minimum Essential Facilities, the application is eligible to receive a supplemental grant based on the square footage of the new Minimum Essential Facility constructed justified by enrollment at the project site as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment at the site using the latest CBEDS Report.

(2) The eligible Square Footage for the Minimum Essential Facility shall be the lesser of the actual Square Footage constructed or the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2.

(3) If a School District submits documentation that demonstrates additional toilet space must be constructed to obtain plan approval from DSA, the eligible Toilet Square Footage may be increased by the amount of Square Footage required to obtain plan approval.

(4) Beginning January 22, 2025, the permanent Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$312 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$559 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(5) Beginning January 22, 2025, the portable Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$69 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$181 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(c) If all conditions in Subsection (a) are met, and the site's existing Minimum Essential Facility is not adequate to serve the enrollment of the school, the application is eligible to receive a supplemental grant based on the square footage of the expanded Minimum Essential Facility constructed justified by enrollment at the project site as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment at the site using the latest CBEDS Report.

(2) The eligible Square Footage for the Minimum Essential Facility shall be the lesser of the delta between the Square Footage of the existing Minimum Essential Facility and actual Square Footage constructed or the delta between the Square Footage of the existing Minimum Essential Facility and the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2.

(3) If a School District submits documentation that demonstrates that additional toilet space must be constructed to obtain plan approval from DSA, the eligible Toilet Square Footage may be increased by the amount of Square Footage required to obtain plan approval.

(4) Beginning January 22, 2025, the permanent Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$312 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$559 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

(5) Beginning January 22, 2025, the portable Square Footage amount(s) determined in (b)(2) above shall be multiplied by \$69 per square foot for all non-Toilet Facilities and by \$181 for Toilet Facilities (includes shower/locker area and physical therapy area for individuals with Exceptional Needs). The amounts shown will be adjusted in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71.

Note: Authority cited: Section 17074.25, Education Code.

Reference: Section 17073.16 and 17074.25, Education Code

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Section 1859.79.2. Use of Modernization Grant Funds.

The Modernization Grant plus any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Sections 17073.16, 17074.25, 17074.10(f) and 17070.15(i) and may also be utilized for other purposes as set forth in Education Code Section 100420(c), and Labor Code Section 1771.3(a) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014. Modernization funding may also be used for the costs incurred by the district directly or through a contract with a third party provider for the initiation and enforcement of a LCP. Modernization funding, with the exception of savings, is limited to expenditure on the specific site where the modernization grant eligibility was generated. The grant may not be used for the following:

(a) New building area, with the exception of the following:

(1) Replacement building area of like kind. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the district.

(2) Building area required by the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or by the Division of the State Architect's (DSA) handicapped access requirements.

(3) A Minimum Essential Facility receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.5. Only the funding provided by Section 1859.77.5 may be used on the Minimum Essential Facility.

(b) New site development items, with the exception of:

(1) Replacement, repair or additions to existing site development.

(2) Site development items required by the federal ADA Act or by the DSA's handicapped access requirements.

(c) the evaluation and removal of hazardous or solid waste and/or hazardous substances when the Department of Toxic Substance Control has determined that the site contains dangerous levels of a hazardous substance, hazardous waste, or both that exceed ten percent of the combined adjusted grant and the district matching share for the project.

(d) Leased facilities not owned by another district or a county superintendent.

Modernization Grant funds may be used on any school facilities on the site, with the exception of portable classroom facilities eligible for an additional apportionment pursuant to Education Code Sections 17073.15 and 17074.10(f) and as defined in Section 1859.78.8. If the classroom facilities on the site include areas that are currently ineligible for modernization, it will not disqualify those facilities from future modernization funding.

PROPOSED REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM SUPPLEMENTAL GRANT FOR TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN CLASSROOMS

PURPOSE

To discuss and receive stakeholder input regarding proposed regulatory amendments resulting from provisions of Proposition 2, related to the establishment of a new School Facility Program (SFP) supplemental grant for the retrofit or new construction of transitional kindergarten (TK) classrooms for school districts receiving an apportionment for modernization funding.

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17073.16 states in part:

(c) (1) A school district eligible for a modernization apportionment may also receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:

(A) Retrofitting an existing school facility to adequately house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(B) Constructing new transitional kindergarten classrooms if the site is lacking sufficient school facilities to house transitional kindergarten pupils.

(2) A school district that receives a supplemental grant to house transitional kindergarten pupils pursuant to paragraph (1) shall meet the requirements of subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (5) of subdivision (b) of, paragraphs (2) and (3) of subdivision (f) of, and subdivision (g) of, Section 17375.

See Attachment A11a for the remainder of the Authority.

BACKGROUND

The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) held a public meeting on February 13, 2025, to discuss proposed criteria for the implementation of the TK supplemental grant. Various questions were answered during the meeting, and those that were not, are addressed in this item. Additionally, OPSC has developed proposed regulations to implement the new grant.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

Following the February 13 meeting, OPSC staff received additional questions and support for the funding option presented as #2 in the prior meeting report. This option most closely follows the existing California, Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (FDK Program) grant calculation methodology. Stakeholders also requested that OPSC provide examples of the proposed grant calculations for the TK supplemental grant, which are included in this report.

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STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Staff reviewed the questions presented at the February meeting and submitted by email. The following responses are provided:

- Q1. Regarding the State/District share - Did the law state it is a 50/50 match? Is the 60/40 model a reasonable option? Full-Day TK classes were funded at 75 percent in the FDK program. If a 60/40 model is an option, it keeps the math simple for the program.
- A1. The statute provides the grant as a supplement to Modernization funding. Therefore, it follows the standard 60/40 funding model. OPSC has developed an example of how to apply this model beginning on Page 3 below.
- Q2. Can a district request a Title 5 exemption from the California Department of Education (CDE) for retrofitted classrooms under 1,250 square feet?
- A2. Consistent with the FDK Program, districts that request funding to retrofit a TK classroom, where the TK classroom is designed to be less than 1,350 square feet, must request an exemption from CDE and the classrooms shall not be less than 1,250 square feet.
- Q3. Is there an option to look at the reimbursement date prior to July 3, 2024, given that with the expansion of Universal TK, districts couldn't wait to accommodate these new students and had to move forward with their construction plans, and intended to request reimbursement from the FDK program, understanding that there was future intent to provide additional funding for the program?
- A3. Because the statute was chaptered on July 3, 2024, reimbursement should be limited to projects with construction contracts on or after July 3, 2024. This is consistent with past implementation of new statutes as amendments to SFP Regulations by the State Allocation Board.

The prior item on this topic presented three options for calculating the new TK supplemental grant: pupil grant, square footage grant, or a percentage of the modernization base grant. Stakeholder feedback included support for funding the TK supplemental grant based on the current funding model for the FDK Program, which uses the New Construction and Modernization pupil grant amounts and state loading standards as the basis for grant determination. OPSC considered the options presented and concurred with stakeholders' preference. Therefore, examples of the grant calculation based on the pupil grant funding model are presented below.

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STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Pupil Grant Funding Model

The pupil grant funding model was used in the FDK Program. It provides a TK base grant equivalent to 25 Modernization pupil grants to retrofit an existing classroom or 25 New Construction pupil grants for each new TK classroom. The number of classrooms included in the DSA-approved plans that are supported by the enrollment justification will determine the total number of pupil grants provided. Commonly requested supplemental grants are included in the examples to demonstrate how other additional grants will be calculated. The proposed calculations recognize that there will be a portion of the scope of the overall project related to modernizing the school site and a portion specifically related to the retrofit or construction of TK classroom(s).

Example #1 - Retrofit One TK Classroom in a Qualifying Modernization Project

The example below assumes that the applicant is requesting 101 Modernization pupil grants and is retrofitting one existing classroom that is 50 years (or older) into a Title V compliant TK classroom (five classrooms total). OPSC proposes that for these projects, a flat percentage increase would be provided for site development to cover the costs of dedicated kindergarten playgrounds and other required elements for simplicity of administration and also to align with the way site development is funded in the FDK Program. The same approach applies to an increase for 50-year-old utilities on a percentage basis to cover those costs. While not shown here, the Mod base grant could also be increased to the 50-year-old pupil grant amount if available.

Example #2 - New Construction of 1 TK Classroom in a Qualifying Modernization Project

The example below is similar to the preceding example. However, the TK supplemental grant allocations have been updated to reflect the New Construction pupil grant amounts and the associated supplemental grants.

Staff is presenting the following pupil grant funding model to show how the TK base grant, fire alarm, and fire sprinkler grants are calculated from the annual new construction per pupil grants.

While the base grant under new construction is calculated on a 50/50 state/district share basis, the TK supplemental grant is going to be processed under the modernization program on a 60/40 basis (see Table 1). The following example (see Table 2) shows how the funding model will be determined for new TK classrooms constructed.

Base Grant Conversion from New Construction to Modernization (Table 1):

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STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION (cont.)

Summary of Proposed Amendments to SFP Regulations

The following amendments to the regulatory language for the SFP are presented for consideration below in order of appearance (Attachment A11b).

Section 1859.51- Adjustments to the New Construction Baseline Eligibility as a result of constructing new TK classrooms

The FDK Program provides an exclusion for new classrooms constructed with program funds in that the new capacity was not included in the New Construction baseline in EC Section 17375. Therefore, the proposed SFP regulation amendments include an adjustment to the district's new construction baseline if new TK classrooms are constructed with funding from the new supplemental grant, as they are not specifically exempted by EC Section 17071.25. Therefore, SFP Regulation Section 1859.51 has been amended to add a new adjustment type to specify that classrooms added to a site through a TK supplemental grant in an SFP modernization project will be added to the district's gross classroom inventory for purposes of adjusting New Construction eligibility. The proposed amendment also notes an exception for classrooms funded through the FDK Program.

Section 1859.77.6- Add a Section for the TK Supplemental Grant

A new SFP Regulation Section 1859.77.6 is proposed to address the inclusion of a new supplemental grant for TK classrooms. OPSC proposes that the supplemental grant for TK shall be limited to four classrooms per school site. A district may elect to split their request over multiple applications. The purpose of this limitation is to prevent excessive use of the SFP Modernization program to add new classroom area in retrofit projects and to construct new classrooms when a school district may lack New Construction eligibility. School districts with New Construction eligibility may apply for New Construction funding if available after adjusting for new capacity added with the TK supplemental grant.

Future amendments to the Form SAB 50-04 shall include a certification acknowledging this provision.

Section 1859.79.2- Use of Modernization Grant Funds

EC 17073.16 allows for the retrofit and new construction of TK classroom(s) as part of a modernization project. Current SFP Regulations stipulate that modernization grant funds may not be used for new building area. However, in addition to new construction TK classrooms being new building area by nature, new building area is often necessary to retrofit a TK classroom to meet the requirements for Title 5 compliance. Therefore, Section 1859.79.2 is being amended to include TK classrooms as one of the exclusions for new building area within a modernization project.

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AUTHORITY All Applications

Education Code (EC) 17070.35 – General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare. Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

EC Section 17375 – Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program

(a)(1) The California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program is hereby established, under the administration of the State Allocation Board pursuant to the requirements of this section, to provide one-time grants to school districts to construct new school facilities or retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of providing transitional kindergarten classrooms and full-day kindergarten classrooms pursuant to Section 8973, and for the construction of new preschool classrooms, the modernization of existing preschool classrooms, or the

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modernization of existing kindergarten and grade 1 to 12, inclusive, classrooms that would be converted to provide California state preschool programs operated by school districts on a public schoolsite, pursuant to this section.

(2) Moneys appropriated pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, hereby created in the State Treasury, administered by the State Allocation Board.

(3) For the 2018–19 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section, as it read on December 31, 2020.

(4) (A) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of four hundred ninety million dollars (\$490,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section. The funds appropriated in this subparagraph shall be available for encumbrance or expenditure by the State Allocation Board until June 30, 2027.

(B) For the 2022–23 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the 2021–22 fiscal year to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section. The funds appropriated in this subparagraph shall be available for encumbrance or expenditure by the State Allocation Board until June 30, 2028.

(C) (i) Of the moneys allocated to a school district from the appropriation made pursuant to this paragraph, savings and interest achieved upon full completion of an approved project, and as a result of a school district's efficient and prudent expenditure of the moneys allocated, may be used for professional development or instructional materials to build capacity for the implementation of a California state preschool program, a transitional kindergarten program, a full-day kindergarten program, or high priority capital outlay purposes identified by the school district and in accordance with subdivision (f), associated regulations, and any accompanying grant agreement.

(ii) Notwithstanding any other law, for purposes of the funds appropriated in support of this paragraph only, a school district may retain and use savings and interest pursuant to clause (i) even if it receives financial hardship assistance pursuant to Section 17075.10.

(iii) Savings and interest retained by a school district shall be expended within one year of project completion or returned to the state as required by associated regulations and any accompanying grant agreement.

(5) New school facilities built pursuant to this section shall not be included in the eligibility determination used for purposes of the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (Chapter 12.5 (commencing with Section 17070.10) of Part 10).

(b) (1) The State Allocation Board shall award grants to school districts that lack the facilities to provide transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten as required for eligibility pursuant to Sections 17071.25 and 17072.10, that lack facilities that satisfy the design requirements required for new kindergarten

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classrooms as specified in paragraph (2) of subdivision (h) of Section 14030 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations, or that lack the facility capacity to increase California state preschool program services.

(2) Priority for grants shall be given to school districts that meet either of the following criteria:

(A) The school district is financially unable to contribute a portion of, or all of, the local matching share required pursuant to paragraph (3) for a project, and meets the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Sections 17075.10 and 17075.15. For purposes of this section, paragraph (5) of subdivision (d) of Section 17075.15 shall not apply.

(B) (i) For school districts seeking a transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten facilities grant, the school district is located in an underserved community with a high population of pupils who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 42238.01.

(ii) For school districts seeking a preschool facilities grant, the school district is located in an underserved area, as defined in Section 8205, that is prioritized to receive funds for the California state preschool program according to the prioritization process described in Section 8210.

(3) Except for school districts that meet the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10 and as specified in paragraph (4), a school district that applies for a grant pursuant to this section for new construction shall provide 50 percent of the cost of the project, and a school district that applies for a grant pursuant to this section for a retrofit project shall provide 40 percent of the cost of the project.

(4) Except for school districts that meet the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10, a school district shall provide 25 percent of the cost of the project, whether the project is for new construction or retrofit, if the school district does either of the following:

(A) Converts a part-day kindergarten program to a full-day kindergarten program. A school district that was awarded a grant from funds appropriated pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (a) and met the requirements of this paragraph shall have its grant amount adjusted from funds appropriated pursuant to paragraph (4) of subdivision (a) to reflect the requirements of this paragraph.

(B) Commencing with the 2021–22 fiscal year, offers, or expands enrollment in, a California state preschool program or transitional kindergarten program.

(5) (A) A school district seeking a transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten facilities grant from moneys in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account shall provide the Office of Public School Construction with schoolsite enrollment data for the year in which its application is processed and the three immediately preceding years. The Office of Public School Construction shall use this data to verify the schoolsite's overall need for funding pursuant to this section based on the schoolsite's enrollment patterns. As part of this verification, the Office of Public School Construction, in consultation with the State Department of

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Education, shall determine if the schoolsite's need for funding shall be limited to retrofit projects.

(B) For a school district seeking a new construction grant for preschool classrooms from moneys in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, the school district shall demonstrate that its existing classrooms, including outdoor play areas and equipment, are insufficient to meet the needs of providing preschool, and that the school district's projected enrollment in the preschool program exceeds the current preschool program classroom capacity at the applicable schoolsite. A school district shall use both of the following to demonstrate enrollment for purposes of determining eligibility:

(i) The most recent childcare needs assessment conducted by its regional local planning council for preschool age children.

(ii) A current or future contract with the State Department of Education to operate a preschool program.

(6) A school district, county office of education, or community college district seeking a preschool facilities grant shall hold title to the real property where the facilities will be located.

(c) The State Allocation Board shall disburse grant funds to school districts with approved applications for new construction or retrofit projects, to the extent funds are available for the state's applicable matching share, if the school district has provided its applicable local matching share, unless the school district meets the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10, and upon certification by the school district that the school district has entered into a binding contract for completion of the approved project.

(d) The State Allocation Board shall allocate funds to school districts using the same maximum grant eligibility amounts that are used for purposes of the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (Chapter 12.5 (commencing with Section 17070.10) of Part 10), as set forth in Sections 17072.10 and 17072.11 for new construction, and as set forth in Section 17074.10 for retrofit projects.

(e) As a condition of receiving grant funds pursuant to this section, and before the release of those funds, the school district shall do all of the following:

(1) Execute and submit a grant agreement consistent with the applicable sections of the grant agreement specified in Section 1859.90.4 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations.

(2) For a school district applying for grant funds for a transitional kindergarten facilities project, pass a resolution at a public meeting of the governing board of the school district stating the school district's intent to offer, or expand enrollment in, a transitional kindergarten program.

(3) For a school district applying for grant funds for a California state preschool program facilities project, pass a resolution at a public meeting of the governing board of the school district stating the school district's intent to expand enrollment in a preschool program and apply for expanded program service funding, and certify that the school district has or will apply for a contract to operate a preschool program before occupying the to-be-constructed or retrofitted facility.

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(f) (1) A school district may use grant funds awarded for new construction on costs necessary to adequately house preschool, transitional kindergarten, and kindergarten pupils in an approved project, which shall include only the following:

(A) The costs of design, engineering, testing, inspections, plan checking, construction management, site acquisition and development, evaluation and response action costs relating to hazardous substances at a new or existing schoolsite, demolition, construction, landscaping, necessary utility costs, utility connections and other related fees, equipment including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, furnishings, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

(B) The costs of acquiring an existing government-owned or privately owned building, or a privately financed school building, and the necessary costs of converting the government-owned or privately owned building for public school use.

(2) (A) A school district may use grant funds awarded for a retrofit project to retrofit an existing school facility to adequately house preschool, transitional kindergarten, and kindergarten pupils, which shall only include the costs of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other related fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, furniture and equipment, including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, playground safety improvements, the identification, assessment, or abatement of hazardous asbestos, seismic safety improvements, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

(B) Grant funds awarded for a retrofit project shall not be used for costs associated with acquisition and development of real property or for routine maintenance and repair.

(3) A school district shall not use funds to purchase or install portable classrooms. For purposes of this article, "portable classroom" means a classroom building of one or more stories that is designed and constructed to be relocatable and transportable over public streets, and for a single-story portable classroom, is designed and constructed for relocation without the separation of the roof or floor from the building and when measured at the most exterior walls, has a floor area that does not exceed 2,000 square feet.

(g) For a modernization grant pursuant to this article to retrofit an existing preschool classroom, including outdoor play areas and installed equipment, the applicable classroom shall comply with all of the following:

(1) The Field Act, as set forth in Article 3 (commencing with Section 17280) and Article 6 (commencing with Section 17365).

(2) The California Building Standards Code, as set forth in Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations.

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(3) The regulations for early learning and care programs as set forth in Chapter 19 (commencing with Section 18000) of Division 1 of Title 5 of, and Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 101151) of Division 12 of Title 22 of, the California Code of Regulations, as applicable.

(4) Written approval from the State Department of Education that the building plans comply with the standards set forth in Subchapter 1 (commencing with Section 14001) of Chapter 13 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations.

(h) The State Allocation Board may adopt regulations to implement this section. Any regulations adopted pursuant to this section may be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of the Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of these regulations shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare.

(i) Notwithstanding any other law, a school district shall be subject, with regard to this section, to an audit conducted pursuant to Section 41024.

(j) The Office of Public School Construction shall report to the Director of Finance, and shall post on its internet website, information regarding the use of grant funds that have been made available to school districts during each fiscal year grant funds are disbursed pursuant to this section. A final report shall also be issued after projects have been audited pursuant to Section 41024 and any savings have been spent or returned to the state.

(k) The Department of General Services may charge its administrative costs against the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, which shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Finance and which shall not exceed 2.5 percent of the account. These administrative funds shall be subject to the encumbrance or expenditure availability for the appropriations described in paragraph (4) of subdivision (a).

(l) Funds made available to school districts pursuant to this article shall supplement, not supplant, existing funds available for school facilities construction.

(m) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:

(1) "Kindergarten" includes transitional kindergarten, as defined in Section 48000.

(2) "Preschool classroom" means a preschool classroom used or proposed to be used for instructional purposes in a California state preschool program.

(3) "Preschool program" means a full-day California state preschool program pursuant to Article 2 (commencing with Section 8207) of Chapter 2 of Part 6.

(4) "Schoolsite" or "site" means the project site for which the school district is applying for grants under this article.

(5) "School district" means as follows:

(A) For transitional kindergarten and full-day kindergarten facilities grants, "school district" means a school district.

(B) For preschool facilities grants, "school district" means a school district, county office of education, or a community college district that operates a

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preschool program on behalf of, or in lieu of, a school district or county office of education.

School Facility Program Regulation Section 1859.51. Adjustments to the New Construction Baseline Eligibility.

The baseline eligibility for new construction determined on the Form SAB 50-03 will be adjusted as follows:

- (a) Reduced by the number of pupils provided grants in a new construction SFP project and by the number of pupils that received a Preliminary Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.140 or a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.162.2.
- (b) Reduced by the number of pupils housed, based on the loading standards pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2)(A), in a new construction LPP project funded under the provisions of the LPP pursuant to Sections 1859.12 or 1859.13.
- (c) Reduced by the number of pupils housed in additional classrooms constructed or purchased based on the loading standards, pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.25(a)(2)(A), in a modernization SFP project.

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AUTHORITY

Applications Received on or after October 31, 2024

EC Section 17072.35 – New Construction Funding Process

(a) A grant for new construction may be used for any and all costs necessary to adequately house new pupils in any approved project, and those costs may only include the cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, site acquisition and development, evaluation and response action costs relating to hazardous substances at a new or existing schoolsite, demolition, construction, acquisition and installation of portable classrooms, landscaping, necessary utility costs, utility connections and other fees, equipment including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, furnishings, and the upgrading of electrical systems or the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology, including schoolsite-based infrastructure necessary to provide access to broadband internet within the schoolsite. A grant for new construction may also be used to acquire an existing government or privately owned building, or a privately financed school building, and for the necessary costs of converting the government or privately owned building for public school use. A grant for new construction may also be used for the costs of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high performance schools. A grant for new construction may be used for the costs of design, materials, and construction to advance state energy goals pursuant to state law, support outdoor learning environments, or to directly shade and protect pupils from higher average temperatures, which may include incorporating nature and natural materials. A grant for new construction may be used for seismic mitigation purposes and for related design, study, and testing costs.

(b) This section does not preclude a school district from using a grant for new construction to support the construction of a school kitchen, a transitional kindergarten classroom, a facility to support a local educational agency-administered preschool program, including, but not limited to, a California state preschool program set forth in Article 2 (commencing with Section 8207) of Chapter 2 of Part 6, that is operated by a school district and located on a schoolsite operated by the district, or a facility to support school nurses and counselors to increase access to health care and mental health services.

(c) In developing guidelines and regulations for consideration by the board, the State Department of Education shall provide a school district with maximum flexibility in the design and new construction of school facilities.

EC Section 17073.16 – Modernization Eligibility Determination

- (a) A school district eligible for funding pursuant to this article may receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:
 - (1) Expanding an existing gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen, if the facility is 60 percent or less than the department's recommended size needed to serve the enrollment of the school.
 - (2) Constructing a new gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen if the site is lacking one or more of the specified facilities.
- (b) A site may receive a supplemental grant for only one project described in subdivision (a).
- (c) (1) A school district eligible for a modernization apportionment may also receive a supplemental grant for either of the following:
 - (A) Retrofitting an existing school facility to adequately house transitional kindergarten pupils.
 - (B) Constructing new transitional kindergarten classrooms if the site is lacking sufficient school facilities to house transitional kindergarten pupils.
- (2) A school district that receives a supplemental grant to house transitional kindergarten pupils pursuant to paragraph (1) shall meet the requirements of subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (5) of subdivision (b) of, paragraphs (2) and (3) of subdivision (f) of, and subdivision (g) of, Section 17375.
- (d) The funding provided under this section shall be in addition to any other funding provided pursuant to this article.
- (e) The board, in consultation with the Superintendent, shall develop regulations implementing this section.

EC Section 17074.25 – Modernization Apportionment

- (a) (1) A modernization apportionment may be used for an improvement to extend the useful life of, or to enhance the physical environment of, the school. The improvement may only include the cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, the replacement of portable classrooms, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, furniture and equipment, including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, playground safety improvements, the identification, assessment, or abatement of hazardous asbestos, seismic safety improvements, and the upgrading of electrical systems or the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology, including schoolsite-based infrastructure necessary to provide access to broadband internet within the schoolsite. A modernization apportionment may be used for the costs of design, materials, demolition, and construction to advance state energy goals pursuant to state law, support outdoor learning environments, or to directly shade and protect pupils from higher average temperatures, which may include incorporating nature and

natural materials. A modernization grant may not be used for costs associated with acquisition and development of real property or for routine maintenance and repair.

(2) A modernization apportionment may also be used for any of the following:

(A) The cost of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high-performance schools.

(B) Seismic mitigation purposes and related design, study, and testing costs.

(C) To remediate any water outlet used for drinking or preparing food with lead levels in excess of 15 parts per billion.

(D) The control, management, or abatement of lead.

(b) This section shall not preclude a school district from using a grant for modernization to support the modernization of a school kitchen, a transitional kindergarten classroom, a facility to support a local educational agency-administered preschool program, including, but not limited to, a California state preschool program set forth in Article 2 (commencing with Section 8207) of Chapter 2 of Part 6, that is operated by a school district and located on a schoolsite operated by the district, or a facility to support school nurses and counselors to increase access to health care and mental health services.

(c) (1) A modernization apportionment may be used to limit pupil exposure to harmful air pollutants by updating air filtration systems.

(2) (A) This subdivision is declaratory of existing law.

(B) It is the intent of the Legislature in enacting Chapter 714 of the Statutes of 2018 (Assembly Bill 2453 of the 2017–18 Regular Session) to encourage school districts to add air filtration systems to applications for modernization apportionments when air pollution occasionally or regularly exceeds levels known to be harmful to public health.

(d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this article, a school district that is apportioned funds pursuant to Section 17073.16 shall use the supplemental grant for expanding an existing, or constructing a new, gymnasium, multipurpose room, library, or school kitchen.

(e) In developing guidelines and regulations for consideration by the board, the department, in consultation with the State Department of Education, shall provide a school district with maximum flexibility in the design and modernization of school facilities.

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PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

Section 1859.32. Adjustments to Gross Classroom Inventory.

After the gross classroom inventory has been prepared pursuant to Section 1859.31, it will be reduced by the following. Any classrooms:

...

(n) New school facilities built with funds provided by the EC Section 17375 shall not be included in the eligibility determination used for the purposes of the School Facilities Program pursuant to EC Section 17071.25.

Section 1859.51. Adjustments to the New Construction Baseline Eligibility.

The baseline eligibility for new construction determined on the Form SAB 50-03 will be adjusted as follows:

- (a) Reduced by the number of pupils provided grants in a new construction SFP project and by the number of pupils that received a Preliminary Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.140 or a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.162.2.

...

(t) Reduced by the number of pupils housed in additional transitional kindergarten classrooms constructed, pursuant to Education Code Section 17073.16(c) in an SFP modernization project.

Note: Authority cited: Section 17070.35, Education Code.

Reference: Sections 17052, 17070.51, 17071.25, 17071.75, 17071.76, 17072.20, 17077.40, 17078.72, 17079.20, 17375, 42268, and 42270, Education Code.

...

Section 1859.77.6 Modernization Additional Grant for Transitional Kindergarten

Article 8. New Construction and Modernization Grant Determinations

(a) In addition to any other funding authorized by these Regulations, the Board shall provide the grant amounts determined in (b) for each eligible transitional kindergarten classroom, up to a maximum of four classrooms, in an application for modernization if the School District demonstrates a need to adequately house transitional kindergarten pupils as described in Education Code Section 17073.16, and the following conditions are met:

(1) The Approved Application was received on or after October 31, 2024.

(2) Construction contracts for the construction or retrofit of transitional kindergarten classrooms were signed on or after July 3, 2024.

(3) Final DSA and CDE plan approvals for the eligible transitional kindergarten classrooms were obtained prior to the received date of the Approved Application.

(4) The School District lacks the facilities to provide transitional kindergarten instruction at the project school site. A project school site will be considered lacking transitional kindergarten facilities if the calculated transitional kindergarten need, exceeds the existing transitional kindergarten classroom capacity, as determined in (5) below.

(5) The maximum calculated transitional kindergarten classroom need shall be determined by one of the following:

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- (A) Calculating the mean of the first grade, second grade, and third grade enrollment at the time of application processing. The mean shall be rounded up to the nearest whole number.
- (B) Calculating the mean of the transitional kindergarten enrollment at the time of application processing plus two prior enrollment years. The mean shall be rounded up to the nearest whole number.
- (C) Classrooms constructed as kindergarten or transitional kindergarten classrooms or altered to house kindergarten or transitional kindergarten students, regardless of current use, will be included when determining the existing kindergarten and transitional kindergarten classroom capacity, as determined by CDE. For purposes of determining classroom capacity, a loading standard of 25 kindergarten pupils per classroom will be used and all transitional kindergarten classrooms will be loaded for full-day instruction unless the School District indicates that an existing classroom(s) will continue to be used for non-full-day instruction at the completion of the project.
- (6) OPSC shall consult with CDE prior to determination of the Approved Application's need for funding based on the school site's enrollment pattern as determined in (a)(5).
- (7) Applicants requesting the additional grant for transitional kindergarten shall include the following documentation:
- (1) A description of the proposed project including, but not limited to, the following information:
- (A) The total number of transitional kindergarten and kindergarten classrooms on the site prior to the Program project.
- (B) The current CBEDS Report, at the time of application processing, including transitional kindergarten students pursuant to EC Section 48000. To determine the appropriate enrollment reporting year, refer to the following:

<u>OPSC 90 Day Notification of Processing</u>	<u>Enrollment Reporting Year</u>
<u>July 1 through October 31</u>	<u>Submit Prior Fiscal Year Enrollment Data</u>
<u>November 1 through June 30</u>	<u>Submit Current Fiscal Year Enrollment Data</u>

- (C) The enrollment at the site for the three years immediately preceding the enrollment reporting year determined in (7)(B) above.
- (D) The total number of transitional kindergarten and kindergarten classrooms on the site after the completion of the Program project.
- (E) Site map that includes labelling of all facilities and their current use, identifies all classrooms constructed or previously retrofitted to house preschool, transitional kindergarten, and kindergarten students, and identifies any facilities that will be retrofitted in the project. If a School District is requesting a 50-year old utilities grant, identify the age of the building(s).
- (F) The funding must construct or retrofit facilities that result in classroom(s) that meets the design requirements required for new kindergarten classrooms as specified in paragraph (2) of subdivision (h) of Section 14030 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations.
- (G) For new construction projects, classrooms must be not less than 1,350 square feet, including restrooms, storage, teacher preparation, wet and dry areas.
- (8) For retrofit projects, classrooms shall not be less than 1,350 square feet, including restrooms, storage, teacher preparation, wet and dry areas unless both of the following conditions are met:
- (A) The project qualifies for an exemption through CDE pursuant to Title 5, Section 14030(r) of the California Code of Regulations to retrofit a classroom that will be less than 1,350 square feet.
- (B) The classroom shall not be less than 1,250 square feet.
- (9) The School District shall not use funds to purchase, or install, a Portable Classroom(s).
- (b) The additional grant for the new construction of a transitional kindergarten classroom(s) shall be equal to the sum of (1) through (6) beginning January 2025:
- (1) \$19,016 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 for each transitional kindergarten classroom in the DSA-approved plans.

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(2) \$23 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 if the classroom(s) in the DSA-approved plans for the project includes an automatic fire detection and alarm system.

(3) \$318 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 if the DSA-approved plans for the project includes an automatic sprinkler system.

(4) An amount equal to 35 percent of the amount determined in (1) for costs associated with site development, demolition, landscaping and other costs incurred when adding a transitional kindergarten classroom(s) to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the transitional kindergarten project.

(5) An amount equal to 12 percent of the amount determined in (a) for each pupil housed in a multilevel building that will house pupils in all levels of the building if the usable site acreage is less than 75 percent of the site size recommended by CDE, pursuant to Title 5, California Code of Regulations, Section 14010(a), for the master-planned project capacity.

(6) \$11,630 for Small School Districts for the cost necessary for project assistance, as defined in Education Code Section 17072.10(e).

(7) The grant amounts shown in (1), (2), (3) and (4) above shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17072.10.

(c) The additional grant for the retrofit of a transitional kindergarten classroom(s) shall be equal to the sum of (1) through (6) below beginning January 2025:

(1) \$6,034 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 for each transitional kindergarten classroom in the DSA-approved plans.

(2) \$196 for each pupil housed multiplied by 25 for each classroom(s) in the DSA-approved plans if the project includes an automatic fire detection and alarm system.

(3) An amount equal to 35 percent of the amount determined in (a) for costs associated with demolition, landscaping, playground safety improvements and other costs incurred when adding a preschool, transitional kindergarten or kindergarten classroom(s) to a site, utility costs, utility connections and other related fees necessary for the project.

(4) An amount equal to 15 percent of the amount determined in (a) for upgrading existing site development (utilities) work as necessary for the retrofit of 50 years or older permanent buildings.

(5) \$5,170 for Small School Districts for the cost necessary for project assistance, as defined in Education Code Section 17074.10(e).

(6) The grant amounts shown in (1) and (2) above shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17074.10(b).

Note: Authority cited: Section 17070.35, Education Code.

Reference: Sections 17375 and 17073.16, Education Code.

Section 1859.79.2. Use of Modernization Grant Funds.

The Modernization Grant plus any other funds provided by these Regulations shall be expended as set forth in Education Code Sections 17074.25, 17074.10(f) and 17070.15(i) and may also be utilized for other purposes as set forth in Education Code Section 100420(c), and Labor Code Section 1771.3(a) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014. Modernization funding may also be used for the costs incurred by the district directly or through a contract with a third party provider for the initiation and enforcement of a LCP. Modernization funding, with the exception of savings, is limited to expenditure on the specific site where the modernization grant eligibility was generated. The grant may not be used for the following:

(a) New building area with the exception of the following:

(1) Replacement building area of like kind. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the district.

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(2) Replacement of existing buildings that are at least 75 years old, pursuant to 1859.78.85, with increased area needed to meet the minimum CDE Title 5 requirements. Additional classrooms constructed within the replacement area will reduce the new construction baseline eligibility for the district.

(2)(3) Building area required by the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or by the Division of the State Architect's (DSA) handicapped access requirements.

(4) A new or expanded Minimum Essential Facility receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.5

(5) New construction or retrofit transitional kindergarten classrooms receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.6

(b) New site development items with the exception of:

(1) Replacement, repair or additions to existing site development.

(2) Site development items required by the federal ADA Act or by the DSA's handicapped access requirements.

(3) A new or expanded Minimum Essential Facility receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.5

(4) New construction or retrofit transitional kindergarten classroom(s) receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.6

(c) the evaluation and removal of hazardous or solid waste and/or hazardous substances when the Department of Toxic Substance Control has determined that the site contains dangerous levels of a hazardous substance, hazardous waste, or both that exceed ten percent of the combined adjusted grant and the district matching share for the project.

(d) Leased facilities not owned by another district or a county superintendent.

Modernization Grant funds may be used on any school facilities on the site, with the exception of portable classroom facilities eligible for an additional apportionment pursuant to Education Code Sections 17073.15 and 17074.10(f) and as defined in Section 1859.78.8. If the classroom facilities on the site include areas that are currently ineligible for modernization, it will not disqualify those facilities from future modernization funding.

Dear Ms. Kirk,

On behalf of the Los Angeles Unified School District (Los Angeles Unified), we appreciate OPSC's Proposition 2 stakeholder engagement and welcome the opportunity to provide input on the proposed amendments to the Schol Facility Program in response to Proposition 2.

The comments provided below correspond to the topics raised and materials provided for the April 3, 2025, Implementation Stakeholder Meeting #7.

75-Year-old Building Supplemental Grant

Stakeholder Feedback #2 – OPSC's response addressed how proposed regulations affect the funding of ancillary spaces but comes short of answering the question posed by the stakeholder, which was how the increased area required by Title 5 for TK/K classrooms is to be funded. The example that OPSC references from the January 30, 2025 Stakeholder Meeting does not account for Title 5-required increases in square footage. Rather it states that classroom construction square footage should be removed from the calculation of like-kind square footage, meaning districts would not receive funding for the required increases. Los Angeles Unified requests further clarification on how funding for Title 5-required increases in classroom square footage will be calculated.

Stakeholder Feedback #3 – In its feedback letter to Stakeholder Meeting #5 dated March 27th, 2025, Los Angeles Unified requested OPSC provide guidance on what aging start date should be used to establish a building's age in cases where a building pre-dates DSA and the DSA approval date does not exist. In the same letter, Los Angeles Unified also recommended OPSC consider the DSA approval of a portable building's first campus placement, rather than the current campus placement, as the start of a building's aging. The response provided by OPSC warrants additional guidance for the situations posed by Los Angeles Unified in its previous feedback letter. Guidance on these situations will also affect the regulations changes proposed for 2 CCR Section 1859.78.65.

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Stakeholder Feedback #8 – OPSC’s response did not clarify whether it was agreeable to the stakeholder suggestion to use Sierra West Construction Remodeling Cost Level F3 for the required 75 years or older funding cost benefit analysis. Additionally, Los Angeles Unified would like to clarify that the Sierra West book does not state that Level F3 is specifically designed for Facility Hardship projects, rather it states Level F3 is for situations that “are a less than common type of construction, involve very small quantities, are in a remote location or have difficult access.” Los Angeles Unified continues to recommend that the F3 level be used for the cost-benefit analysis, as Level F1 would not adequately account for the challenges associated with buildings over 75 years old. These challenges include the presence of asbestos, lead, and other unknown conditions commonly found in older facilities, all of which can significantly impact scope and cost.

Stakeholder Feedback #9 – Los Angeles Unified recommends SP1As, in addition to “as-use plans,” be allowed in cases where original DSA plans are unavailable.

Stakeholder Feedback #10 – OPSC’s response stated that it has taken the feedback regarding viewing buildings per their current use rather than the snapshot use but did not provide the outcome of their consideration. Los Angeles Unified requests clarification on what OPSC concluded regarding this situation, and by what reasoning.

OPSC stated in the Pupil Grant Funding Model section (pp. 22-23) that the base grant would be calculated from the new construction per pupil grant whereas the 75 years or older supplemental grant will be processed under the modernization program. The materials do not clarify how the modernization baseline eligibility will be adjusted, whether the pupil grants will be adjusted or whether a building will receive a new aging date. Los Angeles Unified requests clarification on how eligibility will be adjusted.

OPSC’s proposed revision to 2 CCR Section 1859.78.7 (pp. 32-33) indicates that site-development funding will be either (a) the lesser of 60% of the costs needed to upgrade utility service or (b) 20% of the funding authorized by SFP regulation 1859.78.6. The funding authorized by regulation 1859.78.6 is based on 50-year pupil grants. Los Angeles Unified requests clarification on OPSC’s rationale for basing the 75-year-old site-development utilities grant on 50-year rather than 75-year pupil grants when a 75-year building is being replaced.

Proposed Form SAB 50-04 Updates (p.37) – “General Information” language reads as follows: “This apportionment is available for projects that only demolished existing 75 years old facilities and construct in eligible like kind replacement.” Los Angeles Unified believes this may be a drafting error and requests clarification or a correction to the proposed change.

Proposed Form SAB 50-04 Updates (p.38) – Los Angeles Unified requests clarification on Section 2.d where the first and second bullet points state “the total number of eligible classrooms or the total eligible non-classroom square footage.” The District would like clarification on whether these bullet points should read “the total number of eligible classrooms and/or the total eligible non-classroom square footage.”

Supplemental Grants for Minimum Essential Facilities (MEF)

Los Angeles Unified understands that OPSC intends to use the most current enrollment at the time an application is processed to determine funding under the Modernization Eligibility Fund (MEF). We also understand that OPSC advises that projects constructed in advance of receiving state funding approval are undertaken at the district's own risk. Given the extended processing times for applications and the potential impact on funding calculations, Los Angeles Unified suggests establishing a priority processing option for projects where current enrollment is a critical factor in the funding calculation. Implementing such an option would help mitigate the effects of delayed processing timelines, which are outside the control of applicant districts.

Los Angeles Unified thanks OPSC for the example calculations which help illustrate how the supplemental grant would be calculated. Regarding the example funding methods on pages 57-65, OPSC calculates Permanent "Other" square footage at \$312 per square foot and Permanent "Toilet" square footage at \$559 per square foot. These dollar amounts are also cited in the proposed 2 CCR Section 1859.77.5 language. However, these dollar amounts do not appear in the current School Facility Program Grant Amount tables. Clarification is requested as to whether new grant amounts for MEF will be added to the existing SFP Grant Amount Tables.

Regarding the Proposed Funding Methods (pp. 60–63), Los Angeles Unified notes that under Option 1, funding for toilet space is limited to the amount needed to serve current CBEDS enrollment. Based on typical site conditions, this limitation would likely result in reduced or no grant funding for additional toilet space. Under Option 2, the grant amount is applied uniformly across all square footage without differentiating between classroom, toilet, or other types of space. However, it is not clear whether toilet space will still be limited to the amount needed to serve current CBEDS enrollment. Clarification is requested regarding how toilet space need will be evaluated under Option 2.

In addition, Los Angeles Unified suggests allowing school districts the flexibility to choose between Option 1 and Option 2 based on what best meets the needs of each project. Providing this flexibility would better accommodate varying site conditions and ensure equitable access to available grant funding.

Proposed 2 CCR Section 1859.77.5 provides that if a School District submits documentation demonstrating that additional toilet space must be constructed to obtain plan approval from DSA, the eligible toilet square footage may be increased by the amount necessary to meet that requirement. We respectfully request clarification regarding the specific documentation that will be accepted to substantiate this need, as well as confirmation from DSA on the associated documentation and approval procedure.

Stakeholder Feedback #5 – Reference to 2 CCR Section 1859.50 does not seem directly connected to a requirement for certifying that the state has satisfied its obligation, as that section does not appear to address such an obligation. While we acknowledge the state's position that a site's modernization eligibility will be adjusted to account for the replacement of the classroom, we are unclear how the age of the replaced facility will be reset, particularly in cases where modifications are limited to only two spaces and constitute a reconfiguration rather than a modernization of the building and its systems. We respectfully request further clarification on these topics.

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Transitional Kindergarten Supplemental Grant


Los Angeles Unified appreciates the work that went into developing and presenting the three options outlined in the February 13, 2025, stakeholder materials. To support a clear and shared understanding of the option evaluation process, we respectfully request a summary of the stakeholder feedback received for each option, along with example calculations for all three scenarios. Providing this additional information will help ensure that all stakeholders are able to fully understand and engage in the decision-making process.

Regarding the Pupil Grant Funding Model (pp. 82–84), clarification is requested as to whether the TK supplemental grant will be capped based on the number of modernization pupil grants requested, or if the full TK supplemental grant will be awarded regardless.

RE: FEEDBACK ON TOPICS PRESENTED DURING APRIL 3, 2025 STAKEHOLDER MEETING FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF PROPOSITION 2 FOR THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM

To Whom it May Concern:

Hancock Park & DeLong, Inc. appreciates the opportunity to continue providing feedback regarding the topics presented during the seventh Proposition 2 Stakeholder meeting held on April 3, 2025. Below is a summary of our comments and concerns:

- **Proposed Regulations to Implement a Modernization Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings**
 - SFP Reg. Section 1859.61. (m) – we propose that the language be “*Adjusted as a result of the 75 years or older buildings receiving replacement funding, pursuant to Education Code Section 17074.265.*”
 - Will the “m” adjustment also cause the building age to be reset to the date of the Apportionment for the corresponding project, similar to adjustment (l)(1)? If so, can this be noted as well?
 - Section 1859.78.65. – please clarify the intended calculation of 75-year eligibility as currently outlined in (a)(1). The proposed regulatory language currently references new construction capacity for a district, High School Attendance Area (HSAA), or Super HSAA and references the adjustments to districtwide or HSAA classroom inventory based upon SFP Regulation Section 1859.32, and Substantial Enrollment Requirement adjustments, neither of which are currently contemplated in modernization eligibility calculations.
 - Please clarify the restrictions on reimbursement in section (b)(5) using only “local funds.”
 - Section 1859.78.7 – is the site development for 75-year-old buildings also intended to be limited to the lessor of (a) or (b)? 1859.78.7.(b) equates to 20% of the 50-Year grant funding outlined in Regulation Section 1859.78.6., which does not contemplate replacement of facilities, only upgrades to 50-year facilities. This limitation seems overly restrictive if a district needs to update or completely replace the existing 75-year utilities infrastructure associated with a new building.

- Similarly, is the site development for water, sewer and gas connections for the replaced building required to be limited to “five feet of the 50 years or older building, or 75 years or older building”? The 50-year site development grant was intended to upgrade an existing building, and did not contemplate the ability to replace an existing building and possibly relocating it elsewhere on the school site. It may be more appropriate to build the replacement building elsewhere on the existing school site, and the associated site development should be allowed to tie into existing utilities infrastructure similar to a new construction addition project.
 - Section 1859.79.2(a)(2) is being revised to incorporate provisions for increased square footage within a modernization project to replace 75-year-old facilities, to account for Title 5 requirements for specific minimum dimensions for classrooms, ancillary spaces, etc. We believe that this use of modernization grants should be allowed for *any* modernization project replacing undersized classrooms with Title 5-compliant classrooms, not only if the classrooms being replaced are over 75-years old.
 - Form SAB 50-04: Under General Information (7.), please clarify whether the application can be for future or proposed demolition of existing 75 year old buildings that are being replaced.
 - Please also clarify that the replacement does not need to be “like kind” (i.e., a portable building can be replaced with a permanent building).
 - Please confirm that the anticipated cost estimate for the modernization/rehabilitation of the 75-year-old building can be embedded in the required cost-benefit analysis, and does not need to be a separate document.
 - For the hybrid projects, please clarify what is meant by “locally funded work”. Does this include the anticipated district contribution?
 - Under Specific Instructions under sections 2. (c) and (d); it appears that pupil grants in each section and/or in total should not exceed the pupil grants being requested in section 2. (a). Please also clarify whether proposed section 2 (d.) is intended to be limited by available 50-year eligibility or whether it is intended to be limited by the associated calculation of 75-year pupil grants.
- **Proposed Regulatory Amendments for Minimum Essential Facilities Modernization Supplemental Grant**
 - Regarding 1859.79.2(a)(3), “A Minimum Essential Facility receiving funding pursuant to Section 1859.77.5. Only the funding provided by Section 1859.77.5 may be used on the Minimum Essential Facility.” By amending this regulation section, will the additional square footage costs need to be broken out and compared to the actual, exact cost of the newly built MEF? We note that it will be cumbersome and difficult to break out costs of just the new MEF square footage if included as part of a larger project in the same set of plans.
 - OPSC notes that this is not a stand-alone grant, there must be additional modernization work beyond the construction of a new MEF or expansion of an existing MEF, and that modernization work must have sufficient cost to justify a minimum grant request pursuant to SFP Regulation

Section 1859.79.3. Will there be a separate 60% commensurate requirement for each component of the application, as if it were a 'hybrid' project with multiple funding sources?

- We encourage OPSC to reconsider allowing the option of looking at enrollment at the time of submittal verses at the time of processing, in order to determine if an existing MEF is adequately sized. Additionally, please clarify whether it will be an option to use a 3-year average instead of current enrollment at the time of processing- the OPSC response to stakeholder feedback #8 was that current enrollment must be used, yet proposed reg section 1859.77.5(1)(A) states, "For the purposes of this Section, to determine if an existing Minimum Essential Facility is inadequate, the existing square footage is 60 percent or less than the square footage necessary for the current CBEDS at the site as calculated pursuant to Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2." This referenced section allows the option of current enrollment and a 3-year average:

1. The enrollment at the project site, is determined by the higher of a. or b. below, or c.:
 - a. The CBEDS Report of the current enrollment reporting year at the existing project site.
 - b. The average CBEDS Report of the current enrollment reporting year and two immediately preceding enrollment reporting years at the existing project site.
 - c. If the site is closed, use the CBEDS Report of the last enrollment reporting year in which the site was open.

2. Using the enrollment determined in 1. any permanent replacement Square Footage provided will be calculated in accordance to a., b., c., below and the chart below.

- Regarding the process to determine the fundable toilet square footage by looking at the total site-wide toilet square footage, we suggest that only student restroom area be included in the calculations (for both the MEF supplemental grant as well as the facility hardship grant calculations). The need for *student plus staff* toilet area does not correlate to the calculated, allowed area needed for *just students*, and it just doesn't make logical sense.
- We appreciate the option of the two funding methods presented and concur with OPSC's staff recommendation of Option #1.

- **Proposed Regulatory Amendments for School Facility Program Supplemental Grant for Transitional Kindergarten (TK) Classrooms**


- We note that grant amounts for the supplemental grant for new TK classrooms are not nearly adequate to help a district to construct a modular or stick-built classroom, as has been shown in multiple applications under the Full-Day Kindergarten (FDK) program which were rescinded or needed to reduce the scope of the project due to costs. We however, also recognize that the requirement to construct a *non-portable* classroom with this grant is statutory and not able to be changed by OPSC or the SAB.
- We agree with the funding model that OPSC is supporting, following the same model as the FDK funding model.

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- Please clarify the proposed adjustment under Section 1859.51, (t). Transitional kindergarten pupils are not currently recognized in existing School Facility Program regulations, nor are they currently recognized under New Construction Eligibility calculations.

Please let us know if you have any questions or would like additional information regarding these topics. We look forward to continuing conversations as these topics progress with development.

IMPLEMENTATION OF PROPOSITION 2 FOR THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM, SECOND ROUND MODERNIZATION, AND GLOBAL SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM REGULATORY AMENDMENTS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this meeting is to continue discussion with stakeholders on the implementation of the Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2). Separate from Proposition 2 implementation, this meeting will also continue discussion of the topics of Second Round Modernization and Global School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Updates, including their respective proposed SFP regulatory amendments and stakeholder feedback.

Proposition 2 Implementation

- 75-Year Old Modernization Supplemental Grant (Attachment A5) – previously presented at the January 30 and April 3, 2025 stakeholder meetings.

BACKGROUND

PURPOSE

To continue discussion regarding proposed School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation changes resulting from California's voter-approved Kindergarten through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety, and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Proposition 2).

AUTHORITY

BACKGROUND

The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) held a public meeting on April 3, 2025, to discuss proposed criteria for determining the eligibility and funding for a modernization grant for buildings at least 75 years old, and to receive stakeholder input.

STAFF ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

OPSC would like to thank the stakeholders who were able to view, attend, or participate in this meeting and those who provided feedback at either the meeting or through written correspondence to OPSC. This meeting presented proposed changes which included both additions and amendments to the SFP Regulations regarding the 75-years-or-older supplemental grant. This follow up meeting is being presented as there are important changes to the proposed regulations from what was previously presented. Attachment A5b addresses the new proposed regulations that have been discussed since the April 3, 2025 meeting and OPSC seeks stakeholder feedback regarding the changes.

In addition, staff has consolidated all questions asked after the previous stakeholder meeting on this topic and provides the following responses to them.

Proposed New Regulations and Regulatory Amendments

The new and updated proposed regulatory amendments as a result of discussions and stakeholder feedback after the April 3, 2025 meeting are on Attachment A5b.

After reviewing the feedback, staff determined that more detailed regulations are necessary to ensure that future applicants have clear guidance on how to qualify for these grants. In particular, staff expanded the list of qualifying criteria, added requirements for the cost-benefit analysis, and listed the allowable site development costs that may be requested.

A new proposed regulation section for the 75-years-or-older grants, titled SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.7.1: Modernization Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings, is included as Attachment A5b. The proposed regulations establish eligibility criteria to replace buildings that are at least 75 years old. The proposed regulations also include a new Form SAB 57-75, which will serve as the cost estimate form for preparing the cost-benefit analysis required by the statute. In addition, the option to submit a cost estimate for allowable on-site and utilities site development costs is added that caps these funding at 35 percent of the total 75-year old funding amount. The proposed Form SAB 57-75 may be found on Attachment A5d.

Staff proposes the following changes to the new regulation section for the 75-years-or-older grants:

SFP Regulation Section 1859.2 includes a new definition for the proposed Form SAB 57-75, which will be incorporated by reference.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.78.7.1 Modernization Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings. This regulation section has been adjusted to consider the increased funding pursuant to EC Section 17074.265(b) that is provided for the replacement of 75-years-or-older facilities. The following Sections have also been modified:

- Section (a)(1-4) defines the eligibility criteria for buildings
- Section (a)(5) defines the requirements for developing a cost-benefit analysis to determine if the cost to modernize the building exceeds the 50 percent threshold stated in EC Section 17074.265.
- Section (b) provides the calculation method to determine the corresponding pupil grant amount for the replacement of qualifying classrooms.
- Section (c) provides the calculation method to determine the corresponding grant amount for the replacement of qualifying non-classroom square footage.

ATTACHMENT E

- Section (d) provides the option to request allowable site development costs or 35 percent of the replacement grant determined in (b) or (c).
- Section (e) specifies that portable buildings replaced under these provisions shall be replaced with permanent square footage.
- Section (f) provides the timeline requirement for demolition of the qualifying building(s).

Staff updated the following proposed amendments to the SFP Regulations and the Form SAB 50-04 that are impacted by the new statute:

Staff has removed the new adjustment type (m) from SFP Regulation Section 1859.61 to align the process of 75-years-or-older funding with 50-years-or-older funding. Because the pupil grants for 75-years-or-older supplemental funding are already being claimed in Section 2.a. of the Form SAB 50-04, there will be no adjustment to the modernization baseline to avoid duplication of the grant request.

- The General Information Section of the Form SAB 50-04 under #7 has been modified to include the following changes:
 - The first bullet point pertaining to 75-years-or-older buildings will allow for “proposed” projects and not only reimbursement projects for the demolished and constructed 75-years-or-older buildings.
 - The second and third bullet points pertaining to 75-years-or-older buildings have been replaced to require submittal of the proposed new form, the *75 Years or Older Building Cost Estimate and Cost/Benefit Analysis* (Form SAB 57-75).
- The Specific Instructions on the proposed Form SAB 50-04 for Section 2.d. have been modified to include the following:
 - Staff has adjusted the language to indicate “and/or” in bullet points one and two to account for buildings that include both classroom and non-classroom square footage.
 - The third bullet point now clarifies that the 75-years-or-older pupil grant request will be a subset of the cumulative number of pupil grants requested in Section 2.a. and may not exceed that request.

- The Specific Instructions on the proposed Form SAB 50-04 for Section 6.d. have been modified to specify that up to 35 percent of allowable eligible costs will be provided for site development costs necessary for the replacement of a 75-years-or-older building.

Proposed amendments to the Form SAB 50-04 are reflected on Attachment A5c.

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17071.25. Existing School Building Capacity

(a) The existing school building capacity in the applicant school district or, where appropriate, in the attendance area, at the time of initial application shall be calculated pursuant to the following formula:

(1) Identify by grade level all permanent teaching stations existing in the school district or, where appropriate, the attendance area. For the purposes of this section, "teaching station" means any space that was constructed or reconstructed to serve as an area in which to provide pupil instruction, but shall not include portable buildings, except as provided in Section 17071.30.

(2) (A) The assumed capacity of each calculated teaching station pursuant to paragraph (1) shall be 25 pupils for each teaching station used for kindergarten or for grades 1 to 6, inclusive, and 27 pupils for each teaching station used for grades 7 to 12, inclusive.

(B) On or after January 1, 2000, the board may adopt or amend regulations adjusting the assumed capacity set forth in this subparagraph as appropriate for each teaching station used for nonsevere or severe special day class purposes after considering the recommendations of the Legislative Analyst pursuant to Section 17072.15. These special day class capacity adjustments and any adjustment of existing school capacity related to changes in the assumed capacity of special day class teaching stations shall be approved by the Director of Finance prior to implementation.

(C) On or after January 1, 2001, the board may adopt regulations establishing assumed capacity standards after consideration of the recommendations developed by the Director of General Services for continuation high school, community day school, county community school, and county community day school, teaching stations pursuant to Section 17072.17. Teaching station assumed capacity adjustments pursuant to these regulations and any other adjustments of existing school capacity related to changes in the assumed capacity of continuation high school, community day school, county community school, and county community day school, teaching stations shall be approved by the Director of Finance prior to implementation.

(3) Multiply the assumed capacity of each teaching station as specified in paragraph (2) by the number of teaching stations calculated under paragraph (1).

(4) The result of this computation shall be the number of pupils housed by grade level in the existing school building capacity of the applicant school district.

(b) The existing school building capacity of the applicant school district calculated under this section shall not include, in any school operated on a year-round schedule, any teaching station that has been in continuous use

AUTHORITY (cont.)

during the preceding five-year period primarily for the operation of a preschool program or programs.

EC Section 17074.265. Modernization Apportionment

(a) Notwithstanding Article 6 (commencing with Section 17073.10), a school district shall be eligible to receive a modernization apportionment to demolish and construct a building or buildings on an existing schoolsite if both of the following conditions are met:

(1) The building or buildings to be replaced are at least 75 years old.

(2) The school district provides a cost-benefit analysis that indicates the total cost to modernize the building or buildings is at least 50 percent of the current replacement cost, as defined by the board, of the building or buildings. The cost-benefit analysis may include applicable site development costs.

(b) A project that meets the requirements of subdivision (a) shall be eligible for a grant equal to the grant provided under Section 17072.10 multiplied by the capacity of the building or buildings calculated pursuant to Section 17071.25.

(c) The board may adopt regulations to implement this section.

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PROPOSED REGULATIONS

1859.2 Definitions

....

'Form SAB 57-75' means the 75 Year Old Building Cost/Benefit Analysis, Form SAB 57-75, (Revised xx/25), which is incorporated by reference.

....

Section 1859.78.7.1 Modernization Additional Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings

In lieu of the funding provided by subdivision (a) of Education Code Section 17074.10 and Section 1859.78.3, the Board shall provide funding to Approved Applications received on or after October 31, 2024 for projects that include the demolition and replacement of 75 years or older permanent or portable school building(s) if a contract for the work was awarded on or after July 3, 2024.

- (a) To receive 75 years or older funding pursuant to Education Code Section 17074.265, all of the following must be met:
- (1) The existing permanent or portable building must be at least 75 years or older. For purposes of determining the age of the building, the 75 years or older period shall begin 12 months after the original plans for the construction of the building were approved by the Department or DSA as applicable.
 - (2) Each building on the site that is 75 years or older must qualify on an individual basis.
 - (3) If the school building was demolished prior to OPSC's receipt of an Approved Application, the school building must have been 75 years old prior to the demolition.
 - (4) The existing permanent or portable building must be replaced at the same site.
 - (5) The School District must complete and submit to OPSC a 75 Year Old Building Cost/Benefit Analysis (Form SAB 57-75) that demonstrates the total cost to modernize the school building(s) and comply with current Title 24 Building Code are at least 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost for the applicable building type; permanent or portable. The cost/benefit analysis must meet the following criteria:
 - (A) The Form SAB 57-75 must demonstrate the minimum work required to modernize and remain in the School Building is at least 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost of the existing Square Footage of the school building.
 - (B) The modernization work required may only include work directly related to the demolition and replacement of the 75 year old school building(s), which may include improvements to extend the useful life of, or to enhance the physical environment of the qualifying 75 year old building. The Form SAB 57-75 may only include:
 1. The cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, the replacement of portable classrooms, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, costs to limit pupil exposure to harmful air pollutants by updating air filtration systems, furniture and equipment, including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, and the upgrading of electrical systems or wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.
 2. The cost of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high-performance schools.
 - (C) The Form SAB 57-75 may not include costs associated with the acquisition of real property or costs for routine maintenance and repair.

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- (D) The Form SAB 57-75 must use the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication by Sierra West Publishing. For all materials or items listed in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication, the amounts entered on the Form SAB 57-75 must use the provided unit costs. For individual materials or items that are not contained in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair publication, the School District must provide supporting documentation to demonstrate that the costs for the unique work are reasonable and appropriate.
- (E) All requested line items shall include Construction Specifications Institute reference number (CSI #), description, F2 total unit cost amount, and quantity. Any line items that include amounts in lump-sum formats will not be reviewed or approved.

(b) For each 75 years old or older classroom replaced, funding shall be provided on a per pupil grant basis for the number of pupils to be housed as follows: 25 for each K-6 Classroom, 27 for each 7-12 Classroom, 13 for each Special Day Class Non-Severe Classroom, and 9 for each Special Day Class Severe Classroom. The grant amounts shown below shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17072.10.

- (1) \$19,016 for each elementary pupil.
- (2) \$20,113 for each middle school pupil.
- (3) \$25,592 for each high school pupil.
- (4) \$53,437 for each Special Day Class Severe pupil.
- (5) \$35,738 for each Special Day Class Non-Severe pupil.

(c) For 75 years old or older non-classroom Square Footage replaced, the eligible Square Footage shall be the lesser of the delta between the Square Footage of the existing non-classroom Square Footage determined by Section 1859.60 and actual Square Footage constructed or the delta between the Square Footage of the existing non-classroom Square Footage per the snapshot and the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2. Excess square footage required as part of Title 5 requirements needed to obtain plan approval are permissible per Regulation Section 1859.79.2 and considered an eligible expenditure, not to exceed square footage provided in Regulation Section 1859.82.1. Any excess Square Footage not due to Title 5 requirements will not be eligible and must be locally funded by the School District. The funding provided will be calculated as follows:

- (1) Multiply the resulting Square Footage of the qualifying building by \$312.
- (2) Divide the product by the per pupil allowance in subsection (b) to determine the total allowable pupil grants for the square footage being constructed.

(d) An additional grant for site development for the minimum work required to replace the qualifying building. Any site development provided will be reduced, on a prorated basis, by the percentage of excess square footage constructed. The School District may request the lesser of either (1) or (2):

(1) 60 percent of the following approved site development and applicable design costs:

- (A) Service site development cost, within school property lines, attributable only to the replacement 75 year old building for:
 - 1. Site clearance including the removal of trees, brush, and debris within footprint of the replacement 75 year old building.
 - 2. Demolition and removal of the qualifying 75 year old building and existing buildings and site improvements which lie in the footprint of a proposed replacement 75 year old building.
 - 3. Removal and rerouting of existing utility service which lie in the footprint of a proposed replacement 75 year old building.
 - 4. Rough grading including cut and fill and leveling and terracing operations required in the design.
 - 5. Soil compaction adhering to common engineering practices and engineered fill that is required by a soils report that is available for review by the OPSC.

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6. On-site drainage facilities including inlets below grade drainage facilities and retention basins.
 7. Erosion control improvements such as plant material, temporary sprinkler systems, jute mesh and straw, due to embankments having a slope of at least two to one and a vertical height greater than six feet.
 8. Outside stairways, handicap ramps and retaining walls due to embankments having a slope of at least two to one and a vertical height greater than six feet.
 9. Fire code requirements on site that are not a part of the building.
 - (B) Utility service costs that are necessary to serve replacement 75 years or older building:
 1. Water: Replacement or repair of main water service line(s) between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site, connection fees if applicable, meter (if not provided by the serving utility), and replacement or repair of a domestic water appurtenances (i.e., well, pump, tank) as needed for the proper operation of the system.
 2. Sewage: Replacement or repair of main sewer line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site and connection fees, if applicable. Replacement or repair of sewage appurtenances (i.e., treatment/disposal system) as needed for the proper operation of the system and a main disposal line from the treatment system to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.
 3. Gas: Replacement or repair of main gas service line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site, connection fee (if applicable), meter (if not provided by serving utility) or replacement or repair of gas service appurtenances (i.e., liquefied petroleum system and tank) as needed for proper operation of the system and a new main supply line from the tank to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.
 4. Electric: Replacement or repair of electrical service between the utility company connection and the building's main switchboard. Primary electric service runs between the utility company's point of connection and the transformer. Secondary electric service runs between the transformer and the main switchboard. Connection fee, transformer pads and protective devices (i.e., bollards) as required by the utility company.
 5. Communication systems: Replacement or repair of service between the utility company connection and the nearest distribution center.
- (2) Site development and design costs equal to 35 percent of the funding provided in (b) or (c).
- (e) Portable buildings replaced pursuant to this section shall be replaced with a permanent Square Footage.
- (f) The qualifying permanent or portable 75 year old or older building must be demolished before the Notice of Completion of the project.

Note: Authority cited: Section 17070.35, Education Code.

On behalf of the Los Angeles Unified School District (Los Angeles Unified), we appreciate OPSC's Proposition 2 stakeholder engagement and welcome the opportunity to provide input on the proposed amendments to the Schol Facility Program in response to Proposition 2.

The comments and recommendations provided below correspond to the topics raised and materials provided for the May 8, 2025, Implementation Stakeholder Meeting #10.

75-Year-Old Modernization Supplemental Grant

Stakeholder Feedback #3 - OPSC's response states that F1 level is to be used for 75-years-or-older projects. However, OPSC references three different Sierra West Levels in the subsequent pages: F2 level (pp. 16), F1 level (pp. 28), and F3 level (pp. 30). Los Angeles Unified continues to advocate for the appropriateness of using the F3 level, consistent with the definitions provided in the *Sierra West Current Construction Remodeling Costs 2025* publication. Nonetheless, LA Unified would also support the use of the F2 level. As illustrated by Sierra West (see Image 1), the F1 level is not appropriate for the modernization of a 75-year-old facility, as Sierra West indicates that F1 is typically applied to new construction or tenant improvements in large, open, unfinished spaces—conditions that do not reflect the complexities of modernizing an aging structure.

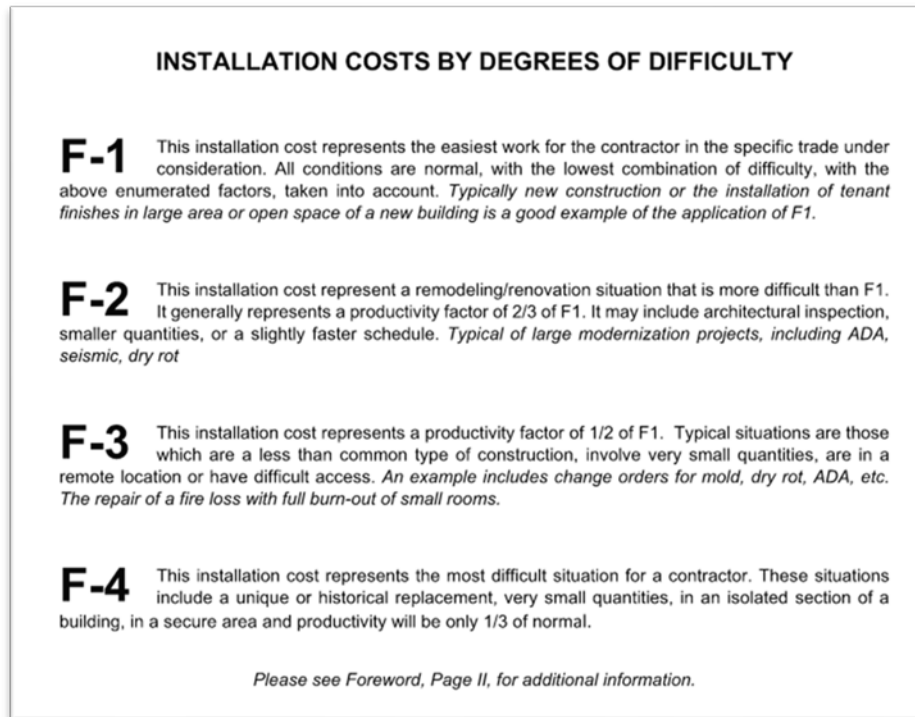

Accordingly, LA Unified urges OPSC to authorize the use of the F2 or F3 levels (with a preference for the F3 level) for modernization projects involving aging facilities, and to update the associated regulations and forms to reflect a consistent and appropriate application of these cost levels.

Stakeholder Feedback #7 – OPSC’s response does not address the stakeholder’s request for the rationale for basing 75-year-old site development utilities grant on 50-year pupil grants. Los Angeles Unified requests further clarity on OPSC’s rationale on this item.

Stakeholder Feedback #11 – The revisions to 2 CCR Section 1859.78.65(b)(5) were not included as part of the May 8, 2025, meeting materials. Los Angeles Unified requests the proposed revisions be provided for stakeholder review before they are finalized

Stakeholder Feedback #12 – Los Angeles Unified requests the rationale behind the 35 percent cap that is being proposed for site development related to 75-year-old buildings.

Stakeholder Feedback #13 – OPSC states its opposition to funding site development costs for replacement of a 75-year-old building elsewhere on the same campus. Los Angeles Unified requests the basis for this determination.

Proposed 2 CCR Section 1859.78.7.1 – Please see the Attachment at the end of this letter, which includes Los Angeles Unified’s in-line comments on the “Modernization Additional Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings” section.

Proposed SAB Form 50-04

- Based on the information provided, the first two bullet points under Section 2.d (p. 20) should read: “The total number of eligible classrooms and/or the total non-classroom square footage...”.
- Based on the information provided, Section D (p. 23) should be clarified to state: “The total square footage of eligible non-classroom space being demolished”.

Proposed Form SAB 57-75

- For clarity, Los Angeles Unified suggests the proposed categories under Part IV (p. 29) be revised to read “Permanent Toilet,” “Permanent Other,” “Portable Toilet,” and “Portable Other.”
- Part IV (p. 29) references “OPSC Verified Total Project Cost” but Los Angeles Unified believes it should read “OPSC Approved Total Project Cost” to reflect the language on the form. The “Calculation Detail” (p. 31) appears to include an internal OPSC note in error.

Career Technical Education Supplemental Grant

Proposed 2 CCR Section 1859.78.10(b)(2) – OPSC proposes use of Sierra West F1 Level costs for the detailed cost estimate associated with the career technical education (CTE) scope of work under the supplemental grant. This approach deviates from 2 CCR §1859.193(b)(A) and (c)(A), which allow CTEFP project costs to be determined by the project architect. Requiring F1 Level estimates introduces duplicative effort for LEAs who elect to pursue the CTE supplemental grant for high-scoring CTEFP applications that did not receive funding, and creates inconsistency within the SFP regulations for CTE scopes of work. Los Angeles Unified recommends that architect-prepared estimates be accepted for the supplemental grant to reduce administrative burden and for alignment with CTEFP application documentation.

Global SFP Regulation Updates

Stakeholder Feedback #2 – OPSC’s response to the stakeholder comment does not fully address the question posed. It is understood that buildings without DSA approval should not be included in the snapshot to determine modernization eligibility, however this does not address how buildings built before DSA existed should be aged. Any building built before 1933 did not receive a DSA approval stamp until after 1933, which means the building’s age is being misrepresented. This misrepresentation affects school districts’ ability to apply for supplemental grants determined by a building’s age, such as the 75-year-old modernization supplemental grant. Los Angeles Unified recommends that, for buildings constructed prior to the establishment of DSA, the date of the original construction plans be used to determine age eligibility under the 75-year-old supplemental grant.

2 CCR Section 1859.193 Career Technical Education Facilities Grant Determination – Los Angeles Unified would like clarification on whether reducing specific equipment to fewer items (e.g., purchasing two units of an item instead of four units) or removal of equipment altogether, due to descope during design or lack of availability, is still considered a change in scope, and would therefore continue to require an appeal be submitted to the SAB.

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Proposed 2 CCR Section 1859.106 Revisions – Los Angeles Unified disagrees with OPSC's interpretation that the penalty for a finding of ineligible expenditures must equal 100% of the funds in question. The School Facility Program is fundamentally structured around a matching share model, where both the State and Local Education Agency contributes proportionally to eligible projects. Accordingly, any repayment obligation should be limited to the State's matching share of the ineligible expenditures, as determined by the local auditor, rather than the aggregate amount.

The intent of the penalty provision is to protect the State's financial interest—not to recover funds beyond its contribution. Requiring repayment of 100% effectively includes both the State and local shares, which exceeds the scope of the State's interest and imposes an undue financial burden on the Local Education Agency.

Second Round Modernization

Item #5 (p. 295) - This item specifies that when a portable classroom is replaced by a permanent building, it will continue to generate eligibility as a portable every 20 years. Los Angeles Unified seeks clarification on what happens when a portable classroom is replaced with a permanent building. Additionally, Los Angeles Unified requests further explanation on the rationale to continue to classify a permanent building as a portable building.

Determination of Second Round Modernization Pupil Types – Los Angeles Unified has concerns with OPSC's current methodology for determining the type of pupil grant (permanent or portable) returned to districts during second-round modernization funding. Because funding applications do not require districts to identify whether the grant request was for permanent or portable pupils, Los Angeles Unified recommends that districts be given discretion to determine the type of pupil grant being returned. A proration based on square footage of permanent versus portable facilities may not accurately reflect the original intent of the application, particularly when permanent construction was proposed. As such, it may result in an inequitable return of eligibility after the aging period.

For example, if a district had 400 eligible pupils, with 200 being permanent pupils and 200 being portable pupils, and submitted a funding request for 150 pupils, the district should be permitted to designate whether that request reflected permanent pupils, portable pupils, or a combination of both when those pupils become eligible for second-round funding. This is particularly important when the original funding application proposed constructing permanent facilities.

1859.2 Definitions

....
'Form SAB 57-75' means the 75 Year Old Building Cost/Benefit Analysis, Form SAB 57-75, (Revised xx/25), which is incorporated by reference.
....

Section 1859.78.7.1 Modernization Additional Grant for 75 Years or Older Buildings

In lieu of the funding provided by subdivision (a) of Education Code Section 17074.10 and Section 1859.78.3, the Board shall provide funding to Approved Applications received on or after October 31, 2024 for projects that include the demolition and replacement of 75 years or older permanent or portable school building(s) if a contract for the work was awarded on or after July 3, 2024.

(a) To receive 75 years or older funding pursuant to Education Code Section 17074.265, all of the following must be met:

- (1) The existing permanent or portable building must be at least 75 years or older. For purposes of determining the age of the building, the 75 years or older period shall begin 12 months after the original plans for the construction of the building were approved by the Department or DSA as applicable.
- (2) Each building on the site that is 75 years or older must qualify on an individual basis.
- (3) If the school building was demolished prior to OPSC's receipt of an Approved Application, the school building must have been 75 years old prior to the demolition.
- (4) The existing permanent or portable building must be replaced at the same site.
- (5) The School District must complete and submit to OPSC a 75 Year Old Building Cost/Benefit Analysis (Form SAB 57-75) that demonstrates the total cost to modernize the school building(s) and comply with current Title 24 Building Code are at least 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost for the applicable building type; permanent or portable. The cost/benefit analysis must meet the following criteria:
 - (A) The Form SAB 57-75 must demonstrate the minimum work required to modernize and remain in the School Building is at least 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost of the existing Square Footage of the school building.

LAUSD Comments:

The Los Angeles Unified School District respectfully seeks clarification on who is responsible for determining what constitutes "minimum work."

(B) The modernization work required may only include work directly related to the demolition and replacement of the 75 year old school building(s), which may include improvements to extend the useful life of, or to enhance the physical environment of the qualifying 75 year old building. The Form SAB 57-75 may only include:

1. The cost of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, the replacement of portable classrooms, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, costs to limit pupil exposure to harmful air pollutants by updating air filtration systems, furniture and equipment, including

telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, and the upgrading of electrical systems or wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

2. The cost of designs and materials that promote the efficient use of energy and water, the maximum use of natural lighting and indoor air quality, the use of recycled materials and materials that emit a minimum of toxic substances, the use of acoustics conducive to teaching and learning, and other characteristics of high-performance schools.

(C) The Form SAB 57-75 may not include costs associated with the acquisition of real property or costs for routine maintenance and repair.

(D) The Form SAB 57-75 must use the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication by Sierra West Publishing. For all materials or items listed in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair Cost publication, the amounts entered on the Form SAB 57-75 must use the provided unit costs. For individual materials or items that are not contained in the most current edition of the Current Construction Remodeling and Repair publication, the School District must provide supporting documentation to demonstrate that the costs for the unique work are reasonable and appropriate.

(E) All requested line items shall include Construction Specifications Institute reference number (CSI #), description, F2 total unit cost amount, and quantity. Any line items that include amounts in lump-sum formats will not be reviewed or approved.

LAUSD Comments:

Per OPSC's response to Stakeholder Feedback Item No. 3: "OPSC maintains the position of providing the F1 level for 75-years-or-older projects." The Los Angeles Unified School District respectfully seeks clarification regarding which unit cost amount should be used on Form SAB 57-75. As currently written, the regulation instructs the use of the F2 total unit cost, which appears to conflict with OPSC's stated position of applying the F1 level for projects involving facilities that are 75 years or older.

(b) For each 75 years old or older classroom replaced, funding shall be provided on a per pupil grant basis for the number of pupils to be housed as follows: 25 for each K-6 Classroom, 27 for each 7-12 Classroom, 13 for each Special Day Class Non-Severe Classroom, and 9 for each Special Day Class Severe Classroom. The grant amounts shown below shall be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January, pursuant to Education Code Section 17072.10.

- (1) \$19,016 for each elementary pupil.
- (2) \$20,113 for each middle school pupil.
- (3) \$25,592 for each high school pupil.
- (4) \$53,437 for each Special Day Class Severe pupil.
- (5) \$35,738 for each Special Day Class Non-Severe pupil.

(c) For 75 years old or older non-classroom Square Footage replaced, the eligible Square Footage shall be the lesser of the delta between the Square Footage of the existing non-classroom Square Footage determined by Section 1859.60 and actual Square Footage constructed or the delta between the Square Footage of the existing non-classroom Square Footage per the snapshot and the Square Footage justified by enrollment pursuant to the chart in Section 1859.82.1(b)(4)(B)2. Excess square

footage required as part of Title 5 requirements needed to obtain plan approval are permissible per Regulation Section 1859.79.2 and considered an eligible expenditure, not to exceed square footage provided in Regulation Section 1859.82.1. Any excess Square Footage not due to Title 5 requirements will not be eligible and must be locally funded by the School District. The funding provided will be calculated as follows:

- (1) Multiply the resulting Square Footage of the qualifying building by \$312.

LAUSD Comments:

The Los Angeles Unified School District respectfully seeks clarification on how the \$312 amount was determined. Furthermore, the Los Angeles Unified School District seeks clarification on whether the \$312 will be subject to an annual adjustment.

- (2) Divide the product by the per pupil allowance in subsection (b) to determine the total allowable pupil grants for the square footage being constructed.

(d) An additional grant for site development for the minimum work required to replace the qualifying building. Any site development provided will be reduced, on a prorated basis, by the percentage of excess square footage constructed. The School District may request the lesser of either (1) or (2):

- (1) 60 percent of the following approved site development and applicable design costs:

(A) Service site development cost, within school property lines, attributable only to the replacement 75 year old building for:

1. Site clearance including the removal of trees, brush, and debris within footprint of the replacement 75 year old building.
2. Demolition and removal of the qualifying 75 year old building and existing buildings and site improvements which lie in the footprint of a proposed replacement 75 year old building.
3. Removal and rerouting of existing utility service which lie in the footprint of a proposed replacement 75 year old building.
4. Rough grading including cut and fill and leveling and terracing operations required in the design.
5. Soil compaction adhering to common engineering practices and engineered fill that is required by a soils report that is available for review by the OPSC.
6. On-site drainage facilities including inlets below grade drainage facilities and retention basins.
7. Erosion control improvements such as plant material, temporary sprinkler systems, jute mesh and straw, due to embankments having a slope of at least two to one and a vertical height greater than six feet.
8. Outside stairways, handicap ramps and retaining walls due to embankments having a slope of at least two to one and a vertical height greater than six feet.
9. Fire code requirements on site that are not a part of the building.

(B) Utility service costs that are necessary to serve replacement 75 years or older building:

1. Water: Replacement or repair of main water service line(s) between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site, connection fees if applicable, meter (if not provided by the serving utility), and replacement or repair of a domestic water appurtenances (i.e., well, pump, tank) as needed for the proper operation of the system.

2. Sewage: Replacement or repair of main sewer line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site and connection fees, if applicable. Replacement or repair of sewage appurtenances (i.e., treatment/disposal system) as needed for the proper operation of the system and a main disposal line from the treatment system to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.
3. Gas: Replacement or repair of main gas service line between the utility company connection and to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site, connection fee (if applicable), meter (if not provided by serving utility) or replacement or repair of gas service appurtenances (i.e., liquefied petroleum system and tank) as needed for proper operation of the system and a new main supply line from the tank to five feet of the 50 years or older building(s) on the site.
4. Electric: Replacement or repair of electrical service between the utility company connection and the building's main switchboard. Primary electric service runs between the utility company's point of connection and the transformer. Secondary electric service runs between the transformer and the main switchboard. Connection fee, transformer pads and protective devices (i.e., bollards) as required by the utility company.
5. Communication systems: Replacement or repair of service between the utility company connection and the nearest distribution center.

(2) Site development and design costs equal to 35 percent of the funding provided in (b) or (c).

(e) Portable buildings replaced pursuant to this section shall be replaced with a permanent Square Footage.

(f) The qualifying permanent or portable 75 year old or older building must be demolished before the Notice of Completion of the project.

RE: FEEDBACK ON TOPICS PRESENTED DURING THE MAY 8, 2025 STAKEHOLDER MEETING FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF PROPOSITION 2 FOR THE SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM

To Whom it May Concern:

Hancock Park & DeLong, Inc. appreciates the opportunity to continue providing feedback regarding the topics presented during the tenth Proposition 2 Stakeholder meeting held on May 8, 2025. Below is a summary of our comments and concerns:

- **Modernization Grant for 75 years or Older Buildings**

- We encourage OPSC to reconsider allowing the relocation of certain 75-year old buildings, and the associated site development costs, when the relocation includes a Multipurpose/Cafeteria building or a Gymnasium/Locker building. Title 5 requires Gymnasiums/Shower/Lockers to be secured from other parts of the campus for evening and weekend events and/or for public use (including emergencies). Similarly, Title 5 requires Multipurpose buildings to be located on the campus where the building will be easily accessible for public use, but close to the street for delivery truck access. Districts should have the ability to relocate these buildings on their school campuses in order to meet Title 5 requirements and increase school security while also allowing public access.

- **CTE Facilities: Modernization Supplemental Grant**

- We request clarification regarding contract dates for prior modernization projects that include CTE facilities. May a project be submitted with a current CDE score letter if the contract for the work was executed prior to July 3, 2024?

- **Regulatory Amendments for General Clean-up**

- The current instructions for Part D of the *Enrollment Certification/Projection* (Form SAB 50-01) include outdated references for how special education enrollment information is reported to CDE. The form currently asks for the information "as shown and reported within the California Special Education Management Information System [CASEMIS] to the CDE in December prior to

the latest CBEDS report.” Data collection for special education pupils was transitioned from CASEMIS to the California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System (CALPADS) over five years ago, during the 2019-20 school year. Under CALPADS, special education pupil data is collected at the same time as the rest of the K-12 data is collected, in early October of each year; there is no longer special ed data reporting being done in December of each year. As special education enrollment is no longer reported to CASEMIS, and no longer reported in December, clarification on the appropriate reporting process would be appreciated. It may be appropriate and timely to update the Form SAB 50-01 instructions to better align with the current practice by school districts.

- **Modernization Grant for Facilities Previously Modernized with State Funds**


- Regarding the situations where a district replacing a portable classroom eligible for second round funding with a different usage, assuming classroom space is no longer needed, we encourage OPSC to take another look at the previously proposed request.

The language of EC Section 17074.10(f) states “for a portable classroom that is eligible for a second modernization, the board shall require the school district to use the modernization funds to replace the portable classroom and to certify that the existing eligible portable classroom will be removed from any classroom use...” We concur with staff’s interpretation to mean that the replacement building must be for classroom use and that the district is required to replace the portable classroom space with classroom space (permanent or portable), *under this first section of the EC*. However, the remainder of ECS 17074.10(f) states, “...unless the school district is able to document that modernizing the portable classroom is a better use of public resources.”

We request that OPSC allow the replacement-in-kind of different usage to be considered “a better use of public resources”, as certified to by the district. Per SFP Reg Section 1859.79.2(a)(1) “modernization” is allowed to be “Replacement building area of like kind”, therefore it follows that a district “modernizing” a classroom should be able to replace it with like-kind building area. Further, OPSC has previously opined that “replacement area of like kind” refers to replacement *square footage* and not the *type of area*. Again, statewide K-12 enrollment is currently declining, many districts are needing to now re-evaluate their spaces and make the decisions that are best for their student population.

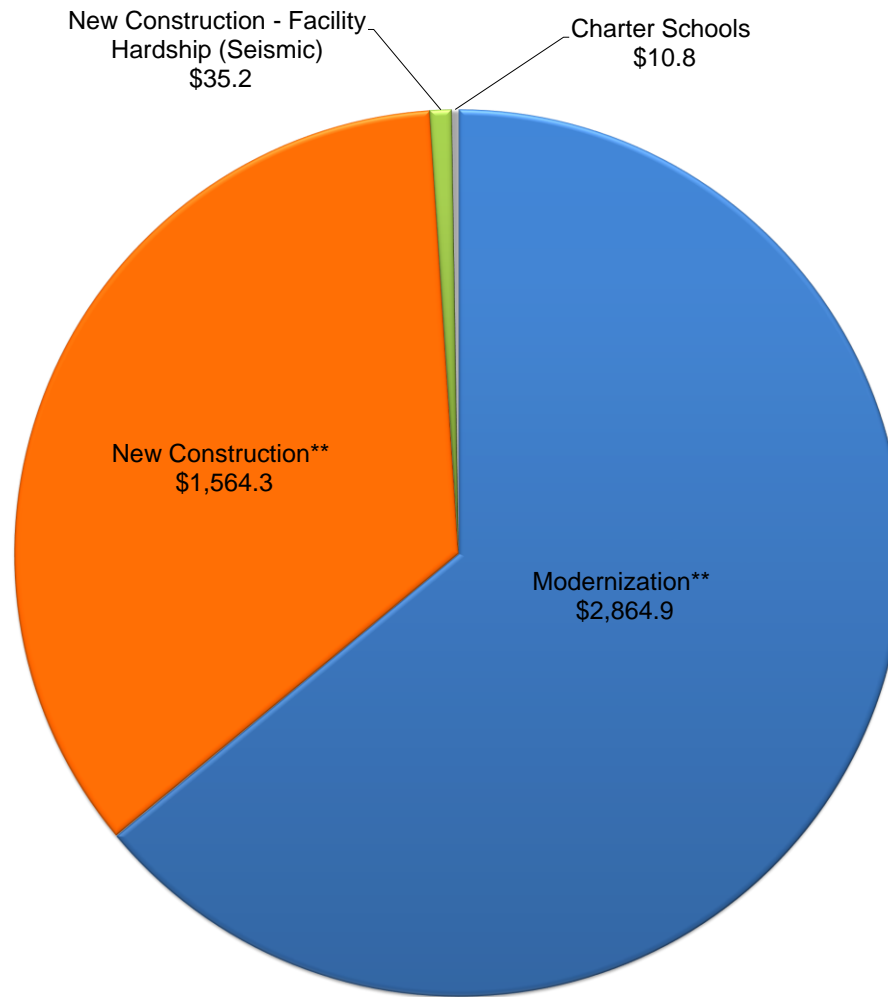

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA WILDFIRES EXTENSION REQUESTS

On January 7, 2025, Governor Newsom proclaimed a State of Emergency in Los Angeles and Ventura Counties as a result of severe wildfires and windstorm conditions.

As a result of prior emergency proclamations, the State Allocation Board (Board) previously approved regulations to provide the Executive Officer with the authority, during a proclaimed emergency by the Governor of the State of California, to grant program extensions. The Executive Officer must inform the Board of any action taken.

A total of 15 extension requests were received and processed by OPSC in January 2025. As of May 31, 2025 all requests have been resolved and are closed.
